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RESOLUTION NO. 8-30-06-H

- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is a federally recognized Indian Government and a Treaty Tribe recognized by the laws of the United States, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida General Tribal Council is the duly recognized governing body of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Business Committee has been delegated the authority of Article IV, Section 1 of the Oneida Tribal Constitution by the Oneida General Tribal Council, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe has acquired in fee status the following parcel described as:
Former Clarence G. Novotny and Sharon D. Novotny Property
- WHEREAS, the parcel is described as follows:
Legal Description: See attached.
Tax Parcel Numbers: HB-692
- WHEREAS, the above described parcel is requested in Trust Status to expand Oneida Tribal land base and provide an existing residential housing land use and will not be used for gaming purposes, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Business Committee certifies that the local property taxes will be paid up to trust placement,

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Oneida Business Committee hereby requests that the United States Bureau of Indian Affairs initiate and carry out the process required to place the above parcels in trust for the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin.

That part of Government Lot Fourteen (14), Section Twenty-three (23), Township Twenty-four (24) North, Range Nineteen (19) East of the Fourth Principal Meridian, in the Village of Hobart, Brown County, Wisconsin, described as follows:

Beginning at the Southeast corner of Government Lot 14, Section 23, Township 24 North, Range 19 East; thence North $89^{\circ} 42' 26''$ West, 252.84 feet along the South line of said Government Lot 14 to a point being South $89^{\circ} 42' 26''$ East, 18 feet, more or less, from the centerline of Trout Creek and is the start of a meander line; thence North $07^{\circ} 00' 25''$ West, 830.36 feet along said meander line; thence North $11^{\circ} 10' 32''$ West, 472.77 feet along said meander line to the South right-of-way of Trout Creek Road and to a point being South $89^{\circ} 29' 06''$ East, 28 feet, more or less, from the centerline of Trout Creek and is the end of said meander line; thence South $89^{\circ} 29' 06''$ East, 439.27 feet along said South right-of-way to the East line of said Government Lot 14; thence South $00^{\circ} 17' 26''$ East, 1,285.32 feet along said East line to the point of beginning, including all lands lying between the meander line and the centerline of Trout Creek.
