

Pulaski High School to offer Oneida language class

The Oneida language will soon be heard inside the schools of Pulaski Community School District.

The school received Language Revitalization Grant from the Wisconsin Department Instruction of over \$25,000 to create a course at Pulaski High School entitled Oneida I for high school credit beginning in the 2014-2015 school year.

This course will be open to Pulaski High School students in grades nine through An Oneida Language program will also be established for Pulaski Community Middle

School and Hillcrest learning from Elementary School.

The Oneida Language Department will have a support role in the class. The department was named as language consultants for the grant.

"We

been developing an Oneida Language Acquisition the American Indian Plan that was created by our main instructor, **Shalihokt** Danforth, for approximately three to four years. Some of our staff has been using this plan to teach various classes in the community also. Staff member, Lataklokwatha Danforth began working with Oneida students at Pulaski High School about two years ago," said Tracy Williams, Director of Language the Department. Wis. tribal leader promises 'positive' speech

MADISON, Wis. (AP) ~ Wisconsin legislators and tribal leaders are talking about collaboration and common ground going into this month's State of the Tribes address, but deep divides over iron mining, hunting rights and school mascots still lurk under the pleasant rhetoric.

The Lac Courte Oreilles chairman slammed Republican legislators and state officials in last year's speech, causing one lawmaker to walk out, and the stage could be set for more conflict when Menominee Nation Chairman Craig Corn delivers the address on Feb. 13. Corn has been lobbying Republican Gov. Scott Walker to approve his tribe's plans for an offreservation casino Kenosha despite two other tribes' opposition.

"I'm not sure I've ever seen the relationship between the state and the Indian nations here so tense," said Patty Loew, a Bad River Band of Lake Superior Chippewa member and a University of Wisconsin-Madison communications professor who specializes in American Indian culture.

Corn and Assembly Speaker Robin Vos, R-Burlington, issued a statement calling the speech an opportunity to highlight common interests and address problems - and

they have plenty of those.

The state's six Chippewa tribes are still angry over Republican legislation clearing the path for a possible iron mine they fear will pollute water and destroy wild rice beds near the Bad River's Ashland County reservation. The state's new wolf also has offended the Chippewa; the bands consider the animal a spiritual brother.

The tribes authorized their hunters to kill an elk a month before the first wolf hunt. Later in 2012, they approved night deer hunting for their members. The DNR has been struggling to reintroduce elk to the state for years and has long prohibited night deer hunt-

ing out of safety concerns. Gordon Thayer, then the Waukesha Republican, walked out. Things haven't gotten much better since.

The overall purpose of this project is to create functional and fluent speakers of the Oneida Language through these Oneida Language Courses in the Pulaski School District, in order to pass on the Oneida Language for many generations to come.

District Judge rules South Dakota Indian child welfare case can proceed

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) ~ A lawsuit from two tribes and three parents accusing South Dakota of routinely violating the federal law governing foster care and adoptions for American Indian children can proceed as a class-action case, a judge ruled.

U.S. District Judge Jeffrey Viken in Rapid City refused to dismiss the lawsuit and ruled that parts of it can proceed at an expedited pace and as class-action case, according to court documents filed Tuesday.

The Oglala Sioux and Rosebud Sioux tribes and Indian parents Rochelle Walking Eagle, Madonna Pappan and Lisa Young filed the lawsuit last year.

The case is part of an ongoing dispute about Native American children in foster care in South Dakota. It alleges the state is violating the Indian Child Welfare Act by holding improper hearings after children are removed from homes. It says the hearings are sometimes as short as 60 seconds and do not give parents the opportunity to introduce evidence showing their ability to care for the child or to question the state.

"We are thrilled that the court has recognized the importance of these issues to Indian parents and Indian tribes," said Heather Smith, executive director of the American Civil Liberties Union of South Dakota.

The lawsuit names South Dakota Social Services Secretary Kim Malsam-Rysdon employee LuAnn Van Hunnik, Pennington County State's Attorney Mark Vargo and 7th Judicial Circuit Court Presiding Judge Jeff Davis as defendants.

"It is an early stage in the proceedings and there has been no decision on the merits. We will prepare to file our answer and work with the parties to exchange discovery information," said South Dakota Attorney General Marty Jackley.

Federal law requires that Indian children removed from homes be placed with relatives or with other Native American families, except in unusual circumstances. Tribal officials contend South Dakota removes too many American Indian children from their homes and then puts them in foster care with non-Indian families.

Congress passed the Indian Child Welfare Act in 1978 because of the once high number of Indian children being removed from their homes by public and private agencies.

to strip public schools of American Indian mascots. Barbara Munson, an Oneida Indian who the Wisconsin Education Association's mascot task force, has called the measure racist.

Meanwhile, Chippewa have appealed a court order barring night deer hunting. And now the casino is in the mix.

Federal regulators have signed off on the Menominee's proposal but Walker has the final say on the plan. He has said he wants all of Wisconsin's tribes to approve the project before he green-lights it pitting the Menominee against the Ho-Chunk Nation and Forest County Potawatomi, who already run lucrative casinos and have refused to OK the Kenosha project. Walker

still hasn't made a final decision.

Corn said his request to the Great Lakes Inter-Tribal Council to give this year's speech wasn't timed to coincide with the casino push. The 11 tribes rotate speakers, and the Menominee wanted to speak last year but stepped aside for the Lac Courte Oreilles, he

Nonetheless, the casino issue will likely hang over the speech. Corn can't afford to alienate lawmakers, Walker or the Ho-Chunk and the Potawatomi and will have to tread lightly, Loew said.

Potawatomi George spokesman Ermert said the tribe doesn't have a problem with Corn giving the speech but expects him to focus on the big pic-

"(The speech is) meant

to talk about the pressing issues for all the tribes in Wisconsin," he said. "It's not meant to be what one specific tribe is dealing with. It's never been about what one specific tribe wants."

Corn said he will talk about the economic boost the casino would give his people and the state as well as broad tribal issues. A draft of his talk will be sent to the other tribes for feedback, he said.

"They're our fellow tribes and we try to help each other and try to pick each other up," Corn said. "That message won't change with this address or this casino. We're going to keep it positive."

Ho-Chunk President Jon Greendeer, Kramer and other key lawmakers did not return messages requesting comment.

Study: Kids' obesity risk starts before school age

Those efforts to fight obesity in schools? Think younger. A new study finds that much of a child's "weight fate" is set by age 5, and that nearly half of kids who became obese by the eighth grade were already overweight when they started kindergarten.

The prevalence of weight problems has long been known - about a third of U.S. kids are overweight or obese. But surprisingly little is known about which kids will develop obesity, and at what age.

Researchers think there may be a window of opportunity to prevent it, and "we keep pushing our critical window earlier and earlier on," said Solveig Cunningham, a scientist at Emory University. "A lot of the risk of obesity seems to be set, to some extent, really early in life."

She led the new study, which was published in this week's New England Journal of Medicine and paid for by the federal government.

It tracked a nationwide sample of more than 7,700 children through grade school. When they started kindergarten, 12 percent were obese and 15 percent were overweight. By eighth grade, 21 percent were obese and 17 percent were overweight.

Besides how common obesity was at various ages, researchers focused on the 6,807 children who were not obese when the study started, at kindergarten entry. Here are some things they found:

BECAME WHO **OBESE**: Between ages 5 and 14, nearly 12 percent of children developed obesity - 10 percent of girls and nearly 14 percent of boys.

Nearly half of kids who started kindergarten overweight became obese teens. Overweight 5-year-olds were four times as likely as normalweight children become obese (32 percent versus 8 percent).

GRADE LEVELS:

Most of the shift the The greatest lence of obesity was between first and third grades; it changed little from ages 11 to 14.

garten through eighth grade, the prevalence of obesity increased by 65 percent among whites, 50 percent among Hispanics, almost 120 percent among blacks and more than 40 percent among others - Asians, Pacific Islanders and Native Americans and mixed-race children.

By eighth grade, 17 had become obese, compared to 14 percent of other races.

INCOME: Obesity was least among children from the wealthiest families and most prevalent among kids in the next-to-lowest income category. The highest rate of children developing obesity during the study years was among middle-income families.

BIRTHWEIGHT: At all ages, obesity was more common among children who weighed a lot at birth - roughly 9 pounds or more. About 36 percent of kids who became obese during grade school had been

The study's findings do not mean that it's too late for schools to act, but their best tactic may be to focus on kids who are overweight and try to encourage exercise and healthy eating, Cunningham said.

The work also shows ne need for parents, doctors, preschools and even day care centers to be involved, said Dr. Daniels, Stephen University of Colorado and pediatrician spokesman for the American Heart Association.



