Amelia presented her abstract on Bilingual/Bicultural contracts. In discussion the purpose and proposed functions of the program is very positive, i.e.,

Dissention was expressed with the tardiness of the application. (It was understood, however, that it is no fault of the departments involved.) Not enough time has been allowed for an intelligent review of material. Accounting is not able to identify Tribe's cost of program (\$18,000) Another aspect is that an assessment has not been made to determine what materials the Tribe has that can be programed into the school curriculum. There may be considerable duplication of services. That could only be detected through an assessment. Also, the whole Business Committee was not present for discussion.

Tony moved to approve the resolution for the contract. Wendell seconded. Vote was 1 for and 3 opposing. Motion failed.

Frank moved to recess at 9:00 P.M. Wendell seconded. Motion carried.
