# Getting fit can lead to more money in your pocket

A new initiative offering free memberships at the Oneida Family Fitness (OFF) hopes to get more tribemployees and members off the couch and improving their health.

The plan has been in discussion for about three months with an ultimate goal of creating healthier community members, which would lower health insurance costs.

A relationship has been formed between the free memberships, the annual Health Risk Assessments (HRA) offered to employees, and the implementation of the Affordable

Care Act (ACA).

The HRA's offer employees overview of their overall health. Your HRA score determines insurance premiums.

The Affordable Care

Act dictates that organizations must offer options for insured to improve their health. A program within the tribe is now in place that will allow even those who didn't score well on the HRA the opportunity to reduce their insurance premium to levels of high scorers by completing tasks, which can lead to improved quality of

"With ACA going into affect the tribe must offer what's called a Reasonable Alternative Standard. Your premium is deter-

mined by your participation in the HRA. Companies are develop wellness plans to lower premiums and care health costs. Oneida has decided to take part in the participatory or activity based program," said Tina Jacobsen, RD, CD -Health Promotion Supervisor.

Jacobsen was part of the group that reviews the HRA scores annually to develop and implement ideas to improve scores.

The program will offer opportunities for the insured to gather points. The lower your HRA score the more points you will need to qualify for the lower insurance premium.

"This list includes things like participating in 5K, getting a colonoscopy, getting a mammogram, and getting a physical. Everything is point based and the points are based on how long it takes in that commitment. You will get more points for a marathon verses a Just Move It Oneida walk,' said Jacobsen.

The points system is all or nothing. You must gather all the required points to get the adjusted premium dated back to January

"Points are documented through Health Employee Nursing. The employee tracks their points, and the employee collects all of their documentation. If you run

After bouncing around from the Social Services cottages to the VFW Post 7784 and back to cottages, the department now occupies the former elder meal site on County Highway J. Open house attendee Art Cornelius is happy for the change.

"I really like the building, I like the way it's set up and it expands the room. Kerry was always so pressed in those small quarters, but now he can expand and represent the veterans for whatever they stand for," he said.

# Gresham steps up as EMHS interim director

A recent change within Emergency Management Homeland Security (EMHS) leaves the office with a new point of contact.

Marty Antone, Director of EMHS, resigned earlier this month to accept a position at the National Criminal Justice Training Center at Fox Valley Technical College after nearly 25 years with the tribe. Now the department is functioning with just newly named Interim Director Kaylynn Gresham.

Gresham has a Master's Degree from University of Wisconsin – Platteville in Criminal Justice Administration. She obtained her Bachelor's Degree from University of

Wisconsin - Green Bay in

Change Social Development. She was hired as Deputy Director in 2008. She is also a United States Army veteran.

Gresham intends to continue with her department's mission of community safety.

"We develop an emergency response plan for the community. It was adopted in 2010. We now regularly keep it up to date. On a day-to-day basis, I work with different departments to make sure that they have their emergency plans up to date and valid. We work to get mutual agreements between departments and outside agencies," said

#### Obama to unveil first 5 'Promise Zones'

WASHINGTON (AP) President Barack Obama is announcing ways the federal government can help economically challenged communities through five new "Promise Zones."

Obama was to discuss the zones Thursday during a White House event. It's part of his effort to focus on income inequality in the lead-up to his State of the Union address this month.

The White House says tax incentives and grants can help communities tackle poverty, giving children better chances at success. By applying federal funding in targeted areas, Promise Zones aim to bolster education, access to housing and

crime-reduction

Obama first announced the initiative during last year's State of the Union but is just now revealing the first zones to be selected. They're in San Antonio, Philadelphia, Los Angeles, southeastern Kentucky and the Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma.

#### Walker signs bill affecting Medicaid timing

MADISON, Wis. (AP) \_ Gov. Scott Walker has signed a bill affecting the timing of Medicaid covfor Wisconsin residents.

Walker signed the bill Thursday, January 16, two days after the state Legislature passed it.

The bill relates to a three-month coverage delay Walker requested, and the Legislature approved, last month. That pushed back from January until April when 77,000 people just above the federal poverty line will lose Medicaid coverage. It also pushed back by three months when 83,000 childless adults will begin receiving Medicaid.

Under the bill, anyone

who qualifies for the BadgerCare Medicaid program could receive it through March 31 if they apply before Feb. 1. After that, if the applicant is above the federal poverty limit, they will be directed to seek federally subsidized private coverage through the online exchange instead.

the Bellin Run, your name's in the paper," said Jacobsen.

Tribal health programs will now offer certificates showing that a course or event was completed.

The free memberships at OFF are available to insured tribal employees and tribal members.

With an influx of new and free memberships minimal or no impact is expected on services at OFF.

According to the tribe's finance area the revenue created from the membership dues represents approximately \$150,000 of the \$1.2 million it costs to run the facility. In fiscal year 2014 and beyond, the operational cost to run the Oneida Family Fitness Center will be part of the Oneida Tribe's health insurance plan. This decision should not have a negative impact on the staff or services of OFF.

Finance also stated even a small improvement in the tribe's HRA scores would equal large savings.

"Improving health risk assessment scores means the general health of our insured employees is improving, representing a lower cost for the Oneida Tribe. As a self-funded health insurance provided, every dollar that goes out in health care is a Tribal dollar. A 1 percent decrease in health expenses

a p p r o x i m a t e l y \$275,000," they said.

Jacobsen improved HRA scores will lead to even more savings that just those numbers.

"The return investment is not tangible money. The return on investment on health, and the reduction of office visits to doctors can't be measured," she said.

"It's a really cool program being offered. I think it's a really big incentive to make change. There are companies that have done this type of thing before the ACA and have lowered their health care costs by millions of dollars over three to five years.

Its out there, it's about time we do it.'

