OSGC's case against Green Bay dismissed

Oneida Seven Generations Corporation's efforts to collect \$21 million from the city of Green Bay hit a roadblock when federal judge William Griesbach dismissed OS-GC's lawsuit on June 6. OSGC was seeking damages after the Wisconsin Supreme Court ruled in May of 2015 that the city of Green Bay improperly revoked a conditional use permit (CUP) for Oneida Seven Generations Corporation's (OSGC) waste to energy project.

The lawsuit, filed December 23 of last year, stated, "The city's irrational decision to revoke the CUP based on manufactured rationale shocks the conscience and con-

stitutes a violation of OS-GC's constitutional right to due process. The city has left OSGC no choice but to bring this lawsuit seeking to recover the significant damages it incurred as a result."

OSGC felt they were owed lost profits, out-ofpocket expenses plus attorney's fees.

Judge Greisbach didn't agree.

"The city's action caused a delay in the project; it was apparently a change in other factors over which the city had no control that caused OSGC to abandon it," Griesbach's ruling said.

The waste to energy facility was designed to take municipal waste that would otherwise be placed into a landfill, sort it, and put nonhazardous, non-recyclable materi-See 17 •

Activist prepared to take pipeline protest case to trial

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) An American Indian activist and former U.S. congressional candidate accused of inciting a riot during protests against the Dakota Access oil pipeline says he has no qualms about taking the case to trial, even though he could face more than five years in prison if convicted.

Chase Iron Eyes maintains his innocence and pleaded not guilty in March to the felony charge and also misdemeanor criminal trespass.

By Blake Nicholson He is scheduled for a oneday trial on Feb. 8, 2018, in Mandan, just west of Bismarck.

Iron Eyes' attorney also represented Hollywood actress Shailene Woodley, who signed a plea deal earlier this year that kept her out of jail in another high-profile protest case. Unlike Woodley, Iron Eyes said, he still lives and works in the area where the protests occurred and has "a huge and sincere concern about the administration of justice."

"If it takes that we have to go to trial to achieve those goals, then that's a good thing," he said. "That's what our system of justice is designed to do."

Iron Eyes and 73 others were arrested on Feb. 1 after erecting teepees on land that authorities said is owned by pipeline developer Energy Transfer Partners. Protesters maintained they were peacefully assembling on land they believe rightfully belongs to American Indians.

Iron Eyes hasn't disputed his involvement, but he says he wasn't the leader of the effort and

had no authority to stop it

Prosecutors did not respond to requests for comment from The Associated Press. But authorities have alleged in statements and court documents that Iron Eyes helped lead a ``rogue group" of "aggressive" protesters who set up the short-lived camp, and that he negotiated with law officers on behalf of the camp, ``holding himself out as the new camp's leader."

Dave Archambault, chairman of the Standing Rock Sioux tribe, which led opposition to the pipeline, condemned the

group's action at the time, saving it undermined legitimate protests.

The pipeline protests in southern North Dakota ended in February, after President Donald Trump's administration and the courts allowed construction on the \$3.8 billion project to wrap up. The line went into service this month, transporting North Dakota oil 1,200 miles (1,930 kilometers) across South Dakota and Iowa to a distribution point in Illinois.

Iron Eyes, a member of the Standing Rock tribe, made an unsuccessful bid for North Dakota's lone U.S. House seat last year.

He said he considers himself a part of an informal "reconciliation process" that involves people from the reservation normalizing relations with people in the Bismarck-Mandan region, where protests often disrupted businesses, farmers and motorists.

"The pipeline brought out the ugliness on both sides. There was no shortage of that," he said. "We just need to take it slow and rebound. I wouldn't have run for Congress in North Dakota if I didn't have confidence in North Dakota, and in Standing Rock."

