## Resolution 8-10-11-E

### Regarding Pardon of Donald Metoxen Jr.


- WHEREAS,** the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is a federally recognized Indian Government and a treaty tribe recognized by the laws of the United States, and
- WHEREAS,** the Oneida General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, and
- WHEREAS,** the Oneida Business Committee is delegated the authority of Article IV, Section 1 of the Oneida Tribal Constitution by the Oneida General Tribal Council, and
- WHEREAS,** the Oneida Pardon Screening Committee reviewed the pardon petition at a duly called public Pardon Hearing held on June 30, 2011 behalf of Donald Metoxen Jr., and
- WHEREAS,** the requirements of the Oneida Pardon Ordinance and Oneida Pardon Procedures Policy have been fulfilled, and

**NOW THEREFORE IT BE RESOLVED,** that the Oneida Business Committee by this resolution hereby:

- Approves the pardon of Donald Metoxen Jr., petitioner, and notifies the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin and its employing agencies that the Petitioner is recognized as a member of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin to have all the benefits and employment opportunities available to all other persons as if the criminal past pardoned by this resolution did not exist.
- Denies the pardon of Donald Metoxen Jr., petitioner and notifies the petitioner that he may request another pardon after one (1) year from the date of certification of this document.

### CERTIFICATION

I, the undersigned, as Secretary of the Oneida Business Committee, hereby certify that the Oneida Business Committee is composed of 9 members of whom 5 members constitute a quorum; 8 members were present at a meeting duly called, noticed and held on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of August 2011; that the forgoing resolution was duly adopted at such meeting by a vote of 6 members for, 0 members against, and 1 member not voting; and that said resolution has not been rescinded or amended in any way.
