## GTC supports Milwaukee Oneidas

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The General Tribal Council (GTC) supported Milwaukee area Oneidas at a special GTC meeting held Sunday, October 27 at the Radisson Hotel.

A petition presented by Brian Doxtator was moved to the top of the agenda. The petition asked for information concerning the processes that were followed in pursuing a new building for the South Eastern Oneida Tribal Services (SEOTS) program in Milwaukee. While the petition allowed for the possibility of amending or overturning at 7-31-04 GTC decision directing the Oneida Business Committee (OBC) to provide assistance in locating a long term facility,

Doxtator stated it was not his intent to close the SEOTS offices.

"This is not about closing down, it's about the process the Business Committee did not follow during the CIP Capital Improvement Process," said Doxtator.

The GTC passed a motion to continue with the 2004 directive to continue with the SEOTS facility. The vote opens the way for the purchase of a new building to house SEOTS that had been put on hold due to the petition.

The GTC heard a petition brought forth by Carole Liggins asking for the dissolution of the second polling site for tri-annual elections. Liggins argued that the second site, located at the SEOTS office in Milwaukee, is too costly for the number of voters

it attracts.

"I don't understand if we're in cost containment ... how we can consider spending several thousand dollars at a Milwaukee polling site," said Liggins.

According to Liggins presentation materials, turnout for the 2011 general election in Milwaukee was 200 voters, about 12 percent of the eligible voter population.

"When this resolution was passed by the Business Committee in 2002, it was anticipated that providing a polling site there would allow as many people could in Milwaukee to go and vote," said Liggins. "It hasn't done that. It hasn't done what the original resolution's purpose was."

SEOTS Director Mark Powless argued that the

\$2900 cost of the off reservation polling site was minimal.

"The polling site cost occurs only every three years," said Powless. "I understand that money's important, but is taking away the voice of our tribal membership worth \$2900 every ... three years?" he asked.

Discussion turned to allowing absentee voting, which would require amending Oneida's Constitution which requires qualified voters to "present themselves in person at the polls on the day of election." OBC members reminded the assembly that the issue wasn't supported at an August 21, 2010 GTC meeting concerning Constitutional amendments.

The GTC passed a motion supporting the polling site to continue.

After approving the Oneida 2013 semi-annual report, the GTC moved on to two referendum questions concerning employees. The first referendum asked

"Should all salaried employees punch in or out to prevent fraudulent claims of work hours?"

OBC Chairman Ed Delgado argued that upper management should deal with this issue.


"This is a management issue. A blanket policy will be very harmful," he said. The referendum question failed.

The second asked "Should all managers work under performance contracts, including supervisors, managers,

directors, assistant managers/directors, senior management?"

The OBC informed the GTC that Councilwoman Melinda Danforth was working on addressing employment issues. The second referendum question failed as well.

Chairman Delgado attempted to defer a petition from Cathy L. Metoxen asking that all supervisory, management, entry-level jobs be employed by enrolled Oneidas, but the GTC moved to delete the item from the agenda.

## Phineas King takes Old Glory Honor Flight

For Phineas King, 80, travel is a challenge due to his age and health. But when the Old Glory Honor Flight notified him he had a seat on the October 17 flight to Washington D.C. there wasn't a second thought about going.

Old Glory Honor Flight offers World War II and Korean War veterans tours of the nation's capital with guardians free of charge.

King served in the Korean War and Vietnam War. He was an Aviation Machinist Mate. He retired after 23 years in the Navy. King's favorite site to visit in Washington DC was the

"I feel for the Korean War. That monument impressed me the most," said King.

One King's most memorable moments from the trip was the mail call during the flight.

"We got an envelope that was full of letters from my relations. How the heck did they know I was going? They sent me letters about being honored for my time in service, what kind of uncle I was," said King.

The greetings his group received in Washington DC and home will hold a special place in King's memory.

"I really enjoyed it. It was wonderful honor. I felt it in my heart. I never had people

## Doxtater reaches Hall of Fame

Few people are fortunate enough to have their achievements enshrined in record books. As for Reggie Doxtater, and his triumphs as an accomplished bowler, he will have such an honor as he is inducted into the Green Bay Bowling Association's (GBBA) Hall of Fame on November 1st.

Having been nominated this past summer, Doxtater had to first meet the Hall of Fame requirements set by the GBBA.

"In order to be considered for the Hall of Fame you have to be a member of the association for at least 16 years, and then you have to be a minimum of 45 years of age. They also look at stats when considering someone. They look at how many 700 series you have, 800 series if you are lucky enough to get that, 300 games, 299 games, championships, and things of that sort," Doxtater said.

Doxtater has recorded 20 games with a perfect score of 300 while he was a member of the GBBA, however his career total is 30 games.

As a youngster Doxtater remembers watching professional bowling on Saturday morning television, hoping to be a competitive bowler. As he got his chance to be a part of competitive bowling his desire to get better only

intensified.

"I started bowling at 11 and I was just asked to sub on a team with some other kids from school and just loved it at that point and picked it up. As a junior you progress up levels of competition and even at that time they had travel leagues. So they had the best bowlers from each bowling center compete against each other. So I think those games are what started the competitive nature," Doxtater said.

At a masters tournament held in Milwaukee Doxtater shared the lanes with some of the nation's professional bowlers. Not a surprise considering Doxtater was a state champion as an amateur.

"I won the Wisconsin state amateur championship in 1999 and won a right to compete against the best amateurs in the country in Reno for a spot on Team USA," Doxtater added.

Doxtater is still an active bowler in area leagues, and shares his

knowledge of the game with the next generation of bowlers as the Head Coach of the Green Bay Southwest High School bowling team.

"I've been coaching the Southwest High School team for the last four years and last year we were able to make it to state, and we actually won state. First time for Southwest and the first time for the Green Bay district since 2004," said Doxtater.

Now that the GBBA Hall of Fame has come calling, Doxtater reflects on his accomplishments as a bowler. But there is one aspect of his induction that stands out.

"It's special for me because I believe I am the first person of color that will be put into the GBBA Hall of Fame, and the first Oneida. In the last 15-20 years there have been Oneida bowlers who have been establishing themselves as a higher echelon of bowler. So I believe there will be more to come," Doxtater said.

December 27, 1955 – October 15, 2013





Benjamin is survived by: his wife, Joyce; 2 daughters, Lona (Keith)





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## Urgent Notice to the Oneida Community

With restoration of the Government functions following the shutdown, the Oneida Comprehensive Health Division will be lifting some of the restrictions put into place on 10/02/13. Effective Thursday, October 24, 2013, the following measures will be taken to begin restoring services to the community. We will begin by phasing in those services which were impacted by the shutdown over the next 2-3 weeks.

• Effective Thursday October 24, 2013, Contract Health Services will go to a Priority 1B level. This means that all referrals for care must meet the requirement of 1B as defined by the Indian Health Service. Priority 1B means a referral must meet the following criteria: The potential for becoming life threatening; not immediate emergency; and is essential to daily function. This includes acute illness, significant flare of chronic conditions, Prenatal Care, Fracture Care, and Specialty consultation/treatment.

This means that you will still need to follow the process for seeking approval for after hour care to utilize the emergency room and/or urgent care services by contacting the on-call nurse at (920) 869-2711.