WI CASA Launches Recruitment Effort

(Green Bay, Wis.) Wisconsin CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) has launched a statewide campaign to recruit more volunteers in order to help children in Wisconsin's foster care and child welfare system. "Every year, more than 6,400 children in Wisconsin find themselves in foster care or in the child welfare system, and less than 700 of them have an advocate," explained Sue Schwartz, Wisconsin CASA Executive Director. "No child should have to go it alone through the court system. The CASA advocate plays an incredibly important role by helping a child navigate through this uncertain time in their life, knowing that a trusted, adult volunteer is standing by their side. CASA wants to provide an advocate for every child, but we need help; we need volunteers."

That is why WI CASA has launched a statewide, "I Am

For the Child" campaign, to draw awareness to the need and the program. "We welcome volunteers from all walks of life but, in particular, we need male volunteers, Native American volunteers and volunteers from rural areas," said Schwartz. "Our volunteers find out that by spending a little bit of time with a child, on a regular basis, they can make a huge difference in helping that child get through a difficult time. It is one of the most significant ways someone can make a positive difference in a child's future."

The awareness campaign includes a number of outreach efforts, including:

- A PSA by Green Bay Packers President and CEO, Mark Murphy (Murphy and his wife have served as foster parents and Murphy's father was a CASA volunteer)
- A focused social media campaign

"Volunteers are the life blood of our organization," Schwartz added. "Thousands of children have been able to find safe, permanent homes because they have a CASA advocate working in their best interest. We want to see the number of children helped by CASA volunteers continue to increase."

CASA volunteers are recruited, screened, trained and supervised by professional CASA staff and all work is performed under National CASA practice standards. Volunteers conduct weekly, face-to-face visits with their child (or children), making independent, objective observations about the child's safety and well-being, and communicate the child's wishes and situation to the court.

Medications ... What Else Works?

Those who have Alzheimer's disease or other dementia often take prescription medicines. Some folks notice a difference in their memory and cope better and some don't. There are other treatments you may want to try that aren't medical that may be helpful to aid memory and reduce stress. While nothing can reverse the course of Alzheimer's disease, quality of life can be improved so these ideas are worth trying.

Pets - Just being around an animal can be soothing and being able to cuddle, pet, feed, or watch a pet can provide relaxation and entertainment. This doesn't mean you run out and buy your parent or spouse a pet. Your family member is highly likely to be unable to care for it. But visits from pet owners or a visit to the Humane Society may be very enjoyable.

Spiritual activities - This may include prayer, going to a worship service, speaking with a spiritual leader, reading meaningful stories/passages aloud, looking at an old hymnal or songbook, etc. For many who had a religious up-bringing the rituals and traditions offer comfort and peace.

Music - Listening to familiar music is both enjoyable and comforting, especially the tunes from the good old days. Music can bring back memories and even engage a person who doesn't communicate much by singing the lyrics, smiling, or tapping a foot. Attending a concert may be enjoyable.

Art - Painting, drawing or coloring helps engage a person in conversation and can bring out their creativity even if they weren't artsy. You can have adult pictures to color or paint or blank pages to be creative. Visiting a favorite museum may also be an enjoyable activity. You can visit many times and see

something new each time.

Storytelling - This activity can be led by a caregiver or companion. The idea is to look at a picture, a postcard, a magazine, or a calendar and ask open-ended questions about it to create a story. You can begin by stating, "Let's make up a story about this funny picture." "What do you suppose that little girl in the picture is thinking?" Avoid asking questions that feel like a test such as, "What's that?" There are no right or wrong answers.

Reminiscing - This is different from storytelling. Reminiscing is encouraging the use of long-term memory by telling stories about family and life experiences from younger days. The person with Alzheimer's can be proud to share family history and family members get to learn things they never knew.

Massage - Massage can help with muscle tension, anxiety, and better sleep. It can be done by a therapist or a family member. It is best to start with hands, foot, or back rubs and see if it is relaxing. Some people with Alzheimer's can be hypersensitive to touch and if that is the case, massage would not be recommended.