Gresham.

Some of Gresham's inprogress tasks are still getting the bulk of her attention.

"Biggest thing I've been working on is the schools and daycares with their emergency response plans. We have emergency response plans, tornado drills, fire drills and they are really good at practicing those drills," Gresham said. "We now have to take that next step. If we do have a fire they're not just going to stand in the grass. We have to get those people out of

there. We're building those next steps like how are we going to transport them, and where are we going to take them."

Along with creating preparedness plans a large aspect of EMHS is creating partnerships and agreements with surrounding agencies and tribal departments.

"Our job is to have connections with fire departments, surrounding law enforcements, ambulance services, Lamers Bus and any entity that could offer a response if there is a disaster or emergency," said

Gresham.

With EMHS planning for the unthinkable getting others to see the big picture regarding emergency prep is sometimes an issue.

"Getting the cooperation between the tribal departments and getting them to understand that their asset is a tribal asset, not just a department asset, is a challenge," said Gresham.

VFW Oneida Post 7784 was recognized for achieving over 100% membership in its district at the Wisconsin Veterans of Foreign Wars District meeting.


Junior Vice Commander Carl Gomand received the award for the Oneida VFW. The post received \$100 for the recognition.

# Re-designed bar coded Tribal ID Facts

- Enrollment Department began issuing Bar Coded Tribal ID Cards on October 1,
- 2013. The Bar Coded Strip replaces the green and purple Gas Exemption stickers.
  - If you have a green or purple sticker, please know when your sticker expires you will not be eligible for the gas tax exemption until you get the Bar Coded Tribal ID.
- You may TRADE IN an "old" Tribal Picture ID for the Bar Coded Tribal ID.
- Sorry, we do NOT accept trade-ins of non-picture certification cards, the green colored certification papers or old gas tax cards.
- Tribal members DO NOT need to pay for the Bar Coded Tribal ID as long as they trade in an acceptable Tribal Picture ID. (If no trade-in the applicable fee will apply)
- Tribal members will have until approximately September 30,

- 2014 to "Trade In" an old Tribal Picture ID for the Bar Coded Tribal ID.
- Tribal members who are under age 16 may trade-in their Tribal Picture ID for the Bar Coded Tribal ID; however, they are not eligible to receive the gas tax exemption until they turn 16.
- The type of gas tax exemption (on or off reservation) is based on the address you have on file at the Enrollment Department. It is important all members keep their address information up-to-date.
- Members are allowed one "trade-in".
- Tribal members still need to complete a Gas Tax Application prior to their birthday each year to maintain their gas tax exemption. If they do not re-apply they will not receive the gas tax exemption.
- At the Oneida One Stop, Tribal members still need to: - Present their Bar
  - Coded Tribal ID to the cashier to be scanned for gas tax



Haskell offers associate's and bachelor's degrees and is one of two higher learning institutions operated by the Bureau Indian Education. Haskell's averages enrollment more than 1,000 students per semester.





Joy started her teaching career as an Oneida Head Start teacher around 1975. She taught threeand-four-year-old children in the Chicago Corners building. Then, Head Start moved to the Oneida Norbert Hill Center where she taught for many years. She truly enjoyed working with this age group and strived to get them prepared for Kindergarten. She has been a true educator, always learning and keeping up to date with the newest informa-


tion not only for herself but for her students. We are lucky to have her in the Oneida School system she is a great asset and a success story for both nations she represents-Oneida Menominee.

# Fox Cities schools explicitly ban e-cigarettes

APPLETON, Wis. (AP) ~ School officials in the Fox Cities are updating their guidelines to ban e-cigarettes on school grounds, saying they want to keep their children safe and healthy.

E-cigarettes are plastic and metal devices that resemble traditional cigarettes. They heat a liquid nicotine solution in a disposable cartridge, creating vapor that the user inhales.

Some Fox Cities schools already prohibit all tobacco-related products, which include smoking and smokeless products. Now others are revising their policies to specifically include ecigarettes, Post-Crescent Media reported Tuesday (http://post.cr/1ds337c).

Val Dreier, an assistant superintendent with the Appleton Area School

District, said officials wanted to make sure students and parents understood exactly where the boundaries are.

"We have seen (e-cigarettes) come up occasionally in schools," Dreier said. "The fact they have come up at all, we want make it clear to students that this is not acceptable."

Officials said the point wasn't to clamp down on students, so much as to direct them toward resources that help them avoid chemical depen-

"Our goal is to keep our children safe and to keep them healthy, and to rely on people instead of relying on chemicals," said Cindy Czarnik-Neimeyer, the drugawareness coordinator for Appleton schools. "We create boundaries

for our children and our students in the district, but we also create supports."

She noted that the district was also concerned that students might try to replace nicotine with marijuana in e-cigarette cartridges.

Other schools in the area have already included e-cigarettes to their lists of banned items. Chilton and Menasha did so in 2011 and Kaukauna did so last month.

Some Wisconsin colleges, such as University of Wisconsin-River Falls, have also banned e-cigarettes. University officials there said the decision was influenced in part by a lack of data on the long-term health effects of inhaling nicotine vapor from the battery-powered device.

# Projects aim to reduce runoff into Green Bay

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) ~ Wisconsin farmers have been asked to participate in studies aimed at reducing phosphorus runoff blamed for a growing dead zone in Green Bay.

The area is called a dead zone because the water no longer contains enough oxygen to support fish and other living organisms. The situation is reversible, but fixing it could take 20 or more years, according to Press-Gazette Media

(http://gbpg.net/1frJ3Je). Farms have been required for years to have plans aimed at reducing phosphorus and other runoff. Two new, fiveyear projects will be launched in the spring to test and assess various techniques.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture and Great Lakes Commission plan a \$1 million project in which a handful of farmers will experiment with ways to reduce phosphorus runoff and share what they learn with others.

