Kalihwisaks The General Tribal Council (GTC) convened for the first time of 2011 on Monday, January 3 for the Annual Meeting at the Radisson Hotel and Conference Center.

The meeting's agenda was quickly adopted with no changes and minutes from the July 5, 2010 and November 20, 2010 GTC meetings were approved. The fiscal year 2010 Treasurer's Report was dictated by discussion about the lease agreement with Oakridge Plaza. The lease land is home to Wal-Mart and Festival Foods along with other businesses located just north of Mason Street in Green

The lease terms were revealed along with how the revenue generated from the agreement is utilized. The report also highlighted an improving balance sheet for the tribe but cautioned that fiscal responsibility on the tribe's part is vital.

The report was accepted. A second motion was presented by Oneida Committee Business (OBC) member Melinda Danforth directing the OBC to provide a detailed report to the GTC on the history and current negotiations of the lease. The motion was passed.

The GTC then heard the 2010 comprehensive annual financial audit by

the accounting firm McGlandrey and Pullen. The report was accepted as no significant findings were unveiled during the audit.

General Tribal Council meets for Annual Meeting

The GTC set the dates for the 2011 tri-annual primary and election. This election will feature the newly implemented primary elections. The caucus will be held March 12, May 7 will be home to the primary election and the general election will take place on July 16.

An amendment to the vacation and personal days accumulation policy in the Personnel Policies and Procedures was tabled until all Oneida Tribal members who are employees receive a 10day notice regarding the proposed changes.

The GTC then moved on to an amendment intended to strengthen Indian preference in hiring throughout the tribe. The amendment featured a tabled motion that accepted the amendments and a withdrawn motion adding tribal member descendents to the list of preferred candidates.

A lengthy discussion followed with what level of preference should be extended to a descendent and what qualified an individual to receive descendent status. The amendment was tabled for 60 days.

A motion by Madelyn Genskow directing the

OBC to initiate the procedures set out in the Administrative Procedures Act to develop a comprehensive law addressing the leasing of the tribe's land to be adopted by the GTC and that the OBC must present this law to the GTC in one year or sooner so the GTC can then vote to approve or make changes failed by a simple hand vote.

The Oneida Annual Report and presentation was accepted with little discussion. The GTC will meet again on February 5 regarding the proposed Judiciary Law and Legislative Procedures Act.

Services available for veterans with PTSD

The Oneida Nation has a long, proud military history that pre-dates the American Revolutionary War, but that history comes with a cost to some of the warriors who survived the battles. That cost is Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD).

Viet Nam War Veteran Ted Christjohn likened PTSD to an enemy waiting in ambush.

"That PTSD, it's a sneaky guy; you got to know how to combat him, but it's harder to combat this guy," he said.

According to the National Center for PTSD, the disorder can occur after experiencing a traumatic event, such as being shot at or seeing someone else get shot.

Between 6 percent and 11 percent of the Afghanistan war veterans and between 12 percent and 20 percent of the Iraq war veterans will experience PTSD.

Symptoms can include reexperiencing the event, or flashbacks, difficulty sleeping, and attempting to avoid reminders of the trauma or numb emotions.

"PTSD, that's always going to be there and pops up at certain times, like you get around holidays, and you get certain smells sometimes, and noises," Christjohn explained of his own symptoms.

Oneida Nation Veterans Department Director Kerry Metoxen works with veterans to get them benefits and counseling.

"Our main focus is benefits and entitlements for veterans and their families," said Metoxen. "We have our own behavioral health staff that we can utilize, also, for natives or family members of our tribal members."

While PTSD is more actively treated now than in past wars, younger veterans have their own struggles to work through.

"Our Iraqi vets, we're getting them in right away, getting them counseling. Some of them guys, too, they're busy, they've got their lives; working, kids, married. Sometimes it is hard to get them guys in," said Metoxen.

Metoxen noted that the multiple deployments experienced by military members

added its own level of stress.

