Mark asked Bingo Committee just how much money is in the Bingo account. Much discussion about how much money is taken in, how much is paid out, what is paid out, who is paid and how much. Mark made the statement that if the Bingo Committee is unable to furnish these kinds of records, that someone may have to be hired to do this.

Alma stated there is \$127,000 in savings, + the general fund, and \$20,000 in CD for 90 days earning 9 1/2 % interest.