Aroma - Some scents can be very comforting and relaxing. Baking bread, chocolate chip cookies may bring back happy memories. Essential oils can be added to baths or placed in a diffuser to reduce anxiety, calm nerves or stimulate the mind. Lavender, peppermint and rosemary are good scents to try.

You may not be able to change the course of Alzheimer's or dementia but you might be able to influence quality, comfort, and care. Why not give these a try?

The Population-Based Programming team is located in the Community Health Nursing area within the Oneida Health Center and is one of the 4 Community Health Services departments. The others are: WIC/Nutrition, Health Promotion/ Disease Prevention and Case Management Services. Our Mission: To empower the Oneida community by providing quality programs & education which will protect, promote and improve health while respecting cultural values.

We have ten staff on our team and they include an Administrative Assistant, 2 Healthy Start Staff workers, the School Nurse for the Oneida Nation School Systems, the

Head Start Nurse, 2 Community Health Nurses, the Prenatal Care Coordinator Nurse, a Maternal Child Health Care Aide, and a Nurse Supervisor.

We are a public health department with a wide range of programs that provide education to benefit the health & safety of community members from infancy to elders, some which include:

• Healthy Start - This program provides prenatal/maternal health education through an evidence-base curriculum, Family Spirit, tailored to meet cultural needs of the community. Healthy Start works with families before pregnancy offering family planning, screening for diseases, well-woman care, and insurance enrollment assistance. During pregnancy the program offers prenatal care, nutrition counseling, childbirth education, smoking cessation and partner involvement. After pregnancy, Healthy Start offers newborn screening, postpartum care and breastfeeding support, depression screening, well-baby care and vaccinations. Healthy Start is a free program that honors our community's children and families through nurturing support and educational

services that promote maternal and early child health.

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• Immunization Clinics - Held regularly by appointment for children & adults to protect against vaccine-preventable diseases. We also offer the Community Flu Clinics every year at the Oneida Nation Elementary School.

• Prenatal Care – Prenatal Care Coordination (PNCC) is a free program for pregnant women in need of support during and after pregnancy. Pregnant women receive help to gain access to medical, social, educational, vocational and other services related to their pregnancy. PNCC helps identify needs and goals, develop a care plan, provide health education, transportation to appointments and help connect with local resources. The overall goal of PNCC is to improve birth outcomes or increase the number of healthy babies by educating and supporting pregnant women who identify areas of need.

• **Preparedness** – We partner with Brown Co. Health & the City of De Pere to plan/prepare the community how to be safe in the event of a public health emergency or catastrophic event.

 School Nursing for Head Start and Oneida Nation School systems - Our nurses advocate Well Child Exams and provide screenings for vision & hearing as well and oversee dental screens. They monitor health issues & med management. They also monitor immunization compliance and inform parents when their child is due. We also have team members who teach "Choosing the Best" curriculum to 6, 7, & 8 grades. CTB classes encourage abstinence as well as health and relationship education. Kids get incentives for reaching learning goals.

You can often find our staff at various community events where they either have planned the event or are participating and providing education & outreach.

## Michigan weight lifter, 74, still sets world records

DETROIT (AP) Ray Fougnier was nearing retirement from the Detroit Public Schools, spending his last year at Detroit Osborn, and he wanted to stay healthy.

His dad, Alexander, retired at 65, got sick and a year later died of cancer. His mother, Lena, also retired at 65 and due to complications from diabetes, died when she was 72.

At 70, Fougnier decided to take up weight lifting and he was serious.

Now 74, he's one of the

age group.

In early April, he set four world records at the 2017 Amateur Athletic Union North American Powerlifting Championships in Laughlin, Nevada. He managed 286 in the squat, 201 in the bench press and 419 in the deadlift for a total weight in the three categories of 906.

The Detroit Free Press (http://on.freep. com/2qylDtp ) reports that the Plymouth Township resident eclipsed the mark he had set a year earlier in Las Vegas. Last

best power lifters in his year, he set just three records.