"You figure you get out (of the service), get a job, get situated, he's got a family and all this, and all of a sudden you get that letter or that phone call, we're calling you back into the military," he said.

Christjohn urges other veterans to not ignore symptoms.

"Get out and get some help. Go and talk, don't be afraid to get some help for yourself," he said.

After getting out of the service, Christjohn attempted to deal with his PTSD on his own.

"You numb yourself a lot, you medicate yourself through alcohol," he said.

Christjohn found himself avoiding crowds, sitting with his back to the wall in public, or avoiding social situations all together. His behavior put a strain his relationships.

"You get discouraged sometimes, people just don't understand," he said. "Especially in a marriage or having a companion, they don't know what's going on ... it's making the relationship bad because they don't understand how to deal with (PTSD).'

After undergoing counseling, Christjohn turned to Native American spirituality, such as participating in sweats.

"I like to burn sage in the morning," he said.

He also does woodworking using tools purchased through the Department of Veterans Affairs Vocational Rehabilitation program. The tools came in handy when anticipation of the interview for this story had caused Christjohn a sleepless night.

"I drew some sketches on how to make my woodworking pattern to keep my mind ... off what I was going to go through today, and that

Retiring senator spurs action on Indian issues

landmark bills for Indians, including laws overhauling tribal health care and law enforcement and settling a 15year legal battle over lost royalties for mismanaged Indian lands.

Congress continued parceling out \$2.5 billion in economic stimulus money to tribes and resolved four long-standing water disputes totaling more than \$1 billion. y

High court dismisses **Oneida foreclosure case**

WASHINGTON (AP) – The U.S. Supreme Court has dismissed a case involving two New York counties that are trying to foreclose on land owned by the Oneida Indian Nation to settle a property tax dispute.

The court agreed in October to hear the case. It centers on the issue of whether tribal immunity from lawsuits prevents Madison and Oneida counties from foreclosing on tribal land.

Wis. gives tribes \$692,000 in police grants

MADISON, Wis. (AP) ~ The state has awarded another round of grants to American Indian tribes to help cover law enforcement expenses.

State Justice Department officials say 10 tribes will receive a total of \$692,000.

Agency officials say the grants come out of tribal gaming money the state collects. No tax dollars are used.

The grants typically have been used to cover personnel costs as well as purchase equipment such as uniforms and body armor.

The Bad River Chippewa got \$128,150, the most of any recipient. The St. Croix Chippewa was next with \$113,700.

Powless, Deacon Edmund C. June 14, 1923 – December 30, 2010

Deacon Edmund C. Powless, beloved husband of Blanche Α. Powless and patriof arch the Powless family

entered into Eternal Life with his Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ on Thursday, December 30, 2010.

Edmund was born June 14, 1923 in Oneida, the second oldest son in a family of four boys born to Ben and Philomene (Antone) Powless, on what was his mother and father's original homestead. In December 1941, directly after Pearl Harbor, Edmund, who was 18 at the time, enlisted in the United States Army, participating in quartermaster training and eventually volunteering for parachute training. He was sent to Europe and earned a Purple Heart during the Battle of the Bulge, where he participated in the liberation of Bastogne. Edmund served as a member of 101st Airborne the Division and earned the rank of Staff Sergeant, earning numerous medals for his Combat duty that included not only the Purple Heart but also two Bronze Star Medals of Honor, along various other with medals during his course of duty. He was honorably discharged October 1945. Additionally, he was recently awarded the French Legion of Honor Medal by the Consulate, French France's highest military service award, for his assistance with the liberation of France during World War II. Currently, Edmund was a member of the Robert W. Cornelius VFW Post, Oneida. When he returned from his military service he married his childhood sweetheart, Blanche Hill, on September 22, 1945 at All Saints Cathedral in Milwaukee. They eventually moved to Green Bay and he soon found work at the Portland-Huron Cement Co., where he began as a laborer but soon developed into a general repairman, learning skills as a carpenter, welder, electrician, and plumber. After 40 years of dedicated service, Edmund retired from Huron Cement Co. in 1985. It was at this time that an idea, that had always laid at the back of his mind, became a full-blown calling. Edmund, a lifelong member of the Church of Holy Apostles, the Oneida, and who became a lay leader at Holy Apostles after the war, always wanted to be of more help to his people. This, along with the pride of his heritage instilled in him by his parents, helped guide him to the life of Ministry. The Episcopal Church started the "deacon school" and it was here that his calling was recognized. With tremendous love and encouragement from Blanche and "his girls" applied for and he became accepted and enrolled in the first class of the Episcopal dea-



