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## Upstate NY fort with long history offers new ways to view it

TICONDEROGA, N.Y. (AP) — Fort Ticonderoga has educated and entertained visitors for decades with exhibits, fife-and-drum performances and cannon and musket demonstrations.

Now the historic site overlooking Lake Champlain in New York's eastern Adirondack Mountains has two more attractions: a trail along America's bloodiest pre-Civil War battleground and cruises on a boat called the Carillon. The cruises provide a soldier's-eye view of the fort that was once key to controlling the region.

The cruises were offered on a limited schedule last summer but now they're running three times a day, Tuesday-Sunday, plus Wednesday evenings in July and August.

As a narrator on board provides local history, the Carillon gives passengers a perspective of

the fort that scouts for the British would have seen while conducting forays by canoe around lakeside French positions during the French and Indian War (1754-63). Up on land, the Carillon Battlefield Trail, opened in 2013, winds 1.7 miles through the forest a half-mile northwest of the fort's walls. The trail follows the now-reforested area where the fort's vastly outnumbered French defenders beat back a British-led attack on July 8, 1758. Grass-covered, tree-shaded earthen embankments trace the location of zigzagging log-and-earthen barricades the French built just in time to repulse waves of redcoats, including the famed Scottish Black Watch, which suffered hundreds of casualties.

The French started building the fort they called Carillon in 1755 on a peninsula jutting from the lake's western shore 220 miles north of New York City and 160 miles west of Bos-

ton. Commanding a high bluff along Lake Champlain's southern end, the fort guarded the 1.5-mile portage between Lake Champlain and the northern end of Lake George. The fort was the lynchpin in a chain of military outposts stretching from the upper Hudson River to Quebec, all built as the French and British empires, along with their Colonial and American Indian allies, fought for control of North America.

Fort Ticonderoga changed hands six times in less than 20 years during the two 18th-century wars. Abandoned in the 19th century and left to ruin, the property was bought by the Pell family, who reconstructed the fort and opened it as a tourist destination in 1909.

While the fort also serves as a museum for one of the largest collections of Colonial-era military artifacts, its emphasis has shifted from static exhibits to interpretations of daily life for soldiers in

this 18th century wilderness outpost. Employees in period uniforms still conduct daily musket firing demonstrations, but this season they're showing visitors how soldiers lived at the fort in 1777, a pivotal year in the American Revolution that saw the British defeated at Saratoga, 60 miles away.

Also on display through the 2017 season: an exhibit called "The Last Argument of Kings: The Art and Science of 18th-century Artillery" showcasing 180 big guns from the fort's extensive collection.

In July 1777, the British hauled cannons up the unguarded mountain. The threat of bombardment prompted the Americans to abandon the fort and retreat to Vermont. Today, a mountaintop pavilion with picnic tables offers spectacular views of the Champlain Valley, Adirondacks and Green Mountains.

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# Lexi Hill represents Oklahoma at SJWP

Lexi Hill, Oneida Tribal citizen from Oklahoma, was named the Oklahoma state winner of the Stockholm Junior Water Prize. Her research focused on Municipal Wastewater Effluent Has Sublethal Effects on Freshwater Snails (*Helisoma trivolvis*).

"I have a love for science and biology, and making sure that Mother Nature is being taken care of by its inhabitants," said Hill.

As a state winner, she received an all-expenses paid trip to the SJWP National Competition at the University of North Carolina. At the national competition, she com-

peted for the national prize for an all-expenses paid trip to Stockholm, Sweden to participate in the SJWP International Competition.

Hill stated she was influenced by recent events to study water quality.

"I read a lot about the Navajo water crisis and then Flint Michigan water crisis. It seemed like there was a lot of area for error," she said.

Started in 1997, the Stockholm Junior Water Prize (SJWP) is considered the most prestigious award for water related science, both nationally and internationally. The prize was developed to model the adult Stockholm Water Prize, which has been compared to the Nobel Prize for water research. The prize strives to encourage enthusiasm in today's youth regard-

ing water issues, build an international community of young scientists bonded together for the water environment, raise public awareness about the future of water resources, and develop and ensure future leadership in the water quality community by attracting the best and brightest young people into the water sector field.

