BC Resolution 08-26-10-I

Hunting, Fishing and Trapping Law Amendments

WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is a federally recognized Indian government and a treaty tribe recognized by the laws of the United States of America; and

WHEREAS, the Oneida General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, the Oneida Business Committee has been delegated the authority of Article IV of the Oneida Tribal Constitution by the Oneida General Tribal Council; and

WHEREAS, the Oneida Business Committee adopted the Hunting, Fishing and Trapping Law (Law) in April, 1996, and has amended the law periodically since then; and

WHEREAS, the Environmental Resource Board and Conservation Department have forwarded recommended amendments to the Law to be implemented for the 2010-2011 hunting, fishing and trapping seasons; and

WHEREAS, the recommended amendments would allow ten and eleven-year olds to obtain a license to hunt; make it illegal for an individual to intentionally damage agricultural crops or restoration areas on land owned by the Tribe; clarify and amend the type of cartridge which may not be used in a handgun when hunting deer; and require 360 degrees of visible blaze orange on a blind when occupied during the gun deer season and muzzleloading season; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing on the amendments to the Hunting, Fishing and Trapping law was held on July 24, 2010.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the attached amendments to the Hunting, Fishing, and Trapping Law are hereby adopted.