> You reach 30 and people say you are over the hill. You reach 40 and you are way over the hill, and then things start to go. I started out at age 70 doing this and I've been going up ever since," he said.

> Fougnier said he only he gets sore when he goes too many days without lifting.

His advice to people who want to stay healthy: Motivation.

When I retired I made the commitment so it wouldn't be short-lived

or I'd be sick. All people really have to do is stay active. It doesn't matter what you do, but stay active, watch your diet and don't be a couch potato."

The retired teacher and former head of the American Indian program at Cornell University grew up on the Oneida Indian Nation's homeland in central New York. He now splits time between Michigan and Pigeon Forge, Tennessee.

"I was living in Tennessee at the time when I got started," he said. ``I was working out in a community center.

"I wasn't really interested in lifting at first. I thought I was too old. I dismissed it for a while, then I went online and looked some of the lifting organizations. I didn't want to get into anything that was drug related; no performance-enhancing

drugs. I looked into it and I saw what the people at my level were doing and I said, 'I could be competitive.""

His first meet in Tennessee was a successful one in 2013.

``I won the event; it was the Tennessee State Championships," he said. ``That was the year I turned 70. That qualified me for the national championships in Orlando. I signed up for that, went down and won that. As a result of winning that competition I was eligible for the world championships."

That event was in South Africa. His sponsor, the Oneida Indian Nation of New York, helped pay his expenses.

His success hasn't gone unnoticed.

"It has been good for the family, too," said Renee Romeo, his daughter.

``He has been working

out since I can remember. He has always had a consistent workout routine; just power lifting, but just being on a health kick. Always eating an apple a day.

``My grandparents never really focused on exercise or even eating well. He has been a great example for me, my husband. ... Working out consistently and watching what we eat. Honestly, we just had a high school reunion and everyone was talking about their parents. My husband's father is in a nursing home. He's only four years older than my father. He was saying. 'What did I do wrong?' He didn't do anything wrong. Maybe it's more of maybe what he didn't do right."

"This is a big deal," Steve Reilly, one of several VFW volunteers, said. "These guys are out here volunteering week after week after week. These guys are like a Timex watch and they work very hard. They're here early in the mornings getting this stuff up and running and they do it because they care about their fellow vets."

Last year's brat fry events saw a record amount of funds raised. "Our weekly brat fry is our main source of revenue," Reilly said. "Last year we netted just under \$10,000 for the season. It was a banner year for what we do and that money goes directly to veterans in distress and veteran's families in distress. And it isn't just for Oneida veterans. It's for veterans in general."

In addition to the weekly brat fry event

the VFW volunteers also host a coffee drive and 50/50 raffles to assist their brothers and sisters in need. "We may not be able to help every individual or their family at 100 percent but we make every effort to do what we can," Gary Maddix, another VFW volunteer said. "We help with food, gas tickets, and try to find housing for them. We will do everything we can to help out fellow veterans without embarrassing them because, let's face it, as vets we have a lot of pride."

Weekly brat fry volunteer and VFW Post 7784 Life Member Charlie Thies is proud of the work his post does for veterans in need. "We try our best to help everybody that we can if we can," Thies said. "Our brothers and sisters are very important to us. This is what we do and what we stand for."

Thrivent Financial has been a key player in contributing to the success of these events. "I am a member of Thrivent and I found out they have this program," Reilly said. "So I submitted an application at the end of last year and was surprised to find out they were willing to donate \$250 for these events, and then they informed me that they will be donating another \$250 later this year. ## **Court fight over local restrictions on large-scale farms**

BAYFIELD, Wis. (AP) -A northwestern Wisconsin county plans a court fight to defend a local ordinance that places more restrictions on large-scale farms to protect water quality.

Bayfield County passed an ordinance last year requiring concentrated animal-feeding operations near the South Fish Creek watershed to provide a minimum of 540 days of manure storage.

