March 21, 1980

Purpose of the meeting was to negotiate an agreement with the Co-op.

There were six items that needed to be discussed and considered to develop a contractual agreement.

Chairman Powless stated the Tribal Attorney should draft up a lease agreement. Discussion followed regarding: Chas has been paying the bills at the Farm, Sue explained the BIA grant that was received last year (for the garden project), nutrition education information will be put in the newspaper this year, there will be a vegetable stand this summer. The land contract is until 1983. Self sufficiency is a goal of the Co-op.

Chairman Powless stated the Farm can use some of his land if they want, the land behind the CAP office.

Sue explained that the pork is inspected at Doersch Packing, they also do the slaughtering cutting and wrapping.

Discussion on the Co-op being incorporated.

It was the consensus of the people there that Mark will work with the Tribal Attorney to draft up an Agreement, possibly the Co-op can rent at fair rental value.

Chas requested that at the next meeting with the Farm, that Myron, Wendell and Loretta attend.

Meeting adjourned at 3:55 p.m.