If you had a referral that was placed on hold on October 1, 2013, you will need to contact Contract Health to obtain instructions as to what you will need to do to reschedule your referral appointment if it meets this criteria.

• Inpatient Treatment for Substance Abuse will CONTINUE to be placed on hold until a date has been determined to restore this

### service .

Patients/clients will be followed through outpatient treatment which is provided on-site until further notice.

• Oneida Pharmacy will return to dispensing a maximum of 90 day supply on all medications and we will restore the dispensing of over the counter (OTC's) that are determined to be medically necessary by November 18, 2013.


• The Contracted Providers will be phased in beginning Monday and patients will be contacted to reschedule their appointments.





## Hobart groundwater claim washed down the drain

The United States Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit sided with the Oneida Tribe in its lengthy legal battle over storm water with the Village of Hobart. The decision issued October 18 agreed with Judge William Griesbach's decision in the United States District Court from September, 2012. The decision re-affirms that the Village of Hobart lacks the authority to impose storm water charges on lands held in trust for the Oneida Tribe.

In 2007, Hobart began imposing storm water charges against the Tribe's trust property and threatened foreclosure of the land if the Tribe did not make payments. In order to protect the Tribe's land, the Tribe filed a lawsuit challenging Hobart's authority to impose storm water management charges on the Tribe's trust property. Hobart then filed a claim against the United States asking the United States to pay the charges, in the event the judge found the tribe not liable for payment. The United States

refused.

Deputy Chief Council for Oneida James Bittorf stated that Hobart's argument that it was the regulator of Oneida's land held in federal trust was upside down.

"Under the Clean Water Act Hobart is a regulated entity, they're not a regulator, and Hobart was trying to put itself in the position of regulating the tribe simply because they got a (draft) permit from the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency)," said Bittorf.

Seven Circuit Judge Richard A. Posner raised questions about the relationship between the Oneida Tribe and the Village of Hobart at the September 18, 2013 hearing in Chicago.

"Hobart doesn't seem to like Indians," said Hon. Posner who referred to a letter sent to village residents by Hobart Village President Rich Heidel that was critical of a candidate for the Hobart Board of Trustees because he was married to a member of the Oneida Business Committee (OBC).

"The attitude is to preserve Hobart's jurisdiction

tion," countered Hobart's attorney Frank W. Kowalkowski.

"From my perspective, the court wasn't buying Hobart's arguments, and I think maybe the justices on the court of appeals were exploring other motivations for Hobart presenting these arguments because I don't think they thought the arguments had any merit, and maybe they were wondering why are these arguments being presented," said Bittorf.

According to Bittorf, the Village of Hobart could ask for a rehearing from the Seventh Circuit, or go to the US Supreme Court. Hobart could also object to Oneida's draft EPA storm water permits.

OBC Chairman Ed Delgado stated in a press release that he would prefer the village and tribe work together.

"It is unfortunate that we had to turn to the courts again to settle this issue. This becomes a costly venue for both governments. According to the decision, "it

(Village of Hobart) doesn't deny the feasibility of cooperative arrangements between it and the Tribe, which has signed cooperative service agreements with other government bodies in the area." Oneida has successfully entered into other inter-governmental service agreements to settle these types of matters and we again extend our invitation to the Village in entering into a service agreement with us.

"Let's cooperate, not litigate. The expense of this litigation to Hobart taxpayers and Tribal members has become too costly in a time of scarce resources. Let's take the resolution of this issue as a sign that we should move forward in a positive manner. The Tribe is pleased with the outcome and hope future litigation can be avoided."

Hobart Board of Trustees President Rich Heidel stated the board hadn't yet met to discuss the ruling and declined to comment at this time.

## Know the rules: Medicare Part D Open Enrollment is Oct. 15 - Dec. 7

Medicare beneficiaries on the Prescription Drug Plan (Part D) have the opportunity to change plans each year during the Open Enrollment period between Oct. 15 and Dec. 7. This is important because the cost of drug coverage offered by private insurance companies can vary by hundreds of dollars, and the plan that was best for you last year may no longer be the most economical choice.

To evaluate plans, be sure to look at the total cost – not just the premium. Total cost is made up of...

- 1) the monthly premium cost;
- 2) the deductible or cost that must be paid before the insurance pays anything;
- 3) the co-pay or amount you pay each time you fill a prescription. The co-pay will vary depending on the individual medication. The best way to evaluate the total cost is to use the Medicare "Plan Finder" on the Internet at [www.medicare.gov](http://www.medicare.gov). You will enter your individual prescrip-

tions and get a total cost based on the specific drugs you take.

(The Plan Finder website is not associated with the Affordable Care Act website, and there are no wait times.)

If you don't have access to the Internet or a computer savvy grandchild available to assist you, you can call the Wisconsin Medigap Part D and Prescription Drug Helpline at **1-855-677-2783** for assistance in finding the best plan for you.

### Companies must follow rules in marketing plans

To protect seniors from aggressive sales techniques, Medicare has strict rules that companies marketing Medicare

Plans must follow. You'll want to be aware that insurance companies selling Medicare Plans:

- CAN'T visit you at your home or a nursing home unless you have invited them.
- CAN'T give you gifts or prizes worth more than \$15 in an effort to get you to enroll in a plan.
- CAN'T try to sell life insurance when you've invited them to talk about a Medicare Plan.

## Trick-or-treating for your money

When it comes to tricking you out of your money, for scammers it's Halloween all year long.

In 2011, an estimated 25.6 million adults (10.8 percent of the U.S. adult population) were victims of fraud. Consumer scams can take many different forms, from direct marketing to affinity scams and involve everything from identity theft to pension poaching.

However, there are a few general tell-tale signs that you can look for if you're trying to decide if a financial product or service you're being offered is a scammer's trick or a financial treat.

### Phantom riches

There are a lot of bogus offers out there that guarantee huge investment returns, windfalls of money, or a fast track to important benefits for only a "small" fee or investment on your part. It could be the offer of a loan at a great rate of interest – as long as you send in a "security deposit" first. Once you do, "poof!" your money disappears along with the

scammer who made you the offer.

Or, maybe it's an offer to help you get thousands of dollars in benefits from the Department of Veterans Affairs – for a fee. If you're a veteran interested in getting benefits like Aid and Attendance, you should be wary of any paid advisor who offers to help you qualify for the benefit or who claims to be able to get you the benefit more quickly than anyone else.

### Superheroes

Scammers would like you to believe they have superpowers, often claiming inflated credentials and experience in order to access your money.

Distressed homeowners may fall prey to mortgage relief companies that offer to help them with their mortgage or foreclosure problems for an up-front fee. These self-styled heroes will tout their credentials and promise to help solve your problems, but often leave you worse off than you were before. And it's illegal for them to charge you an advance fee for help, so report them by submitting a complaint online or by calling (855) 411-2372.

Make sure you thoroughly research anybody who offers to help you with a consumer financial problem! Even the fact that they may have been in the military themselves isn't a guarantee that they are going to treat you right.

### Zombie debt

Zombies can come back from the dead and so can your debts. You may have a debt from years ago and suddenly a debt collector is contacting you demanding that you pay it back – now.

