INFORMAL MEETING

July 26, 1979

Meeting began informally at 3:10 p.m. Purpose of the meeting was to hear the closing remarks of Ethel Yari who spent two days here at Oneida reviewing the EOC Program.

Ms. Yari offered her findings and made comments on the fact that our EOC Program is in a state of crisis because of the late start and because of personnel problems early in the Program. Numbers are insufficient but the Program is workable with a great effort to produce. Ms. Yari stated that she was satisfied with the record-keeping and in-house procedures but stated she felt it more important now to produce the numbers required in our contract.

Lengthy discussion ensued on the interpretation of the contract language and who we can serve and methods of making our Program more visible. She also requested a monthly report for the next three months in order to monitor our progress.

Further discussion ensued on the EOC Advisory Board and Ms. Yari stated that the Board needs more community input. Rochelle indicated her willingness to comply with all suggestions made by Ms. Yari and the Business Committee.