But the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources rejected the ordinance, and the county plans to argue its case against the state agency in court next month, Wisconsin Public Radio reported.

Iowa-based Reicks View Farms has proposed building a farm for about 26,000 hogs near South Fish Creek. The farm is expected to produce around 10 million gallons of manure every year.

The state attorney general's office said in court documents filed in the fall that the ordinance doesn't provide reductions for existing phosphorus sources.

In a response filed in May, Bayfield County Attorney Linda Coleman argued the department couldn't ``rightfully argue that preventative regulations are unnecessary to achieve water quality'' when the department also employs a proactive approach.

## Downsizing Utah monument pleases Republicans while angering tribes

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke's recommendation to downsize the new Bears Ears National Monument in Utah was applauded by the state's top Republican leaders but marked a stinging setback for a coalition of Western tribes that pushed for protection of lands they consider sacred.

Zinke, a former Republican congressman from Montana, said Monday he's committed to make sure Native American culture is preserved and vowed to push for Congress to approve legislation granting tribes legal authority to ``co-manage" some of the Bears Ears site.

The scenic swath of southern Utah with red rock plateaus, cliffs and canyons is on land considered sacred to a coalition of tribes and is home to an estimated 100,000 archaeological sites. But President Donald Trump and other Republicans are critical of former President Barack Obama's late-term creation of the 1.3 million acre Bears Ears National Monument. They say it's an unnecessary layer of federal control that hurts local economies by closing the area to new energy development. They also say it isn't the best way to protect the land.

Zinke said he discussed the idea with the tribes and that they came away happy with the plan. ``I have enormous respect for tribes,'' Zinke said. ``This is working handto-hand with the tribes as I said I would do.''

Several tribal leaders balked at that characterization, saying they weren't briefed on the plan and consider the idea to be an attempt to temper their criticism. They joined environmental groups in vowing to file lawsuits if Trump accepts the recommendation and shrinks the monument.

"This was really just a cynical effort to distract Indian country from the devastating blow of reducing the size of the monument," Natalie Landreth, an attorney at the Native American Rights Fund. "Bears Ears is not for sale. It's not up for trade."

Ethel Branch, Navajo Nation attorney general, said the lands within Bears Ears are essentially holy lands that hold critical plants, minerals and powers that members of many tribes rely on to heal and strengthen themselves.

"Protection of these lands are non-negotiable," Branch said.

Trump signed an executive order in April directing Zinke to review the designation of

27 national monuments on federal lands, calling the protection efforts ``a massive federal land grab" by previous administrations.

Zinke made the Bears Ears recommendation as part of an interim report to Trump. He said he will issue a final report in late August, when he is due to make recommendations on Bears Ears and 21 other national monuments on federal land in 11 states, including Grand Staircase-Escalante in Utah, Giant Sequoia in California, Nevada's Basin and Range and Katahdin Woods and Waters in Maine.

The review also targets five marine monuments in the Atlantic and Pacific oceans.

Zinke toured Bears Ears last month on foot, horseback and helicopter and met with Utah Gov. Gary Herbert and other state leaders who opposed Obama's December designation of Bears Ears monument.

"There is no doubt that it is drop-dead gorgeous country and that it merits some degree of protection, but designating a monument ... where multiple-use management is hindered or prohibited is not the best use of the land," Zinke said.

Zinke did not specify how much of the 1.3 million acres should be trimmed.

Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, called Zinke's announcement ``an unquestionable victory for Utah."

Noting the contentious nature of the monument designation, Zinke called on Congress to approve a land-management bill for Bears Ears and other federal lands. The Republican-controlled Congress has failed to approve a significant public lands bill in recent years, but Zinke said that was because of veto threats by Obama.

Utah rancher Zeb Dalton was among monument critics who wanted Zinke to recommend rescinding the entire monument. He and other cattle ranchers fear that their grazing rights will be impacted even though the government had said the monument designation will allow grazing to continue.

