RESOLUTION 5-21-79-A

WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribal Council has been desirous of attaining self-determination by continuing to operate an Indian Action Program, Indian Library Training Program, under the auspices of the Great Lakes Inter-Tribal Council, Inc; and

WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe is organized in accordance with the provision of the Indian Reorganization Act of June 18, 1934, (48 Stat. 984);

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, Inc. requests that the Fiscal Year contracting services of the Indian Action Program, Indian Library Training Program, remain with the Indian Technical Assistance Center, Lakewood, Colorado, and that sub-parts 271.24 or Public Law 93-638 be waived.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Great Lakes Inter-Tribal Council, Inc. shall operate the Indian Action Program, Indian Library Training Program for the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, Inc.