Financial institutions sometimes sell old debt to other businesses, which then try to collect on it. If the financial records aren't accurate, you may even find you're being asked to pay back a debt you already paid off – or one that wasn't even your debt in the first place.

Personal Financial Managers and JAGs can help servicemembers review any demand for debt repayment that you don't fully understand. We've also prepared sample letters that you can use to respond to a debt collector. The letters may help you learn more about the age and other features of the debt and help you protect some of your rights.

### Vampires

Vampires prey on the unsuspecting. Fraudsters do the same – using the promise of a special deal or a one-time offer to lure unsuspecting consumers into deals they don't realize are financial booby traps. Never be pushed into buying something or entering into a financial contract because the product is going fast or the amazing deal is a limited-time offer. Take the time to do your research and get all your questions answered. Ask CFPB is a good place to get some of those answers.

And always remember: unlike the hapless victim in a vampire movie, you have the ability to escape. You can walk away from the table, hang up the phone, or log off the website.

You don't need garlic, stakes, or torches to fight off the scary forces of consumer fraud – just a little knowledge about the tricks scammers use.

## VA Dental Insurance Program



The Department of Veterans Affairs provides comprehensive dental care to Veterans who meet eligibility standards; however, the benefit is not available to many Veterans. VA would like all Veterans and beneficiaries to have access to good oral health. Good oral health is more than just a nice smile or ability to chew favorite foods – it impacts a person's overall health throughout his or her life.

VA's Dental Insurance Program (VADIP) offers enrolled Veterans and beneficiaries of VA's Civilian Health and Medical Program (CHAMPVA) the opportunity to purchase dental insurance at a reduced cost. VA is offering this service through Delta Dental and MetLife.

VADIP is a three-year, national pilot program to assess the feasibility and advisability of providing a premium-based dental insurance plan to eligible individuals. The program is mandated by Public Law 111-163, Caregivers and Veterans Omnibus Health Services Act of 2010.

### Eligibility for VADIP

Veterans enrolled in the VA health care program and CHAMPVA program

beneficiaries are eligible to participate in VADIP. Participation in VADIP will not affect Veterans' eligibility for VA dental services and treatment.

Dependents of Veterans, except those eligible under CHAMPVA, are not eligible for VADIP; however, separate coverage options may be offered dependents by the insurance carrier.

### Dental Plan Information

VA has contracted with Delta Dental and MetLife, private insurers, to administer the dental insurance program.

Beginning November 15, 2013, individuals interested in participating in VADIP may complete an application online, over the phone or by mail. A direct link to each provider's VADIP webpage will be available from [www.va.gov/healthbenefits/VADIP](http://www.va.gov/healthbenefits/VADIP).

Coverage under VADIP begins January 1, 2014 and will be provided throughout the United States and its territories.

The initial participation period will be at least 12 calendar months. Afterward, VADIP beneficiaries can renew their participation for another 12-month period or be covered month-to-month, as long as the participant remains eligible for coverage and VA continues VADIP.

Multiple plan options will allow participants to select a plan that provides benefits and premiums that meet their dental needs and budget. The offered plans vary and may include diagnostic, preventative, surgical, emergency and endodontic/restorative treatment.

Each participant will pay a fixed monthly premium for coverage, in addition to any copayments required by his or her plan.

## Ten Doable Ways You Can Enjoy Meals on Special Days

Before you go to a holiday meal, feast day, pot-latch, graduation or birthday party, make a plan to stay on a healthy eating track:

- Choose the ways you can stay on track and check: YES! I can!

- After the event, check the ones you did: YES! I did it!

1. Earlier in the day, eat breakfast or healthy snacks. Try not to delay eating so you can eat more at the feast. If you skip meals, it may be harder to manage your blood sugar. It will make you hungry. You will be more likely to overeat at the special meal. YES! I can! YES! I did it!

2. At the special gathering, limit before-meal chips and crackers. Try putting a small portion on a small plate or napkin and eat only that. Avoid creamy dips and cheese.

Choose salsa as a dip if it is served. YES! I can! YES! I did it!

3. Limit the number of

starchy foods (potatoes, macaroni, bread) you choose. Have a serving of just your favorite one. Or eat  $\frac{1}{2}$  slice bread and a few tablespoonfuls of other starches. YES! I can! YES! I did it!

4. Choose vegetables that are raw, grilled or steamed. Avoid vegetables in cream sauce, gravy, butter or cheese sauce. YES! I can! YES! I did it!

5. Drink calorie-free drinks like water, unsweetened tea, seltzer or diet sodas. Avoid regular sodas and juice. YES! I can! YES! I did it!

6. Avoid drinks with alcohol or limit them. Women should drink no more than one alcoholic drink a day. Men should drink no more than two. YES! I can! YES! I did it!

7. If you choose to eat dessert, have a small piece. Ask for a half of a piece of cake or pie. Try not to eat the frosting on cake. Don't add whipped

cream. YES! I can! YES! I did it!

8. After the meal, take a walk with family members. Walking will lower your blood sugar level. You will have more energy. YES! I can! YES! I did it!

9. If you eat too much, don't feel bad. You have not failed because of one meal. Think about the days you did not overeat. YES! I can! YES! I did it!

10. Plan to get back on track the next day. Make a plan for what you will eat for breakfast—maybe a boiled egg and a piece of whole wheat toast with non-fat milk (or soy milk). You are back on track! YES! I can! YES! I did it!



# Cyberbullying

Cyberbullying is when one person or a group of people aim to threaten, tease or embarrass someone else by using a mobile phone, the internet or other technologies. ### ONCEC Incorporates ModuMath Program



For the most part, the difficulty of math has to do with your personal perception and its relevance to you. In other words, if you believe it is hard it will be more difficult. This can be made worse if you do not use the math skills.

just text). It specifically targets adult learners. The learner can select the areas to review. Each subject is broken into several lessons and each lesson takes about 20 minutes to complete.

ModuMath covers many topics in both developmental math and algebra. It lets each learner set the pace of instruction, offers immediate positive reinforcement, checks for understanding with short quizzes and questions, holds student attention with continuous interaction, and minimizes math anxiety.

## OBC approves travel for delegation to attend coin dedication, represent Oneida code talkers

The Oneida Business Committee (OBC) approved travel for 11 people to attend a Code Talkers Coin dedication in Washington, DC at the Wednesday, October 23 meeting.

Present: Chairman Ed Delgado, Vice Chairman Greg Matson, Secretary Patty Hoeft, Council members Melinda J. Danforth, Vince DelaRosa, David Jordan, Paul Ninham, Brandon Stevens; Not present: Treasurer Tina Danforth.

The OBC approved travel expenses for members of the Oneida Nation Veterans Affairs

Committee (ONVAC), Oneida citizens who helped research and identify four Oneida Code talkers, and family members of the code talkers to attend a Code Talker Coin dedication November 19-21 in Washington, DC.

The presentation is to honor Native Americans who served in World War II and used their indigenous languages as a military code. The travel for 11 people was approved despite ongoing budget issues caused by the federal shutdown that has delayed grant funds from reaching Oneida. Chief Financial Officer (CFO) Larry Barton suggested taking the funds out of the OBC special projects

budget due to the "one time historical significance of the event."

ONVAC member Mike Hill stated the Oneida Code Talkers weren't honored, as they should have been when they returned from the war.

