Petition filed looking to remove Chairman Delgado

Over 600 Oneida Tribal citizens made their voices heard as a petition calling for the removal of Chairman Ed Delgado was turned in to the Tribal Secretary's office on Friday, August 2.

The Oneida Tribe's Removal Law requires signatures totaling 30 percent of the previous general election. The petition was handed in with 623 signatures while 522 were needed.

Petitioner Brian Doxtator along with 20 others who supported his petition process claim Delgado ignored General Tribal Council (GTC) directives, tribal policies and procedures, and the tribe's Code of Ethics law.

"It goes back to 1982

and the (GTC) directive is very specific to stay out of day-to-day affairs. It's not just one scenario. We can't say getting involved in day-to-day affairs has not occurred over the last 20 years. To some degree, more with

some Business Committees and less with others, but this is out right blatant," said Doxtator.

Doxtator cites a case where the Community Support Services Fund (CSSF) policy and procedures were not followed by the Chairman's office.

The CSS fund requires applicants to have less than three months of non-payment before assistance will be offered. The CSSF also has procedure allowing a \$500 maximum payment amount.

Documents show after an individual was denied

for not making a utility payment for at least three months and their appeal denied, the Chairman's office directed the CSSF administrator to make a \$600 payment to pay a utility bill for an individual.

Doxtator also claims that Delgado circumvented the process regarding a tribal member needing assistance in Arizona.

A tribal elder needed medical attention but needed tires for his vehicle to return home and receive dialysis treatment. Delgado directed Don White, the tribe's Governmental Services Division Director, in an email to assist in repairing the tribal members vehicle.

"I know there is a fine line between day-to-day involvement and my responsibilities as the Chair, but without the

General Manager there are instances where we need someone who can make a directive to get something done," said Delgado in the email. "I am accepting this responsibility at this time. I am directing you to assist

this tribal elder in getting his car fixed so he can get his dialysis treatment here in Green Bay. If something happens to him as we try to manage this request through our process, we will all be ultimately responsible."

Doxtator feels this is over stepping his authority as Chair.

"He is actually telling them to go ahead and give this person or that person assistance. Not

WI Tribes come together to resist mining

In the spring of this year, some traditional Iroquois people in New York sent tobacco to Melvin Gasper, to show support for the Lac Courte Oreilles Harvest and Educational Camp (LCO-HEC). The Iroquois and Chippewa people still show goodwill toward each other as they have done since the early 1700s when the Iroquois gave them a wampum belt of peace and friendship.

This fall, the LCO-HEC will host a Potluck Harvest Feast, Sept. 21st, at the White Cap Mountain Chalet and Resort in Upson, WI. The LCO-HEC will provide the grilled venison. The resort is near Webster Lake

and features an 18-hole golf course. The Red Cliff tribe will donate the fish, and the Bad River tribe will donate the wild rice.

The harvest feast is part of the first Penokee Hills Education Summit at the White Cap. Entertainers, vendors, and good company will gather Sept. 20-21st for informational and social events. The first ever Two Step and Square Dance might occur here with a drum and polka band in tandem.

The LCO-HEC camp coordinators are Gasper and Felina LaPointe, both LCO Chippewa tribal members, and Paul DeMain, an

Maria Hinton, 103 Passes On

Oneida matriarch Maria Hinton passed away Sunday, July 28 at 103 years old.

Hinton's Oneida name was Yake yale, it translated into the English language as "She Remembers".

Hinton, whose first language was Oneida, didn't learn English until she was sent to a government school at the age of 10. She was raised by her grandparents who only spoke Oneida in the home. She was a faith-keeper of the Oneida longhouse and one of the first state certified Oneida language teachers in the country.

She was one of the first

teachers at the Oneida

Nation Elementary

School in 1980. She

taught language and cul-

ture classes.

During the second half

of her life she passed on

her knowledge of the lan-

guage and created thou-

sands of recordings and

books as critical learning

tools of the Oneida lan-

guage. She taught three

generations of Oneida

students during her

career. She taught at the Oneida Nation Elementary School until she retired at the age of 92, after which she continued to teach in her home.

She is applauded for her work to preserving the Oneida language by completing a verbal Oneida dictionary with the guidance of University of Wisconsin – Green Bay Linguistics professor, Cliff Abbott. She spent nearly 20 years along with her brother Amos Christjohn and Dr. Abbott to completing the dictionary to preserve the Oneida language.

"People are begging, they want to speak the language, so they say," Hinton said during an interview three years ago. "We thought that it would be important to have a dictionary that they could refer to."

"To develop the Oneida dictionary was a significant piece of scholarly work that transcends time and encourages people to learn the

language," said former Oneida Tribal Chairman Rick Hill. "Her dedication and her efforts were extremely important and I want to thank her for her work."

"My grandmother was one of the most important influences of my life. I will always cherish her legacy. It is a great honor to be one of so many grandchildren that she loved so dearly," said Hinton's grandson, Ernie Stevens, Jr. on Facebook early Monday, July 29th.

Oneida tribal member. The LCO Tribal Governing Board gave its support to the camp so that more tribal members would make a presence in the Penokee Hills.

While all the Chippewa tribes in Wisconsin are part of the Lake Superior Chippewa Tribe, the LCO Chippewa are currently the most active in making a public stand with the Bad River to protest iron ore mining.

The Gogebic Taconite, LLC, (GTAC) company has already drilled for samples near the headwaters of Bad River. They also left behind waste

and environmental damage.

Wisconsin Governor Scott Walker signed, in March 2013, a new mining law that makes it easier and faster for mining companies to start extracting iron ore in Wisconsin.

The new mining law allows for destruction and pollution of the Bad River headwaters.

The tribes and most of their neighbors are opposed to the mining operation because of acid

mine drainage, and water

and air pollution.

Dubbed the, "Bad River Watershed Destruction Act," by environmentalists, it is described as special interest legislation designed to gut environ-

mental regulations for Gogebic Taconite's iron mine proposal in Ashland and Iron Counties.

Dave Blouin, Sierra Club Mining Committee Chair, said, "The Senators who voted for SB 1... irresponsibly abdicated their responsibility to protect Wisconsin's resources, natural environment and taxpayers."