Reverend William Louis Stevens, then Bishop of the Diocese of Fond du Lac, as Deacon of the Episcopal Church August 25, 1990, the Feast of King St. Louis of France, at the age of 67, and became the first Deacon at his lifelong church, The Church of Holy Apostles, the Oneida. He obtained this with less than three months of high school education. Since that time, his ministry has included home and hospital visits to those unable to attend church, as well as assisting with the weekly services at church.

Despite all his achievements, Deacon Edmund will be best remembered as a modest, humble man whose heart was filled with love and tender caring for all people, everywhere and whose service to his Lord and Savior was clearly evident in the actions of his daily life and by his warm and ever present smile. He will be greatly missed, not only by his family, but by those he also lovingly ministered to.

Deacon Edmund is survived by his loving, devoted wife, Blanche, Green Bay; their five daughters, Pat (Cory) Hill, Oneida, Sister Theresa Rose Powless-T.C.G., Arizona, Kathy Hughes, Oneida, Dottie (Doug) Krull, De Pere, and Barb (Rick) Dickson, Green Bay. He is further survived by six grandchildren and ten grandchildren great with extended along family members; Lucille Powless, Green Bay, Powless. passed by Congress last spring. It clears the way for more preventive care, boosts mental health resources and addresses recruiting and retaining physicians throughout Indian Country. It also focuses on teen suicide an epidemic on many reservations and improves treatment for diabetes, another chronic problem.

Dorgan said he told Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid he would not vote for the larger health bill unless it included Indian health care. "That's not a threat, just a statement of fact," he said.

Dorgan also championed the Tribal Law and Order Act, which aims to give tribes more authority to combat crime on their reservations.

The measure authorizes more federal law enforcement officers and makes federal agencies collect data on crimes committed in Indian Country. It also requires the Justice Department to maintain criminal data on cases that U.S. attorneys decline to prosecute for various reasons, including a lack of evidence. A recent report found that federal officials decline to prosecute more than 50 percent of violent crimes on reservations.

Congress approved \$3.4 billion to settle the lost royalties case, which covers claims that Native Americans were swindled out of payments for oil, gas, timber and grazing rights for more than a century. As many as 500,000 American Indians will receive at least \$1,500 apiece; some will get significantly more.

A total of \$2 billion will be used to buy broken-up Indian lands from individual owners willing to sell, with the lands turned over to tribes. Another \$60 million will go to a scholarship fund for young Indians.

The settlement was reached in late 2009, but was not approved by Congress until the lameduck session that ended just before Christmas.

Protesters demonstrate outside Seattle inquest

SEATTLE (AP) ~ Scores of protesters pounded drums and sang outside the King County Courthouse as a police inquest began into an officer's fatal shooting of a Native American wood carver.

Protesters were visible before Monday's session began, during the noon hour and at the conclusion of the day's testimony.

The inquest jury was shown newly disclosed video of Officer Ian Birk pointing his semiautomatic pistol at John T. Williams just moments after Birk fired four shots that left Williams sprawled on the ground.

The Seattle Times reports some demonstrators wore headbands saying "4 seconds to death." That's a reference to the time between when Birk ordered Williams to drop a knife and when Birk fired.

rying the knife Aug. 30 and said he fired because Williams didn't respond to three commands to drop the knife.