NEW Water, which is part of the Green Bay sewerage district, and Oneida Tribe of Indians plan a second project aimed at identifying the most cost-effective way of reducing phosphorus. It will target Silver Creek, an area of the watershed surrounded in large part by land owned by the tribe.

"We're looking at the whole water shed. How effective can we be and at what cost?" said Bill Hafs, director of environmental programs at NEW Water.

The study also will look at the effect on farms, which Hafs said are responsible for more than half of the phosphorus in the Fox River and lower Green Bay.

"For example, if the plan calls for converting a strip of land to grass as a buffer, what is the cost of the loss of that land to production?" Hafs said.

This culturally sensitive approach should help connect 509 program participants to their studies.

The standard GED/HSED programs are now available online

When people begin their program they will take an initial assessment that will help identify their strengths and weaknesses. This will allow the system to create a customized plan. # Fee patent documents find their way home

Recently, we received an envelope from the Brown County Register of Deeds and we were amazed when we read the note written by Brown County Register Deeds, Williquette-Lindsay which said, "I hope you enjoy these documents as much as I enjoyed finding them." We were amazed to find that her staff had uncovered 11 historical Oneida documents. Their find consisted of 10 original Fee Patents\* dating back to 1907 and an original Warranty Deed from 1910. We were thrilled to see that the documents were signed in old fashioned fountain pen by non-other than former Presidents Theodore Roosevelt (1901-1909) and Harry Truman (1909-1913); these documents contained Oneida family names such as Webster, Skenandooh,

A majority of the documents are in extraordinary condition, considering they are over 100 Land old. Management employees were determined to find

Schuyler, King, Powless,

out how to protect and preserve these local historical artifacts so we immediately contacted Records Management, Museum, Cultural/Heritage. We were informed that the documents had to be protected from the light, heat and humidity. White gloves should be worn because the oils from hands could discolor and help deteriorate the paper. Old documents should be kept flat in acid-free folders, and kept in a humidity conenvironment. Reggie Doxtater from Cultural Heritage came to assist us and has taken documents Cultural Heritage. Once there, the documents will be scanned into the Onbase system and steps will be taken to ensure the safety and longevity of these historical arti-

Under the General Allotment Act, also known as the Dawes Act of 1887, the lands contained within a tribal reservation were divided among the individual tribal members. Each member was given an allotment of their tribal lands, in Oneidas case that was 40 acres of land for every man, woman and child also known as lands were then sold under rules and regulations passed by the government. Luckily, the Oneida Reservation didn't have any excess

The United States Government issued Trust "patents" Allotted and this placed the land into trust status by the federal government for 25 years and gave the allottee's the right to use and occupy tribal land. At the end of the 25 year "Trust" period, if the Secretary deemed an Indian who had been allotted land the General Allotment Act competent to manage his own affairs, then he would issue a "patent" in Fee to the Allottee and the land would then be taking out of trust and be subject to same state and local taxation. Fee patents\* are grants made by the government that confers an individual fee-simple title to public lands; it entitles the owner unrestricted powers to dispose of the property as they wish. An effect of issuing Fee patents resulted in thousands of acres of Trust lands passing out of Indian hands and onto the open mar-





Tewahúhtyaks W∧hní·tale<sup>2</sup> or Breaking Ear Moon. The second moon is occurring on February 15.

In honor of the turtle as a clan animal, the Oneida Nation Museum is planning a community event consisting of building a giant snow turtle. We are gathering snow and preparing the foundation for the turtle on Monday, January 20. Work will continue throughout the

# 2013 DPW Electrical Department report

Kevin Rentmeester DPW Electrical Manager

At the beginning of each New Year I assess what we have accomplished in the Electrical Department the past year summarize achievements of our electrical crew. I also look forward to what is yet to be accomplished, what we can do better, areas that need improvement and what possibilities and opportunities lay ahead in the New Year.

Overall the Electricians had another very productive year. The scope of their work is far beyond that of electrical maintenance. We operate as an in house electrical contractor specifically built and trained to meet the widely varied (Commercial, Residential, Industrial, Agricultural and Specialized) electrical needs of the Oneida Tribe. The electrical position

carries a high degree of responsibility. The facility 480/277, 208/120 volt electrical systems are much like a living breathing organism. The amount of electrical equipment and wiring on systems under our care is massive. Electrical current is constantly flowing on these systems and must be selectively de- energized for servicing. Critical thinking skills are a must when electricians work in and around potentially hazardous voltages. The equipment we install will carry electrical current and will be used by both Oneida employees and the general public when it is re-energized. We must make sure it is installed correctly, meets code requirements and operates safely in our facilities. Much of the electrical equipment and systems we install are technical in nature and involve a high capital investment.

We would also like to acknowledge the valuable **DPW** the support Administrative staff gives our department. Paula and King Lindsey Powless help us navigate through the ARCHIBUS work order system, direct customer calls and help us with computer/ copier tasks. Jeanette Ninham processes all of our quotes, P.O. requests, invoices, and training requests. Bobbi Jo King is responsible for behind the scene support for all of DPW.

#### Health Center HVAC rooftop unit replace-

ments DPW Electrical completed all of the electrical work in house. This included the field layout and installation of four 480 volt feeder runs; GFSC protection, over 400 feet of conduit and conductors and 120 volt branch circuits. Brocker was the lead on this project which included most of our crew. We were also able to coordinate the replacement of the main 2000 amp service breaker and the installation of upgraded

surge protection system

during this project.

The old Anna John facility was still in operation until June 2013. The dependability of the Anna John emergency

electrical system were a great concern to our Electrical department. Much of the components of electrical systems were prone to failure and no longer available. Our electrical crew kept a weekly vigil to Anna John to test and document the operation of equipment. This was not only to ensure the facility met state nursing home licensing requirements but more importantly to ensure the safety and well-being of our elders.