On December 15, 2013, the General Tribal Council, which is the supreme governing body of the Oneida Tribe (henceforth "Tribe"), voted to dissolve the Oneida Seven Generations Corporation (7Gens), a corporation which is 100% Tribally owned. That GTC action has left our Tribal population divided on

many fronts. Many support the action-while many do not; many are asking why the corporation has not yet been dissolved; many are quite angry at me for calling for a reconsideration of the December 15th action, while many others are just wanting to know where we're at and where we're going regarding the dissolution action. With this Guest Editorial, I will comment regarding some of the above community concerns. But first, I will try to provide a short history of 7Generations as I myself try to understand how a once successful

Short History

Originally, 7Gens acted as a commercial leasing agency for the Tribe. Its primary role was to lease Tribal properties. It was quite successful in doing that and provided an annual return back to the Tribe in addition to paying local property taxes on properties that were not yet in

bership voted to dissolve it.

role and made them a corporation that would seek out business opportunities. That action led to 7Gens investing in a tissue company (Nature's Way) which failed costing 7Gens and the Tribe in excess of 4 million dollars. The next business venture was the waste to energy project. On that project, the General Tribal Council in 2011, scolded Business membersCommittee Secretary Patty Hoeft and myself as Councilman, for asking questions regarding the waste to energy project. (Hoeft's motion requesting due diligence on the project was voted down by the General Tribal Council). So the project went forward until 2013 when the General Tribal Council, first in May, prohibited the waste to energy project from being placed anywithin where the Reservation boundaries and, finally, as stated, the December 15 action to dissolve 7Gens.

December 15, 2013 On that Sunday evening after the December 15th GTC, I began receiving calls to secure the 7Gens building and all its documents. It was then that I began to really worry. Surely, the GTC did not expect that the 7Gens would immediately be dissolved, not with tens of millions of dollars at stake

Not with the that time, expanded 7 Gens debt of 7Gens being almost \$27 million dollars and not knowing what the Tribe's financial responsibilities would be if the corporation was immediately dissolved. Yet, I received those calls from Tribal members to immediately dissolve. When Business Committee met with petitioner Frank Cornelius on either the Monday or Tuesday morning after the GTC meeting, the petitioner was adamant that 7Gens be immediately closed. The Business Committee could not immediately close (dissolve) with so many unanswered financial consequences pending. Such action, I believe would be financially irresponsible. Accordingly, as Tribal Chairman, I called for a meeting to reconsider the December 15th action, thus giving the Business Committee time to find out how 7Gens could be dissolved in a fiscally responsible manner, or if dissolving could not be done without harming the Tribe financially, to ask GTC to reconsider or modify its December 15th decision.

Developments Since December 15th GTC Action

Since the December 15th GTC action:

- (1) The 7Gens CEO and CFO have resigned for personal reasons,
- (2) The 7Gens Board has been dissolved by

- resolution, Board recent had appointments started to make some good decisions, but unfortunately, proba-

The responsibilities of the Agent is to operate 7Gens in place of the former Board until further notice, and to speak to the 7Gens partners and creditors regarding the consequences when and if dissolving 7Gens takes place. - (4) An attorney group, Whyte, Hirschboek, Dudek, SC) has been hired they would carry out the legal aspects as we move forward to find out the consequences of dissolving 7Gens.

In a short time, after the newly appointed 7Gens Agent has met with 7Gens partners and creditors, and after the newly hired attorney group has had a chance to evaluate the legal consequences of dissolving 7Gens, the Oneida Business Committee will sit down with the Agent and the attorney group to come up with a resolve. The General Tribal Council has played a role in getting to this point where we are divided, as has the 7Gens Board of Directors, and the Oneida Business Committee. But I believe that we all want the same thing. We all want to do what is best for the Tribe and our people and our future generations. And I believe we, all of us, will make the sound financial decisions to do just that. Thank you.

Five Steps to take if Your Identity is Stolen

In 2012, 12.6 million consumers filed complaints with the Federal Commission (FTC) regarding identity theft, and that number is likely to be even higher when data for 2013 becomes available. While prevention is the best solution, you need to know what to do if you become a victim of identity theft. Here are five steps to take immediately if you think your identity has been stolen:

Step 1: Freeze Your Credit Report

Request a copy of your credit report from each of the three agencies (Experian, Equifax and TransUnion). If you are viewing the report online, the simplest way to initiate a dispute is to click on the fraudulent item. The agency website will walk you through what steps to take in order to place a security freeze on your report. The freeze ensures that no one will be able to obtain new credit using your identity, protecting you from further fraud.

Step 2: Contact Your Bank

Contact your bank to



let them know you've become a victim of fraud. If you think your credit card was stolen as well, and the bank is not the card issuer, contact the issuer in addition to your bank. This step is easier if you have prepared and made a list of institutions to contact and their phone numbers. Don't include account numbers on this list, as that would be one more way for a thief to steal your identity. Do keep a list of what's in your wallet, so if it's stolen you know exactly who to contact.

Step 3: Contact the FTC

File an Identity Theft Affidavit and create an Identity Theft Report with the FTC. You can file this report online at http://www.consumer.ftc .gov/articles/0277-create-identity-theft-report or by calling 877-438-4338. The FTC will provide you with information on what to do next, depending on what specific type of fraud occurred.

Step 4: File a Police Report

In order to complete the report in Step 3, you'll need to contact your local police office and report the theft. Obtain a copy of the police report or the report number for future reference. The completed FTC Identity Theft Report will help you when you work with the credit reporting agencies other companies where the thief has used your identity to open accounts.

Step 5: Protect Your Social Security Number

If you suspect your social security number may have been compromised, contact the Social Security Administration (800-269-0271) and the (800-829-0433). This step is important if you think your SSN has been stolen, even if you haven't seen any fraudulent activity yet. The thief may be planning to wait until April and then steal your tax refund, or may seek employment under your name.

Take these steps as soon as possible after you suspect your identity has been stolen and the clean-up afterward will be simpler.

Seminole Tribe of Florida

Native Learning Center is Awarded Training and Technical Assistance Funding from HUD

Hollywood, FL – The Native Learning Center (NLC), a Seminole Tribe of Florida program dedicated to the development of cultural and quality of life skills for all Native and Indigenous people, is pleased to be named the only Tribe authorized to receive a \$700,000 Cooperative Agreement award from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to provide training and technical assistance to Tribes and Tribal housing authorities.

The NLC will work directly with federally recognized Indian Tribes that receive HUD's Indian Housing Block Grant (IHBG) to provide training and technical assistance related to their affordable housing plans. For example, funds may be used to conduct educational conferences for multiple Tribes on specific topics such as energy-efficient/sustainable construction, or to provide on-site, one-on-one consultation to Tribes to resolve challenges that prevent them from creating sustainable, affordable housing for their members.

"We are very grateful for this funding from HUD and the positive impact it will have on Tribes that receive HUD's IHBG funding. We believe that providing training and technical assistance for Tribes will yield results that will help strengthen our communities in Indian Country." - Georgette Palmer Smith, (Kiowa Tribe Oklahoma/Choctaw

Nation of Oklahoma) Executive Director of the Native Learning Center. The NLC is one of five

organizations awarded training and technical assistance funding that total \$4.5 million dollars. The four other recipients Association of Alaskan Housing Authorities, Community Assistance Corporations, Nations Development Institute, and FirstPic,

HUD will administer and coordinate the delivery of training and technical assistance services with the awardees; however, the details on how Tribes can access the services have not yet been disclosed.

In 2013, NLC completed 5 on-site technical assistance visits Tribes. The NLC also hosted 3 conferences and 29 interactive webinar trainings that totaled 90 sessions on topics unique to Tribal housing and strengthening Tribal communities. Over 950 Tribal professionals and 69 Tribes were served Indian throughout Country.

The NLC continues to offer training and technical services within its five focus areas (Housing Strategies, Financial Wellness, Tribal Government, Grant Education, Celebrating Culture & Language) under its current IHBG grant through HUD's Office of Native American Programs.

The Oneida Community Health Center's Diabetic team received federal grant money to help individuals manage their diabetes. The epidemic of Type 2 diabetes in Tribal communities is associated with decreasing levels of physical activity and an increasing prevalence of obesity. Promoting physical activity is a crucial component of the management of type 2 diabetes. The Oneida Community Health Center (OCHC) Diabetes Team partnered with Oneida Adventures to offer patients with diabetes an opportunity to make snow shoes. The Diabetic Team work with individuals to evaluate their health and goals then refer them to our grant funded snowshoe tying course. Kip Miller from the Oneida Adventure program, along with help from Yvette Peguero provided the instruction on how to tie the snowshoes. The collaboration was an effort to increase physical activity, which is one of the goals of the OCHC Diabetes Team. Any physical activity can have a positive effect on self concept, body composition, heart health, flexibility, and strength. More importantly, physical activity can have a direct impact on improving blood sugar control.