Hill enjoyed meeting other students from different states and backgrounds.

"We got to talk about home life and other cultures. It was an awesome experience," she said.

The U.S. SJWP is open to all high school students in 9th -12th grades who have conducted water-related science projects, and have reached the age of 15 by August 1st of the current com-



petition year. Projects should be aimed at enhancing the quality of life through improvement of water quality, water resource management, or water and wastewater

treatment. The projects may explore water issues on a local, regional, national, or global level using a research-oriented approach.

## Oneida Tobacco Plants Growing and Helping Students

Each fall the association tries to acclimate new Native students by providing meaningful activities that help bond them to other students.

## College Trustees Prepare Search As President Sets Retirement Date

The College of Menominee Nation is seeking a new chief executive officer as Dr. Verna Fowler, CMN's founding president, prepares for retirement effective June 30. Fowler, who was hired by the Menominee Tribal Legislature in Fall 1992, opened the College in Spring Semester 1993.

She has piloted the tribal college to standing as an accredited baccalaureate institution with a regional economic impact exceeding \$37 million. CMN serves students

from campuses in Keshena and Green Bay and as of its Spring 2016 graduation has more than 1,100 alumni.

Virginia Nuske, chairwoman of the College's Board of Trustees, says Fowler's intention to leave the leadership post has been known by the trustees for several months and has allowed the oversight body to begin transition planning. "The replacement of a long-time leader, and especially of a founding president, is always

a challenge for an organization," Nuske says. "President Fowler has given nearly 24 years of time and talent to building an institution of higher learning that is an asset for our tribe, a major benefit for students in this region, and a model among tribal colleges."

Lori Corn, Gary Frechette, Sarah Harkey and Nuske comprise the Presidential Search Committee, with ex officio members Bernard Kaquatosh of the tribe's Human Resources depart-

ment and Rachel Tuma of the College's HR department.

The Board has unanimously chosen Dr. Diana Morris to serve as Interim President effective July 1, saying that Morris will provide high-level continuity to the operations of the College until a permanent replacement is on the job. Morris has served CMN since 1997 as a faculty member and administrator. She is currently Chief Academic Officer.



Saturday, May 28 through July 11, South-eastern Oneida Tribal Services (SEOTS) hosted a series of events to help address the impacts of Historical Trauma in the Oneida population. Historical Trauma takes into consideration the traumatic events in the history of Native Americans and the emotional and physical toll those events have enacted on lifespans and generations. Three sessions focused on educating the community on Historical Trauma. The sessions were led by Dr. Lisa Poupart and Dr. Mark R. Powless.

Dr. Robert Antone visited SEOTS during the first week of July to provide four presentations on Decolonization. The Decolonization presentations helped attendees to understand how the effects of colonization have changed Native people and provided a road back to finding our Oneida roots. The final day with

Dr. Antone included a Condolence Ceremony to help heal our community.

All events concluded with a Resiliency Celebration to help commemorate what is amazing and beautiful about our Native populations. Actor and comedian, Tatanka Means, provided many laughs and uplifting narratives from his life. Tatanka Means recently appeared in National Geographic's Saints and Strangers and in Tiger Eyes, which is an adaptation of the acclaimed Judy Blume novel. In addition, Vice Chairwoman Melinda Danforth provided an update the progress being made on the Oneida Reservation. Community members Juana Williams and Annette Harris created an Indigenous meal of Bison Stew, Three Sisters Salad, Wild Rice, and mixed berries for dessert. The night concluded with Longhouse dancing.

Fireworks are often used to mark special events and holidays. However, they are not safe in the hands of consumers. Fireworks cause thousands of burns and eye injuries each year.


People can enjoy fire-

# Loretta Says: 33 Land Swindles

Stadler King interviewed many older Oneidas when he was writing their stories as part of the W.P.A. Project (1939-1942). He interviewed Jacob Denny on Feb. 9,

1942 about Land Swindling and says: Jacob lives in the South end in the Town of Oneida. He is seventy four years old. He was married long ago but was separated. He has one son but no one knows where he is. He draws old age pension. He speaks Oneida real well but very little English. He belongs to the Methodist Church where he is officially declared a deacon. He does not belong to any organization.