DeMain said the LCO tribal council wanted to get more Chippewa

hunters and harvesters

into the Penokee

Mountain range to make

a presence and witness

GTAC drilling activities.

They are also exercising

their rights to hunt, fish,

and gather in the region

according to the federal

treaties between the US

and the Lake Superior

Chippewa people.

"The LCO Council

liked the general

approach to getting peo-

ple in and out of the

range to harvest, learn

about harvesting, looking

for historical marks, and

doing an inventory of

the natural resources.

They authorized me to help set

it up. I went to Melvin

and asked for his assis-

tance because he is a long

time harvester in that

region. He knows some

of the key buyers of tree

boughs, and other plants,

and resources that can be

gathered from there," he

said.

Since the LCOHEC was set up in March, over 1,000 visitors have been there. One of the visitors came from England and another one came from Maui.

Senator Bob Jauch visits the LCOHEC camp often. In July, he and Senator Tim Cullen went there. DeMain gave Senator Cullen a tour of the camp. Afterwards, everyone enjoyed good conversation by the central campfire.

Many local families support the LCOHEC camp. The camp coordinators receive donations of locally grown fruit and vegetables from their neighbors. Other camp supporters forage in woods for edible mushrooms, berries, herbs, and medicinal plants.

The 1st Penokee Hills Education Summit will be Sept. 20-21, 2013 at the White Cap Mountain Chalet and Resort. Everyone is welcome to the Potluck Harvest Feast in the evening of Sept. 21st. *Passing On...***Hinton, Maria Anastasia (Christjohn)**

June 5, 1910 – July 28, 2013



Maria Anastasia (Christjohn) Hinton, 103 of Oneida, WI passed away peacefully surrounded by her loving family on Sunday, July 28, 2013. Maria's Oneida name was Yakeyale (yah-gay-yah-lay), which translates into English as "She Remembers." Maria was a Faithkeeper of the Oneida longhouse and one of the first state certified Oneida language teachers in the country. Born into the Oneida language, Maria spoke fluent Oneida her entire life. It wasn't until she began attending the local government boarding school as a young child did she begin learning to speak English.

In her life time Maria attended several boarding schools in Oneida, the Ho-chunk community and then later in Mt Pleasant, Michigan and at Haskell Institute. She finished her high school education in Kansas City, Missouri then returned home to Oneida. Maria later lived in Milwaukee and Chicago, then relocated to Los Angeles when her first grandchild, Kelly was born. Maria worked many jobs in her career, doing what she had to do survive and provide for her family during the Great Depression and forward.

In her early 1970's Maria relocated back to Green Bay and Milwaukee, once again working to help and provide for her family. It was in Milwaukee where she began her college and teaching career. Maria enrolled at the University of Wisconsin-

into the mainstream of American society. While this era was not looked upon favorably in history, Maria made the best of it. As an educator, Maria encouraged Indian Country to look forward and keep building upon the quality of education we see today. "The past is behind us, lets look to the future through the eyes of our children", said Maria.

The entire Oneida community mourns the passing of a truly gifted and loving grandmother that embraced everyone who sought her help in learning their language. During the second half of her life, for 50 years, she passed on her knowledge of the language and created thousands of recordings and books as critical learning tools for the Oneida language. She taught three generations of Oneida students during her career. Maria taught at the Oneida Nation Elementary School until she retired at the age of 92, after which she continued to teach in her home.

Maria Christjohn Hinton was an amazing woman who has left the Oneida Nation with a legacy of honorable work and undying love of the history, culture and language of the Oneida people. Her work will live on forever as a teacher and a linguist. She lived an amazing, full and meaningful life and will always be remembered as dignified. Maria was well known and loved dearly by the entire Oneida Nation, addressed by family and community members alike as "Aksot", which

in Oneida means "grandma."

She was preceded in death by her Father, Paul Mose Christjohn, Mother, Lucy (Hill) Christjohn, siblings Anna John, Rosetta Huntington, Eva Cornelius, Elizbeth Ridgeway, John Christjohn, Frances Christjohn, Vernon Christjohn, Amos Christjohn, and grandson Coleman Stevens. She is survived by her sibling Mae (Christjohn) Baxter, and her son Ernest Lloyd Stevens Sr. Also survived are 8 grandchildren; Kelly (Shelly) Stevens, Ernest (Cheryl) Jr., Toni (Doug) House, Apache (Dewain) Danforth, Mike (Tommy) Stevens, Pam (Lester) Harms, David Stevens, and Jennifer Stevens. Maria also had 26 great grandchildren and 18 great-great grandchildren. She is also survived by numerous nieces and nephews, as well as countless students and other community members who looked at her as their grandma.

The wake was held on Wednesday, July 31 at Ryan Funeral Home 305 N. Tenth Street in De Pere. The funeral was held at 10 am Friday, August 2, at the Oneida longhouse.

It is the cultural tradition of the Oneida people to begin a fire to honor and offer prayers for an individual who has passed on, the fire was located at her original homestead located at 4204 W. Mason St (Hwy. 54) in Oneida.

CMN and Oneida partner for education

The College of Menominee Nation (CMN) and the Oneida Tribe recently forged a partnership to offer courses at no cost to the community. The partnership constructed courses that offer college credits or aid in finding employment.

"We offered the courses based on need. For example the Home Health Aid course we offered because we know that the Oneida Health Center will be needing more people that are certified. We also have a lot of individuals who were unable to pass a HRD math test so we offered that course to strengthen their abilities and boost their confidence so that they may pass the test and find employment," Hensley said.

Jacob McLester, a sophomore at Iowa State University, participated in the Oneida Language and Home Health Aid courses.

"I knew a little bit of Oneida before the class, I went to the Tribal school for a little while so I knew a little but not a whole lot. But after the course I had learned so much more of the language than I already knew. I learned a lot about how to take care of people in need. So it is good to go through and actually learn it and have that knowledge," McLester said.

The courses also edu-

cate those who may need medical knowledge on a day-to-day basis.