"It's something that everybody should know about our veterans who went to war and couldn't talk about it," said Hill.

The Committee was looking to the future as it started a set aside fund for the 200-year-celebration of Oneidas arriving to Wisconsin and creating a community planning team. The OBC will save \$10,000 a year for the celebration in 2023 starting in fiscal year 2015.

Councilwoman Melinda Danforth stated the Cultural Heritage Department found pictures from the 100-year anniversary held in 1923.

"In speaking with a number of community members, they wanted to make sure that the celebration for this event in 2023 would be grand," said Danforth.

The OBC also held an emergency meeting later in the day to talk about the Oneida Community Cemetery. Vice Chairman Greg Matson was designated as the point person to assist with the Trust Committee and Division Directors necessary to help resolve issues with the current site.

DATCP is pleased to announce the release of an updated version of the guide, available immediately from the agency as a free download on the DATCP website or as a printed booklet.

"Seniors are specifically targeted in a number of scams, so it is important that we provide a central resource to educate and help protect this group," said Sandy Chalmers, Division Administrator for Trade and Consumer Protection. "At nearly 50 pages, the guide provides a comprehensive look at the scams and consumer issues that seniors

encounter in this state, and the tips and information in the guide can help them through difficult issues or help them identify possible scams."

The guide also includes general consumer protection topics such as landlord/tenant laws, filing a complaint with DATCP, protecting personal information and registering for the state's No Call List.



## Maintenance Corner with Justine Hill - Maintenance Supervisor Fall Home-Maintenance Checklist

With fall in full swing, now's the time to get your home and yard ready for winter.

October is the first full month of fall; by the end of this month, most of your winterization should be completed. Falling leaves and dwindling daylight signal a final opportunity to do some outdoor organizing before winter settles in.

**Fire fluency**

If you didn't clean your chimney at the end of the heating season, do it now — especially if you burn soft woods, which release more creosote. Preventive maintenance is important.

**Detect deadly gas**

If you heat your home with wood heat or a gas heater, a carbon-monoxide detector is a must. These devices look and sound like smoke detectors, but they detect carbon-monoxide gas instead. Units that plug into an outlet are also available.

**Check batteries in smoke detectors**

Daylight saving time ends Nov. 2. Get into the habit of checking smoke-detector batteries when you "fall back" and "spring ahead."

**Close seasonal air conditioners**

If you live in a place where air conditioners are used, this is a good month to close them down. Switch off power, make sure the condensate drain is clear, and clean condenser coils and filters (a vacuum will do). Either remove window units or cover



them, to protect your home from drafts and the units from inclement weather.

**Store outdoor furniture**

Wash and store outdoor furniture; even furniture designed to stay out year-round will last longer if protected from extreme cold and wet. Empty and store large planters — clay or terracotta units will crack if left out to freeze and thaw. Clean and store your gardening tools, but don't put them completely out of reach — shovels are useful year-round.

**Winterize external plumbing systems**

This is the most important job of fall. The simple fact that water expands upon freezing has caused countless homeowners innumerable woes. Ignore this job and flooding, water damage and thousands of dollars' worth of plumbing bills will be your constant winter companions.

Drain exterior water pipes and any pipes that run through unheated areas (such as a garage, crawl space or unheated porch). If draining these pipes isn't possible, wrap them with foam insulation or heat tape.

Drain and store garden hoses. Leave one hose and nozzle somewhere that's easily accessible; you'll need it for gutter cleaning and car washing.

## How will the Per Capita affect your Benefits?

The Oneida Nation Per Capita has been distributed and will affect your SSI and Medicaid health care benefits (including QMB, SLMB and SLMB+). SSI and Medicaid eligibility are based on an individual or family's monthly income and assets. The Oneida per cap is considered income during the month you receive it and an asset anytime following and thus may affect your benefits.

- The Per Capita is considered income the month that it is received and will likely put most people over income for SSI and Medicaid. This means that you will not be eligible for SSI and Medicaid. The only way to become eligible again is to spend the money down until you are within the eligibility guidelines.
- After one month, any remain-

ing Per Capita that you have not spent is now considered an asset, not income. Once you have spent down your Per Capita and are within the SSI and Medicaid assets limits, you will be eligible for SSI and Medicaid again. The maximum asset limit is \$2,000 for an individual and \$3,000 for a couple.

- You can always spend your Per Capita on home repairs, furniture, pay rent ahead of schedule, etc. to help meet the necessary asset limit.

## Assembly approves mascot Bill

MADISON, Wis. (AP) ~ Assembly Republicans passed a contentious bill Tuesday that would make it harder to strip public schools of American Indian mascots, sending the proposal on to the Senate despite Democrats' complaints that the measure is racist.

Democrats railed against the bill for 2 1/2 hours on the Assembly floor, taking turns blasting it as an ugly step backward in race relations.

"Indians are real people. They're not mascots," said Rep. Nick Milroy, D-South Range. "Stand up for human rights and human dignity."

The bill comes as the Mukwonago Area School District is fighting a state Department of Public Instruction order to drop its "Indians" nickname and logo depicting an American Indian man in a headdress. District officials say they've used the nickname for more than 80 years; their lawyers say it could cost around \$100,000 to change it.

The bill's author, Rep. Stephen Nass, R-Whitewater, represents most of Mukwonago in the Assembly. He defended the bill on the floor, saying the current process for ordering schools to drop their nicknames is too slanted toward complainants and doesn't give districts a fair chance to defend their beloved monikers.

"What's on the books right now is basically an outright ban," Nass said. "Right now the school district is guilty."

Under current state law, DPI must hold a hearing on a school's race-based nickname if the agency receives a single complaint about it. The school must prove the nickname doesn't promote discrimination at a hearing. DPI then decides whether the name must go.

## Wis. Senate passes property tax cut

MADISON, Wis. (AP) ~ The Wisconsin Senate passed Gov. Scott Walker's \$100 million property tax cut proposal Tuesday with bipartisan support, even though Democrats complained it was more a political ploy than anything that would truly help people's pocketbooks.

The bill is speeding through the Legislature so it can take effect on property tax bills mailed this December. The Assembly planned to pass it Thursday, just a week after Walker introduced it. Walker hopes to sign it into law Friday.

On average, the tax cut will reduce taxes on the typical home \$13 this year and \$20 next year, although the exact effect will vary widely statewide based on where a person lives and how much their home is valued.

Even under the cut, property taxes are still projected to increase by \$11 - from \$2,943 to \$2,954 - in two years for the median-valued \$148,000 home.

Democratic opponents said the \$100 million cut sounded good but would actually amount to little for most families and would only hurt the state's budget.

"What we're doing is trying to help the governor get elected," said Sen. Tim Cullen, D-Janesville. "At the end of the day, that is what this bill is all about."

Cullen was one of five Democrats who voted against the bill. The others were Sens. Bob Jauch of Poplar, John Lehman of Racine, and Fred Risser and Mark Miller, both of Madison. All 18 Republicans and 10 Democrats voted for it.

Republicans defended the tax cut as a significant reduction that will be welcomed across the state.

## Less money available in Wis.

### for heating help

MADISON, Wis. (AP) ~ Wisconsin is expected to get less federal money this year to help pay for the heating bills of low income residents.