Jacob told of three cases and that he knows of fraudulent land deals by white men and some Oneidas with Indians.

One case like this was when Martin Denny was in Seymour. His deed was at the agent's office and these McCormicks knew about it but he did not. The agent, Mr. Hart, use to apply for the deeds and sometimes a bunch of them would come. He would not notify the Oneidas about it, and the land buyers would be at the office every day and would find out about the deeds (arriving) before anyone else and then they would run around and make some kind of a deal with the Oneidas before they told of the deed arriving (in the agent's of-

rice). Martin was in town so Mike McCormick saw him there and went after him for a deal. He first took him into a saloon and bought a few drinks and made good friends with him. The he offered him a team of horses. Martin had a team but they were small horses so he was offered to trade them in, for a big beautiful team. They were not a heavy team but they were rather high, mostly for road traveling. Jacob made motions to indicate that the team was long legged and about so high. Martin was offered this team and a certain sum of money, the exact amount Jacob had forgotten, but he said it was around seven hundred dollars. This made a total of about one thousand dollars that he got and he gave up his little team. McCormick had a man in the Bank to make out a quit claim deed. Well, Martin Denny had a bunch of money and a good looking team of horses. W. W. Silverwood and Chester Cornelius heard of the deal so they drove quickly to the agent. They got Martin's deed and then drove to find him. He had just

got home when they got to hius place. He was drunk from the drinks he got from McCormick. Chester talked to him in Indian and told him that he was cheated by McCormick and they wanted to help him out. They took him along and drove as quickly as possible to Appleton, the county seat of Outagamie county. They took him right to the court house or the register of Deeds. The way Chester told him was that they would stop this McCormick Deal from being registered. Martin could not talk English and could not understand it so he believed what Chester was saying to him but Chester was working it different. He told Martin that he must sign some papers so that when McCormick comes to register his deal, it would be stopped so Martin believed all this, but instead of signing papers to stop the recording, he signed off his deed which was among the papers he signed. Of course he did not sign it himself because he can't read or write, so they had him make an x after his name which Chester wrote. This deal was then

recorded right off and the next day McCormick came along for the same thing and for the same piece of property. He was told that a deal was made yesterday to this same property and was registered. McCormick went to Martin and got his horses back but could not get the money. When McCormick told Martin what those fellows had done, he got to drinking for three days and then he went into a woods back of his place and hung himself. The next day the people started to miss him. Then they looked for him about two days. The third day they heard their dog barking steadily in the woods not very far from their house. Miller Denny was the man that went to see what the dog was barking at. He found Martin with a piece of bark from a young basswood bush around his neck. The basswood bark could be taken off and used for tying. He had this around his neck and then tied to the top of a small tree. He was sitting down and the tree was bent so he must have bent down the tree and tied this bark to the top of it and then let it spring back but he was dead. Martin had ninety acres on a good location so the place must have been worth at least five thousand dollars but he got only what McCormick gave him and Chester and Silverwood sold the place to another man soon after.

## *Will tribal employees lose their employment rights due to the proposed new employment law?*

### **By Oneida Personnel Commission**

*Who oversees the hiring practices conducted by the Oneida Human Resources Department (HRD)?*

*Who has the authority to question lack of transparency or inconsistency in HRD's hiring practices?*

*Who is required to participate on Prescreens, Interviews, and Reassignments as a neutral party?*

The Oneida Personnel Commission has this responsibility.

The Oneida Personnel Commission was formed by General Tribal Council. General Tribal Council formed the Oneida Personnel Commission and their role and responsibility was to be a neutral hearing body to oversee the hiring practices of the Oneida Nation. This was due to the unique organizational structure of the Oneida Nation, which consists of family and extended family members. This unique organizational structure has not changed and the Oneida Personnel Commission's role and responsibilities still remains vital to all employees who work for the Oneida Nation.

The Oneida Personnel

Commission has the authority to question HRD, we are your voice regarding: Job Descriptions, Prescreens, Interviews, and Reassignments. The Oneida Personnel Commission has challenged HRD on unfair and inconsistency posting of positions, Job Descriptions developed for an individual person, and Internal Posting of New Positions that are not open to all employees of the Oneida Nation.