The King County prosecutor will use the inquest findings to determine whether to charge the officer.

"We signed these treaties and made promises - in writing and then broke them all," he said. "This is about keeping the country's promises."

Legal Notice

If You Are a Native American Who Tried to Get a Farm Loan or Loan Servicing from the USDA,

You Could Receive Benefits from a \$760 Million Class Action Settlement.

A class action Settlement with the United States Department of Agriculture ("USDA") has been reached. The lawsuit claimed the USDA discriminated against Native Americans who applied for or tried to apply for farm loans or loan servicing. The USDA denies it did anything wrong.

Am I included?

The Class includes all Native American farmers and ranchers who:

- Farmed or ranched or attempted to farm or ranch between January 1, 1981 and November 24, 1999;
- · Tried to get a farm loan or loan servicing from the USDA during that period; and
- Complained about discrimination to the USDA either on their own or through a representative during the time period.

You are not eligible for this Settlement if you filed a claim, or intend to file a claim, in another USDA discrimination case like Pigford 1 or Pigford II (Black farmers), Garcia (Hispanic farmers) or Love (Women farmers).



ND bills seek to keep Fighting Sioux nickname

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) ~ Two North Dakota House bills would delay or halt the University of North Dakota from discarding its Fighting Sioux nickname and American Indian head logo, a job the school wants to finish this summer to avoid NCAA penalties.

Rep. Al Carlson, R-Fargo, said Monday he would introduce legislation to require UND to keep its nickname and logo. The bill, which was obtained by The Associated Press, orders Attorney General Wayne Stenehjem to consider filing an antitrust lawsuit against the NCAA if the association tries to sanction UND for keeping the nickname. A separate bill, sponsored by Rep. David Monson, R-Osnabrock, says the university may not drop the nickname or logo unless the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe holds a referendum and tribal voters deny UND permission to continue using them. Supporters of the nickname and logo have held out hope that they could be retained if the Standing Rock and Spirit Sioux Lake tribes endorsed them. The Spirit Lake tribe held a referendum in April 2009, with 67 percent of voters declaring they wanted to keep the nickname and logo, which is a profile of a Sioux warrior with feathers and paint. The Standing Rock Sioux's council tribal has declined to hold a referendum, with the tribe's chairman, Charles Murphy, saying it had more pressing issues. UND plans to eliminate most instances of the nickname by August. Sellers of Fighting Sioux memorabilia have until June 30 to clear out their stocks. In April 2010, William Goetz, the chancellor of the state university system, ordered UND to begin a transition away from the nickname and logo, and "at this point, the University of North Dakota is continuing to comply" with the directive, UND President Robert Kelley said in a statement Monday.

Goetz's order came shortly after the North Dakota Supreme Court, ruling in a lawsuit filed by a group of Spirit Lake nickname supporters, concluded the state constitution gave the Board of Higher Education authority to drop the nickname and logo.

Stenehjem said the Supreme Court's decision would pose problems for the Carlson and Monson bills.

Because of a law passed by Congress, you are also not eligible for this Settlement if you either:

- · Experienced discrimination only between January 1 and November 23, 1997; or
- · Complained of discrimination only between July 1 and November 23, 1997.

What does the Settlement provide?

The \$760 million Settlement will pay cash to Class Members for valid claims as well as attorneys' fees (between 4% and 8%, subject to Court approval) and awards. The Settlement includes up to \$80 million in USDA loan forgiveness for Class Members who qualify. The USDA will pay an additional \$20 million to implement the Settlement and will make some changes to their farm loan programs. Any money left after all payments and expenses have been made will be donated to one or more organizations that help Native American farmers and ranchers.

What can I get from the Settlement?

The amount of money you will receive will depend on whether you file a claim under Track A or Track B. It will also depend on the total number of claims that are filed and approved.

Track A – You can get a payment up to \$50,000 for your discrimination claim plus an additional 25% paid to the IRS to reduce any income tax you may owe.

