RESOLUTION #<u>10-14-98-B</u> Section 5311 Capital Assistance Resolution

- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is a federally recognized Indian government and a Treaty Tribe recognized by the laws of the United States; and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin; and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Business Committee has been delegated authority under Article IV, Section 1 of the Oneida Tribal Constitution by the Oneida General Tribal Council; and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin has determined as an overall goal to protect, maintain, and improve the standard of living and the environment in which the Oneida people live; while maintaining and re-establishing the sovereign rights of the Oneida Nation; and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe has also determined that the health, safety, and welfare of the Oneida People is one of its top priorities; and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe has developed the Oneida Public Transit department to serve our people and our community with the accessibility to get to and from work, home, and other events by providing safe, affordable transportation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: that the Oneida Tribe apply for 1999 Section 5311 Capital Assistance funds from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation to assist in the efforts of providing for safe, affordable, and accessible transportation to the Oneida People and the Oneida Community.