The OPC has the responsibility to question concerns involving HRD; however, we find this to be a very difficult task, despite it being the OPC responsibility. If the proposed Employment Law, sponsored by Councilman Brandon Stevens, is passed, this will eliminate the Oneida Personnel Commission and Your Voice. This will allow HRD complete and total control without any oversight. You will have no voice. Ask yourself: Are you comfortable with the Oneida Human Resources Department having complete and total control over all hiring process? Do you trust HRD and its practices? Be educated on what you will be voting on.

# Petroglyphs in Michigan provide link to Native American past

 CASS CITY, Mich. (AP) — In a discarded pile of garish yellow plastic chain — the cheapest possible option to keep people away from things they're not supposed to touch — Stacy Tchorzynski spied a little piece of red printed fabric wrapped around an offering of tobacco. She picked it up and

carefully untied it from the chain, which until this day had been used to keep people from stepping on the low dome of sandstone, carved hundreds of years ago with images sacred to Great Lakes Native American tribes.

There is Ebmodaakowet, the archer who shoots knowledge into the future.

There is Migizi Inini,

the Eagle Man, who looks to the east — the direction of the new day — and flies over to ensure people are following traditions and teachings.

There is Mishibizhew, the water panther, who protects the waters of the Great Lakes.

There are other sacred shapes and symbols, surrounded by a clutter of carvings that likely came much later: initials

scratched by 19th century loggers, other graffiti, bowl-like indentations where someone, somewhere in history, chipped out an entire symbol and the rock around it so they could take it home.

Tchorzynski laid the tiny bundle down next to a pile of others, which will be saved for ceremonial burning. In time, new offerings will be tied onto the new cedar railings going in around the rock at Sanilac Petroglyphs State Park. The offering of tobacco, or asemma, is an acknowledgment of the carvings and of all that people take from the earth.

The Lansing State Journal (<http://on.lsj.com/28Laqqr>) reports that a growing partnership aims to recognize both the archaeological significance as well as its cultural and spiritual importance to Great Lakes Native American tribes.

“It’s one of the most unique places in the entire region,” said Tchorzynski, an archaeologist with the state Historic Preservation Office and the Michigan Historical Center. “There are moral, cultural and spiritual and environmental lessons embedded in these carvings.”

The 240-acre park was created in 1970 to preserve the carvings, which are Michigan’s largest known concentration of petroglyphs, or Native American carvings into rocks. Other Great Lakes

sites include the Jeffers site in Minnesota and a collection of carvings in Peterborough, Ontario. The Sanilac petroglyphs, smack in the center of the Thumb, are the centerpiece in Michigan’s least-visited historic state park, drawing about 4,500 visitors last year.

That number could soon go up, thanks to a cooperative effort to make the area more attractive and present its history and cultural significance in a more comprehensive way. Those involved in the effort include the DNR, state Office of Historic Preservation, and members of the Saginaw Chippewa tribe.

On that recent Tuesday, Tchorzynski was at the park to work on installation of new cedar railings, decorated with a floral design, and new signs that describe the cultural and spiritual significance of the spot in both English and Anishinabemowin, the native word for the Chippewa language. A digital scan of the rock also is planned to preserve and record the carvings as they are today.

But getting here has been a long road.

It’s likely that the petroglyphs, known as ezhibiigaadek asin or “written in stone,” were carved 600 to 1,000 years ago, according to William Johnson, who leads the cultural resource management at the Ziibiwing Center, a museum and learn-

ing facility operated by the Saginaw Chippewa Tribe in Mount Pleasant. He’s also interim tribal historic preservation officer.

Petroglyphs are one of many ways previous generations of Anishnabe people left information for the future, said Shannon Martin, director of the Ziibiwing Center. Others include pictographs, or paintings on rocks; birch bark scrolls handed down through generations; and effigy earth mounds, huge mounds in stylized animal or symbol shapes used for burial or storage caches and once common throughout Michigan and the Midwest.

“They placed important and spiritual knowledge on the landscape in a permanent way for us and generations well into the future,” she said.