The Oneida Adventure program strives to provide programs that help people use adventure based activities as a way to learn about themselves in a fun and challenging way. When participants learn the art of snowshoe tying, they quickly realize the importance of following a well-prescribed plan by correctly tying the patterns. Even though missing a step may have little impact on the structural/safety of the shoe, it does affect the lacing strength and durability. Experientially this can teach participants about the importance of following a well-prescribed plan to manage their diabetes. The staff help participants apply concepts such as these to their goals in prevention.

Oneida Tribe Purchases Future SEOTS Building

SEOTS will not move into the new building immediately. The current schedule and budget will allow for a complete renovation of the interior, to accommodate community services, programs, and activities. When the transition date to the new building is determined, advanced notice will be provided to the commu-

In 1992, SEOTS was established as an offreservation office in the Milwaukee-area to provide services to all Oneida tribal members in the six counties of southeastern Wisconsin. The mission of SEOTS is: Strengthening our cultural connection and providing services and programs to enhance the well-being of On^yote?asoutheastern in Wisconsin. Twenty years of resourceful and innovative collaboration have allowed SEOTS to proother tribal members and their descendants as well.

SEOTS offers many services and programs, including youth and elder activities, medication distribution, cultural education, Oneida language classes, referral services and much more. The population of Oneida Tribal members residing in southeast Wisconsin currently stand at 2,025. During fiscal year 2012, SEOTS total client interactions was about 11,500. A client interaction includes office visits as well as phone calls received.

2004, In Oneida General Tribal Council directed the Oneida Business Committee to provide assistance to SEOTS to locate long term facilities for the **SEOTS** program, whether rental or purchase.

2010, In Oneida General Tribal Council approved a \$38 million bond package that included \$2 million for the purchase of longterm facility for SEOTS. In 2013, Oneida General Tribal Council again confirmed their support for chase.

As with all lease or rent payments, there is no way to recoup those expenses.

Financial Literacy Can Make a Difference

What is a culture? A culture consists of many things including heritage, beliefs, language, values organization. Understanding culture can give clues to your financial success. It is common to carry the values and beliefs of past generations forward into the new generations. Think back to your childhood. Did your parent talk about money? Did you know where it came from and did you have opportunities to earn and manage money on your

Native people have always managed their resources whether it was catching the salmon, harvesting corn, or herding sheep. Families and tribes used basic skills of planning and budgeting resources to meet their own needs and to trade for resources they were not able to produce on their own. As tribes lost their homes, lands and ways to European settlers, they also lost their wealth and ability to be self-sufficient as they had in the past. Those resources were no longer available

to the Indigenous People and poverty became the new culture.

Some people may remember their parents or grandparents stashing money away because they did not trust banks and the American government. Money was scarce and often not enough to make ends meet. They may have had to borrow more or live in harsh conditions that took a toll on their health and ability to earn, spiraling even deeper. These behaviors ingrained themselves into Native people across America over several generations resulting in high levels of financial illiteracy and

While there have been some improvements in opportunities for Native Americans, in order to achieve financial security the beliefs and behaviors surrounding money must also change. This can be challenging but it can also be very rewarding. Learning the skills to build wealth can vastly enhance your life and lifestyle. In addition to being able to purchase more things, people gain personal satisfaction with the ability to care for their families and future generations. These bene-

Public school Open Enrollment application period begins Feb. 3

Wisconsin's public school open enrollment application period runs from Feb. 3 to April 30 for the 2014-15 school year, allowing parents an opportunity to send their children to any public school district in the

Traditionally, children Wisconsin assigned to public school districts based on the location of their parents' home. The open enrollment application period is the only tuition-free opportunity for most parents to apply for their children to attend a public school in a school district other than the one in which they live.

"Wisconsin is among a number of states nationwide that offer public school open enrollment across school districts. The state's long-running program supports parental involvement and shared responsibility for educating children," said Superintendent State Tony Evers.

The state's open enrollment program is an interdistrict choice program that began in the 1998-99 school year. During the first years of the program, the application window was three weeks. With legislation adopted for the 2012-13 school year, the application window expanded to three months. According to the **Education Commission** of the States, Wisconsin is among 21 states with inter-district open enrollment.

Under the full-time public school open enrollment program, parents must apply during the three-month application period to the school district they wish their children to attend. Online application is encouraged. Application deadlines are firm. Early and late applications are not accepted. Districts will notify parents by June 6 whether their enrollment applications have been approved or denied.

Under the current open enrollment law, transportation, in most circumstances, is responsibility of the parent. However, some school districts may provide partial transportation. Parents with questions should call the nonresident school district office to find out if any transportation will be provided. Reimbursement of a portion of transportation costs is available for families whose children are eligible for free or reduced-price meals based on federal

income guidelines. The Department of Public Instruction provides the following guidance for parents who wish to apply for open enrollment.

· Parents are urged to

- apply online directly from the open enrollwebsite http://sms.dpi.wi.gov/ sms_psctoc. The online application will be available from midnight Feb. 3 until 4 p.m. on April 30.
- Paper applications can be obtained from the DPI or any public school district. Paper application forms must be received by the nonresident school district no earlier than Feb. 3 and no later than 4 p.m. on April 30. A postmark for paper forms will not meet the requirement.
- Parents may submit applications to up to three nonresident school districts for each

- child during the open enrollment application period.
- · Forms must be filled out completely and accurately. Contact the local school district office or the DPI if assistance is needed in completing the applica-
- · Parents may request enrollment in a specific school or program in the nonresident school district: however, enrollment in the requested school or program is subject to space and other limitations and is not guaranteed.
- Most students who attended a nonresident school district under open enrollment last year are not required to reapply for the 2014-15 school year. However, if the student will be entering middle school, junior high school, or high school in the 2014-15 school year, parents should call the nonresident school district to find out if reapplication will be
- · Parents may apply for their children to attend 4-year-old kindergarten under open enrollment only if the resident school district also offers a 4-year-old kindergarten program for which the child is eligible.

Changes made to Community Support Fund

This fund was amendthrough OBC Resolution #12-11-13-D and will go into effect March, 2014. Funds for this program are based on the Tribe's economic

Requests for assistance from the Community Support Services Fund must be the result of a catastrophic event, illness or injury.

The main changes include elimination of Stabilization Assistance (examples include shelter, auto repair, appliance repair/replacement, D.O.C. re-entry assistance, legal fees, home renovations to accommodate handicap access, student assistance, basic eyewear/dental needs, or basic home medical equipment).

Other changes include:

Eligibility Criteria:

- Services are available only for enrolled members of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin.
- Services will cover catastrophic events, illness, or injuries only.
- Services will assist with an emergency situation that poses an immediate risk to health, life or
- Requests for assistance must be made within thirty (30) business days from the catastrophic event, illness or injury.
- Applicants must satisfactorily provide the program with required documentation and/or before verification funds can be released.
- Application for assistance shall be made within a reasonable time period, not to

exceed thirty (30) business days of a catastrophic event or illness or injury. Applications made after thirty (30) business days of the event will not be considered.

Priorities for Assistance:

- Severity of event, illness or injury
- Life-threatening emergency requests
- Emergency medical travel

Cost-Sharing:

One of the other changes for the fund is the applicant will be required to pay a portion (cost-share) unless the person falls below the Federal Poverty Level The Federal limit. Poverty Level limit is used by Economic Support Services (Center for Self-Sufficiency) and determined by Federal government.

The Amendment to the Community Support Services Fund requires Economic Support Services (Center for Self-Sufficiency) to set caps on the amount of assistance each person or household may receive, per event.

Comprehensive Health Division's Perspective on Insurance coverage

Should I pay for health insurance when I have the Health Center and Contract Health or should the government pay for this?

Many people have voiced their concerns about the need for health insurance since Affordable Care Act was passed. As a Native American, you may ask, "why should I pay for health insurance or my medical care because this is a Federal Trust Responsibility right? I don't need to pay for insurance because I use the clinic or I have Contract Health Services." With the Affordable Care Act, community members have asked these questions and many more. The Affordable Care Act is confusing and with the Health Exchange or Health Insurance Marketplaces website having issues even more questions have been raised.

