Francis stated the Seminary Lands was never allotted to an individual, it was set aside for a school. There is 118 acres of this Land. There were five (5) attempts to sell the Seminary. Francis said research will still go on, and he would like to put these two Claims together as one unit. He will be getting opinions from other Lawyers.