The Sanilac carvings, on a low, flat outcropping of soft Marshall sandstone near the banks of the Cass River, were lost to history for some time during the 19th century, overgrown with brush in the river’s flood plain and surrounded by farmland.

That corresponds with the 19th century period of cultural trauma as white settlers pushed Native Americans into reservations, sometimes by force.

“Our ancestors, through our prophecies,

Amidst the recent tragedies in Orlando and having personally attended the “Active Shooter Training” sponsored by the tribal organization—one can’t help but think we should never take life for granted and we all need to treasure how precious life is. Tragedy quickly reminds us how at any given moment our loved ones can be gone. I’ve lived through such tragedy and my heart goes out to all those affected by unexpected death in your families. The best advice I can give you during your difficult times is keep your faith. Reach out to family/friends for support and realize you’re not alone as you travel your grief journey. Give yourself the opportunity to grieve on your own timetable and know that someday, you will once again laugh and celebrate life. I’m not a trained psychologist or counselor but a surviving mother who shares, understands and who has traveled that road of

tragedy and death.

### When death comes — How prepared are you?

I encourage all enrolled tribal members over the age of 18 to complete their Oneida Beneficiary Designation Form. This is a life insurance benefit to enrolled members. It’s valued at \$15,000 and may be used towards your funeral or final expenses. All you need to do, is complete the Oneida Beneficiary Designation Form and designate a responsible person who you trust will use this money for your final expenses.

### When you pass away and have not submitted the Oneida Beneficiary Designation Form, Several things will happen:

1. EPIC Life Insurance will now determine who gets the benefit proceeds based off a naming sequence.
2. If you are “single” and have minor children (under age of 18 years old), there will be NO monies available for your funeral/final expenses. The full \$15,000 will go to your minor child(s) surviving parent/guardian. That parent/guardian is to spend the monies on the child and not use it to pay for your funeral expenses.

**We currently have 5,420 Tribal members who DO NOT have their Beneficiary Form submitted!**

I strongly encourage you to take time and get the completed form in to the Enrollment Department. See contact information below.

### Important Cemetery

#### Update:

The Oneida Trust Enrollment Committee has taken

official action to remove the cemetery maintenance from under the Enrollment Department. Most significant factor in rendering this action is: Enrollment Department does not have the proper equipment and staff to maintain the cemetery in the event the current maintenance vendor can-

not fulfill their obligation.

This action has been communicated to the Oneida Business Committee in numerous meetings and Joint sessions. We are working with other tribal areas to ensure the cemetery is properly maintained.

Shekoli. My name is Jongheyon Choi. I was a foreign exchange student at Oneida Nation High School. I am from South Korea.

At first, my English was awful. When I stood in front of the immigration office I was really nervous. The immigration officer was so mean to me and I was stammering. It was terrible. I wanted to go back to South Korea at that moment. Then I arrived at this town, Oneida. When I heard that Oneida is a nation of Natives, I felt relieved. Actually, I had read some Native story in the textbook as an elementary school student. I had interest in the Native culture and I felt familiar.

What I liked the most was Native music and dance. They were singing a song while dancing. It

was a fresh shock to me. I had never seen music like that. On New Years day, we celebrated with music and dance at the Long House. I also have learned the history of Oneida. I thought a history of Oneida is similar to the history of Korea. We were invaded by Japan in the early 1900's and we still have some affront and problem with Japan. So, I could feel history of the Native better, even though we are half way around the world between Oneida and Korea. Also, I learned some simple Oneida language such as 'Shekoli', 'Yaw<sup>^</sup>ko'. It felt strange but also funny.

Honestly, I struggled with food and language. Foods were sometimes strange and not my taste. Thus, I missed my home foods. English is still my huge problem for me.

But everyone helped me to adapt into a new language. So, I am better at English compared to the first time I got here..

In conclusion, I appreciate every experience I had during this program. I say Yaw<sup>^</sup>ko to the Oneida Nation School System, especially the Oneida Nation School Board for accepting me into your school. Also, to Principal Artley Skenandore and the Oneida Nation High School teachers. The students, teachers, and Principal Skenandore were kind to me and welcomed me even if I was a stranger and bad at English. I had a pleasant experience of living here. And especially, Thank you Brian Doxtator.