Lorena Castillo, a junior at Seymour High School, completed the Home Health Aid course.

"There were flyers that I seen around and then I saw the program and decided to take the Home Health Aid class. I thought it would be good to take the class because I get to help my mom because my mom is diabetic. So I can help her or if anyone else needs emergency aid like CPR or anything I know how to do it. I learned a lot of things. We also had a lot

of fun," Castillo said.

An added benefit to completing a course is that the credits earned can be used at area schools such as the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay and Northeast Wisconsin Technical College.

"I would recommend these courses for anyone looking for some nice credits and is interested in the field; it is a good place to learn a lot of things. The instructors were great and they either currently practice what they teach, or have in the past, so they offer a lot of real world experience," McLester added.

Southbound US 41 exit ramp at Mason Street to close in Brown County

Traffic to use the southbound US 41 Shawano Avenue exit ramp

Green Bay - The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) Northeast Region is announcing the closure of the southbound US 41 off-ramp to Mason Street will begin Wednesday, July 31, until September 2013.

The southbound US 41 Mason Street ramp closure is needed to complete paving needed on US 41, while maintaining traffic operations and keeping the interchange open.

Physical access to Mason Street from southbound US 41 will not be closed.

From Wednesday, July 31, 2013, until paving operations finish in September 2013, southbound US 41 traffic will have access to the Mason Street exit by using the Shawano Avenue south-

bound off-ramp, crossing WIS 29 and accessing Mason Street from the southbound US 41 on-ramp from WIS 29. Expect significant traffic delays on eastbound and westbound WIS 29 while traffic crosses WIS 29 in route to Mason Street.

Future access to both Mason St. and Shawano Ave. via US 41 will be by new collector-distributor lanes between Shawano and Mason.

All lane restrictions are weather dependent and subject to change.

Wisconsin Home Energy Assistance Program (WHEAP)

Oneida Tribe Economic Support Services is scheduling appointments beginning **September 1st** for the 2014 heating season.

If you reside within the Oneida Reservation boundaries you can call 920-490-3939 to make a WHEAP appointment.

If you reside outside of the Oneida Reservation boundaries you must call your county's WHEAP office (for Brown County 488-6460 and Outagamie County is 800-506-5596).

The Wisconsin Home Energy Assistance Program (WHEAP) provides assistance for heating costs, electric costs, and energy crisis situations. Operating with federal and state funding, the program provides assistance to approximately 225,000 Wisconsin households annually.

Most types of fuel are eligible to receive assistance. Whether you use

wood, propane, natural gas, electricity, or fuel oil to heat your home, energy assistance is available if you qualify.

Heating Assistance

WHEAP assistance is a one-time payment during the heating season (October 1 – May 15). The funding pays a portion of the household's electrical (non-heating) costs, but the payment is not intended to cover the entire cost of the non-heating costs.

WHEAP electric (non-heating) assistance is a one-time benefit payment during the heating season (October 1 – May 15). The funding pays a portion of the household's electrical (non-heating) costs, but the payment is not intended to cover the entire cost of the non-heating costs.

The amount of the non-heating assistance benefit varies depending on a variety of factors, including the household's size, income, and non-heating costs. In most cases the non-heating assistance benefit is paid directly to the household's energy supplier.

Electric Assistance

A household may be eligible to receive a payment for non-heating electric energy costs through funding provided

have the money to purchase more. Crisis assistance is available through local WHEAP agencies that provide a 24-hour crisis phone number to help with emergencies that occur after business hours.

WHEAP crisis assistance provides both emergency and proactive services.

There are also non-emergency or proactive crisis services that include providing information on how to reduce fuel costs, counseling on budgeting and money management,

providing payments to a fuel supplier, and co-pay agreements.

Furnace Assistance

WHEAP emergency heating system assistance can provide services to eligible home owners if the furnace or boiler stops operating during the heating season. Heating system assistance includes payment for repairs, or in some situations you residence may qualify for a total replacement of a non-operating furnace or boiler. Call the local

Go paperless with eNotify, a new electronic notification system



You get emails and text messages from your doctor's office, your hairstylist, and your favorite retailers; now you can add the Division of Motor Vehicles to that growing list. Part of a broader strategy to move toward electronic applications and online services, DMV launched eNotify to respond to the needs of its customers. "More and more, our customers expect to do business online. It's where they are, so it's where we need to be," says Mitchell Warren, DMV Bureau of Vehicle Services Director. "People are busy; we want to make their lives a little easier."

How eNotify works:

- Once subscribed, DMV will send you electronic license plate/registration renewal notices for all

eligible vehicles. You can receive them in an email. A text message option is also available.

- Electronic license plate/registration renewal notices will include a link to renew your registration online (www.dot.wisconsin.gov/drivers/vehicles/renew/online/index.htm).
- You must subscribe at least three months in advance of the plate expiration to ensure receipt of an electronic renewal notice for a particular vehicle.




When the temperature goes up, so do energy bills, water bills and a host of other home-related costs. Here are a few ideas for how to stretch your household budget this summer.

Invest in a programmable thermostat

Programming your thermostat is one of the easiest, lowest cost ways you can cut your energy bills. Installing a programmable thermostat prevents your home from going through large temperature swings and can save you up to 10 percent on your cooling bills. A homeowner can save as much as \$150 - or even more - on air conditioning bills by setting a thermostat.

Turn down the heat on your water heater

In the summer, most households can function

Clean or change filters

Appliances like furnaces and air conditioners function more efficiently and cheaply (and last longer) when you replace or clean their filters on a regular basis. Read your owners' manual to find out how often you should replace or clean filters.

Finally, unplug electronics when they're not in use. Even when electronics such as television sets, DVD players, computers and phone chargers are turned off, they can suck power out of outlets. Either unplug them when you're done using them or use a Smart Strip (which cuts power when it's not needed). One exception to this tip: overhead fans, especially at night, will cool air more cheaply than turning down the thermostat.

