Whereas, the Oneida Tribal Council is recognizing the Medical and Dental needs of Tribal members living on the Onéida Reservation and whereas, the members comprise the total population of 1,147 people, and whereas, the state Medical Assistance Program does not meet the needs of many people.

W hereas the Indian Health Service has procided inadiquate contract funding for these people, the health status is far below that provided other Indian People in Wisconsin and the rest of the United States.

Now therefore be it resolved, that the Indian Health Service have appropriated or make avaiable \$62,000.00 in the fiscal year 1971 to meet the medical and dental needs of these people and that these funds be made available By Indian Health Service under contract with the Tribal Council.

Be it further resolved, that an equitible amount be provided in subsequence years to insure that their health level can be maintained or improved.