## Oneida Nation Marriage Licenses

Effective **June 16, 2016**, the Oneida Licensing Department will begin accepting applications for marriage licenses.

Marriage licenses are issued under the Oneida Nation's sovereign authority, and have the same legal validity as a state-issued marriage license.

**IMPORTANT: Both parties must appear in person to apply for a marriage license. Marriage license applications are processed by appointment only. Contact the Licensing Department to schedule an appointment.**

### Marriage Licensing Current Fee Schedule

Marriage License Application Filing Fee:	\$50
Amendment Fee (for any changes to an application after it is filed)	\$10

### Who is eligible for a Marriage License?

Both parties must meet (and are subject to) all requirements identified in the Marriage Law including but not limited to, the following:

- ♦ Marriage licenses can be issued to both opposite-sex and same-sex couples.
- ♦ Both parties must be at least 18 years old (or 16, with the consent of a parent/guardian)
- ♦ At least one of the parties must be either:
  - ◇ an enrolled member of the Oneida Nation, or
  - ◇ A member of another Indian tribe/ nation who is a resident of the Oneida Reservation.




## Pulitzer finalist's paperback coming

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Being named as a finalist for this year's Pulitzer Prize in fiction came to no one's greater surprise than to Lexington author Margaret Verble, who didn't even know she had been nominated for her novel "Maud's Line" that is being released in paperback on Sunday.

Verble tells the Lexington Herald-Leader (<http://bit.ly/28TauJO>) that being named a finalist has resulted in strong sales for the book and media attention for herself that she describes as "disorienting."

"It's sort of like being sprinkled with pixie dust," she said. "I suddenly am a lot smarter than I was before, and the book's a lot better than it was before."

Verble, who was raised in Nashville, Tennessee, moved to Lexington to earn her undergraduate degree at the University of Kentucky. After returning to Nashville to teach high school for four years, Verble went back to UK in the 1970s to earn her master's degree in English and a doctorate in education.

The novel set in 1928 is about Maud Neil, a young woman of mixed Cherokee and white heritage living in Indian country in rural eastern Oklahoma. Her life is set on a new course when a school teacher from the city turns up at her house on one of the "section line" roads that divide up the landscape.

The setting is based on

the author's own family history. Verble is a voting citizen of the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma whose family was removed to Oklahoma in 1838 from a prosperous farm in what is now a northeastern suburb of Atlanta.

"My mother got out of there, mainly because they didn't have indoor plumbing and electricity and she wanted a better life," she said. "I grew up in Nashville, but we were in Oklahoma all the time, I've been up and down that section line a million times."

Many of the characters in the novel are based on Verble's own relatives, with the protagonist being a major exception.

"Maud's totally fictional, because basically what a novelist has to do with a main character is put them through hell and abuse them in every possible way imaginable," she said. "I couldn't do that to anybody that I knew and loved."

While writing has always been Verble's passion, she wasn't able to get her first two novels published. She then focused on getting short stories published in literary journals before she finally landed publisher Houghton Mifflin Harcourt for "Maud's Line."

Verble is on the eighth draft of her newest novel, set in Tulsa, Oklahoma, in 1930.

"We'll find out what happens to Maud in this book," she said.

#### Project Description:

The project will add amenities to address the communities' diverse recreational needs. #### Current Status:

Installation of the new Lacrosse field at Flying Leaf Park is nearing completion. knew that there would be at least three generations that would struggle to maintain and to retain our culture," Martin said. "During that time, the spirit rock was dormant and sleeping. This was a time when we as Anishinabe were under great duress and trouble."

The carvings lie in the historical territory of the Saginaw Chippewa, but are part of the history and tradition of Michigan's 51 Native American tribes and bands, Johnson said. Anishinabe is how the Chippewa refer to themselves and other native peoples.

Various tribes and bands would gather in the Thumb during the summers, Martin said.

"They would live and reside and gather from all points to share in harvesting," she said. "The place was just teeming with ducks, pigeons, cranberries and wild rice. And the sacred stone was there."

The rock was discovered by European settlers after an 1881 forest fire swept across two-thirds of the Thumb, killing nearly 300 people and consuming trees, brush and homes.