#### Apple Orchard sorting machine upgrade

Calvin Cornelius and Mark Engel were the leads on this project. This involved the addition of a washer, waxer, additional sorting, frequency drives and improved safety devices. Mark's extensive industrial electrical background was valuable.

#### Norbert Hill 3rd floor lighting panels

This is an extremely critical an ongoing process the Electrical Department does behind the scenes. In the course of our work we also identify existing hazardous electrical installations within our facility buildings. Unfortunately once these substandard installations are in they require an extensive amount of time and coordination to correct. In this particular situation we relocated a noncode compliant electrical panel installation located within a pipe chase. This posed a potential shock hazard to both electrical and maintenance personal. Ray Creapeau and Calvin Cornelius completed this project.

#### Norbert Hill gymnasium

This was one of several Energy Efficiency bondprojects Mitch Skenandore was lead on. Mitch was responsible for sight evaluation, working with vendors, coordinating deliveries of hundreds of fixtures and hardware and being lead on installation of fixtures. Thirty 400 watt metal halide lighting fixtures were replaced with Orion fluorescent fixtures. Calvin Cornelius updated the lighting on the scoreboard.

#### Recreation Genter on H gymnasium lights

Electricians installed 12 wireless controlled energy efficient gymnasium fixtures as part of the bonding projects.

#### Social Services Child Welfare Office lights

The lighting in 14 offices were upgraded with direct/indirect, dimmable, quit, Lutron fixtures. This project was coordinated along with the maintenance department in conjunction with the ceiling replacement. Jill Brocker was our lead on this project.

#### Elderly Services fire alarm replacement

The Electrical department worked with C.E.C in replacing the Simplex Fire Alarm to make it compatible with the AJR-CCC system. Brad Van Every and Waylon Denny are our leads on all Fire Alarm systems.

# Facility wide surge pro-

tection projects Ray Creapeau and Calvin Cornelius toured all of our facility buildings with a vendor Engineer to determine the needed updating and improvements to our facility surge protection systems. The transient voltage surge protection system protects all of the electrical equipment in our facilities from electrical utility line surges and lightning strikes. Ray is now leading phase two of this three phase project.

#### Ridgeview parking lot lights

This project (D.O.E.) was funded through a grant obtained by the Environmental Department. Mark Engel was lead on several D.O.E

#### Parish Hall parking lot This was also a D.O.E.

project and completed by Mark Engel and Mitch Skenandore.

#### **Occupational Health**

Mitch Skenandore installed six parking lot pole lights.

#### Oneida Veterans Memorial parking lot lights

This was a D.O.E. Energy project completed by Mark Engel and Mitch Skenandore.

#### Little Bear parking lot lights

This was part of the Efficiency Energy Bonding projects. We reduced the height of the pole and used high efficiency longer life directional lighting. We will have a much longer period between servicing these fixtures and we will no longer have to rent an 80 foot lift to service the lights.

#### Distribution Food Warehouse lights

This was another energy efficiency project completed by the Electrical Department. 400 watt metal halide fixtures were replaced by 150 watt fixtures. Mitch Skenandore was lead on this project.

#### Skenandoah HRD office lights

We installed direct /indirect fixtures in four small HRD offices. These fluorescent fixtures are not only energy efficient but significantly reduce glare. Jill Brocker completed this project.

#### NHC Auditorium lighting upgrade

This work was completed to accommodate a summer theater project. Waylon Denny and Brad Van Every completed this project.

#### Ridgeview exit sign upgrades

This is part of our continuous effort for energy efficiency and code compliance.

#### Utility **Department** emergency calls Our Electrical depart-

ment is purposely built for the broad range of electrical installations under the Tribes ownership. Mark Engel and Ray Creapeau are our leads in Utility Department service calls. Utility Department personnel have direct contact with our electricians whenever they need our services at the Waste

Cornelius Calvin changed out several batteries and performed other maintenance procedures at multiple facilities to ensure our generators are ready during emergencies and outages.

#### **Education Center** remodel computer class-

This is the latest of several remodel projects over the years completed by DPW departments at the Career Center. This project was to accommodate the evolving needs of the Career center clientele.

#### AJRCCC post construction projects

Brad Van Every was lead on the installation of several of the low voltage systems when it was under construction. As a result Brad and Waylon Denny were assigned to handle several of the post construction projects.

#### AJRCC phone repeater

This project was completed in order for improved phone reception in the concrete reinforced tornado shelter areas of the AJRCCC.

#### AJRCCC rewire coolers/freezers to EM generator

after project This change order was to prevent the loss of product during extended power outages.

#### AJRCCC micro shades This allows control for

the shades in the main cafeteria.

#### Skenandoah data center shutdown This was required to

By having an internal credentialed electrical department we can quickly adjust to the changing electrical requirements of the Tribal departments.

#### Grounds keeping fan instalation

**BERLIN, Wis. (AP)** The Berlin (BUHR'-lin) Area School District has renewed discussions about its Indian mascot in light of a new state law.

The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction originally told the district it would have to change the mascot. Superintendent Robert Eidahl says the new state law put the brakes on that change for now. The new law requires a petition to trigger a state review of a nickname instead of a single complaint. It also wipes out all previous state orders for schools to drop race-based mascots.

WLUK-TV says the school board heard arguments on both sides Wednesday night, but made no immediate decision. Those in favor of a change say the Indian logo has negative and racist overtones. Those for keeping it say it's a matter of free speech.

# Walker signs bill affecting Medicaid timing

**MADISON, Wis. (AP)** ~ Gov. Scott Walker has signed a bill affecting the timing of Medicaid coverage for some Wisconsin residents.

Walker signed the bill Thursday, January 16, two days after the state Legislature passed it.