From Comprehensive Health Division's perspective, we would like to encourage all of our community members who do not have insurance and are not covered by Medicare

or Medical Assistance (Medicaid) and who utilize our services to explore the Health Exchanges to determine if you might be eligible. The main reason we would like to encourage people to purchase insurance if they do not have any type of coverage is because the Health Division is dependent upon the funding we receive from the Indian Health Service for the provision of services and for our Contract Health Services Program. The Indian Health Service is only funded by the Federal Government at about half the level of need to provide Health care services to Tribes across the country. The Comprehensive Health Division is only funded at about 46% of the level of need that we have to pay for the services that we currently provide. The remaining 54% of our funds are made up through a combination of Tribal Contribution and our third party insurance coverage. The third party insurance coverage includes Medicare, Medical Assistance (Medicaid) and private

insurance. An excellent example of why insurance coverage is so important is happened patients of the Health Division during the recent Government Shutdown in October, Shutdown occurred, the Indian Health Service funds were not received the Oneida Community Health Center. This meant that we were only operating on the third party insurance money that we received through our billing processes. As a result, our services were impacted and Contract Health was only able to cover emergency services. If you had private insurance coverage, this would have paid for services Contract Health could not cover.

Contract Health Services operates on a limited amount of money so there is a Priority list that must be followed when the money is limited. If you have insurance, you can get the health care services you need even if Contract Health has no money or your service cannot be covered by Contract Health. Health Insurance can normally pay for things that your Contract Health Service program does not provide or cover.

So, what about the Federal Responsibility? Why shouldn't the Federal Government pay for all of your health care? In some ways the Federal Government has incorporated special provisions into the Affordable Care Act that are only afforded to Native people. The Federal Government pays for your health care through many programs in addition to the Indian Health Service. In the Insurance Exchanges or the Marketplaces the Federal Government is paying a portion of the cost of your insurance through subsidies based upon your plan selection and your income levels. The special provisions for Native people state that Native Americans and Alaska Natives do not have to pay co-pays or deductibles if you are enrolled in the Insurance plans as well as allowing Native Americans and Alaska Natives to reenroll on a monthly basis if you wish to change your plan. If you continue to receive services through the Oneida Health Center or any other IHS/Tribal facility you do not have to have the insurance coverage, but Tribes are encouraging their membership to purchase insurance if possible because it helps to extend the provision of services to the entire

organization. The more reimbursements received from the insurance companies, the less Tribal Contribution needed by the health division. The more individuals with private insurance, the more services that we can provide to the community!

In children, obesity and overweight are defined by how a child ranks on growth charts that compare them to other kids the same age and gender. Kids at or above the 85th percentile are considered overweight, and obese at the 95th percentile or above.

No child should be placed on a diet without a doctor's advice, the federal Centers for

Disease Control and Prevention advises. To help keep kids healthy, balance the calories a child gets from food and beverages with how much exercise he or she gets to allow enough for normal growth - some weight gain is normal, the CDC says.

"You can change your fate by things that you do early in life," with more exercise and eating a healthy diet, Daniels said. "Once it occurs, obesity is really hard to treat. So the idea is we should really work hard to prevent it."

Wis. high school won't bring back Indian mascot

MUKWONAGO, Wis. (AP) ~ Walk inside the Wisconsin high school that was the focus of a Native American mascots and you'd be hard-pressed to find a single image of the school's Indian logo or mention of its nickname.

A law passed last month gave Mukwonago High School the right to restore its logo on the gym floor and its nickname on athletic uniforms. But district officials have no immediate plans to switch back after changing most time and money on the logos during the threeyear fight.

School districts could object to Wisconsin's 2010 law requiring the state's Department of Public Instruction to hold hearings on race-based nicknames if the agency received even a single complaint. But most schools had already given up their Native American mascots by the time the law was changed last month, and officials said they had spent too much

change to backpedal now.


Mukwonago administrators said many students southeastern Wisconsin school district seem satisfied with the new "fast M" logo - a blue M with a yellow outline and serifs that suggest motion - and there's little to be gained from reopening old wounds right now.

"You'd have no trouble finding people who are still upset about that initial complaint," said Shawn McNulty, the dis-

superintendent. "But right now our aim is just to sit down with the Potawatomi and try to find a permanent solution."

Mukwonago translates to "place of the bear" in the Potawatomi language.

McNulty said much of Mukwonago's fight was for principle's sake. The law required schools to prove their names weren't racist, something he believes made the process inherently unfair.

State wants to add 192 waterways to polluted list MILWAUKEE (AP) ~ The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is proposing adding 192 waterways to a list of those that don't meet water quality standards. The Milwaukee Journal Sentinel reported most of the new additions have excessive levels of phospho-

rus, which spurs weed and algae growth. State officials list impaired lakes, rivers and streams every two years as part of the federal Clean Water Act, which requires states to prioritize problem waterways and create plans to get them into compliance.

There are already more than 700 waters listed as impaired in Wisconsin, including many sections of the Milwaukee, Menomonee and Kinnickinnic rivers. DNR officials say about 75 percent of the waters it monitors have shown trends of improving over the

Still, it can be hard for a polluted river to improve enough to get removed from the list. This year, the proposed list includes 17 waters the DNR wants removed, including the KK Road Beach on Lake Michigan in Sheboygan County for E. coli and three Madison beaches, including in James Madison Park on Lake Mendota, also for bacteria pollution.

Seven bodies of water, including most of the Gile Flowage in Iron County, were removed because of declining levels of mercury.

The list now goes to the public for input, and it must be reviewed by the Environmental Protection Agency. Two years ago, the EPA told the DNR to add more than 100 waters after concluding the state wasn't following its own standards.

Propane crisis continues on Dakotas reservation

BISMARCK, (AP) ~ The federal government has released more money for a program that helps lowincome people around the country heat their homes, but the leader of an American Indian reservation in the Dakotas said it might not be enough to deal with a local propane crisis.

About 5,000 homes on the Standing Rock Sioux Reservation that straddles the North Dakota-South Dakota border rely

more than doubled in price because of a nationwide shortage exacerbated by recent cold weather. Many reservation families are on fixed incomes and can't afford to pay more for the gas, putting them in danger of running out, according to Tribal Chairman Dave Archambault II.

"The high cost only allows you to go on an amount of fuel for two to three weeks when normally it would take you through a month, a month and a half," he

Tribal officials have

declared an emergency. They are looking internally to find more money for propane and also are asking for aid from the federal government.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services on Thursday released another \$439 million nationwide for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program, better known as LIHEAP. North Dakota is getting \$3.4 million in the latest allocation and South Dakota \$2.8 million. Of that amount, \$1.3 million is earmarked for tribes in the two states.

Archambault Friday that he did not immediately know how much the Standing Rock tribe was to get from the tribal allocation. He said the money will be welcome but likely won't be enough to bring Standing Rock's program up to normal funding. The tribe's LIHEAP program has only \$1.5 million available this winter, down from \$2.5 million last winter because of federal budget cuts.

"We're asking the federal government just to get us back up to our norfunding," Archambault said. "This

will help, but it's not enough."

The tribe has set up shelters in two communities - one on each side of the border - that are getting help from the American Red Cross. They have not yet been widely Archambault said, but he fears what could happen

"It doesn't help when there are Arctic blasts coming through, requiring furnaces to run nonstop," he said.


The first quarter of fiscal year 2014 received three very important residential leases back from the BIA. Although, every lease is very important, these leases were met

Using Due Diligence **Practices**

Frustration often times can lead to anger when the source of that frustration goes unaddressed for too long. Anger can lead to other hurtful actions or words which do not result in positive or desirable outcomes, only more negativity which perpetuates the cycle. Recognizing the slippery slope individuals are attempting to bait me into, I am choosing to address the source of frustration, nipping it in the bud before the situation in its totality gets worse.

The Chairman's "Elder Advisor" Yvonne Metivier, who has access internal Business Committee (BC) information and is also the editor for the unsanctioned O4O Times paper, has publicly accused me of interfering in day to day business. Conducting due diligence is an essential component of making sure each complaint or concern brought before the BC and/or the Legislative Operating Committee (LOC) is addressed appropriately.

Recent antics displayed by the Chairman's Elder

Advisor in an effort to discredit the work I do for the nation has grown tiresome and I am standing up for myself. To set record straight from a recent article in the 040 safety

complaint was provided to me regarding the feeding of feral animals at the Oneida Civic Center in Site I. feeding of these feral animals led to the attraction of other wild animals and resulted in them coming too close to the facility close enough for the staff or children to be deemed to be put at risk to be bitten. The complaint also included pictures of cat feces on the floor of the Civic Center and also state that the heating of cat food was occurring in the same microwave the employees of the facility used to heat their food. The LOC and I, received the information by way of a request to amend the Domestic Animal Law. The information on this complaint was gathered, researched and provided to the LOC by our staff. The LOC acknowledged the request and ultimately referred the request to the appropriate Division Director for follow up. As the Chairperson of the LOC, it was my duty and

up and get this complaint to the necessary parties to rectify the issues, and as such I did.