Archaeologists have studied the site since the 1920s, making plaster casts and using onion-skin paper to make rubbings of the carvings. Some of those are now in the collection at Cranbrook Institute of Science. In the 1940s, Cranbrook's director Robert

Hatt worked with University of Michigan's Museum of Anthropology and the DNR to create a plan to preserve the carvings. One of the suggestions: Turn the site into a state park.

In 1966, the Michigan Archaeological Society bought 80 acres containing the petroglyphs; the additional property was added later. It donated the land to the state with the caveat that the petroglyphs be preserved and available to the public.

Marshall sandstone is soft. That makes it easy to carve, but also means that those carvings are susceptible to erosion. Wind, water, the freeze-thaw cycle of winter wear them down. So do human or animal touch.

Since the early 1980s, the rock that bears the carvings has been protected under a circular, open-air pavilion; in the winter it's wrapped in an insulating material to keep snow and ice off of the rock as much as possible.

But there's no perfect way to protect a piece of sandstone like this one. The shade created by the pavilion allows the growth of lichen, tiny plants that turn the stone green and create tiny fissures with their roots. Birds and bats that roost in the rafters of the pavilion leave droppings on it.

Trees around the pavilion were trimmed last year to let more light reach the rock; gutters also were improved to

channel water away from the base of the enclosure. This year, a conservation consultant will be hired to evaluate the site and discuss other measures that can be taken.

"We're looking at how to care for the rock itself, what kind of shelter it needs, what kind of light it needs," Tchorzynski said. "We'll balance that technical knowledge with what the tribe needs. It's a balance between technical and cultural preservation."

A tall chain-link fence, topped with barbed wire, surrounds the rock to keep vandals out, but that also limits access for those who would like to make a spiritual visit.

"For now, when we want to go there and have a ceremony, we have to apply for a permit," Martin said. The state has worked with the tribe to accommodate requests to honor the site.

But over the past five years, the state, the tribe and the Michigan Archaeological Society have worked together to try to create new ways to manage the site and present information there.

Martin gives Tchorzyn-

ski credit for starting that effort, when she sought out Martin, Johnson and Sonya Atalay, an expert in indigenous archaeology, at a nationwide archaeology meeting in Memphis, Tennessee, in 2012.

Tchorzynski had recently been hired by the state of Michigan and was working on a doctoral dissertation about the Sanilac site.

Something happened that day, Martin said. Groups whose goals were occasionally at odds began to work together.

"Now we're writing grants together to provide funding to maintain and enhance the entire property," she said. "It's an amazing relationship and it's continuing to grow."

The first official tribal gathering in decades was held at the site in July 2002. Martin recalls it as exhilarating.

"We camped out there for four days and kept the sacred fire burning," she said. "We had teachings and individuals coming to talk about some of the carvings on the rock and there was a sweat lodge. We did that as a reconnection to the site."

Currently, the Saginaw Chippewa tribe now hosts annual spring and fall events at the site. The next one, on June 25, involves a spring cleaning of the rock, where in which women rinse it with water from the nearby Cass River. Tradition calls for sweeping the rock with cedar boughs, but now the water is imbued with cedar to protect the stone from the scratching of boughs. It's open to the public.

Native Americans see the site as part of a living tradition, a place to be used. It wouldn't be out of the question for a Native American spiritual leader to use tools to restore a weathered image, Martin said.

"With archaeologists, they just start twitching when you talk about re-etching," Martin said. "If we were to go there and use that place as our ancestors intended for us to see it and learn from it, we would have spiritual people and teachers on the rock with teaching sticks, talking about those carvings and re-etching so that it continues to be alive and those teachings would always remain."

For now, no re-etching is in the works.

Instead, the tribe and the state will continue to work together to improve the site and preserve the carvings while making them as accessible as possible to both Native Americans and other visitors.

New signs containing explanations of the cultural and spiritual significance of the rock have replaced those that contained information only about their archaeological significance. Bridges on the mile-long trail at the site will be replaced this year. A permanent fire pit has been discussed to accommodate the sacred fires that spiritual practices require.

"We remain hopeful and excited about the future," Martin said. "There is more attention that is being given to that beautiful place, not only from our own people but from those who are entrusted to take care of it, and there are definitely better relationships now."



