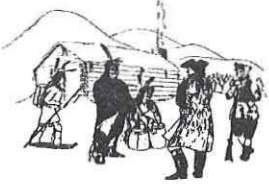


Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin

Resolution 05-15-09-A

Regarding Pardon of Robintina Dickenson

- Whereas,** the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is a federally recognized Indian Government and a treat tribe recognized by the laws of the United States, and
- Whereas,** the Oneida General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, and
- Whereas,** the Oneida Business Committee is delegated the authority of Article IV, Section 1 of the Oneida Tribal Constitution by the Oneida General Tribal Council, and
- Whereas,** the Oneida Pardon Screening Committee reviewed the pardon petition at a duly called public Pardon Hearing, and
- Whereas,** the requirements of the Oneida Pardon Ordinance and Oneida Pardon Procedures Policy have been fulfilled, and
- Whereas,** the Oneida Pardon Screening Committee hereby recommends denying the pardon petition of **Robintina Dickenson**,

Now therefore be it resolved that the Oneida Business Committee by this resolution hereby denies the pardon petition of **Robintina Dickenson**, and notifies the petitioner that she may again petition for a pardon after one (1) year from the date of this resolution.

CERTIFICATION