Dalton said he'll await the new boundaries to find out how much of his land is included.

"Everybody says it needs to be protected; it's already protected," said Dalton, while adding. "I guess reducing the size is better than nothing."

### Demand for skilled construction workers rising in Wisconsin

Ashland, WI (AP) -The construction industry is struggling to find skilled workers as home construction is rising in Wisconsin.

Wisconsin Public Radio (http://bit.ly/2sjrmDH) reports that the Wisconsin Indianhead Technical College in Ashland has teamed up with the Northwest Wisconsin Workforce Investment Board to offer a new construction training course to meet the demand.

Almost 30 students are on track to receive a short-term technical diploma through the nine-credit course. The credits can also be applied to a technical degree if students continue their education.

Eric Lockwood, project manager of continuing education with the college, says the course has been offered to students at the Clayton School District, WITC-Ashland and Lac Courte Oreilles Community College.

"It focuses on construction framing where they learn about safety ... using power tools, building materials, plans, codes, building layout - things like that," he said.

Andrea Huggenvik, sector and strategies coordinator with the Northwest Wisconsin Workforce Investment Board, said they teamed up with WITC to offer the course because the area is slated to a 17 percent increase in construction workers over the next seven years. The Chequamegon Bay region had 1,148 construction laborers in 2014, which is expected to grow to 1,346 by 2024, according to the workforce board.

## Standing Rock Sioux officials acquitted in North Dakota pipeline protests

MANDAN, N.D. (AP) - Two officials with the Standing Rock Sioux have been acquitted of disorderly conduct charges that were filed during early protests against the Dakota Access oil pipeline.

Tribal Chairman Dave Archambault and Tribal Councilman Dana Yellow Fat were arrested on Aug. 12 for allegedly pushing back against a line of law enforcement officers in North Dakota.

During their trial Wednesday, both men said they were only trying to protect older tribal members. Jurors quickly returned not-guilty verdicts.

The Standing Rock tribe led the opposition against the \$3.8 billion pipeline, alleging it

f law threatened drinking water s in and tribal sites. Hundreds of people were arrested during protests last year.

The pipeline developer denied the claims. The company was allowed this year to build the final leg of the pipeline to move North Dakota oil across South Dakota and Iowa to a plant in Illinois.

## **Excavations in Wisconsin reveal Mississippians' artifacts and history**

TREMPEALEAU. Wis. (AP) - Danielle Benden has been uncovering artifacts in the Trempealeau area for the past decade, but the thrill of the find never gets old. "It's still equally as exciting now," said Benden, archaeologist and co-owner of Driftless Pathways with husband and fellow archaeologist Robert "Ernie" Boszhardt. "Digging up something in the dirt that hasn't been touched in 1,000 years ... it's an amazing feeling."

It's an experience Benden has shared with many over the course of the Trempealeau Archaeology Project, a community-wide quest to uncover the history of the Mississippians, a group of 100 to 200 people who left the city of Cahokia, a 2,200-acre tract near what is now St. Louis and paddled 500 miles up the Mississippi River to the Mountain Whose Foot is Bathed in Water," the La

Crosse Tribune reported. Benden and Boszhardt, both formerly with the Mississippi Valley Archaeology Center, recently developed the Trempealeau Interpretive Path: TRIP initiative to share the wealth of discoveries.

TRIP includes curriculum resources, with activities and breakdowns of their findings, and a three-part exhibit. An artifact display at the Shirley M. Wright Memorial Library includes historical illustrations and artifacts collected during both the group digs and by local individuals.

Early records of the mounds were composed by surveyor T.H. Lewis in the 1880s, and Benden, Boszhardt, UW-Madison students and dozens of locals ranging in age from 7 to 70 have continued to uncover the symbolic platform mounds, the base for religious temples, as well as excavate the village below, digging in yards for artifacts and remnants.