Connecting Voices for Change: youth vs adults views

A team of three Oneida Community members, who are also tribal employees from different program and department areas, have come together forming a collaborative team to help bring about positive community driven change. These three individuals came together with a common desire to work towards building a Healthier Oneida Community by assisting the community with taking ownership of itself for the purpose of designing and implementing positive community change for the benefit of all. This team, "Connecting Voices for Change" was accepted into a collaborative initiative that teaches facilitation skills and provides knowledge for leading positive community based change focused on listening to and implementing suggestions from the voices of the community. This collaborative initiative known as the Healthy Native Community Fellowship works with teams from tribes across the United States focusing on helping to build healthy Native communities. "Connecting Voices for Change" is made up of Kaylynn Gresham - Deputy Director of Emergency Management/Homeland Security; Sarah Phillips - Health Promotion Disease Prevention Program and Dianne McLester-Heim - Oneida Ombudsman.

As part of the initiative, "Connecting Voices for Change" conducted a Community Listening Tool Survey at the May 5, 2013 General Tribal Council Meeting. This same survey was also provided to the youth of the Oneida Nation High School and a Youth group program for the purpose of obtaining input from voices of our youth. The result of the survey's provided a great deal of information about the views of the Oneida Community at this point in time. Areas for which information was collected included: feelings about the importance of culture, thoughts on matters related to local youth, impact of local communication, feelings about the ability to impact the community by one's own actions, and

the impact of community leadership.

Of those completing a Community Listening Survey, 45 came from Oneida Youth and 70 came from various community members providing input from a total of 115 Oneida Community Members. The information collected viewed the thoughts of youth and adults separately to allow for comparison.

More specifically; Oneida Youth and adults indicated the following:

Feelings about the importance of culture:

Both youth and adults indicated that it is very important for future generations to speak our Native language, they want to learn more of our 'traditional' language and culture, they know where to go to find information on our traditions and culture, having knowledge of our traditions and culture is a key component of a healthy Native Community, and that many of our community events currently incorporate cultural teachings. When looking at the importance of culture to the Oneida Community, youth and adults appear to hold very similar views and opinions, both suggesting it is important to our future.

Thoughts on matters related to local youth:

When looking at matters related to local youth, the youth and adults do not hold common thoughts and feelings. The community youth have identified that they feel there are enough recreational activities while adults do not feel there are. Youth stated that they can voice their concerns to tribal leaders and that they have good community role models while adults identified these as areas that need to be improved. Finally, both groups indicated that communication between youth and parents could improve and as well as the cultural sense of belonging held by the youth.

Neither group gave these areas high ratings; however the youth indicated they view communication and a cultural sense of belonging at a better place than the adults do.

Impact of community leadership:

In looking at the concept of leadership, youth suggested that tribal leaders listen to the needs of the community while adults feel they do not. Youth see 'community leaders' as good role models making changes

Impact of local communication:

As a general overall statement; youth find the current style, amount, and content of communication with in the community to be satisfactory or above; while adults find these communication areas to be very poor. Communication from tribal government, listening by tribal government, community or program leader's ability to bring people together to discuss concerns, find solutions, and take responsibility for themselves and their situations were among the areas assessed. Both the youth and adults surveyed rated, tribal government listening to the community, as the least successful area of communication at the local level.

Ability to impact the community:

When it came to looking at how the youth and adults felt about their ability to impact their community, there were some split feelings. Youth felt more able to speak up in disagreement when it came to impacting community change than adults. Both groups indicated they felt their suggestions could have a positive impact on making change and that the community can come together to make positive change. Both groups did indicate they felt as though 'leadership did not necessarily listen to or hear the suggestions they make'. While both groups feel that people in the community do come together to address issues, the youth were more optimistic about people working together to solve community problems than the adults were. Overall, the survey results suggested both youth and adults feel they have the ability to speak up, to come together, and create positive change for the community.

to programming based upon feedback from the community. Youth also felt that the community itself encourages community leaders and provides opportunities for people to gain leadership skills. Adults completing the survey suggested they do not feel that the community supports or encourages community leaders, nor do community members have opportunities to gain leadership skills.

This Listening Tool Survey provided an opportunity for "Connecting Voices for Change" to begin looking at positive community based change by first listening to what the community had to say. While not every single tribal member was able to provide input on these items, this is the beginning of listening to the unheard voices of the Oneida Community. Following this listening tool, "Connecting Voices for Change" conducted two community listening sessions called Rez Café's in order to hear more of what the Oneida Community had to say about growing a Healthy Community. These lis-

tening sessions were held to provide an opportunity for community members to have their voices heard, to look at how those of the community who participated see the community, and to begin to look at how the community can take ownership of creating some positive changes.

"Connecting Voices for Change" looks forward to sharing what occurred at the Rez Café sessions in the very near future.



days when we are available to anyone who wants to talk to us regarding how to balance your checkbook, how to get your credit score increased or get a loan," she said.

If you do need help Zubella asks that you

don't utilize the corner stores that don't have your best interest in mind.

"The last thing we want is our customers to do is go to these check cashing places. They get in a lot of trouble and the rates are astronomical," she said.

The question now: Is this what you want? You may yet face this avoidable situation if you stand around and do nothing. It is your decision.

Seven Gens continually comes back for more and more money and they will not stop until the Tribal members stop them. If we don't, they will run the Tribe.

The Business Committee seems to blatantly ignore the will of the people. We must continue to fight diligently for the rule of law instituted in our Oneida Constitution. You can tip the scales toward justice by helping to dissolve 7 Gens and put an end to their fiscal strain on our tribal budget.

Make No Mistake: GTC Runs the Tribe

The Oneida Tribal Constitution is the highest law on the reservation.

The General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Tribe.

In 1949, the GTC passed a resolution delegating authority to the

Business Committee to handle business to benefit ALL the tribal members. Through this delegated authority, the BC manages the regular tribal operations, however, the authority of the BC is subject to both the Constitution and the GTC.

The GTC can review any actions taken by the BC, and can issue a directive to the BC to be carried out! In other words, ordering the BC to take certain actions or to implement or change a specific policy. The Business Committee must carry out the directive from the GTC. It is NOT up to the BC to question or revise a directive from the GTC

A directive was issued on July 9, 2013: a petition with over 360 signatures was given to the BC to dissolve Oneida Seven Generations Corporation. It is now up to the BC to take action in accordance with Article III, 'Governing Body,' Section #, paragraph 1, which states in part: "[T]he Business Committee...shall perform such duties as may be authorized by the GTC."