The Wisconsin Department of Administration says the average heating benefit this season is expected to be \$227. That compares with \$337 last season.

The heating assistance is available now through May 15. Eligibility is based on household income, household size and the home's heating cost. A family of four must earn less than \$47,485 to qualify. An individual can earn no more than \$24,692.

The state estimates that about 215,000 people will qualify.

Applications can be made through county social service offices, tribal governments, and private non-profit agencies.

## Oneida lends support to Menominee project

The Oneida Tribe has officially thrown their support behind the Menominee Tribe's proposed gaming facility in Kenosha during an October 17 announcement.

"We value this relationship that we have with the Menominee. They are our closest neighbors, they welcomed us here almost 200 years ago. Many of our Oneidas and Menominee have created families. This is good for all of us," said Oneida Tribal Chairman Ed Delgado.

Governor Scott Walker was expected to make his decision on the Kenosha casino last week but due to the amount of information needing review he has extended his deadline. The Kenosha project is opposed by the Ho-Chunk Nation and Forest County Potawatomi.

He cites conflicting job and revenue information from the Menominee, Ho-Chunk Nation, Forest County Potawatomi, and Milwaukee County. In particular, the Ho-Chunk presented a decline in gaming revenues by \$19.5 million while the Menominee showed the Ho-Chunk with no loss of revenue.

"During their meeting with me last week, the Menominee representa-

tives suggested an objective review of the data. In particular, they suggested looking to a firm like the Innovation Group. As I noted to them, the Innovation Group is the firm, which conducted a review of the impact of a Kenosha casino to the Ho Chunk's operations, and this firm found it would lead to the aforementioned \$19.5 million loss.

"This discussion illustrates the difficulty of getting objective information. With that in mind, I am taking additional time to conduct the due diligence necessary for a decision in the best interest of the entire state of Wisconsin."

The agreement between the Oneida Tribe and Menominee calls for the project to utilize banking services from Oneida's Bay Bank.

Bay Bank will provide a variety of financial and banking related services for the Kenosha project.

"It's not a revenue sharing relationship, it's a business relationship. We would be doing some nation-to-nation relationships regarding future business associations. We have agreed to some marketing strategies that protects our markets," said Delgado.

Menominee Chairman Craig Corn was pleased with the Oneida Tribe's decision to support the Kenosha project.

"It's another historic day in Menominee's history. Like (Chairman Delgado) said, we go back 200 years. I always knew in my heart Oneida would support us," he said.

As for the Ho-Chunk and Potawatomi's oppo-

sition, Corn is hopeful the sides can get to a point of understanding.

"I won't give up on a possibility we can come to some agreement, I won't give up on that," he said.

Corn also feels after reviewing factual information the Governor will approve the project.

"After a thorough review of the facts I think that he will look at in a different light," said Corn. "There are 8,862 tribal members, he has their future in his hands. I hope that he would see the good things that happened today."

The \$800 million gaming facility will feature 100,000 square feet of gaming floor, 400-room upscale hotel with convention space. It will take two years to build.

## Students celebrate Bosses' Day





I'm not sure if ghosts are real or not; however,



**CURRENT ISSUES**

1. General Tribal Council Meeting. On Sunday, October 27th, the governing body of the General Tribal Council held session and expressed Oneidas living in the Milwaukee area by supporting previous action by: (1) supporting the purchase of a building for the SouthEastern Oneida Tribal Services (SEOTS), an Oneida Tribal department which provides important services for our Oneida population living in the Milwaukee area, and (2)

supporting the Milwaukee Polling Place which allows Oneidas living in southern Wisconsin and Northern Illinois easier access to voting at the tri-annual elections. If the petition to close the polling place was successful, it would have created a hardship on many Oneidas, especially elders.

Other issues were regarding employees, one being a referendum that would mandate all employees to punch in, the other proposal mandating that management personnel be mandated

to sign performance contracts. Both were defeated. Discussion was good. There are some salaried employees that abuse having not to sign in and in certain instances, having performance contracts

attached to certain job descriptions could increase productivity. But the general consensus, and I agree, was that the vast majority of our employees, both salaried and those who have to punch in, and managers

and Division Directors are good hard working employees who come to work to serve their people. It was also the consensus of the General Tribal Council that the Division Directors should address those employees who abuse the system by being paid but who do not report to work on a consistent basis. I believe that the Oneida Business Committee will direct the Division Directors to address that issue.

2. Tribal Cemetery. Flooding issues continue to be of great concern at

the Oneida Tribal Cemetery. Addressing that issue is a priority of the Oneida Business Committee. The Oneida Trust Committee continues to work to address the problem. The Business Committee has at its most recent meeting, directed that all the necessary departments of the Oneida Tribe will provide the technical expertise necessary to address the problem. Vice-Chair Greg Matson has been assigned the task to address the problem on behalf of the Oneida Business Committee.

**MESSAGE**

The Tribal membership who attend General Tribal Council meeting expect to be able to hear and participate at meetings. And they expect that there will be no personal attacks, verbal or otherwise, on other Oneidas during those meetings. The Business Committee continues to

receive complaints regarding meeting participants who are too loud in their conversations, or are talking on their cell phones during the meetings. In addition, at Sunday's meeting, we had an incident whereby a participant started making allegations which included a Tribal member who

was not even at the meeting. General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Tribe. However, it is not an institution where Tribal members can make personal attacks against other Tribal members. When that kind of behavior takes place, the person acting in that improper

way will have their microphone turned off and if the improper behavior continues, they will be removed from the meeting. That has been the policy in the past and that policy will continue. I am sorry to write about such a negative activity in this Message, but respectful behavior is a very

important issue when there over a thousand people gathering together to make decisions regarding the future of their Tribe. In fact, I believe respectful behavior towards others is generally a good way to conduct one's life.

**Treasurer's Report**

On October 1, 2013 the Federal Government ordered a partial shutdown which basically meant all grant funds would be frozen until an agreement was reached. On October 18, 2013 a temporary agreement was reached. There has been no guarantee from the Federal Government that any expenditures during the frozen period are going to be reimbursed or that any programs that continued to operate will

receive funding for the weeks the government was shut down. This has created a shortfall in our FY14 budget.

For starters, the Health Center budgeted to receive \$2M in Tribal Contribution this year. Without any federal dollars or guarantees that expenses will be reimbursed the budgeted \$2M will not last too long. In an effort to save cash, the Health Center changed all Contract Health referrals

to Priority 1A which means the condition must be life threatening. If a situation is not life threatening, patients may go to the ER but will be responsible to pay for their visit out of their own pocket. Unfortunately this has caused some problems for some patients that had scheduled surgeries and other needed procedures.

I would like to believe this one change will make enough of an impact that the rest of the Health Center would not be affected but from a financial perspective, it is not enough. To further cut expenses, the Health Center has discontinued all travel unless deemed necessary and will stop dispensing over the counter medications in the pharmacy and cut 90 day prescriptions to a 30

day supply.

These steps alone are not enough to help us weather the government shutdown. Any of our grant programs who are on a fiscal year cycle of October 1 – September 30 have not received their federal monies. Without any dollars, two things could have been done. The first, like the government employees, our employees could have been placed on furlough which basically means laid off until their grant money is released by the government. The second, we could pay the wages of these employees through use of their budgeted funds from other health areas.