When the Mississippians, known for their building skills and corn farming, arrived, they brought their culture with them, including their bright red pottery, stone tools and religious practices. The parameters of their religion are unknown, but is believed to involve sun worship, as the mounds are aligned to the cycles of the sun and moon.

"Your world would end if that fire goes out," Boszhardt said. ``You don't want that eternal flame to blow out."

The flame could be seen by the commoners residing below the bluff, as the vegetation was sparse at the time, the lack of trees offering a 270 degree view of the Mississippi.

Artifacts and carbon dating indicate the Mississippians only stayed in the area for half a century, later settling in Aztalan in southeast Wisconsin.

While the reason for their departure is unknown, it is not believed to be caused by conflict, as the lack of walls and barriers indicate they lived peacefully with the neighboring locals.

"The community plan is much bigger than we thought," Benden explained. "We want to try to put boundaries on it. Every year we continue

to to excavate. It's science we're extrapolating and compounding on what we know."

Benden and Boszhardt will lead their next excavation this summer, unearthing the lawns of modern day residents for traces of dwellings long ago.

"The Driftless area is a special place to live now it has been for

1,000 years," Benden said. "There's something about knowing where you come from. Perhaps these findings can help people connect and feel ownership over the place they live, and a provide as sense of stewardship over the land. These are places definitely worth preserving."

- Provide that after certification by the Leg-٠ islative Operating Committee, the proposed rule must be adopted by the Oneida Business Committee before it may become effective [see 106.8 and 106.9].
- Require an authorized agency to conduct a ٠ review of each adopted rule every two (2) years after the rule is adopted [see 106.12].

Despite below-average temperatures and a threat of rain, 100 community members enjoyed the 18th annual Youth and Elder Fishing Day at Osnúhsa? Lake. As usual, the lake was stocked with 1000 "catchable" rainbow trout averaging about 8 inches long. In addition to trout, quite a few good-size panfish and largemouth bass took the bait, offering community members a lively morning and perhaps a few meals as well.

Youth and Elder Fishing Day is the Oneida Water Resources Program's largest community outreach event. The event was started as a way to showcase fishing opportunities on the Reservation while encouraging young people to take up this wholesome pastime. The event soon evolved with an intergenerational focus, bringing extended families together for a day of fun. The first "Youth Fishing Day" took place in 1999. At that event, one young angler hooked an eight pound, 24-inch largemouth bass - a legendary opening foretelling many years of good fishing ahead.

The event requires a lot of coordination across departments and partnership with outside agencies. We couldn't do it without the help of the expert grillmasters from the Environmental Resources Board; community members who volunteer for "dunk tank duty;" assistance with set-up from the Conservation staff; and many others who volunteer their time to make this event happen. We receive 1000 trout for the event each year from the US Fish and Wildlife Service -Genoa Fish Hatchery in Lacrosse. Past years have also featured an aquarium on loan from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, providing a close-up view of the fish of Osnúhsa? Lake.

If you missed Youth and Elder Fishing Day this year, or just didn't get the monster catch you had hoped for, keep trying. Perhaps they're just holding out for the tastiest bait they can find. Maybe they will find it on the end of your line!

### Wisconsin hospital takes steps to address food insecurity

MADISON, Wis. (AP) - One Madison-area health care provider will begin asking patients of all ages about hunger.

The Wisconsin State Journal reported that on Tuesday UW Health providers in Madison will start asking all emergency room and hospital patients if they're worried about having enough food. Patients who are experiencing food insecurity will then be directed to food pantries and other assistance.

"Individuals with food insecurity and chronic hunger have more poor health," said Cassie Vanderwall, a clinical nutritionist and dietetic internship program manager at UW Health.

The hospital will also start providing children with free meals during the summer. The U.S. Department of Agriculture will reimburse the hospital for the food. The meals will be offered daily for pediatric outpatients and siblings or children or inpatients until Aug. 25.

No registration or income check will be required to qualify for a meal.

"We are assuming that if they ask for a meal, they need a meal," Vanderwall said.

