


Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin

BC Resolution 06-22-11-H Hunting, Fishing and Trapping Law Emergency Amendments

- WHEREAS,** the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is a federally recognized Indian government and a treaty tribe recognized by the laws of the United States of America; and
- WHEREAS,** the Oneida General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin; and
- WHEREAS,** the Oneida Business Committee has been delegated the authority of Article IV of the Oneida Tribal Constitution by the Oneida General Tribal Council; and
- WHEREAS,** the Oneida Business Committee adopted the Hunting, Fishing and Trapping Law (Law) in April 1996, and has amended the law periodically since then; and
- WHEREAS,** the Environmental Resource Board and Conservation Department have forwarded recommended amendments to the Law to be implemented for the 2011-2012 hunting, fishing and trapping seasons; and
- WHEREAS,** the recommended amendments allow 10 and 11-year-olds to obtain a license to hunt after completing an approved Hunters Safety Course if he or she is accompanied by a mentor while hunting; enable individuals to obtain a permit to release small game birds for dog training purposes; require tree stands to be removed by April 1st of each year, instead of two weeks after the end of deer hunting season; limit a designated hunter to hunting for one elder or disabled person; require a deer to have at least four points to be considered "antlered"; and allows the use of colony traps; and
- WHEREAS,** regulation booklets which contain applicable hunting, fishing, and trapping laws are provided to individuals who purchase a sportsman license allowing him or her to hunt, fish and trap; and
- WHEREAS,** the regulations need to be printed so they can be distributed when an individual purchases a sportsman license, which will be available for purchase on August 22, 2011; and
- WHEREAS,** in order to ensure that those who purchase a sportsman license are aware of all applicable laws, these amendments should be in effect before the regulations are printed; and
- WHEREAS,** the Administrative Procedures Act (APA) authorizes the Oneida Business Committee to enact legislation on an emergency basis, to be in effect for a period of six (6) months, renewable for an additional six (6) months; and
- WHEREAS,** emergency adoption of amendments to the Hunting, Fishing and Trapping Law (Law) is necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, or general welfare of the reservation population, and observance of the regular APA adoption requirements for passage of laws would be contrary to public interest.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the attached amendments to the Hunting, Fishing, and Trapping Law (Law) are hereby adopted on an emergency basis.

CERTIFICATION