The By-Laws of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, Article IV, 'Powers of the General Tribal Council,' Section 3, 'Reserved Powers,' states: "Any rights and powers heretofore vested in the Oneida Tribal but not expressly referred to in this constitution shall NOT be abridged by this

article, but may be exercised by the people of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin through the adoption of appropriate By-Laws and constitutional amendments."

If the BC fails to act, they are in violation of the Oneida Constitution.

If the BC tries to modify the requested petition, they are in violation of their Oath of Office.

If the BC holds secretive unannounced meetings like the one held on July 12, 2013 inconsistent with the Oneida Constitution, Article III, Section 3, paragraph 2, which states in part, "Special meetings of the business committee shall be held upon a three day advance notice by the chairman to all members thereof or upon written request of a majority of the Business Committee stating the time, place and purpose of the meeting," the BC is in violation.



Hyperbaric Oxygen returns to Oneida

The Mobile Hyperbaric Unit provided by American Hyperbarics will return to Oneida on the 27th of August 2013.

Located at the rear of the Oneida Health Center, treatments will be conducted daily from 7 AM through 6 PM. The Hyperbaric Chamber will be in the area through the middle of October.

This versatile therapeutic treatment allows oxygen to be delivered to tissues in critical need. Oxygen is the essence of life, its availability helps tissues to heal, helps the body's immune system to fight infection and in certain situations provides the body's cell the ability to produce energy allowing them to function efficiently.

Hyperbaric oxygen therapy centers are not new, in fact their emergence began in the early 19th century being seen first in Europe. More and more you are seeing its acceptance in hospitals throughout the US.

Recent research with

Veterans returning from Iraq and Afghanistan have shown its effectiveness in addressing lasting effects of mild traumatic brain injury or symptoms of post traumatic stress disorder.

Whose House Do You Belong To?

The word Longhouse is often used in different ways and misunderstood. There are at least three different meanings of the word. The first is the most basic: Longhouse means the type of home or structure in which Oneida people traditionally lived. The second is an extension of the first: to be a Longhouse person, meaning H a u d e n o s a u n e e (Iroquois), or a descendant of people who lived in Longhouses. By this definition, all Oneida people are Longhouse people. The third use of the word is in reference to beliefs and living a certain way: to be Longhouse, meaning they go to the Longhouse for ceremonies and follow traditional teachings. A person may identify themselves as a Longhouse person by the second or third definitions (or both). This can lead to confusion.

It is important to note the third definition is often referred to as a religion. Our traditional teachings included spiritual elements, but our government and social rules and expectations were also included in those teachings. It is more accurate to refer to the traditional teachings as a way of life—the Longhouse way of life. Spiritual, social, and political elements were all tied together in the traditional culture. Today we tend to talk about them in separate terms.

Not all Longhouse peo-

ple (our second definition) follow the Longhouse way of life (our third definition). About 400 years ago, Oneida and other Haudenosaunee people were introduced to the concepts of Christianity by Europeans. Gradually, Christian beliefs and values changed the political, social, and spiritual landscape of the Oneida Nation. Following the American Revolution, a Seneca man named S k a n y a t a l i · y ó (Handsome Lake) had several visions. From the first vision in 1799 until his death in 1815, Skanyatali·yó shared a message of revitalization for traditional teachings, getting back to holding the ceremonies, and keeping our culture intact.

About the time that Skanyatali·yó's message was spreading to the other Haudenosaunee, the Oneida were losing vast tracts of land and were forced to leave their ancestral homelands in New York. Many Oneida who came to the reservation on Duck Creek were Christian Oneidas. Over the course of the 1800s, fewer and fewer Oneida in Wisconsin practiced the spiritual components of the Longhouse way of life. Those who did, practiced "underground," or secretly, to avoid persecution by Christian Oneida.

During the 1900s, the effects of assimilation, boarding schools, and acculturation began to take a toll on Oneida in Wisconsin. The Oneida government transitioned from the Chiefs to an

elected government, and with that change, the political and social elements of the traditional teachings continued to weaken.

In the very early 1980s the ceremonies began to be re-introduced in Oneida, Wisconsin, including SUSTAIN ONEIDA Kalihwi·yó, the message shared by Handsome Lake. The Oneida School System and the Language program have contributed significantly to our cultural revitalization. Since then, the spiritual and social aspects of our traditional teachings have been strengthened. We have yet to address the political issues, such as blood quantum and the foreign governing system we currently use.

If we imagine all Oneida people as a landscape, over the course of our history that landscape has diversified and changed in appearance and way of being. However, it has remained unified despite changing belief systems, political systems and social patterns. There is still something that holds us together as a nation, as a people. Could it be our sovereignty? It doesn't matter if you are a traditional Oneida, a Christian Oneida, or any other category of Oneida; we are all still Oneida. Our individual beliefs and ways of life are a part of our identity, but it seems that collectively we share something else in common.

Maybe the blood quan-



tum issue isn't an identity issue after all. If the blood quantum concept were removed as a requirement of tribal citizenship, wouldn't you still be Oneida? It seems our identity is rooted in the same place as our sovereignty. Whatever new definition we develop of what it means to be Oneida should support and strengthen the concepts of our sovereignty.

only did he tell them to give them assistance, it was over and above what the policy says," Doxtator said. "He is using the community support fund as his personal checkbook to help people."

Delgado defended his decision.

"I don't think any leader, if he had the resources, would allow a person in that much need of a medical facility, would sit back and say there is nothing I can do. You're going to have to wait and we'll discuss this. You act," Delgado said. "Our customs and traditions of our tribe always looked out for our people and no leader would ever turn their back on those needs. That's not being an Indian leader."

Doxtator also addressed tribal traditions and why he feels removal is the only answer.