According to hunger relief organization Feeding America, about one in nine adults and one in six children in Dane County have food insecurity.

"Adults are also very vulnerable to food insecurity," said Anne Gargano Ahmed, coordinator of the HungerCare Coalition at Second Harvest Foodbank of Southern Wisconsin. "Oftentimes, it's the parents who skip meals so the kids can eat. Seniors are particularly at risk of food security, and it can have a lot of health effects."

## The Oneida Code of Laws now has 97 Chapters

In addition to processing all of the proposals to create and amend laws, the LOC has also been working on various other projects. One of the main efforts this term was to overhaul and reorganize the Code of Laws. Now, the Code of Laws has been divided into nine "Titles" - and each law is a chapter within a specific title. The new titles include:

Title 1—Government and Finances Title 2—Employment Title 3—Health and Public Safety Title 4—Environment & Natural Resources Title 5 – Business Title 6—Property and Land Title 7—Children, Elders and Family Title 8—Judicial System Title 9—Education

In addition, existing policies have also been merged into the Code of Laws policies were adopted in the same manner as a law and have the force and effect of law—this change did not change the legal status of duly adopted policies.

The LOC also maintains legislative information on the Oneida Register—including public meeting notices, information about past public meetings, the Code of Laws, certified rules, and more. ## Trump puts focus on Wisconsin's growing apprentice program

MADISON, Wis. (AP) - Gov. Scott Walker once told then-candidate Donald Trump "we don't need an apprentice in the White House."

But on Tuesday the president and his daughter Ivanka Trump joined Walker to tour Waukesha County Technical College and talk about the importance of providing on-the-job training to workers in industries that sometimes struggle to find qualified people.

Wisconsin was the first state in the country to pass a law establishing apprenticeship programs in 1911, the same year what is now the technical college system was created. Now there are 11,000 adults and 3,500 high school students in apprenticeship programs overseen by the state.

LDI Industries always struggled with larger companies poaching its workers for slightly higher pay, but saw investing in apprenticeship programs as a way to attract and retain more workers, said John Lukas, the company's vice president of manufacturing.

"We're really using that as a marketing tool to say everyone isn't cut out for a four-year college," Lukas said.

Interest in the state's

apprenticeship programs is growing. Adult participation is up 6 percent from 2015 and includes participation from 2,400 employers. The goal is to double or triple those numbers, said state Department of Workforce Development Secretary Ray Allen.

Walker has long touted Wisconsin's apprenticeship programs as a way to address workplace shortages. Wisconsin's unemployment rate of 3.2 percent is the lowest it's been since 2000, but there are about 97,000 job openings posted on the state website.

"There aren't enough people to fill the jobs and the people applying don't have the skills necessary," said Conor Smyth, spokesman for the Wisconsin Technical College System. The shortages cut across multiple job sectors, including agriculture, manufacturing, information technology and health care, he said.

The state's technical colleges work closely with the Wisconsin DWD to create programs where there is need in the industrial, construction and service sectors.

Participation in Wisconsin's apprenticeship program in the 16 technical colleges has increased 36 percent since 2013, according to the technical college system's most recent annual report released in January. There were 669 graduates statewide in 2015 and of those 409 worked in construction, 204 in industry like electricians and mechanics, and 56 in services like cosmetology.

The annual median salary for those who had completed the apprenticeship program statewide as of 2015 was about \$67,600.

While Walker and Trump will be touting the value of apprenticeships together on Tuesday, that wasn't always the case. Walker used Trump's past job on the television show ``The Apprentice'' against him when they were both running for president in 2015. That's when Walker told Trump at a Republican presidential debate that the country didn't need an apprentice in the White House.

Their relationship has improved since then.

Walker went on to endorse Trump for president and after Tuesday's technical college tour the president planned to host a \$1,000 per-person fundraiser for Walker's re-election campaign. Photos with Trump cost \$10,000.