While this a very b r o a d overview of the process used address matter, it is important to

note no LOC member, including myself, interfered with the Division Director's ability to address the complaint, in fact, we did just the opposite, we empowered the Division Director to make the necessary decisions to address the issue.

Moving Forward

I recognize each of us

have faults and make mistakes; however, most of us take those mistakes and learn from them so not to make them again.

For us to move forward as a Nation we must come together in a way which places our intent for the betterment of the people and the entire community on the table and we need to protect our fire. We need to protect our fire from the outside as well as from within, and I can no longer stand by while an individual, with no clear intent to create solutions, wreaks havoc on those who have dedicated their lives or careers to building our Nation.

I grew up in this community; I have chosen to make my home here and to raise my family here as many others have done. I

have worked hard to build a strong fire for myself, my family and for my community and I will not let any person with ill intent continuously attempt to extinguish it unchecked.

I believe in us, and our vision, a nation of strong families built on tsi? niyukwaliho¹tλ, and I am calling on all Oneida's to believe the same. I am taking that first step to protect our fire, and I will no longer stand by and accept published lies with no useful purpose other than to defame our own people. If we truly want accountability then we need to start with ourselves and not let Oneida's treat Oneida's with distain. I expect more from us and so should we all.



The Bar Coded Strip replaces the green and purple Gas **Exemption** stickers.

- If you have a green or purple sticker, please know when your sticker expires you will not be eligible for the gas tax exemption until you get the Bar Coded Tribal ID.
- You may TRADE IN an "old" Tribal Picture ID for the Bar Coded Tribal ID.
- Sorry, we do NOT accept trade-ins of non-picture certification cards, the green colored certification papers or old gas tax cards.
- Tribal members DO NOT need to pay for the Bar Coded Tribal ID as long as they trade in an acceptable Tribal Picture ID. (If no trade-in the applicable fee will apply)
- Tribal members will have until approximately September 30,

- 2014 to "Trade In" an old Tribal Picture ID for the Bar Coded Tribal ID.
- Tribal members who are under age 16 may trade-in their Tribal Picture ID for the Bar Coded Tribal ID; however, they are not eligible to receive the gas tax exemption until they turn 16.
- The type of gas tax exemption (on or off reservation) is based on the address you have on file at the Enrollment Department. It is important all members keep their address information up-to-date.
- Members are allowed one "trade-in".
- Tribal members still need to complete a Gas Tax Application prior to their birthday each year to maintain their gas tax exemption. If they do not re-apply they will not receive the gas tax exemption.
- At the Oneida One Stop, Tribal members still need to:
 - Present their Bar Coded Tribal ID to the cashier to be scanned for gas tax



The Code of Ethics (Code) Amendments update the Code throughout; adding, revising and deleting various ethical requirements. Changes include:

- A preamble and addendum are added to incorporate a traditional
- The Code no longer applies to program and enterprise employees, and only applies to current elected and appointed officials.
 - The requirements regarding the acceptance of gifts are revised and expanded; specifically an Official cannot receive double compensation or reimbursement from two different sources for the same activity.
- A new hearing process is established for violations and lesser penalties are added instead of just offering removal or termination of appointment.
- A hearing process and penalties are established for those who file frivolous ethics complaints.
- Officials who are removed or terminated for a violation become ineligible to serve as an Official for ten (10) years after their removal or termination.

152, Sec. 1.12.2, recently enacted by the General Tribal Council as part of the judiciary transition states: "A Judge shall not initiate, permit, condone or consider ex parte communications with parties, counsel or interested persons, or other communications made to the Judges outside the presence of the parties and their lawyers, concerning a pending or impending matter..." The rule then

lists several exceptions, none of which apply here.

It is an important rule because it would not be fair to any litigant for a judge to discuss or learn information about the case that the litigant did not know.

One of the values of the Court process is transparency. This means that every bit of information received by the judge is available to both sides; and both sides have a

This is part of due process. Communication outside of Court could lead a judge to make a decision based on something other than the facts before the court and the law applicable to the case. In addition, even if the judge was not influenced, it creates a perception of improper outside influence.

chance to comment on it.

When judges are perceived as deciding cases on something other than the merits, the public might lose confidence in the process.

Our judges know these rules and know to follow them. Membership can help by not approaching a judge to discuss a pending case.

This case involves an Ethics Complaint Pursuant to Article III of Oneida Tribal Judicial System Rules of Discipline, filed against Judicial Officer Linda Dallas.

Judicial Officer Dallas

was convicted on August, 23, 2010 of operating a motor vehicle with prohibited blood alcohol content in violation of Wis. Stat. 346.63(1)(b). The offense took place on November 18, 2009 during Ms. Dallas' current term as a Judicial Officer. Ms. Dallas was fined \$691.50. The matter is listed as Outagamie County v. Linda Dallas, Case No. 2009 TR

By violating the laws of another jurisdiction Ms. Dallas has engaged in misconduct and therefore is subject to discipline under the Oneida Tribal Judicial System Rules of Discipline. Our Judicial Code of Conduct has been violated in Article III 3-2 and Article V 5-1.

II. Issues

Is Honorable Linda Dallas in violation of the stated Oneida Tribal Judicial System Article HI 3-2 and Article V 5-1.

Honorable Should Linda Dallas be considered in default for nonappearance at a hearing scheduled for June 1, 2011.

III. Analysis

Linda Honorable Dallas was convicted as within charged Complaint 10-Ethics-003 by another Jurisdiction, therefore is subject to the Oneida Judicial Code of Conduct and other Oneida Tribal Laws, rules or regulations. The authority vested within

Background

On February 23, 2011 Petitioner, Winnifred L. Thomas, filed two ethics complaints alleging a violation of Article III 3-2 of the Judicial Code of Conduct.

The ethics complaints against Respondent were for: 1) Truancy Charges

2) Attending an outof-state Training/ Conference on February 14-15, 2011 and February 17-18, 2011.

This case came before Oneida Judicial System, Investigative Panel, Judicial Officer Jean M. Webster, Pro-Tempore Judicial Officer

Linda Cornelius presiding. A decision was issued on August 9, 2011, by the Investigative Panel concluding a violation of Article IV, 4-1 of the Judicial Code of Conduct regarding the ethical Truancy charges filed against Respondent, be forwarded to a Hearing Panel. The Investigative

Panel issued a decision on August 9, 2011 which concluded there was a violation of Comprehensive Training Plan, Section IV, 4-2 and the Oneida Travel and Expense Policy, Article IV, 4-2 and Article XVI, 16-1, regarding Respondents travel to San Diego, CA on February 13-19, 2011, and that this violation be forwarded to a Hearing Panel.

The Hearing Panel convened November 4, 2011 to review a motion filed by the Respondent to delay and reschedule the Hearing with a suggested date to be some time in December.

The motion for delay and rescheduling was granted and a Hearing date set for December 2, 2011 at 9:00 AM. A timely notice was sent to each party.

On December 2, 2011, the Hearing Panel convened at 9:15AM, 15 minutes after the schedtime. The Respondent failed to appear for the Hearing and did not have a representative. The Petitioner submitted documentation for the record and summarized the findings of the Investigative Panel.

A default judgment based on Respondent's failure to appear is issued. The Court record reflects all parties were mailed the summons to appear in Court. Based on the Respondent's non- · compliance, the Court granted the default judgment in accordance with Rules of Civil Procedure, Rule 16(B): "the Court may grant a default judgment when the Respondent fails to appear."

DECISION

The Court issues a default judgment to suspend the Respondent for One (1) Year (the maximum allowed under the

Rules of Discipline, VII,7-2,b) from carrying out any duties and/Qr responsibilities related to her status as a Judicial Officer for the Oneida Tribal Judicial System. The One (1) Year is to be implemented beginning on the date the Respondent is engaged to carry out the duties and/or responsibilities as a Judicial Officer of the Appeals Oneida

Commission. Further, the Court strongly the urges Oneida Appeals Commission to complete updating the Rules of Discipline and the Comprehensive Training Policy to better address the issues that came before this Hearing.

Appeal procedures in accordance with the Oneida Administrative Procedures Act (APA), person 1.11-1; any aggrieved by either a final decision in a contested case or by the promulgation of a rule or regulation of a rule under the act, is entitled to appellate review. The appeal must be filed within thirty (30) business days of the entry of the final decision, order or judgment. A notice of appeal must be sent to all parties within (10) business days. Please see the

entire rule for details. Appeals procedure in accordance with Appellate Rules of Procedure, Rule 2; a

party has ten (10) business days from the date of receipt ofthe final decision.