Through many discussions, the Business Committee determined that the executive contin-

gency fund was to be used not only to pay grant employee wages but for the Health Center to use to continue to operate. Since management did not supply the Business Committee with a needed amount, I am concerned with how this decision will impact the entire organization. What happens if the executive contingency fund is not enough to cover incurred expenses?

Unfortunately many people in our community do not understand the financial impact the government shut down has had on our Tribe or will potentially happen again when the temporary agreement runs out in February. It is necessary for every area to tighten up and conserve as much cash as possible. This

money is needed to make up for the department funds units whose federal fund allocation is still pending release and reimbursement.

These measures are a short term fix for a potentially long term problem. The Business Committee has asked all areas to develop contingency plans for their respective areas. While some areas of the tribe have been very diligent in making recommendations; there are others who prefer not to and want Finance and or the Business Committee to direct them.

I would like the organization and the community to be patient and understanding at this time. Finance and I will do our best to give direction and execute plans as deemed necessary.

**OBC Forum**

In this report I wanted to talk about a few ongoing issues which are in front of us. We are at a sort of turning point; financially we have many challenges we need to respond to as we look across a spectrum of serious policy and economic issues.

**SEOTS**

Going back some 6 to 7 years ago, I was pushing to build a vibrant community that included a real economic movement, a housing movement, and a movement to usher in outside investors who were interested in investing in SEOTS and the SEOTS community. Outside investors could have provided financing options to help spark a new home building movement in Milwaukee. There was also the potential of creating a 501(c)3. Unfortunately, back then – as it is now, I could not receive the support needed to bring those plans to fruition.

I had been asked to originally support the 68th and Morgan site at the time because there would be an opportunity to do something bigger for the SEOTS commu-

nity down the road. That time has come and all attempts to set up an avenue for building a suitable new building for SEOTS have been strongly resisted. Instead, support has been given to purchase an old existing building for SEOTS on 52nd Street. I have personally visited the 52nd Street twice and believe it is a very questionable choice. I cannot understand the support for this site over a brand new facility. A new facility would actually cost us less, so it is puzzling why and how a more costly, old existing building is being supported over a brand new building.

The difference in these two locations is startling and dramatic. If a blind survey of independent people were completed, the results would not even be close because everyone would clearly favor the idea of a new building. I have received numerous inquiries from tribal members asking about the status of the SEOTS building and questioning the decisions that have been made thus far. Not one person I have talked to supports the purchasing of an old existing building, with

limited space, over a dynamic new building that offers more space at a cheaper price. A new facility would have included a much more conducive outside setting, where even powwow grounds or a lacrosse field were possible. Economically, the lack of support doesn't make any sense; a new building with anywhere from a \$400,000 to \$700,000 in a pay-as-you TIF was available and this has all been disregarded in favor of an old building.

The SEOTS community should have hope, but there needs to be affirmative actions to seek out that hope. Someday, somehow, things should change. An old building is not the answer for Milwaukee Oneidas. Vibrancy in that community will not be advanced by going into another old building.

**Menominee – Kenosha Project**

As many of you are likely aware, the Tribe

has been meeting and discussing options for supporting the Menominee Tribe's pursuit of an off-reservation gaming project.

I felt it was important, from a negotiations perspective, to find a common avenue where job creation could be supported. I acknowledge the need and value of all tribes working together and supporting each other equally but this must be balanced with the reality of the economic impact to us here locally. The impact of this project could be substantial long-term, therefore as a fiduciary, we have to balance our interests delicately and prioritize an economic role.

I did ask that we look at pressing the issue of creating new economic sanctioned zones on all reservations and in nine other locations where substantial Indian populations reside. The idea was to make sure gaming payments to the state

come back to all tribes. I have also asked over the last year that we advance a role in the management work, development work and financing.

**Wake-Up Call- Weak Auditing and No Diversification can spell trouble!**

I will say, this government, and all tribal governments need to turn our full attention to economic diversification efforts. This includes most tribes needing major upgrades to auditing, budgeting and business performance standards. For Oneida, we are really in a slow and emerging crisis, which started in earnest in 2007. I have been talking about these matters and trying to carve out financial independence for us since 1986. Even during financial struggles, too many are fighting any level of change regardless of what the issue is. There is so much to say here, I won't go into every detail but I do want to touch on a few highlights.

We need to consider advancing an economic model with a new policy framework that is backed by a desire to change.

**Government Shutdown and Furloughs**

The impact of the recent political push-and-shove by Congress should be a wake-up call for all of us. It became quickly evident how much of our economic security relies on federal funding. With the resulting government shutdown, the BC had to quickly work with self-governance and the division directors to anticipate and closely monitor the impacts of the shutdown across Indian country.

The Departments of the Interior and Health and Human Services had contingency plans and provided summaries of the impact regarding the Department of the Interior, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Bureau of Indian Education, Office of the Special Trustee, and Department of Health and Human Services. Some areas, such as in the education area were not going to be dramatically impacted right away because the schools are forward funded for this school year. Other

## Summary of the Proposal

The proposed Child Care Complaint Policy (Policy) creates a process for filing a complaint with the Oneida Child Care Department (Department), and the Department's responsibilities when handling a complaint. The new Policy will:

- Allow a parent, guardian, or anyone on the child's emergency contact list, or anyone who witnesses an act of child abuse or neglect to file a complaint.
- Have a separate process for investigating complaints that involve child abuse or neglect.
- Require Staff members accused of child abuse or neglect to be placed on investigative leave.
- Allow the person who filed a complaint to appeal to the Area Manager and the Judiciary if dissatisfied with the findings or corrective action plan.
- Require the Department staff to document and report any unethical or inappropriate behavior they witness.
- Form a parent/teacher organization.

The Public Meeting materials, including the draft proposal, legislative analysis and any other relevant documents, will be made available at the Public Meeting, or can be obtained in advance through the Legislative Reference Office. ## **Topic: Amendments to the Indian Preference Law**

**This Public Meeting is being held to consider a proposal that would:** replace the current Indian Preference Law with a new, expanded and updated Law. The amendments expand the provisions for hiring certified Indian-owned business and Skills Bank workers to complete Tribal Projects. In addition, the amendments:

- Establish the Indian Preference Office in law and make that office responsible for the implementation, monitoring and enforcement of the Law.
- Clarify how a business qualifies as Indian-owned, by expanding on the criteria reviewed before certification is granted.
- Requires compliance agreements be negotiated by the Indian Preference Office to establish the number of Indian workers that must be hired for a project and their benefits and wages.
- Incorporate the provisions of Rider I for Construction Contracts into the Indian Preference Law.
- Remove the License Commission from the process, as that Commission is not being utilized.
- Establishes complaint and investigation processes in the Law.



areas though, such as in health services felt a more immediate impact due to the amount of funding received through Indian Health Services (IHS).

Due to the anticipated financial and immediate impact to the tribe, an emergency furlough policy was adopted by the BC on October 9, 2013. Although I supported the policy and the need for emergency legislative, I have raised some concerns in how it was adopted outside of the recently adopted Legislative Procedures Act (LPA). I did share these concerns in writing and there was support to move this in a correct direction. We all have agreed the LPA and tribal law outline a clear process for adopting legislation on an emergency basis and unfortunately these processes were not followed, due to the emergency nature of these advancing issues.