"I don't want to compare us to our chief system but the Clan mothers chose the chiefs, they approached the chief three times and they gave him an opportunity to clean up his act. We don't have that here. All we have is the Removal Law. People have talked to him and said you are

doing something wrong. He needs to go, he is not willing to change his ways. He is saying I can do it, I am the Chair," said Doxtator.

Doxtator's ideal situation would not be the removal of Delgado but another means to address misconduct tribal wide.

"I don't agree with removing him. It's not the best answer but because of the continuous violations we are pushed to it's the only conclusion. If we had sanctions laws or even if the GTC could fine you \$500 for every email you send to a division director... we don't even have that," he said. "All we have is removal."

The Oneida Enrollments Department has verified the signatures and it will be forwarded to the Oneida Appeals Commission.

They review the merits of the petition. If the Oneida Appeals Commission determines that the petition alleges sufficient grounds for removal, a hearing is conducted.

If the Oneida Appeals Commission determines at the hearing, that sufficient grounds have been proven, then a GTC meeting will be sched-

uled within 45 days after the Appeals Commission's findings are submitted. At the GTC meeting, a two-thirds vote of the GTC is needed to remove an elected official.

Delgado has filed an injunction with the Oneida Appeals Commission questioning the timeline that the signatures on the petition were collected.

Delgado feels the topic may not even reach the GTC.

"I don't think any court of law would uphold these charges. A negotiator negotiating, a leader encouraging, and helping our elders and children. I can't imagine them saying that's wrong and it's wrong to try to save lives," Delgado said.

Delgado feels he is supporting and protecting tribal ways.

"As Chairman, I support our proud history as Oneida people and I believe that Indian leaders must stand up and accept responsibility for the continuance of the Oneida customs and traditions, the protection of our people and our resources. To do otherwise would be negligent and weird," he said in a prepared statement.




In 1994, the Oneida Tribe purchased a 2,400 tree Apple Orchard as part of their continuing strategy of reacquiring lands within the original boundaries of the reservation. The Apple Orchard has 24 acres of original orchard and an additional 14 acres of new orchard, which now totals approximately 4,500 trees. The orchard offers 34 varieties but the majority of the apple varieties are McIntosh, Cortland, and Honey Gold. During the season we try to offer a wide selection of fresh produce such as winter squash and pumpkins.

Part of the Orchard's goal is to generate interest in the area of agriculture as well as encourage our children to understand at a young age, the importance of growing healthy food, and finding natural ways to eliminate pests. The Apple Orchard is part of the Youth Day on the Farm event that takes place each April. The Oneida Elementary School 6th graders partake in this event. It has been quite successful in generating the youth's interest in agriculture. It also teaches them the many techniques which are used to naturally eliminate pests such as trapping insects and releasing bugs to control other bugs.

The Apple Orchard offers fresh fruit and vegetables to all community members. They can purchase these products

starting early fall. Each September the Orchard participates in the Big Apple Fest. This year the Big Apple Fest will be on Saturday, September 21 from 10a.m. till 4p.m. Please see our website for additional details www.oneidanation.org/ocifs.

Killer of Green Bay teen gets 40 years in prison

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) ~ A man who shot and killed an unarmed Green Bay teen has been sentenced to 40 years in prison.

Nineteen-year-old Julio Gonzalez, of Oneida, pleaded no contest in May to being a party to first-degree reckless homicide in the 2012 shooting death of Jeremy Teller. Press-Gazette Media report the sentence was the result of a plea deal. He could have received life in prison.

Another defendant, 26-year-old Miguel Garcia, of Oneida, was sentenced Friday to 15 years for being party to felony murder. Three other defendants have received lesser sentences, while two others await sentencing.

Prosecutors say the defendants were looking for someone else to get revenge for an earlier fight when they confronted Teller, and that Gonzalez shot Teller in the back as he lay on the ground.

Experts seeing sharp increase in ticks

MADISON, Wis. (AP) ~ Veterinarians and others say they're noticing an increasing number of ticks in Wisconsin this year.

Pewaukee veterinarian Randy Schuett says it's one of the worst years he's ever seen. Schuett says he recently treated a Golden Retriever and suspected he had arthritis. Instead it turned out to be Lyme disease, which is carried by ticks.

University of Wisconsin-Madison entomologist Susan Paskewitz has researched ticks since the early 1990s. Paskewitz measures tick density out in the field. She says ticks are ten times higher than she's used to seeing.

Wis. mine opponents allowed to stay, for now

HURLEY, Wis. (AP) ~ A group opposed to a northwestern Wisconsin iron ore mine will be allowed to continue camping on Iron County forest land, for now.

The Iron County Board decided to postpone action on the camp at Tuesday night's meeting.

Instead, The Daily Press reports the board sent the issue back to its forestry committee.

The camp organized by the Lac du Flambeau Band of Lake Superior Chippewa has occupied a site near the proposed mine since mid-May. It has become a meeting place for those opposed to Gogebic Taconite's mining plans.

County forestry administrator Joe Vairus says the encampment has grown to 20 to 25 wigwams and has become a squatters village. Vairus says the camp is violating county ordinances by occupying without a permit.



The class size is small in order to facilitate discussions. A limit of 12-15 participants is usually accepted. The discussions focus on various federal eras of Indian policy and law, and how the Oneida Tribe was specifically impacted. In addition to lectures, lively sharing of information is generally received from the participants as the class moves through the traditional early years of the government, the Allotment Era, Indian Reorganization Era, and the present Self-Determination Era.

The class focuses on tribal laws and authority of different branches of the Oneida government, with an emphasis on Oneida tribal land transactions. Invited speakers from tribal programs such as the Appeals Commission, Environmental Department, and Tribal History enhance the discussion of how the Tribe as a whole carries on its business.

A tour is given of selected reservation properties, and then continues with an in-depth discussion of how and why properties are purchased within the Oneida Reservation boundaries. The overlap between



CURRENT ISSUES

To Diminish the Power of General Tribal Council (GTC). It is no secret that prior to the John Powless Petition to provide a \$100 stipend as an incentive to attend GTC meetings, the institution of GTC was becoming an ineffective institution. Too many GTC meetings were canceled due to the lack of a quorum. In my view, the John Powless petition returned the power of this tribe back to the people and removed it from the hands of a very few who had controlled the GTC for nearly thirty years.

