WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is a federally recognized Indian government and a Treaty Tribe recognized by the laws of the United States, and

WHEREAS, the Oneida General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, and

WHEREAS, the Oneida Business Committee has been delegated authority under Article IV, Section 1 of the Oneida Tribal Constitution by the Oneida General Tribal Council, and

WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin has determined that the overall goal of the Oneida Tribe is to protect, maintain and improve the standard of living and the environment in which the Oneida people live, and


WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin and the Health Promotion Department strive to empower the Oneida community to improve their health, quality of life and aim to prevent chronic disease, and

WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin and the Health Promotion Department will focus on weight management and diabetes prevention, and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: that the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin authorizes and submits a grant application to the Department of Health and Human Services Indian Health Services for Health Promotion and Disease Prevention.

SYNOPSIS: Focusing on weight management and diabetes prevention, Oneida Health Promotion strives to empower Oneida community to honor personal roles and responsibilities in making positive lifestyle choices which will improve health, quality of life, and prevent chronic disease. According to Tim Moureau, RN, NP, CDE, at least one person each day is newly diagnosed with diabetes. With the ever increasing diabetes rates among Oneidas, Oneida Health Promotion works with people at risk for diabetes which includes Oneida Community Health Center patients with pre-diabetes and overweight. Ultimately, we coach patients using Motivational Interviewing and Appreciative Inquiry to increase physical activity, reduce unhealthy behaviors such as smoking and alcohol consumption, and increase health nutrition choices. In addition to the one-on-one coaching, Health Promotion provides education through various group education methods such as an annual health fair and monthly group education presentation with hands on activities to enhance learning. Monthly education topics are selected using the wellness observances calendar. The annual health fair will include inter-active booths using Tribal resources for the 7 Dimensions of Wellness: Cultural, Social, Physical, Emotional, Occupational, Environmental, and Intellectual. This annual event is held at Oneida Nation Elementary School during National Public Health Week or the 1st full week in April.