The bill relates to a three-month coverage delay Walker requested, and the Legislature approved, last month. That pushed back from January until April when 77,000 people just above the federal poverty line will lose Medicaid coverage. It also pushed back by three months when 83,000 childless adults will begin receiving Medicaid.

Under the bill, anyone who qualifies for the BadgerCare Medicaid program could receive it through March 31 if they apply before Feb. 1. After that, if the applicant is above the federal poverty limit, they will be directed to seek federally subsidized private coverage through the online exchange instead.

# Wis. legislators circulate 7-day work week bill

MADISON, Wis. (AP) ~ Wisconsin manufacturing and retail workers could volunteer to work seven days straight without a day off under a bill two Republican lawmakers are circulating on behalf of the state's largest business group.

ratchet up tensions between the GOP and Democrats and their organized labor allies, who are still stinging after Republicans passed Gov. Scott Walker's plan to strip most public workers of nearly all their union rights in 2011.

The bill promises to

The measure's authors, Sen, Glenn Grothman of West Bend and Mark Born of Beaver Dam, say the bill brings Wisconsin in line with federal law, gives workers a way to make extra money and employers a way to boost production. Democrats and labor leaders insisted bosses would use the bill to force their employees to work longer and effectively erase the weekend. "Even God said rest on

the seventh day," said David Reardon, secretary-treasurer Teamsters Local 662, a union that represents about 10,000 workers across various industries in west-central and east-Wisconsin, including manufacturing, truck driving, public workers and food service workers. "I would hate to see that Republican bill pass. Some employers would really take advantage of that."

Current Wisconsin law requires employers who own or operate factories or retail stores to give their workers at least 24 consecutive hours off every seven days. Under Grothman and Born's proposal, workers could volunteer to work seven straight days without a rest day.

W i s c o n s i n Manufacturers and Commerce, the state's largest business organization, brought the idea to them, the two Republicans said. The organization was doing a study on discrepancies between federal and state law and discovered federal law imposes no such limits on consecutive work days as long as minimum wage and

overtime payment requirements are met, Born said.

In an email to lawmakers seeking support for the bill, Born and Grothman said they had heard from businesses with employees who want to work the additional time. But when asked for names Born said the only people he met with to discuss the bill were from WMC.

"We should have worded that differently," Born said. Grothman said he has talked to a business but declined to name it.

WMC spokesman Jim Pugh didn't return messages.

Born said the bill gives workers a chance to make some extra dollars and their bosses a means to increase production.

"Here's an opportunity for folks to work together to get things done in a positive way for the employer and the employee," Born said. "It just seems like a win all the way around."

But opponents warned the only choice employees will have is work the extra hours or lose their jobs. The measure also would give workers who can work the extra day an advantage over workers who want to spend a day with their family, they said.

Rep. Cory Mason, D-Racine, called the legislation a "slap in the face to ordinary working folks in Wisconsin."

"Workers fought long and hard for a 40-hour work week and the weekend," Mason said. "People deserve at least a day off a week. It's a legal protection for a reason."

Grothman dismissed their concerns, saying he's never heard of any business where pressuring employees to work extra hours has been a problem. He, too, insisted the bill would help workers make extra cash.

"It's ridiculous when people want to work extra hours why Democrats would stand in the way of that," he said. "I don't know why some people want some people to remain poor."

The bill's prospects are unclear. Republicans control both houses of the Legislature but caucus leaders haven't committed any support for the measure and a Walker spokesman was noncommittal.

#### Tensions flare between Wis. DNR, Gogebic Taconite

MADISON, Wis. (AP) ~ Tensions between state regulators and a company that wants to bring an open pit iron mine to northern Wisconsin could be a signal of more conflict yet to come.

Gogebic Taconite and the Wisconsin

Department of Natural Resources got into a public dispute last week over how much regulatory authority remains in the agency's hands under a 2013 law that rolled back environmental restrictions to make mining easier. The dispute over what is and isn't allowed under the untested mining law may be a preview of what's to come when the company seeks a mining permit, the Wisconsin State Journal reported Sunday.

Letters illustrating the tensions were posted on the DNR website last week. The company objected to a DNR research document that listed environmental hazards of mining, which the company considered

biased, and it sharply criticized the extent of agency questions about Gogebic's plans to dig up rock for testing.

"All of the tests and modeling we've done cost money," company spokesman Bob Seitz said. "(Some studies cost) tens of thousands of dollars a crack. So this should be about what's necessary and not what's wanted to satisfy curiosity."

Seitz said multiple rounds of questions from the DNR have delayed completion of its plan for collecting bulk samples from the site in Iron and Ashland counties.

Sen. Bob Jauch, a Democrat whose district includes the mine site near Mellen, accused the company of "bullying" tactics.

Gogebic Taconite's tough tone will backfire if the DNR is forced to deny the company's final mining permit because the company fails to provide needed data within the new law's tightened timeline for decision by

the state, Jauch said.

DNR officials said they will continue to ask questions that need asking to ensure that the environment is protected and to provide information to the public.

"I was surprised that they took it so hard," said Ann Coakley, one of the DNR's key managers for the project. "We will always be here with a smile and a 'How can we help you?"

# Disenrollment leaves Natives 'culturally homeless'

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) ~ Mia Prickett's ancestor was a leader of the Cascade Indians along the Columbia River and was one of the chiefs who signed an 1855 treaty that helped establish Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde in

But the Grand Ronde now wants to disenroll Prickett and 79 relatives, and possibly hundreds of other tribal members, because they no longer satisfy new enrollment requirements.

Oregon.

Prickett's family is fighting the effort, part of what some experts have dubbed the "disenrollment epidemic" - a rising number of dramatic over clashes tribal belonging that are sweeping through more than a dozen states, from California to Michigan.