# Torres-Smith killer sentenced to life

Percy N. Sims, the man convicted in the murder of Oneida Nation member Krystal Torres-Smith in June of 2015, was formally sentenced on June 28 to life in prison with the possibility of parole after 40 years. Brown County Judge Thomas J. Walsh handed down the sentence before a packed court room filled with the victim's family and friends.

Sims, 27, originally of Milwaukee, was already on probation for a previous armed robbery conviction out of Milwaukee County when he absconded from probation agents there and fled to the Appleton area. While on the run, Sims came under federal investigation for

allegedly burglarizing a gun store where it is believed he came into possession of the firearm he later used in the Torres-Smith homicide.

In the early morning hours of June 8, 2015, Torres-Smith, 39, was found shot multiple times in her vehicle at Communiiversity Park on the campus of UW-Green Bay. Sims was arrested within days of the murder and held on unrelated charges until investigators could bring formal homicide charges.

Numerous family members gave emotional victim impact statements at the sentencing hearing including Torres-Smith's 14-year-old daughter.

Prior to sentencing, Sims read a brief statement from his seat, referring to his actions that night "as just an accident."

# Dayton appoints first American Indian to Supreme Court

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — Gov. Mark Dayton named Anne McKeig to the Minnesota Supreme Court on Tuesday, putting the first American Indian judge on the state's highest court in a pick that also gives the seven-member bench a female majority.

A descendant of White Earth Nation, McKeig has served as a Hennepin County District Judge since 2008, including serving as presiding judge of its family court. Tears streaming down her face, McKeig recalled watching the swearing-in ceremony of the state's first judge from White Earth in 1995, calling it an inspiration that enabled her own career trajectory.

"It is people like him and his wife who have led the way that have allowed for others like me to dare to dream," she said of Robert Blaeser, who served nearly two decades in Hennepin County District Court. "Today is a historic day not only for myself and for my family but for all

native people."

McKeig's appointment further bolsters the diversity of the Supreme Court that Dayton has dramatically altered since taking office in 2011. Of the five justices Dayton has named — including Wilhelmina Wright, who assumed a federal judgeship this year — four have been women. Two were black women, and Dayton named the state's first openly gay Supreme Court justice, Margaret Chutich, earlier this year.

When McKeig assumes her spot on the court in September, the Supreme Court will have a female majority for the first time since the administration of former Gov. Rudy Perpich in the early 1990's. It also means Dayton has appointed a majority of the justices.

Dayton emphasized the critical mix of diversity and judicial excellence that McKeig will bring to the court for motivating his selection. She was one of three finalists forwarded by a state judicial commission.

"I wanted someone who would be an outstanding associate jus-

tice," the Democratic governor said, noting both the importance of McKeig's background and her judicial experience.

McKeig was appointed a district judge in 2008 by then-Gov. Tim Pawlenty. She became a family court judge in Hennepin County the following year and presiding judge in 2013. Her background also includes a lengthy stint as an assistant Hennepin County prosecutor in the child protection division, as well as expertise in the Indian Child Welfare Act.

She'll replace Associate Justice Christopher Dietzen, who announced his plans to retire in March as he the state's approaches mandatory retirement age of 70 for the Supreme Court.

McKeig said a more diverse court is important for the state.

"Under Gov. Dayton, more Minnesotans can look at judges and see themselves in the faces of those judges, adding to the accessibility of the court and embracing the diversity that makes Minnesota great," she said.

# Supreme Court tie favors tribal court authority

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Supreme Court tie has left in place the authority of Native American courts to judge complaints against people who are not tribal members.

The justices said Thursday they deadlocked 4-4 in a closely watched dispute between the Mississippi Band of Choctaw

Indians and Dollar General Corp.

The case threatened to limit the ability of tribal courts to resolve cases in which a member makes claims about a company doing business on tribal land.

The Tennessee-based company was sued in tribal court in 2005 over

allegations that a store manager made sexual advances toward a 13-year-old boy placed in his store by a tribal youth employment program. Dollar General asked federal courts to block the lawsuit. The boy's family is seeking \$2.5 million.

Lower courts sided with the tribe.