Without an effective GTC able to carry out its' constitutional responsibilities, the Oneida Tribe is not able to function as intended by our ancestors who adopted our Constitution in 1936. Currently, the payment of stipends to GTC members for attending meetings is being challenged by many. The number of elected leaders who work to diminish the power of the GTC is troubling because before the 2007 John Powless petition, a few, less than 100, made the decisions and laws for

this tribe. Recent OBC minutes show another attempt to reduce the power of the GTC by continuing to bring the issue of reducing stipends to the GTC agenda. Each elected



leader, board members, are given stipends for their work, and the work of the GTC is the highest authority. I do not support decreasing in any manner the \$100 stipends because I feel

that it would diminish the ability of GTC to do its work.

GTC attends, listens, participates, and exercises its power as the Supreme Governing Body. At GTC meetings, there are over 2000 tribal members voting, and each tribal member's vote is significant to the governing of this tribe. Having 2000 Oneidas making the decisions for the Oneida Tribe is not only good governance, but also, protects our members and our resources by making more responsible decisions than 9 members could possibly make.

Case in point: In May of this year, the GTC said "No" to a Waste to Energy plant on the Reservation. Hopefully, further costs on that project will be stopped and if they truly are stopped because of GTC's actions, I believe that the GTC will have paid for itself in Tribal savings to cover GTC meetings for the next 20 years, just from that one meeting.

I caution GTC about approving any initiative which might diminish its effectiveness.

MESSAGE TO THE PEOPLE

Removal From Office. As a people, the Oneida have been together since the beginning of time. We weathered the arrival of the European settlers; we survived and endured the removal from our homelands by a country that our warriors fought and died for to help create. We survived based on who we are as Oneida people. We prepared for the future by always considering the next generations; and we protected and honored our commitment to our children, our elders, and the integrity of our identity as Oneidas - there was, and is today, no greater responsibility. These are the customs and traditions of the Oneida.

The petition submitted for my removal from Office as

Chairman appears to be based upon a foreign and unreasonable concept:

- (1) That it is a bad thing and a removable offense for a leader to stand up and accept the responsibility to serve and protect the health and safety of Oneida elders and children;
- (2) That it is wrong to support efforts to enhance community health through ceremonies;
- (3) That it is somehow against the law for a leader to encourage that construction initiatives be more fiscally responsible.
- (4) And finally, that after being assigned the task of negotiating a contract with a particular vendor, that it

is somehow improper and a removable offense to communicate with that vendor regarding the Tribe's counter offer.

Currently, an injunction has been filed with the Appeals Commission on the issue of the fact that the first signers of the Petition for Removal signed on June 6, 2013, and the last signers were on August 2, 2013. The removal petition states that the Petition must be handed into the Secretary's office within 30 days of the collection of the first signatures.

The removal petition was handed into the Secretary's office on August 2, 2013, approximately 60 days after the first signatures on June 6,

2013. Therefore the position of the injunction in following the removal law is that the petition is null and void.)

As Chairman, I support our proud history as Oneida people and I believe that Indian leaders must stand up and accept responsibility for the continuance of the Oneida customs and traditions...the protection of our people and our resources. To do otherwise would be negligent and weird, and not me.

As a candidate for Chairman, I ran on a platform of supporting the GTC (FOR THE PEOPLE) and that means all the people of the Oneida Tribe. My campaign centered around supporting the GTC and all the tribal members, stopping bad

investments that benefitted only a few Oneidas, addressing wasteful and overspending, and addressing corruption using the laws the people have in place to protect their tribe and their resources.

I followed the tradition of our people and tried to help a sick elder (in the end the elder paid for himself, not the tribe), supported community sweeps needing hard wood, and demanded a fair and financially prudent process for the SEOTS building as directed by the GTC resolution. As a Candidate for Chairman, and as your Chair, let me assure you that I will continue to protect the Oneida people, **all the people**, and protect the resources **for the people**.

Summary of the Proposal

The Amendments were requested by the Oneida Trust/Enrollment Committee and Higher Education after the Area Manager for Education and Training overturned a decision by the Higher Education Manager to deny trust scholarship funds to an applicant. The Area Manager of Education and Training overturned the denial of trust scholarship funds due to ambiguities in the Policy's appeals process. These proposed amendments seek to clarify the appeals process by:

- Requiring the Higher Education Manager to handle initial appeals. The current Policy requires the applicant to file an appeal with the Department Director, however that position was changed to the Higher Education Manager position.
- Requiring the Area Manager for Education and Training, instead of the Trust/Enrollment Committee, hear appeals from the Higher Education Manager's decision.
- Extending some time frames from calendar days to working days. The current Policy requires an applicant to appeal to the Oneida Trust/Enrollment Committee within ten calendar days; however, the proposed amendments require an applicant to appeal to the Area Manager for Education and Training within ten working days.

LOC Update

Transition Timeline: 2013-2015

On January 7, 2013, the GTC approved dissolving the current Oneida Tribal Court system and replacing it with a new Tribal Judiciary. These changes expand the scope of the Tribal court system, and many new requirements have been added to safeguard the integrity of the system.

Not all of the changes are immediate. The next few years will be full of transition, as the current Appeals Commission winds down and the Judiciary is established.

In addition to adopting the new Judiciary, the GTC directed that a separate Family Court be created—this will be a part of the Judiciary once the Judiciary is up and running, but the Family Court will be opening much sooner than the rest of the Judiciary.

Family law matters (i.e., paternity, child support, child custody and visitation, and divorce cases) will be transferred to the new Family Court beginning in September of 2013, so that the new


Family Court Judge can begin hearing cases as of October 1, 2013.

All other types of cases (the non-family law cases) will remain with the Appeals Commission until the new Judiciary opens its doors. During the transition, all of the Appeals Commission's remaining cases must be completed, transferred to the Judiciary, or dismissed so that the parties can refile in the appropriate court if necessary.

The OBC and the Appeals Commission are working together—and working hard—to make sure that there will be no disruption to any active cases during this process.