"In my entire life, I have always known I was an Indian. I have always known my family's history, and I am so proud of that," Prickett said. She said her ancestor chief Tumulth was unjustly accused of participating in a revolt and was executed by the U.S. Army and hence didn't make it onto the tribe's roll, which is now a membership requirement.

The prospect of losing her membership is "gutwrenching," Prickett said.

"It's like coming home one day and having the keys taken from you," she said. "You're culturally homeless."

The enrollment battles come at a time when many tribes - long poverty-stricken and oppressed by government policies are finally coming into their own, gaining wealth and building infrastructure with revenues from Indian casinos.

Critics of disenrollment say the rising tide of tribal expulsions is due to greed over increased gambling prof-

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its, along with political in-fighting and old family and personal feuds.

But at the core of the problem, tribes and experts agree, is a debate over identity - over who is "Indian enough" to be a tribal member.

"It ultimately comes down to the question of how we define what it means to be Native today," said David Wilkins, a political science professor at the University of Minnesota and a member of North Carolina's Lumbee Tribe. "As tribes who suffered genocidal policies, boarding school laws and now out-marriage try to recover their identity in the 20th century, some are more fractured, and they appear to lack the kind of common elements that lead to true cohesion."

Wilkins, who has tracked the recent increase in disenrollment across the nation, says tribes have kicked out thousands of people.

Historically, ceremonies and prayers - not disenrollment - were used to resolve conflicts because tribes essentially are family-based, and "you don't cast out your relatives," Wilkins said. Banishment was used in rare, egregious situations to cast out tribal members who committed crimes such as murder or incest.

Most tribes have based their membership criteria on blood quantum or on descent from someone named on a tribe's census rolls or treaty records old documents that can be flawed.

There are 566 federally recognized tribes and determining membership has long been considered a hallmark of tribal sovereignty. A 1978 U.S. Supreme Court ruling reaffirmed that policy when it said the federal government should stay out of most tribal membership disputes.

Mass disenrollment left battles started in the 1990s, just as Indian casinos were establishing

a foothold. Since then, Indian gambling revenues have skyrocketed from \$5.4 billion in 1995 to a record \$27.9 billion in 2012, according to the National Indian Gaming Commission.

Tribes have used the money to build housing, schools and roads, and to fund tribal health care and scholarships. They have distributed also casino profits to individual tribal members.

Of the nearly 240 tribes that run more than 420 gambling establishments across 28 states, half distribute a regular per-capita payout to their members. The payout amounts vary from tribe to tribe. And membership reductions lead increases in the payments - though tribes deny money is a factor in disenrollment and they're simply trying to strengthen the integrity of their membership.

Disputes over money come on top of other for tribes. issues American Indians have one of the highest rates of interracial marriage in the U.S. - leading some tribes in recent years to eliminate or reduce their blood quantum requirements. Also, many Native Americans don't live on reservations, speak Native languages or "look" Indian, making others question their bloodline claims.

Across the nation, disenrollment has played out in dramatic, emotional ways that left communities reeling and castout members stripped of their payouts, health benefits, fishing rights, pensions and scholarships.

In Central California, the Picayune Rancheria the Chukchansi of Indians has disenrolled hundreds. Last year, the dispute over banishments became so heated that sheriff's deputies were called to break up a violent skirmish between two tribal factions that several people injured.

In Washington, after Nooksack Tribal Council voted to disenroll 306 members citing documentation errors, those affected sued in tribal and federal courts. They say the tribe, which has two casinos but gives no member payouts, was racially motivated because the families being cast out are part Filipino. This week, the Nooksack Court Appeals declined to stop the disenrollments.

Michigan, And in where Saginaw Chippewa membership grew once the tribe started giving out yearly percapita casino payments that peaked at \$100,000, a recent decline in gambling profits led to disenrollment battles targeting hundreds.

The Grand Ronde, which runs Oregon's most profitable Indian gambling operation, also saw a membership boost after the casino was built in 1995, from about 3,400 members to more than 5,000 today. The tribe has since tightened membership requirements twice, and annual per-capita payments decreased from about \$5,000 to just over \$3,000.

Some members recently were cast out for being enrolled in two tribes, officials said, which is prohibited. But Prickett's relatives, who were tribal members before the casino was built, the reasons were unclear.

Prickett and most of her relatives do not live on the reservation. In fact, only about 10 percent of Grand Ronde members do. Rather, they live on ancestral lands. The tribe has even used the family's ties to the river to fight another tribe's casino there.

Grand Ronde spokeswoman Siobhan Taylor said the tribe's membership pushed for an enrollment audit, with the goal of strengthening "family tree." declined to say how many people were tabbed for disenrollment.

But Prickett's family

says it has been told that up to 1,000 could be cast out, and has filed an ethics complaint before the tribal court. They say the process has been devastating for a family active in tribal arts and events, and in teaching the language Chinuk Wawa

"I have made a commitment to both our language and our tribe," said Eric Bernardo, one of only seven Chinuk Wawa teachers who also faces disenrollment. "And no matter what some people in the tribe decide, I will continue to honor that commitment."

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# Contempt charges dropped in **Baby Veronica case**

TULSA, Okla. (AP) ~ A South Carolina judge on Thursday dismissed contempt of court charges filed against Dusten Brown, the biological father of the girl known as Baby Veronica who was caught up in a lengthy custody dispute.

The contempt case dropped after Dusten Brown and the Cherokee Nation reached an agreement with Matt and Melanie Capobianco, who are the adoptive parents of 4year-old Veronica, the Tulsa World reported Friday. Brown faced contempt charges after initially refusing to comply with a judge's order to return Veronica to the Capobiancos.

Veronica has been the subject of court battles since she was born to a non-Cherokee mother, who put the girl up for

Capobiancos had been lined up to receive custody since 2009.

