
Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin

RESOLUTION # 06-24-98-A

Indian health Services for a Periodontal Disease and Diabetes Model Programs

WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is a federally recognized Indian government and a treaty tribe recognized by the laws of the United States, and

WHEREAS, the Oneida General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, and

WHEREAS, the Oneida Business Committee has been delegated the authority of Article IV, Section 1 of the Oneida Tribal Constitution by the Oneida General Tribal Council, and

WHEREAS, 1 out of 5 Native Americans has diabetes as compared to 1 out of 20 adults in the total United States population, and

*HEREAS, the Oneida Community Health Center Diabetes Registry currently contains 686 individuals that have a diagnosis of Diabetes Mellitus, and

WHEREAS, acute infections, such as periodontal disease, will induce insulin resistance, leading to difficulty in controlling the blood sugar levels of tribal members with diabetes, and

WHEREAS, Indian Health Services has selected the Bemidji Area as high risk for periodontal disease associated with diabetes mellitus.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin submits a grant application to Indian Health Services for a Periodontal Disease and Diabetes Model Programs Cooperative Agreement Grant.