Here were the concerns I raised over this issue:

1. The Legislative Operating Committee (LOC) did not review the legislation prior to BC consideration.
2. A legislative analysis was not attached.
3. The policy was not adopted by resolution.
4. A Statement of Effect (SOE) was not included.

As soon as I realized these oversights, I sent my concerns to the BC in hopes that the policy would be lawfully adopted. The LOC has added this matter to the next LOC meeting.

### **Economic Initiatives**

My staffer pulled together a list of recommendations that I have made during just this term; I have tried to pursue the creation of at least 400 jobs, with the building of 300 plus homes thus far. These efforts included a home building plant which could have advanced the quality of life for our Oneida people. So many people need home additions, remodeling on many levels, Do-Do home add-ons and the like. The home building plant could have easily built new homeless shelters, college dorms for many university clients, and obviously custom built new homes in six week time frames.

My goal for years has been to create tribal

member enterprises and to help the tribe advance other business opportunities for the Oneida people, from a jobs standpoint. The Oneida Homes Building plant was such a measure.

As the author of Oneida Small Business 2000, I have pushed for small business growth throughout the state that is leveraged with the economic strength of the tribe. On the Oneida reservation, if we were to advance business options like this, the impact would be immediate.

### **Budget**

On the tribal budget, we've been told we need to downsize payroll and tighten up our budgets. I recently tried to advance a whistleblower law so we could have a proper avenue and forum for some independent reporting. However, we encountered obstacles with our control environments, making it difficult to finalize a workable draft. The local control environments are not up to speed. This comes directly from the auditing area, saying we need vast improvements in the control environments prior to putting a whistleblower law in place; this is of grave concern.

### **Diversification**

On the idea of diversification, there are so many serious issues coming towards us. The potential economic impact of IGaming here is extraordinary. Some project brick and mortar casinos could be impacted by 25%. Considering we're not even meeting our own projected numbers, this could pose a grave danger to us economically. We have been looking at this issue and recently we've learned, there is no real opportunity in IGaming. Without proper legislation through Congress we would be locked-out of the direction where this is going.

Oneida needs to consider its own stimulus bill in order to create an economy which can run parallel with the tribe, but be independent of the tribe. We are a major economic player, but we need diversification so we can leverage our economic strength to the advantage of our tribe and our people. This should involve the enhancement of local regional relationships because local partnerships are vitally important.

Tying some of our economic movements with locals will, in the long-term, insulate our business interests. This can also help bring resources to bear on deals we may have or tribal member businesses may have. All of this may help spark desperately needed innovation and ultimately change.

The targeted expenditure of every single Oneida dollar should be the focus. Focus really has to be on the people, the processes, and the products. What and how we deliver to our customers and our clients, the making of money and the spending of money needs to be more closely measured.

I have raised these issues, trying to balance cost with expenditures. I share this quote, because it means so much here: "Because the purpose of business is to create a customer, the business enterprise has two—and only two—basic functions: marketing and innovation. Marketing and innovation produce results; all the rest are costs." - Peter Drucker

Soon we'll need to closely look at having absolute economic metrics and measurements in place. Since we do not run operations off of any tax base, we need to merge-up auditing and budget checks along with appropriation oversights.

I have tried to harness this type of movement but it has been difficult. I am happy to see attempts now to get a budget management act in place, this is the first step. There are many things that need to be dove-tailed with those budget efforts, auditing being one of them.

Also, the cost of goods sold need to be weighed. How much should it cost to run operations that make money? There is an industry staffing standard. On the spending side of the balance sheet, how much does the bureaucracy cost, what is that true cost? How much should it cost to deliver services? I look at the budget as money makers, money spenders, and service providers, we need to bore down on these issues.

The economic vitality of Oneida is at stake, someday, somehow, things should change.



## LOC Update

Legislative Operating Committee Progress Report:  
Completed Items (To Date) for the 2011-14 Term

## New Tribal Legislation

The following is a list of all of the new legislation that was processed by the LOC, adopted, and which went into effect this term:

 Gaming Regulations:

## Vendor Licensing

*Adopted on an emergency basis on May 25 and November 9, 2011. On May 23, 2012, the OBC adopted this regulation on a permanent basis.* This new Regulation (Vendor Licensing and Permitting Regulations, OGC R#1) governs the issuance of vendor

licenses by the Gaming Commission as provided for in the Oneida Nation Gaming Ordinance.

 Concealed Weapons Law

*Passed as a Resolution adopted by the OBC on October 26, 2011.* The Tribe now prohibits weapons on Tribal public property, including Tribal Building, Gaming and Retail Establishments, Facilities, Construction Sites, Vehicles and at Tribally Sponsored Events.

 Tribal Environmental Response Law

*Adopted by the OBC on September 12, 2012.* This Law establishes a Tribal Environmental Response Program to address situations where the discharge or potential discharge of a hazardous substance has occurred and may have contaminated the environment.

making provisions from the Administrative Procedures Act.

 Judiciary Act

*Adopted by the GTC on January 7, 2013.* This Law was created to strengthen and redefine the authority of the Tribal Judicial System. It establishes the new Tribal Judiciary.

 Legislative Procedures Act (LPA)

*Adopted by the GTC on January 7, 2013.* The LPA is a new law that streamlines the law-making process, replacing the law-

 Family Court

*Adopted by the OBC on May 8, 2013.* As directed by the GTC at the January 7, 2013 meeting, this Law creates a Family Court, which requires increased qualifications for the judges.

 Oneida Tribal Judiciary Canons of Judicial Conduct

*Adopted by the OBC on June 12, 2013.* This is a comprehensive set of rules and guidance for the new Tribal Judiciary to ensure Judges maintain the highest ethical standards and behavior.

## Amendments to Existing Tribal Legislation

The following is a list of all of the changes to existing Tribal laws that were processed by the LOC and adopted this term:

 Severance Law

*Resolution adopted by the OBC on October 26, 2011.*

The LOC processed a directive from the OBC to consider repealing this Law. However, the OBC ultimately adopted a new Resolution instead, reaffirming OBC Resolution 9-14-94-B—Prohibiting Severance Payments.

 Hunting, Fishing and Trapping Law

*Adopted by the OBC on December 14, 2011 and May 22, 2013.* The LOC processed seasonal amendments to this Law twice this term.

 Indian Preference Law: HUD Compliance

*Adopted by the OBC on an emergency basis on March 28, 2012 and September 12, 2012.* Amendments were made to ensure the order of preference was compliant with the federal requirements that enabled HUD to provide grant funding to the Tribe.

 Personnel Policies and Procedures: Grievance Process

*Adopted by the OBC on March 28, 2012.* Amendments revise the grievance process to remove the role of the General Manager, since that position has been eliminated.

 Per Capita Law: Fraudulent Diplomas, Tax Liens, Attachments

*Adopted by the OBC on May 9, 2012.* The amendments add a penalty for the use of fraudulent diplomas to obtain per capita trust funds, clarify the attachment process to make it more efficient, and allow per capita payments to be attached for federal tax liens after child support arrears and

Tribal debt has been satisfied.