Brown, a member of the Cherokee Nation, pressed claims under the Indian Child Welfare Act and won custody when the girl was 27 months old. The Indian Child Welfare Act was passed in 1978 with the intent of reducing the high rates of Native American children being adopted by non-Native American families.

But in June, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled the act didn't apply because Brown had been absent from Veronica's life. In September, Oklahoma's Supreme Court dissolved an order keeping her in the state, and Brown handed the girl over to the Capobiancos.

Both Brown and the Capobiancos have kept a

low profile since Brown handed Veronica to them. Brown last spoke publicly on the issue in October, when announced he was giving up all legal challenges over the custody of Veronica.

"I love her too much to continue to have her in the spotlight. It is not fair for her to be in front of media at all times," he said then.

The Capobiancos are seeking more than \$1 million in legal fees and expenses from Brown and the Cherokee Nation. That case remains pending in Oklahoma court.

# Tax Identity Theft Awareness - Smart Filing Practices

MADISON fraud involving identity theft has been a big news item over the past couple of years, with stories of consumers submitting their tax returns only to find that criminals have already filed returns using their Social Security Numbers and identities. It is a growing concern nationwide and has affected a number of Wisconsin residents.

"Tax Identity Theft Awareness Week" is underway, and Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) is asking Wisconsin taxpayers to take steps to protect their personal information and to use caution when filing their taxes.

Tax scammers have a number of ways of getting at a consumer's perinformation, including data breaches, theft of medical or banking records, access to personal computers using malware or "dumpster diving" paper

"Your best protection against tax fraud is to safeguard your private information year-round," said Sandy Chalmers, Division Administrator for Trade and Consumer Protection. "At a minimum, consumers should shred personal documents, use strong internet passwords and never give out personal information through unsolicitphone calls

The IRS will contact you by mail if they suspect that you are the victim of tax identity theft. The IRS will not contact you by phone, email or text message. If your identity has been compromised, call the IRS ID Theft Protection Specialized Unit at 1-800-908-4490.

To avoid becoming the victim of tax identity theft fraud, consider the following tips:

? If possible, file your taxes early in the season to get a jump on a potential scammer.

? If you file your taxes online, use a secure connection – not a public WiFi network. Update your operating system or anti-virus software ahead

? If you file by mail, take your return directly to the post office rather than leaving it in an unse-

? Before choosing a tax preparer, do your research and get references from other clients.

? Shred any unnecessary copies of your tax return, calculation sheets or supporting documentation.

? Never give out any personal or banking information on an unsolicited phone call or in response to an unsolicited email.

? If you suspect that your identity may have been stolen, check your credit report to ensure that no new accounts have been created in your name. Visit www.annualcreditreport.com to get a copy of your report from the three major credit

? Anyone suspecting fraudulent activity is encouraged to file a complaint with DATCP. File a complaint online at datcp.wi.gov or call the state's Consumer Information Hotline at 800-422-7128 and

request a complaint form. ? To further protect consumers from tax scams, DATCP asks Wisconsin residents to notify the state if they see questionable practices at tax preparation businesses. Complaints can be filed online through the DATCP website or using a DATCP complaint

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
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# BIA Grants Will Boost Tribal Preparedness to Climate Change

WASHINGTON – The Department Interior's Bureau of Indian Affairs announced today that it has awarded more than \$600,000 in grants to 18 tribes or tribal consortiums to support them in addressing the challenges of climate change as part of the President's Climate Action Plan to reduce carbon pollution, move the economy toward clean energy sources and prepare communities for the of climate

The grants are designed to assist tribal communities on preparedness, including through planning projects and by supporting participation in federal initiatives that assess climate change vulnerabilities and develop regional solutions.

part "As of the President's Climate Action Plan, we are looking for ways that BIA can be a partner to tribes in preparing for the impacts of climate change," said Assistant Secretary -Indian Affairs Kevin K. Washburn. "American Indian and Alaska Native communities can be particularly vulnerable to impacts, so it is our hope that these grants will help bolster the efforts of tribal managers to adapt to climate change."

In the near future, the BIA will solicit FY 2014 proposals for additional grants from federally recognized tribes to support community-based preparedness and resilience efforts.

"The Department of the

Interior recognizes that

tribes can often face disproportionate impacts from a changing climate," Director BIA Michael S. Black. "The planning and adaptation processes that these grants will support are important, not only for infrastructure, human

health, and economic sec-

tors, but also for the cultural and spiritual ties that tribes have with our land and natural systems."

In choosing the FY 2013 grants BIA considered proposals for more than \$5 million and gave priority to those proposals that supported multiple tribes, among other considerations. Some of the 2013 projects include:

- The College Menominee Nation, in cooperation with the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin, the Climate Northeast Science Center, and State Pennsylvania University, will build on a successful climate conference attended by 21 tribes presenting follow-ups on climate adaptation training in the Midwest.
- The 1854 Treaty Authority will coordinate a vulnerability assessment and adaptation planning for offreservation hunting and

gathering concerns for two tribes and the authority itself in the Midwest.

• 13 tribes were awarded travel support for technical capacity-building through participation in interagency adaptation technical forums and implementation projects. The tribes include: Quinault Indian Nation, Upper Sioux Community, Walker River Paiute Tribe, Coyote Valley Band of Pomo Indians, Bear River Band of the Rohnerville Rancheria, Pueblo of Taos, Prairie Band Potawatomi Nation, Lac Vieux Desert Band of Lake Chippewa Superior Indians, Sac & Fox Tribe of the Mississippi in Iowa, Hopi Tribe, Kashia Band of Pomo Indians of the Stewarts Point Rancheria, Gila Indian Community, and the Cherokee Nation.

