Frances wells explained what had happened with the George Doxtator land and the Seminary lands.

There is 38.7 acres in the George Doxtator Claim, and 118 acres of the Seminary Lands.

The material presented was reviewed at a special meeting with the Business Committee, Land Committee and Legal Dept. on February 19, 1980. The action that was needed was to request the Solicitor to look at the outline of theories upon which the Claim might be based, and request reconsideration of the status of the Claim as a U.S.C. 2415 action.

Loretta made a motion to send a Memorandum of Law to the Solicitor. Margaret seconded Motion carried unanimously.

Francis stated we will send the Memo and get an opinion, if it is negative we will go ahead and file the Claim.
