- WHEREAS, the Oneida Business Committee has been delegated the authority of Article IV, Section 1 of the Oneida Tribal Constitution by the Oneida General Tribal Council, and
- WHEREAS, the goal of the Oneida Tribe is to protect, maintain and build a solid educational foundation by addressing human needs of all members throughout the circle of life, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe through the Oneida Nation Community Education Center and the Oneida Job Training Partnership Act Program Title IV-A will provide education and career opportunities to the Oneida Nation assuring Seventh Generation Lifelong Learning, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe believes that the Oneida Family will be strengthened by promoting the overall educational needs of the Oneida Community for the next seven generations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin in cooperation with the Oneida Job Training Partnership Act Title IV-A funds authorizes and submits this grant application for the purpose of securing job training monies for eligible Oneida Community Members.
