RESOLUTION # 12-01-99-A

Justice 2000 County-Tribal Law Enforcement

- WHEREAS the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is a federally recognized Indian government and a treaty tribe recognized by the laws of the United States, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, and
- WHEREAS the Oneida Business Committee has been delegated the authority of Article IV, Section 1 of the Oneida Tribal Constitution by the Oneida General Tribal Council, and
- WHEREAS the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin the Oneida Tribe has determined that the overall goal of the Oneida Nation is to protect, maintain and improve the standard of living and the environment in which the Oneida people live, and
- WHEREAS the Oneida Tribe established the Oneida Police Department to "provide enhanced law enforcement and security on the Oneida Reservation by protecting our nations residents, employess, and patrons through the enforcement of rules and regulations for the welfare and safety of the community", and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe encourages collaborative efforts between the Oneida Police Department and the Outagamie County Sheriff's Department as well as other law enforcement agencies, and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: that the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin authorizes and submits a grant application to the State of Wisconsin/Department of Justice for a 2000 County-Tribal Law Enforcement grant.