The next few years will require a lot of effort to make sure that everything goes smoothly, but in the end, the Tribal court system will be stronger, more efficient and capable, and a better reflection of our status as a sovereign and independent nation.

Court Operations



General Phases

Now—August 2013
The OBC screens candidates and hires a Family Court Judge.
The Oneida Appeals Commission prepares to transfer all family law cases (i.e. child support, child custody, divorce, paternity, etc.) over to the new Family Court.

August 2013—December 2013
Procedural rules for the Judiciary (i.e. civil procedure, evidence, etc.) are created and adopted. The LOC also works on amending existing Tribal laws—all references to the Appeals Commission have to be changed to reflect the Judiciary as the Tribal Court system.

August 2014—October 2014
Newly-elected judges complete mandatory training before the Judiciary opens.

November 2014—February 2015
The Appeals Commission begins the final process of winding down, and works to transfer or complete all remaining cases on the dockets. Any cases that have not been transferred or completed by the end of this period will be dismissed and may be re-filed with the Judiciary.

6 plead guilty in bribery linked to Choctaw casino

TULSA, Okla. - Six people linked to the construction of a Choctaw Nation casino pleaded guilty to bribery charges, federal prosecutors announced Monday.

Five of the six people; Lauri Parsons, her husband Brent Parsons, Cordell Bugg, James Stewart, and Mark Eshenroder owned or worked for companies that performed work or sold materials for the construction of the Durant casino, the U.S. attorney's office for the eastern district of Oklahoma said. The other person, Allen Franklin, was a project manager for the tribe.

All six were charged with conspiracy to commit theft or bribery of programs that receive federal funds, which is punishable by up to five years in prison and a \$250,000 fine. In addition, Brent Parsons was charged with conspiracy to commit money laundering and Stewart was charged with money laundering. Each of those counts is punish-

able by up to 10 years behind bars.

According to prosecutors, the Parsons owned Builders Steel, a Tulsa company that sold steel to the tribe, and Stewart worked for the company. Bugg and Eshenroder worked for Flintco, a Tulsa-based construction management company hired by the tribe.

The Choctaw Nation said in a statement Monday that a routine audit relating to the casino project found discrepancies from the purchase of steel from Builders Steel, and eventually revealed the tribe had been overcharged for those purchases. The tribe said the matter was turned over to federal investigators.

Flintco issued a statement Monday saying it regretted the harm caused to the Choctaws and disclosed that a third, unnamed former employee, was under investigation. It didn't name the former worker, but said it was cooperating with the investigation.

"Our company recognizes the Choctaw Nation was adversely impacted by the actions of Builders

Steel, who influenced former Flintco employees and others to commit certain wrongdoings," the statement said. "Flintco sincerely regrets this isolated incident and the negative impact it has had on the Choctaw Nation."

"We highly value our relationship with the Choctaw Nation and our company's Native American heritage. We will continue to cooperate with the government and the Choctaw Nation in any further investigation of persons involved."

The indictments and federal officials laid out Monday specifically how the building firms and other subcontractors tried to defraud the tribe:

- Lauri and Brent Parsons agreed to provide more than \$5,000 in trips, vehicles, firearms, furniture, tuition, mortgage payments and other gifts to employees of the Choctaw Nation and Flintco, among other items. The company used the influence "to obtain bidding preference, higher prices and huge cash advances for services and materials not delivered," according to the government.

• Lauri and Brent Parsons and Stewart agreed to submit \$345,000 in false invoices to the Choctaw Nation from Scott Rice — an office furniture company that Stewart worked for before he

joined Builders Steel. The illegal proceeds were used to make a \$25,000 deposit on an African safari and purchase firearms, furniture, and additional gifts.

• Brent Parsons submitted a false invoice from the Worth Group to the tribe. The Worth Group was the architectural firm that designed many of the Choctaw Nation's casinos. The illegal proceeds were used to pay for \$160,000 of trophy game killed by Brent Parsons at the Heartland Wildlife Ranch in Missouri.

• Eshenroder agreed to provide more than \$5,000 in building materials to remodel Franklin's kitchen, in order to influence business with the Choctaw Nation.

South Dakota cited in federal election complaint

SIOUX FALLS, S.D.

(AP) - An organization that asked state officials in South Dakota to approve satellite absentee voting offices on three American Indian reservations has now filed a complaint with the federal Justice Department's civil rights division.

The Argus Leader reports that Four Directions filed the complaint after Secretary of State Jason Gant and the Board of Elections declined to establish early voting offices in Fort

Thompson, Eagle Butte and Wanblee.

The advocacy group for Native American voting rights contends residents in the predominantly Native American communities don't have an equal opportunity to vote or register to vote when compared to residents in other parts of the state.

Gant says he's trying to get clarification on whether the state can use federal money to set up the satellite voting offices.

Native American sculptures get OK in Rapid City

RAPID CITY, S.D. (AP) - The Rapid City Council has unanimously approved a Native American sculpture garden in the city's downtown despite safety and access concerns.

The sculpture garden in Halley Park proposed by the nonprofit First Nations Sculpture Garden Corp. will feature bronze statues of four prominent 20th century American Indians: Charles Eastman, a physician who witnessed the Wounded Knee massacre; Black Elk, an Oglala holy man who was born and raised at Pine Ridge; artist Oscar Howe; and author Vine Deloria Jr.

The garden will be flanked by two of the city's busiest roadways, raising concerns about traffic safety and available parking. The city's Parks and Recreation Advisory Board in July narrowly rejected the plan, urging First Nations

to work with city staff to find a more suitable location. First Nations officials maintained the park likely will not draw heavy foot traffic, and the city's Public Works Committee last week narrowly recommended approval.

"This project is not meant to be obtrusive," project coordinator Elizabeth Cook-Lynn said. "It's an art-history project. It has nothing to do with politics. It has nothing to do with religion. We don't want to dig up old animosities. Very simply, it's an educational contemplative garden. It will remind us of our indigenous past."

The leaders selected for statues represent a cross-section of influential Native American leaders, which moves away from depictions of American Indians as strictly warriors or other stereotypes, according to First Nations.