Initial Review

Rule 9(D) – Criteria for Acceptance:

The Initial Review Body shall accept an appeal for appellate review if one or more of the following elements are sufficiently alleged to exist in the original hearing body decision by the Appellant in the Notice of Appeal:

- (1) A violation of constitutional provisions;
- (2) The decision is outside the scope of the authority or otherwise unlawful;(3) The decision is clearly
- erroneous and is against the weight of the evidence presented at the hearing level; (4) The decision is arbi-

- procedural irregularity which would be considered a harmful error that may have contributed to the final decision, which if the error had not occurred, would have altered the final decision;

 (6) There is a presentation
- or introduction of new evidence that was not available at the hearing level which, if available, may have altered the final decision.

To conserve time and space provided, the Oneida Tribal Judicial System will only put into print the Initial Review Decisions which have been denied. The cases that have been accepted at Initial Review will be published when the final adjudication has been entered.

Denied Initial Review Decisions Looney and Lizzie

Mouse. Docket No. 13-AC-009, November 19, 2013. Judicial Officers Janice L. McLester, Lois Powless, Jenny Webster, Stanley R. Webster and James Van Stippen (Pro Tem) presiding. This was an appeal of Oneida Land Commission decision of May 13, 2013 on a Motion Reconsideration of their original foreclosure decision of February 11, 2013. This decision denied Appellant's Motion for Reconsideration. Mr. & Mrs. Mouse alleged the May 13, 2013 decision contained procedural irregularities in that the Land Commission erroneously based their decision on new information that was not included in the original foreclosure prior to the reconsideration hearing. Mr. & Mrs. Mouse entered into a mortgage and purchased the home in 2003. Between June 2012 and January 2013 there were numerous violations of the mortgage and residen-

tial lease. This consisted

tain and care for the home, habitual police calls involving drug activities and other multiple complaints, all in violation of their Residential Lease, Oneida Zoning and Shoreland Protection Law. On February 11, 2013 the Land Commission heard argument and granted judgment to Respondent of Foreclosure and Lease Cancellation giving the Mouses until August 11, 2013 to vacate the premises. The Mouses appealed to the Land Commission for a reconsideration, which was granted. The Land Commission decided the reconsideration request failed to meet the standard of review for "new evidence that was not available at the original hearing level." The Mouses then appealed to the Oneida Tribal Judicial System (OTJS) and at the same time requested a stay of enforcement which was granted. The Mouse's asserted multiple procedural irregularities within the Land Commission's decision to foreclose. The OTJS after appellate review found the Mouse's failed to persuade the body by supplying evidence that the Land Commission decision was flawed in relation to the Motion for Reconsideration. Decision affirmed and Stay lifted.

Tonya Boucher vs. Michelle Mays, Oneida Law Office. Docket No. 13-AC-015, December 10. 2013. Judicial Officers Winnifred L. Thomas, Janice L. McLester and Lois Powless presiding. This case was an Interlocutory Appeal of the Oneida Personnel Commission (OPC) decision dated November 12. 2013 which denied Boucher's subpoena request for witnesses requested on the grounds that witnesses did not provide written refusal or that there lacked specific relevance to their attendance. The request for subpoenaed witnesses was granted due to the OPC's Hearing document Information that states the criteria one must follow in order to Subpoena must show the relevance of each witness. The Appellate Court stated "how can the Oneida Personnel Commission determine if evidence is relevant until the evidence is presented?"

Trial Court Decisions

Heather M. Smith vs **Oneida** Housing Authority. Docket No. 13-TC-128, October 1, 2013. Judicial Officers Jean Webster, Mary Adams and Winnifred L. Thomas presiding. On September 26, 2013, Petitioner, Heather Smith, filed a request to stay of eviction. The case involved a request for a Temporary Restraining Order against Respondent, Oneida Housing Authority. Petitioner claims she was issued a decision to vacate the premises by September 30, 2013 by 11:00 a.m. The court

granted the Petitioner's Temporary Restraining Order and a hearing was scheduled. On October 1, 2013 a hearing was held and Petitioner failed to appear. Respondent motioned the Court to: (1) lift the temporary restraining order and proceed with the eviction; (2) Petitioner shall vacate the premises on/or before October 15, 2013 by 11:00 a.m. at which time the locks will be changed; and (3) Petitioner shall not commit waste upon the home. Respondent noticed the court upon completion of the housing inspection; they will be filing a Motion for Enforcement and Deficiency Judgment for outstanding rental charges, utilities, and repair charges due to

According to the Rules of Civil Procedure, Rule 16 (C) it states, "Petitioner: When a party who has filed a claim fails to appear, plead, or prosecute said claim as provided in these rules or elsewhere, a dismissal may be granted by the trial court, dismissing the claim."

neglect and/or waste.

The court granted the Respondents motion to lift the temporary restraining order; for Petitioner to vacate the premises on/or before October 15, 2013 and Petitioner shall not commit waste upon the home. Case dismissed.

Leah S. Dodge vs. **Oneida** Land Commission. Docket No. 13-TC-126, October 1, 2013. Judicial Officers Jean Webster, Leland Wigg-Ninham and James Van Stippen (Pro Tem). On September 3, 2013 the court granted Petitioner's motion for an Injunctive Relief seeking the court to reverse the decision and rescission of a building permit issued Zoning Oneida Department based on the Oneida Land Commission improper decision. An Injunctive Relief hearing scheduled September 20, 2013 to hear the merits of the peti-

tion.
On September 06, 2013, Respondents filed a motion for continuance, due to the Respondent's Attorney having a prior commitment and motion was granted. The Injunctive Relief hearing was rescheduled for September 24, 2013 to discuss the merits of the case and decide whether the case would move forward to a trial.

On September 18, 2013, the Petitioner filed three motions: (1) Motion for Recusal and Substitution, (2) Motion for Injunctive Relief, and (3) Motion for Continuance.

On September 20, 2013

the court held a deliberation to address the three motions filed by the Petitioner. The court ruled as follows:

1. The Petitioner's

Motion for Continuance of the September 24, 2013 hearing to discuss the merits of the case was granted. The hearing is rescheduled to October 9, 2013.

2. The Petitioner's Motion for Injunctive

Relief to halt the construction of the commercial office building, also referred in the petition as the "garage" located at 112 Riverdale Drive, and Motion Recusal of Judicial Officers Jean M. Webster, Chris J. Cornelius and Lois Powless shall be heard on September 24, 2013.

On September 24, 2013 a hearing was held. Prior to addressing Petitioner's addendum for the recusal of Judicial Officers, the court informed the Petitioner that if the current Judicial Officers find they should recuse themselves from hearing the Motion for Recusal, this will only cause further delay in hearing the Petitioner's petition and any other motions filed would also be delayed. Without an injunction or order in place, the status quo is not being preserved. Therefore, it will be more difficult and potentially inequitable to undo any construction that may occur between now and when a decision is rendered. This delay is squarely the responsibility of the Petitioner. The court noted to the Petitioner if the case is heard by a panel of three (3) Wisconsin Tribal Judges Association (WTJA), the hearing would be scheduled according to (WTJA) schedule.

Each Judicial Officer addressed the court stating why they would not recuse themselves from the case, followed by the Petitioner addressing the recusal addendum and each Judicial Officer answering is Petitioner's questions appropriately.

According to the Oneida Tribal Judiciary Canons of Judicial Conduct and the Oneida Tribal Judicial Code of Ethics, the presiding Judicial Officers were willing and able to hear the Petitioner's motions, however, the Petitioner was very adamant that each Judicial Officer and/or immediate family member who have any connection to the parties would be perceived as a conflict of interest. Petitioner also requested the Judicial Officer's named on the pool list should not be a part of this case. Without the pool of Judicial Officers present to address the Petitioner's questions, the court shall not rule whether a conflict of interest existed for judges as they were not present at the hearing.

Petitioner's perception that a conflict of interest existed was also noted to the court when Petitioner would strenuously object to a Judicial Officer's responses about remaining on the case and noting to the court she will object to any Judicial Officer who's impartiality can reasonable be questioned. Noting the strong objections by Petitioner and having warned the Petitioner about the risks of delaying the case the presiding Judicial Officer's recused

Delebreau, filed a complaint against Respondents, HRD-Benefits and Crawford & Company Insurance, alleging Respondents Worker's denied his

On September 24, 2013 a hearing was held. The Court issued a Pre-trial Scheduling Order.

Compensation claim.

On October 9, 2013 Petitioner filed a motion of dismissal as all of his medical bills were being satisfied. The Court grants Petitioner's Motion to Dismiss.

