## Delegation of Authority Over Certain Tribal Properties in New York to the Land Commission

 government and a treaty Tribe organized under the laws of the United States of America; andWHEREAS, the Oneida General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, the Oneida General Tribal Council has delegated the authorities of Article IV of the Oneida Tribal Constitution to the Oneida Business Committee; and

WHEREAS, on May 29, 1996, through this delegated authority and in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act, the Oneida Business Committee adopted the Real Property Law; and

WHEREAS, the Real Property Law delegates the responsibility to manage land on the Oneida Reservation in Wisconsin to the Land Commission and to Land Management; and

WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe holds title to land in the State of New York, in addition to the land on the Oneida Reservation in Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, the Business Committee is currently responsible for the management of the land the Tribe owns in New York; and

WHEREAS, the Business Committee believes it is in the best interest of the Tribe to delegate certain land management authorities over certain property the Tribe owns in New York to the Land Commission.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Oneida Business Committee delegates to the Oneida Land Commission the authority to manage the Tribe's New York property which is described in the attachment hereto, and is situated in Madison County, New York and in Oneida County, New York. This includes the authority to enter into and manage leases concerning this property.