 Personnel Policies and Procedures: Vacation and Personal Cap

*Adopted by the GTC on July 2, 2012.* Amendments place a 280 hour limit on the total combined amount of vacation and personal time a Tribal employee can accrue.

 Per Capita Law—Payment Date

*Adopted by the OBC on an emergency basis on September 12, 2012, and on a permanent basis on August 14, 2013.* These amendments enable per capita payments to be made on or before September 30th, instead of only on September 30th. This addresses situations where September 30th falls on a non-business day.

 Child Support Law

*Adopted by the OBC on October 10, 2012.* Amendments update various sections of the Law, including long-arm jurisdiction procedures and provisions addressing jurisdiction over a nonresident. Additional changes streamline the law and clarify the difference between payment of arrears and past due child support.

 Paternity Law

*Adopted by the OBC on October 10, 2012.* General changes were made to update the law, including changing the name of the enforcement agency.

 GTC Meeting Stipend Payment Policy

*The OBC adopted these amendments on an emergency basis on October 24, 2012 and February 13, 2013.* The changes prevented members under age 21 from attending GTC meetings until facilities that seat over 2,500 people were identified. Amendments also prevented members who leave the ballroom area and related bathroom facilities from receiving the GTC meeting stipend.

 Administrative Procedures Act

*Adopted by the GTC on January 7, 2013.* The Tribe's legislative process was pulled out of this Law

and incorporated into the new LPA.

 Independent Contractor Policy

*Adopted by the OBC on February 27, 2013.* Amendments address the Tribe contracting with current Tribal employees or employee-owned businesses.

 Indian Preference in Contracting

*Adopted by the OBC on March 27, 2013.* Comprehensive revisions were made to update and strengthen this Law. The amendments also clarify how a business qualifies as Indian-owned; require compliance agreements be negotiated by the Indian Preference Office; incorporate the provisions of the Rider I Policy; establish a complaint and investigation processes in the Law; and enable the Indian Preference Office to create a fine schedule.

 Room Tax Law

*Adopted by the OBC on an emergency basis on June 27, 2012 and December 12, 2012, and on a permanent basis on June 12, 2013.* The Law was amended to remove the set tax rate, and to allow the OBC to set a room tax rate by resolution.

 Marriage Law

*Adopted by the OBC on June 12, 2013.* Amendments address the fact that the State will only accept original copies when issuing certified copies of a marriage license.

 Small Business Loans Law (Formerly Small Business Project 2000)

*Adopted by the OBC on August 28, 2013.* Amendments increased the required owner's contribution rate, decreased the loan cap amount for loans where no real estate was involved, and allow the loan interest rates to be set by the OBC. The OBC then adopted an interest rate for loans by BC Resolution 09-11-13-A.

 Cemetery Law

*Adopted on an emergency basis by the OBC on October 9, 2013.* Amendments enable any person to purchase a cemetery plot for someone eligible to be buried in the Tribal Cemetery.

## Active Files List Update: New Items

In the LOC Update published in the July 25, 2013 issue of the Kalihwiaks, we identified all of the legislative proposals that were being processed by the LOC. Since then, the following items have been added to the LOC's Active Files List. The LOC is now also processing these proposals for OBC and/or GTC consideration.

## Alcohol Beverage Licensing Law Amendments

The Licensing Department has requested amendments to allow the Licensing Department to accept applications and grant Alcohol Beverage licenses under the Law. Under the current Law, the Tribal Secretary accepts the applications and the OBC grants the licenses.

## Whistleblower Law

A new Whistleblower law has been requested to replace the Employee Protection Law and provide a more comprehensive avenue for complaints to be processed in a confidential manner.

## Employment Law

The LOC is processing a request for the development of an employment law to replace the current Personnel Policies and Procedures.

## Fitness for Duty Policy

The LOC is processing a request for a new policy to address employees who are not fit for duty, and who may present a health and/or safety hazard.

## Bylaws

The LOC is processing proposed amendments to the Library Board Bylaws and SEOTS Board Bylaws.

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# Bealer crosses San Francisco Bay

Bealer (Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin), was among a group of American Indians from South Dakota, Wisconsin, Washington and California who participated in the 11th annual PATHSTAR Alcatraz Swim Week (October 6 to 14) in San Francisco and Bay Area locales. The swim week is a component of a year-round program to inspire healthy eating and a stay active lifestyle among American Indian and Alaska Natives. 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Oneida citizen Stephanie Bealer swam the San Francisco Bay to cap off a week of learning about healthy eating and active lifestyles on Monday, October 14.

"It was a life changing experience and I plan on doing it again next year," said Bealer.

The week long seminar was held by PATHSTAR which works with American Indian/Alaska Native (AIAN) communities to encourage healthy eating and active lifestyle practices to fight diabetes and related diseases. Bealer participated in the program in memory of her grandmother Catherine (Skenadore) Bealer who died from complications from Type II Diabetes.

"It pretty much took over her life and wound up ... She wound up getting toes amputated all the way up to her leg, and it eventually took her life," she said.

According to the American Diabetes Association, of the approximately 33 million AIAN, over 16% have

diabetes – the highest rate of any race or ethnicity in the U.S. Bealer plans to share what she's learned with her clients at the Owens Valley Career Development Center in Owens Valley, Calif.

"I want to share that with the Native community and my family, because being Native, you're already at a high risk for certain things," said Bealer. "If anything I want to shake up my family members."

Participants in the PATHSTAR training worked their way up to swimming the 1.5 mile distance from Alcatraz Island to Aquatic Park by taking a series of short swims without wetsuits and building up to longer swims.

"Basically, we were acclimating our bodies to the water, because what happens when your body gets into the water your body goes into shock and you can literally feel the all blood rushing to your heart," said Bealer. "(You) do the mind over body thing and control your breathing and know that you'll be ok and it takes a few minutes to pass and you start swimming."

Bealer was the first of

her PATHSTAR group to complete the swim, but took time to enjoy the experience.

"I did take time to realize where I was at, glancing back and seeing Alcatraz behind me as I was making my forward motion and glancing over and seeing the Golden Gate on one side and then the Oakland Bay Bridge on the other side, it was pretty surreal," she said.

Bealer is looking forward to swimming in the ocean again, even if it's the chilly San Francisco Bay with an average water temperature of 55 degrees Fahrenheit.

"I'm a swimmer, I've been swimming my entire life, I've swam on competitive swim teams and I've swam in a pool but I've never swam in the open water. So this is my first experience in an open water swim, and it wasn't just open water, it was freaking cold. It was

definitely different, and I already miss it, that's what's crazy is that I already miss swimming in the ocean," she said with a laugh.

"My dream," says Chee, is to eventually have the sport includ-

ed as a venue in some of the larger disabled sports competitions such as the Warrior Games and would ultimately love to see it included in the Paralympics. Chee stat-

ed the U.S. Wheelchair Armwrestlers website, has currently had hits from six different countries as far away as Russia, Belgium, Australia, and Finland. From the U.S. alone, individuals from 28 different States have visited the website, "so the interest is definitely there."

Chee is frustrated with the misconception that "whenever it comes to anything associated with the disabled, for whatever reason, most people believe that serving entities must be non-profit."

U.S. Wheelchair Armwrestlers website is set up as fee for membership. However, for a limited time, those interested in competing can register for free.