# Getting rid of debt

The Debt-Snowball Method

Setting a budget is often just the first step in getting your financial world in order. The budget will easily help you understand your financial situation and get control of those monthly bills but sometimes you need more help with getting caught up if you have other debt. Once you have completed putting together your budget together you will be able to identify where you can cut back on your spending. (If you do not have a budget, you can pick up a free budget helper package at the ONCEC). Most often this will be found by reducing nonessential costs. Reduce your daily spending by as little as \$3.33 and you will save \$100 per month. For many people, reining in discretionary spending for a few months goes a long way toward tackling debt. But if that's not enough, try to reduce your fixed expenses. Take steps to

lower your household bills; refinance your mortgage to get a lower interest rate; or, if you have a good payment history, ask your credit- card company to lower the interest rate you're charged. The average U.S.

household with at least one credit card carries nearly a \$15,950 in credit-card debt (in 2012), according CreditCards.com. Getting rid of debt can be challenging. The type of debt we are talking about is generally in the form of loans, such as car loans, title loans, credit cards and other personal loans that are five years or less from maturity. Mortgages are often treated differently

because they usually fit into an overall strategy. The strategy or plan that you use depends a lot on your discipline and the type of debt you have. Talking to a counselor can help you choose the right strategy. This article will explain a method called the Debt-Snowball method. If you have several credit cards, you should get rid of all but one and that one should be used only for real emergencies. Having analyzed your budget, you should know how much money you have to pay off your debts. This method requires a commitment to pay the minimum amount on all but the smallest debt. On the smallest debt, you will pay your remaining discretionary funds on that loan. As soon as you get that loan paid you will be able to use the amount that would have gone to that loan to apply to the new smallest debt owed. This process of paying off loans and using the excess cash to pay the next smallest loan continues until you have

paid all of your loans off. This method works because it gives the fastest results and sense of accomplishment initially because the money from retired debt snowballs together to help pay the larger amounts owed. Mathematically, however, sometimes it makes more sense to pay off the high interest loans first. "Rosemary Rickard Hill grew up on the Tuscarora Nation, member of the Beaver Clan. Rosemary's mother, Margaret Rickard; grandmother, Hattie Williams, and great-aunt, Gertrude Chew were the first teachers. Rosemary remembers making, and playing with, beaded wirework jitterbugs, miniature chairs, cups and saucers.

"By twelve, Rosemary was sewing raised and flat beadwork on Victorian whimsies'. Based on patterns handed down through the generations, these items were first sold to Victorian era tourists. Rosemary remembers accompanying her mother, grandmother and great-aunt to Prospect Park (Niagara Falls, NY) where the women sold their beadwork "at the brink of Niagara Falls."

"As Rosemary has continued to sew and learn, she has developed her Tuscarora technique of beading. Often inspired by turn-of-the century works, her pieces include only natural, glass, crystal, and gemstone beads. She has been teaching for

about 12 years now, first doing workshops at home, then 8 years at the Niagara Historical Society and at the

Tuscarora Indian School. She is also doing classes at an art gallery she is associated with. She is credited with bringing people from as far away as Germany and Canada as well as all over the United

States."





At the recent House White Conference Washington DC, where hundreds of tribal leaders gathered to express

their concerns and needs with President Obama's top level staff, an Indian woman stood up and said, "Today, the life of every man, woman and child living in Indian Country is in danger because of the drugs!" She didn't mean the drugs and the negative physical consequences of drugs. She meant the gangs and the alarming growth of gang activity on Indian reservations. Oneida has hundreds of gang members of every sort. Word on the streets of Oneida, is that one of the native gangs wear their pony tails over to one side.

In closing, long ago when I was young, the issues were too much alcohol, and too much rock and roll. Today, our little children and grandchildren face a much more dangerous future. They face being recruited and intimidated by gang members, and they face being shot down in the streets of Oneida. We, as Oneidas and as parents and grandparents, must say to the gangs, stop the violence, stop the tagging of our community, or you will be required to leave.

Many have commented regarding this past December's GTC action to dissolve the Seven Corporation. Generations Some support the action, some don't. I do not support the action at this time; however, I am bound to by my Oath of Office, to work towards carrying out the GTC directive. I am also bound by my Oath to at all times, to act in the best interest of the Oneida Tribe. To completely dissolve Seven Generations, may carry with it, a substantial financial consequence. I do know that Seven Generations has debt (\$26.5 million). I also know that there are two or three agreements in buildings and properties that are not transferrable to another entity unless the non-Tribal entity agrees. All of these financial interests must be evaluated prior to pulling the trigger on to dissolve. It is for these reasons that I am calling for a meeting with you the mem-

bership acting as GTC to perreconsider your December action to dissolve. Below is my memorandum asking for a Special Meeting to address a very serious financial issue. Please read.

She served in the burn unit of the 36th Evacuation Hospital in Vung Tau and at Pleiku in the 71st Evacuation Hospital, 30 miles from the Cambodian border in the Central Highlands, just 10 to 20 minutes by helicopter from the field. Including her one year in Vietnam, Carlson Evans completed a total of 6 years in the Army Nurse Corps.

# **Topic:**Amendments to the Code of Ethics

The Code of Ethics (Code) Amendments update the Code throughout; adding, revising and deleting various ethical requirements. Changes include:

- A preamble and addendum are added to incorporate a traditional element.
- The Code no longer applies to program and enterprise employees, and only applies to current elected and appointed officials.
- The requirements regarding the acceptance of gifts are revised and expanded; specifically an Official cannot receive double compensation or reimbursement from two different sources for the same activity.
- A new hearing process is established for violations and lesser penalties are added instead of just offering removal or termination of appointment.
- A hearing process and penalties are established for those who file frivolous ethics complaints.
- Officials who are removed or terminated for a violation become ineligible to serve as an Official for ten (10) years after their removal or termination.

All community members are invited to attend this meeting to learn more about this proposal and/or to submit comments concerning this proposal.






