A quorum of the Business Committee was not present but it was decided to have discussion regarding OTDC's present status.

Discussion relating to the insulation problems and controversy as it affects OTDC and, ultimately, the Tribe. One avenue of resolution suggested was that the Tribe relieve OTDC of their responsibility toward completion of the Nursing Home.

Ernie indicated that he would be agreeable to whatever action the Business Committee took and would work to arrive at a mutual agreement toward that end if the Tribe so desired.

Discussion ensued about the conflicting letters and other documentation between Nichols engineer and the Johns-Mansville Company.

Major recommendation Ernie made was that the Tribe not be satisfied with any of the letters or opinions and that they secure their own legal counsel to apply pressure to the architect.