Housing **Oneida** Authority vs Keshia Mencheski. Docket No. 13-TC-121, October 17, 2013. Judicial Officers Jean M. Webster, Mary Adams and Leland Wigg-Ninham presiding. On July 25, 2013, Petitioner, Oneida Housing Authority filed a money judgment against the Respondent Respondent refuses and/or fails to pay delinquent arrears, tenant damages and other damages owed to the Petitioner. A hearing was scheduled for August 27, 2013.

August 27, 2013 a hearing was held and Respondent failed to appear, however, it was discovered Respondent did not receive proper notice and hearing was rescheduled to October 16, 2013.

October 16, 2013 the

October 16, 2013 the hearing was called to order and Respondent failed to appear. Petitioner claims Respondent was negligent in the care of maintaining her residence, Respondent failed to make timely payments and has maintained a delinquent balance on the

rental account; therefore Respondent breached a legal written contract with the Petitioner by not fulfilling her obligation to pay rent. Amount due \$688.00. Petitioners motioned the court to have the hearing proceed to find and the Respondent in default. According to the Rules of Civil Procedure, Rule 16 (B) states, "Respondent: When a party against whom a judgment for relief is sought has failed to appear, plead or otherwise defend as required in these rules or elsewhere, a default judgment may be granted by the trial court upon the receipt of whatever evidence is deemed necessary to establish the claim." Petitioner further requested the court to grant the judgment against the Respondent.

The court finds the Respondent in default and grants the Petitioner's motion for a money judgment.

Respondent is ordered

to pay the Petitioner \$713 for unpaid rental payment, damages, and filing fee, Respondent shall have 60 days from the signing of this order to complete payment or make arrangements for payment or installment payments with the Petitioner, and the Court orders an attachment of per capita payment if payment is not satisfied.

Joyce Williams vs. Epic Life Insurance- Broadway. Docket No. 13-TC-127, October 21, 2013.

Judicial Officers Mary

Adams, Kathy Hughes and Janice L. McLester presiding. On September 4, 2013, Petitioner, Joyce Williams, filed a motion an Injunction/ Temporary Restraining Order against the Respondent, Epic Life Insurance-Broadway claiming the beneficiaries have refused to pay for her son, Bradley Williams burial expenses. Respondent, Epic Life Insurance – Broadway (hereafter "Epic"), filed a Response to Petitioner's Request for an Injunction/Temporary Restraining Order, making several claims in defense and asking for the request by Petitioner to be denied. Respondent argues: 1) that jurisdiction is not proper due to the forum selection clause in the Epic Group policy; 2) that under the policy, no claim has been filed and therefore nothing to be order to be paid or stopped by operation of injunction and 3) Ms. Williams, as the decedent's parent, is not entitled to relief under the terms of the policy. This matter is dismissed without prejudice because it is not ripe for adjudication.

From 12B/OTJS October - December Summaries

Preference Department to correctly apply and implement the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin Indian Preference Laws, found at Chapter 57 of the Tribe's ordinances. Petitioner, HVS Advertising-Marketing (HVS), alleged Indian preference was misapplied when it sought to win a media and marketing contract offered for bid by the Oneida Bingo and Casino. Based on the evidence and arguments presented during the two day trial, April 16-17, 2013, the Court found the Preference Indian Department failed to meet its duties and that viola-

tions of Chapter 57 had

occurred; therefore a

hearing on damages was held September 25, 2013. The Petitioner was requesting compensatory damages, punitive damages and civil forfeiture. Petitioner further requested the Court to schedule a "Show Cause" hearing or the Court order the Respondent to file a petition against the Oneida Casino. Petitioner believed the Oneida Casino was largely responsible in that they did not apply preference when selecting the contractor; therefore they were in violation for failure to carry out and properly apply the functions under the Indian Preference law. Compensatory damage

is a sum of money awarded as a result of a wrongful act, omission or negligence. The Court finds in favor of the Petitioner, HVS, and awarded compensatory damages. The compensatory damages were based on the lost revenue for the two years the contract should have been awarded to HVS and attorneys' fees. Petitioner was given 30 days to submit the final invoice for Attorney fees for the dates of May 2013 to September 25, 2013. On December 20, 2013 the Court issued a decision accepting the Petitioner's final attorney fee invoice and incorporated that amount into the final decision. A note of interest, the Petitioner had a list of items for compensatory damage; however, the Court was not convinced the other requests for damages were sufficiently related to the Respondent's violations; therefore items were denied.

Petitioners were seeking punitive damages. Punitive damages are a monetary award intended to punish the wrongdoer. Punitive damages are limited to when the party has acted willfully, maliciously or fraudulently. See Quality Construction Management, Inc. et al. v. Oneida Seven Generations Corp. 05-(9/21/2005).TC-018, The Court found the Petitioner was contacted to submit an RFP and was selected to participate in the interview process. While Respondent failed to conduct a thorough investigation of Petitioner's complaint, the Court is not convinced the Respondent's actions met its true definition. Punitive damages denied.

Petitioners were also seeking civil forfeiture. Forfeiture means to incur a penalty or to become liable for a payment of a sum of money, as a consequence of a certain act. Although the Court found the Respondent did not conduct a thorough investigation, the court is not convenience Respondent acted willfully, maliciously or fraudently. Civil Forfeiture

Petitioner motion the court to order a "Show Cause" hearing to bring Oneida Bingo and Casino back as a party. Court was reluctant to bring the Oneida Bingo and Casino back into the case for at least two reasons. First, the Oneida Bingo and Casino was dismissed by an agreement of all parties includthe Petitioner. Second, it raises due process concerns if a party is brought back into the case in the damages phase when it had no part of the liability phase. In order to be fair, if the Oneida Bingo and Casino is brought back into the case, they would have to be given a chance to litigate the underlying merits. Given how far the case has progressed, the entire case would need to be re-heard; this would be time consuming and inefficient. The request for a "Show Cause" hearing against the Oneida Bingo and Casino is denied.

the Final decision Petitioner, HVS awarded compensatory Motion for damages. punitive damages and civil forfeitures were denied.

Ron Kelly vs. Harvey Kosowski. Docket No. 13-TC-036, November 15, 2013. Judicial Officers Mary Adams, Jean M. Webster and Leland Wigg-Ninham presiding. Facts: On November 18, 2012 Mr. Kelly was hunting within tribal lands. On the same day or shortly thereafter, Mr. Kelly was issued a citation from Warden Kosowski for violation of Chapter 45.16 (violation #127) and Mr. Kelly's weapon was seized. This violation is described as trespassing in a wildlife area, park or bow hunting area during the nine (9) day gun deer season, without giving notice. A hearing was scheduled at Environmental Resources Board for January 17, 2013, but was rescheduled for February 21, 2013. On February 21, 2013 Mr. Kosowski did not appear and the ERB dismissed the citation and shortly after Mr. Kelly retrieved weapon. Mr. Kelly then filed this action. The Respondents entered a Motion to Dismiss and Motion for Summary Judgment; both were granted in part and denied in part. The Motion to Dismiss the Conservation Department GRANTED. The Motion Dismiss Officer Kosowski was DENIED. Petitioner was requesting punitive damages in the amount of \$25,500. Petitioner claims punitive damages are to punish the

during Officer Kosowski confiscated his property. Petitioner claims his niece and other hunters heard about the incident while she was hunting in the Dakotas, which caused damage to his reputation. Petitioner asserts that he has suffered emotional distress, which caused him to be reluctant to hunt in his homeland again and he should not bear the expense to hunt at other places. Petitioner is requesting \$50,000 in total. Respondent claims Petitioner failed to point to any law that grants him the ability to maintain an action for monetary damages against Respondent. Respondent asserts Petitioner is only entitled to prospective injunctive preventing relief Respondents from seizing his weapon for hunting in a no hunting area in the future. Petitioner's gun was confiscated two days into the nine day hunting season. The General Council has not enacted laws which allow us to grant the remedies Mr. Kelly was seeking. The Court agrees that Mr. Kosowski has a moral obligation to treat elders and the general public with the utmost respect. However, this is the wrong venue to litigate complaints about our service people. Punitive damages are limited to when a party has acted willfully, maliciously or fraudulently. From the onset, this case would not have advanced to trial if Mr. Kelly's actions were lawful. Courts generally don't honor requests for attorney fees especially when the case initiated from actions that were

