- WHEREAS, The U.S. Nuclear Waste Policy Act of 1982 establishes a very significant role for affected Tribal governing bodies in the nuclear waste repository siting process; and,
- WHEREAS, The greatest potential areas for the siting of a Nuclear waste repository in Wisconsin is on or near Indian country;
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, THAT

The Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin requests that the Secretary of Interior become involved in the Nuclear Waste Repository issue on behalf of Indian people, by insuring that Tribal governments are included in the nuclear waste siting process as specified in the Nuclear Waste Policy Act of 1982.