Track B – You can get the amount of your actual damages up to \$250,000. Track B requires more proof than Track A.

USDA Loan Forgiveness – Under both Track A and Track B you can get forgiveness on part or all of your eligible USDA farm loans plus an additional 25% paid to the IRS to reduce any income tax you may owe.

How do I get benefits?

You will need to file a claim by **December 24, 2011** to get benefits. After the Court approves the Settlement, meetings will be held across the country to help Class Members file claims. You can register for a Claims Package at the website or by calling the toll-free number.

What are my other rights?

- If you want to keep your right to sue the USDA about the claims in this Settlement, you
 must exclude yourself by February 28, 2011. Unless you exclude yourself, you will be
 bound by the terms of this Settlement.
- If you stay in the Settlement, you can object to or comment on it by February 28, 2011.

The Court will hold a hearing on **April 28, 2011** to consider whether to approve the Settlement and the attorneys' fees. The Court has appointed attorneys to represent the Class. You or your own lawyer may ask to appear and speak at the hearing at your own expense.

"The obstacle that they're going to face is the provision of the North Dakota Constitution that says that the Board of Higher Education has full authority over the institutions of higher education in North Dakota," Stenehjem said.

Jon Backes, president of the Board of Higher Education, called the bills "entirely a legislative issue."

"I think until the Legislature gets through their debate on the issue, I really don't have anything more to say about it," Backes said. "If they try to force the state board to do something, I guess we'd have to talk to our lawyer about the constitutionality of that, but to the extent that they think the process is worthy of significant debate. I encourage a robust debate in that regard."

The Fighting Sioux nickname, which for decades has withstood criticism that it demeans American Indians, ran into its strongest challenge in 2005, when the NCAA declared that it and other colleges' American Indian nicknames were hostile and abusive. The NCAA said

On Saturday, February 5, 2011 there will be a momentous day for the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin. On that day, the Judiciary law and Legislative Procedures Act (LPA) will be brought before the People at a special GTC meeting, and the People will be asked again to decide: Are we ready for these proposed changes to our government and judicial system?

It is now in the hands of the People to decide, and as with everything we do, our actions will affect the seventh generation. I urge all GTC members to take the initiative if you have not already, to learn about these laws and what they mean to the Oneida Tribe.

Rather than repeat information about these proposals or the recent changes made, I would like to stop for a moment and thank everyone that has worked so hard to get the word out about these laws; to make sure that everyone has either received or had an opportunity to access as much information as possible. The process of updating the Administrative Procedures Act by creating the Judiciary Law and the Legislative Procedures Act was a huge undertaking, requiring as much information as possible to be shared with the membership in order for them to make an informed decision. The Legislative Procedures Act was nearing finalization about a year ago, however it took almost three years before that to develop and prepare it for GTC consideration. The work on the Judiciary began about five years ago and finally got to the stage for introduction to the GTC in July of 2010. At that point, we began concerted efforts to educate directly to

the membership. Through a collective effort the LOC, several other departments, employees, and community members worked very hard to make sure the voters were fully informed on these matters.

I am also very aged to do so much

while under cost-containment. Our total costs for this media effort came to \$5,862.68, and that includes the expense of internally copying and distributing fliers, surveys and materials for the community meetings – this is far below market value for the kind of coverage we were able to achieve.

Here is a breakdown of all of the outreach and information-sharing we have accomplished:

Kalihwisaks - in 2010, at least 29 different items regarding the Judiciary law and Legislative Procedures Act were published in 16 issues of the Tribal newspaper. This includes: one frontpage news story, six OBC forum columns written by myself and other members of the OBC, at least ten public hearing notices and other announcements, four full articles devoted to these laws, and three articles that discussed the Judiciary or Legislative Procedures Act along with other topics. The community also played a role - the Kalihwisaks published four letters to the editor from community members and one full-page guest editorial from the Chief Judicial Officer of the Oneida Appeals Commission.

