Emergency Adoption of Paternity Law

- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is a federally recognized Indian government and a treaty tribe recognized by the laws of the United States of America; and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin; and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Business Committee has been delegated the authority of Article IV of the Oneida Tribal Constitution by the Oneida General Tribal Council; and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe has a responsibility to provide a quality child support program and ensure Oneida children and other Indian children receive financial support from their parents; and
- WHEREAS, the Child Support Program has received numerous concerns from Oneida tribal members on the lack of services currently being provided to them by the State Child Support Agency, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Business Committee gave approval for the establishment of the child support office for the Oneida Tribe at their regularly called meeting of June 20, 2007; and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe's application for a comprehensive child support services grant was approved by the United States Department of Health & Human Services/Office of Child Support Enforcement on April 4, 2008; and
- WHEREAS, if the Oneida Tribe does not have an approved child support code by July 1, 2008, the Tribe will be considered out of compliance and will be required to layoff staff and repay the granting agency for any expenses that have occurred under the grant; and
- WHEREAS, according to the Social Services Department, this will also be detrimental to current and future grants with the United States Department of Health & Human Services as it will appear that we are not honoring our commitment; and
- WHEREAS, a law cannot be permanently adopted in time for the July 1, 2008 deadline; and

- WHEREAS, the APA authorizes the Oneida Business Committee to enact legislation on an emergency basis, to be in effect for a period of six (6) months, renewable for an additional six (6) months; and
- WHEREAS, emergency adoption of the Law is necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, or general welfare of the reservation population, and that observance of the regular APA adoption requirements for passage of laws would be contrary to public interest.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the attached Paternity law is hereby adopted on an emergency basis.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that the Paternity law shall be effective immediately and remain in effect for six (6) months unless extended by the Oneida Business Committee for an additional six (6) months.
