
Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin

RESOLUTION #11-08-95-A

- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is a federally recognized Indian government and a treaty tribe recognized by the laws of the United States, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Business Committee has been delegated the authority of Article IV, Section 1 of the Oneida Tribal Constitution by the Oneida General Tribal Council, and
- WHEREAS, the mission of the Oneida Police Department is to preserve and protect life through law enforcement and enhance the safety, welfare and peace of the Oneida reservation, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe encourages collaborative efforts between the Oneida Police Department and the Outagamie Sheriff Department as well as other law enforcement agencies, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Police Department and the Outagamie Sheriff Department are in agreement to use the monies from their County-Tribal Law Enforcement grant to hire an enrolled Oneida into the Outagamie Sheriff Department, and
- WHEREAS, this program will increase public awareness of the cohesive law enforcement effort between Outagamie County and the Oneida Tribe, thus serving as a model to other counties and tribes in the state of Wisconsin.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin authorizes the application for a County - Tribal Law Enforcement Grant from the Madison Department of Justice.