The Green Bay Press-Gazette also ran at least one article about the Judiciary

proposal within the past few months.

Community Meetings, Work Meetings, and Public Hearings: In 2010, the LOC spent roughly 60 hours in community meetings, public hearings, and work meetings, and another 200 hours proud that we man- Councilwoman preparing presenta-

tions for those meetings and/or reviewing and addressing the comments and concerns brought forth at those meetings.

Six community meetings were held in 2010.

In addition to the Public Hearing held for the Judiciary on May 12, 2009, another one was held on July 29, 2010. A Public Hearing for the Legislative Procedures Act was held March 11, 2010.

The LOC held over a dozen work and informational meetings on these issues - aside from the several regular LOC meetings (open to the public) at which we discussed and worked on the proposals. The Oneida Appeals Commission was invited to several of the work meetings, and at other meetings we brought the information to other groups, such as ONCOA. The advice, recommendations and questions we received in these meetings helped with the understanding of the purpose of the law, and the policy and criteria for each section that should be included.

In order to promote all of these meetings, eight different fliers were created and over 600 copies were posted in Tribal workplaces and other public areas.

Information by mail: Not counting GTC packets, the LOC sent out over 20,260 pieces of mail (five different publications) to inform Tribal members about the Judiciary proposal. In July and August of 2010, informational booklets and brochures were mailed to all Oneida households in the region Wisconsin and several neighboring states. Then, a second brochure was mailed out in the Milwaukee area and Brown/Outagamie Counties. In January 2011, we created and sent a fourth mailer to households Oneida in Wisconsin, explaining the changes that have been made based on feedback from the November GTC meeting and announcing upcoming community meetings. This was followed by a fifth mailer, announcing an upcoming community meeting at SEOTS.

Informational Booth: On September 16, 2010, a booth was booked at the Oneida Farmer's Market, where informational materials were passed out, questions were asked and answered, and Tribal members were invited to fill out a survey.

Surveys: Along with the survey passed out at the informational booth, a survey was enclosed in the booklets mailed out to heads of households. Between those efforts, we received and reviewed 69 responses, which also helped shape the final draft of the proposal.

Website: In August of 2010, a webpage explaining the Judiciary proposal went live on the Oneidanation.org website. This webpage has since been expanded to provide information about the Legislative Procedures Act, as well. Originally, we posted the most current drafts of the Judiciary law and all of the content that was mailed out to Oneida households. Later, we created and added three additional publications, answering even more frequently asked questions about the proposals. More recently, we added about information the Legislative Procedures Act, and links to newspaper articles relating to the proposals. We will continue to keep this website updated regularly.

Current and Future Efforts: Of course, we are not done with our efforts to share information with the community. We scheduled three additional community meetings in 2011; two were held on January 12th and 13th, and one will be held at 10 a.m. on January 15th in the Business Committee Conference Room in the Norbert Hill Center.

We also invite the membership to attend this remaining community meeting.

I am very interested to learn what the People think about the media efforts we have undertaken - was this outreach effective? How could it be better? What other ways can we get information out to the public? Please take a moment to let myself or one of the other LOC members know what you think. This information can help us improve as we go along. As I hope the information above shows, there has been a concentrated, collective effort to make sure the membership has heard from us. Now, we want to hear more from the membership. Yawkko

'Indian' Nickname and Logo

If you show respect for a symbol that promotes stereotyping, harassment and discrimination does that take away the harm? If you replicate that symbol is more or less harm done? If you claim that you mean no harm when you use it, does the harm go away?

My friend Mark says this is sort of like the Confederate flag in the South. Some people, mostly whites, claim that it is a symbol of resilience, bravery and pride. Others say that it symbolizes white power, slavery and segregation. Does the fact that it is raised respectfully with a

hope Mark's metaphor helps move understanding about the use of the race-based 'Indian' name and logo in Mukwonago. It helped me understand the issue better.

