Historical Perspective

The Library was established in 1968 and opened its doors in 1969 in the Parish Hall across from the Stone Church. Over the years, it moved to the Civic Center for more room. In the late 70's, it moved to its present location in the Archiquette Building on Elm Street in Site One. At the present time the Library service population was about 7,000. It served Outagamie County, Brown County and the OWLSNET consortium in which we share materials from 55 other libraries within the State of Wisconsin. Members of material check-outs are approximately 36,000 plus another 2,000,000 for our partners in our consortium.

This Oneida Community Library is solely supported by the Oneida Tribe of Indians and is recognized as a Wisconsin Public Library in good standing.