Petitioners filed a Request for Injunction to immediately reverse the Respondent's decision and immediately termi-Emergency nate the Temporary Attorney employment contract with Mr. Layatalati Hill. The trial court held a deliberation and found that Petitioners' request for an Injunction failed to meet the terms in Rule 31, but decided that the case may proceed as an Original Complaint. A hearing was scheduled and held to hear the merits of the case on Tuesday, November 26, 2013 at 9:00 a.m. Judicial Officer Jean Webster stated for the record that Attorney Rebecca Webster is married to her nephew and that she took the oath of office to judge fairly and independently without prejudice. Judicial Officer Sandra Skenadore stated that Layatalati "Lati" Hill is her sister's nephew and in no way

related to Hon. Skenadore and that she took the oath of office to judge objectively. Petitioner orally motioned to recuse both Judicial Officers Jean Webster and Sandra Skenadore. Petitioner alleged that both judicial officers have close family members as a party or attorney on the case. Petitioners' motion for

recusal was denied. Mr. Lati Hill was hired by the Tribe by contract to provide legal services to the Legislative Operating Committee. The contract was approved by the Business Committee. Mr. Hill is not licensed by the State Bar of Wisconsin nor is he admitted to practice before the Courts of the State of Wisconsin. The attachments to the complaint indicate that Mr. Hill received his J.D. degree from University of Kansas Law School in 2012. Petitioners filed their complaint contending that Mr. Hill should be terminated immediately because he is not admitted to practice before the Courts of the State of Wisconsin nor he is licensed by the State Bar of Wisconsin. After several requests by the panel for Petitioners to address their case complaint, Petitioners failed to present evidence or argue their position. Petitioners were adamantly not interested in moving forward to address the merits of their case. Therefore, the allowed Respondents to state their opposition to the merits. Respondents argue, Mr. Hill's position with Oneida does not require a State license or approval with the Bureau of Indian Affairs. Most importantly, Mr. Hill is not violating a State law or federal law. Respondents request the Court to dismiss Petitioner's complaint. Petitioners had no answer to Respondents' arguments. Petitioners failed to address their complaint or the issues stated above in Respondents' arguments. We agreed with Respondent's arguments and reasoning. Without Petitioners addressing their complaint the Court has no other option but to

dismiss their complaint. Racquel L. Hill vs Oneida Business Committee/General **Tribal Council.** Docket 13-TC-131, No. 20, 2013. December Judicial Officers Mary Adams, Sandra L. Skenadore and Jean M. Webster presiding. Petitioner filed the following requests: to enjoin the General Tribal Council action to dissolve the Seven Generations Corporation; that the motion be ruled out of order as it did not attain the two-thirds majority vote and; to stay any action that the Respondents may take until this case is completed. At the hearing, Petitioner was required to show specifically how this Court has jurisdiction. Once jurisdiction is established then Petitioner may address mitted a Motion to Dismiss and Response to Petitioner's Request for Injunctive Relief and Declaratory Ruling. Respondent asserted that actions raised at General Tribal Council (GTC) meetings are political matters that need to be addressed in the legislative forum, i.e. the GTC. Respondent concluded that this process respects the separation of legislative and judicial functions that the Oneida Tribal Judicial System was set up to create. Respondent claimed there are other opportunities to challenge GTC actions; Petitioner may address the action at GTC meeting, the Petitioner may petition for a GTC meeting to readdress those actions or the Chairman may exercise his constitutional authority to call for a GTC meeting. Respondent asserted Chairman Delgado has called for a GTC meeting. Petitioner argues: That the Generations Seven Corporation is created under and is subject to the laws, ordinances jurisdiction of the Oneida Nation. The Oneida Tribal Judicial System enhances and protects the self-government and sovereignty of the Oneida Tribe and its jurisdiction extends over all persons and cases in law and equity arising within the boundaries of the Oneida Tribe, or cases that affect the Oneida Tribe under the protection the Oneida Constitution. The enactment of the Oneida Tribal Judicial System provides a clear separation of powers, consistent procedures of law and rule-making, and due process for the Tribal members. Administrative Procedures Act requires the Oneida Tribe to provide a forum for appeals of administrative errors and contested issues that ensure fairness and notice to Oneida tribal members. Under the Indian Civil Rights Act of 1968, U.S.C. (Sec 1301-1303) the federal government supports tribal members' rights to "petition for redress of grievance." The Oneida Tribal Judiciary fulfills that responsibility. Petitioner recited portions of GTC Resolution #8-19-91A which establishes the Oneida Tribal Judicial System. The Court ruled

Bruce A. King, Seven **Generations** Docket No. 13-TC-132, December 31, 2013. Judicial Officers Mary Adams, Sandra Skenadore and Jean M. Webster presiding. Petitioner filed a motion a **Preliminary** Injunction alleging his due process was denied by his removal from the Oneida Seven Generation Corp (OSGC) in direct result of the action by the General Tribal Council on December 15, 2013 "...To direct the OBC to dissolve the OSGC based on the Law Office's finding that the OSGC's Corporate Charter identifies the shareholders (i.e. the Tribe) as represented the **Business** Committee, can dissolve the Corporation." and for the potential harm that could be imposed not only upon the OSGC and its employees as well as the reputation and credibility of the Oneida Tribe and its ability to do business with commercial entities outside the reservation and the Oneida Tribe itself. Before the Court discussed Petitioner's motion we had to decide if this Court has jurisdiction to adjudicate his complaint. In order to address Petitioner's complaint, there are five (5) questions listed on the Original Complaint form that are designed to assist with identifying the issues. The Court found ordered that Petitioner have five (5) days to perfect his filing and provide any supporting documentation that will assist the Court with his motion. Petitioner then filed a Motion to The Court Dismiss. accepted Petitioner's

Shipping Email Scams Deliver Headaches

MADISON ~ Be on the lookout for fake shipping emails that appear to be from a "shipping manager" for a delivery company such as USPS or UPS or from major retailers such as Best Buy, Walmart or Costco.

The emails claim that the recipient has a shipment that is waiting to be delivered, but note that there is a problem with the delivery. The recipient is asked to complete a form on a linked page to get the situation rectified. The scam email also threatens that if the recipient does not respond within a week or so, they will refund the money for the item minus a significant fee.

In actuality, there is no product waiting for delivery, and the alarming language in the email

is intended to make recipients act quickly without considering consequences. By clicking on any of the links in the email, a recipient risks downloading malware or handing over personal information to the scam-

If you receive a similar email, delete it and do not click any of the links contained within. If you know that you do, in fact, have a shipment on route that may incur a delay, contact the shipper directly to inquire.

The Real Virus in a **Tech Support Scam?** The Scammer

MADISON – If you receive a call out of the blue claiming that your computer has a virus and that the caller can help you get rid of it, hang up immediately. It is a scam.


These "tech support" scams have been around for a long time and are common. The callers often falsely to represent Microsoft or a local tech support company to gain the consumer's trust. They tell the consumer that they can remove the (non-existent) virus from their computer for a fee. The caller asks the victim to download software from the internet that them remote access to the system.

If you allow these scammers to access your computer, they can load any number of malicious up. software programs onto

your machine and they may access your files as well. For people who shop, file taxes, access medical records or bank online, a computer may hold a wealth of personal and financial information including Social Security numbers, birth dates, addresses and banking and routing account numbers. Giving access to a computer-savvy scammer is a recipe for disaster.

In addition, these scammers often require payment for their "services" by phone using a credit card. With the victim's card numbers, the scammer is likely to pile on additional charges to the account.

Again, if you receive one of these tech support phone calls, simply hang

TO: Ethics Hearing Body:

As the judicial officer assigned the task to supervise the processing of the two (2) complaints named above, I am submitting this final status report and a Motion to Dismiss both cases, for the record. This case has been languishing for over a year. Some finality is needed.

Final Report

The Pro Tempore Ethics Panel met and issued their decision to order the parties to medi-

Respondents agreed to participate in Peacemaking. However, the Complainant did not agree to Peacemaking. This action has reached an impasse. The Oneida Tribal Judicial System does not wish to pursue any further action in this case.

Motion to Dismiss

The Oneida Tribal Judicial System does not feel it is in the best interest of the parties or the Judiciary to prolong this case any further. The original complaint was filed March 14, 2011; it is now May of 2013. Further reasons to summarily dismiss this case:

- The Complainant

resigned Judicial System as of August 12, 2011.

- In light of the fact the Investigative found in 11-Ethics-003 no clear wrongdoing, failure to comply with the Judicial Code of Conduct or violation of due process on the part of Winnifred Thomas, Chief Judicial Officer at the time of the complaint. "This panel does not recommend any discipline."
- Recommendation the Investigative Panel 11-Ethics-004, "...this case be forwarded to a full Hearing Panel for dismissal, on the record."
- The animosity within the Judicial System as acknowledged by the Investigative Panel has dissipated of its own accord in the months following Complainant's resigna-

- In the decision of the Ethics Hearing Panel no charges of Ethics violation or disciplinary actions were brought forward and attempts Peacemaking have failed.

On behalf of the Oneida Tribal Judicial System, I am requesting both of these cases be dismissed.





Seymour duo score 1000th point in same game


