RESOLUTION NO. 3-11-83-L

WHEREAS, The Indian Self-Determination Act granted Tribes' the right to contract for Bureau programs, and

WHEREAS, The Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is a Tribe recognized by the United States, and

WHEREAS, The Bureau of Indian Affairs is responsible to assist Tribes' in their endeavors.


NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the Oneida Business Committee requests a contract from the Bureau of Indians Affairs to provide funding from un-banded allocations for the expansion of an Oneida Historical Photographic Exhibit, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That contract negotiations, amendments and/or modifications be initiated through the Museum Director and the Tribal Administrator who will seek final approval of the Oneida Business Committee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That all allocations pertaining to this contract be made available July 1, 1983 via Letter of Credit and that the proposed term of the contract commence on July 1, 1983 and complete June 31, 1984.