Symbols like the Indian head in profile are called "severed head" logos. They have been used at various times in the colonial period and in

later scalps of Indian people (men, women and could children) be brought in for bounty payment. Blood stained scalps gave rise to the term 'redskins.' The bounty practice is one reason why many American Indian people are so opposed to the use of these logos. Bounty payments are about death and genocide not about athletic games and academic and music competitions. When I see one of these symbols I see a bounty marker, what do

you see? Research by Dr. Stephanie Fryberg and many others proves that Indian nickname and logo stereotypes are a form of discrimination. Dr. Jesse Steinfeldt and others show that these stereotypes lead to harassment. Dr. Chu Kim-Prieto demonstrates that these stereotypes lead to a tendency to stereotype other minority groups. Four State Superintendents have urged Wisconsin school districts to review their use of American Indian logos, nicknames and mascots. Why would anyone want to continue to use symbols that are proven to cause harm to children in public school settings?

Judiciary law - the proposed Judiciary law would replace the current Oneida Appeals Commission, expand the jurisdiction of the Oneida Tribal Judicial System, and allow the Oneida Tribe to exercise more of our inherent sovereign powers.

Among the changes that have been made to the Judiciary law are: • Options for education

requirements for judges • Options for either the remaining judges of the judiciary, or judges not currently seated, to form disciplinary committees to handle matters involving misconduct of a judge.

- Compensation for judges based on a tiered scale commensurate with education levels.
- Continuing to authorize the OBC to appoint judges where there is a vacancy with less than 18 months remaining in the term, but placing more strict conditions on who would qualify for appointment.

Legislative Procedures Act (LPA) the proposed LPA would streamline, update and improve the lawmaking process by requiring fiscal estimates and a legislative analysis for each legislative proposal.

Among the changes that have been made to the LPA are:

- Language added specifying that only the GTC can make amendments to the LPA. which
- Language



emphasizes that the LPA does not limit the ability of a Tribal member to petition for a special meeting of the GTC upon obtaining the required signatures.

• Language which emphasizes that amendments or repeal of a law adopted by the GTC shall require GTC action unless authority to amend or repeal the law is specifically granted to the Oneida Business Committee.

More changes are anticipated based on the feedback from the community requested meetings, and any changes will be reflected in the final draft which will be presented to the GTC for consideration on February 5, 2010. In the meantime, updated information about the Judiciary law and LPA will be posted on the www.Oneidanation.org website as it becomes available.

Carlson said Monday he expected his bill would be popular with lawmakers and North

Dakotans generally. He called the Fighting Sioux nickname "a proud tradition" and compared its prospective loss to forcing North Dakota State University to drop its Bison nickname and logo.

"It would be like somebody coming in and telling us that no longer could we have a bison, because those bison were somehow mistreated by the early settlers because they shot too many of them," Carlson said.

Frequently Asked Questions **Oneida Tribal General Election Primary**

How will the election process be different for the 2011 General Election?

In 2011, a Primary Election will be held in April or May and the regular General Election will be held in the month of July. (General Tribal Council will decide the date at the Annual Meeting in January 2011 per the Oneida Election Law).

What is a primary?

Excerpts from Oneida Tribal Election Law: 2.12-2. There shall be a primary election for Business Committee positions whenever there are three (3) or more candidates for any officer positions or sixteen (16) or more candidates for the at-large council member positions.

- (a) The two (2) candidates receiving the highest number of votes cast for each officer position shall be placed on the ballot.
- (b) The fifteen (15) candidates receiving the highest number of votes cast for the at-large council member positions shall be placed on the ballot.
- (c) Any position where a tie exists to determine the candidates to be placed on the ballot shall include all candidates where the tie exists.

2.12-3. The Election Board shall cancel the primary election if the Business Committee positions did not draw the requisite number of candidates for a primary by the petitioning deadline set for the primary.

2.12-4. In the event a candidate withdraws or is unable to run for office after being declared a winner in the primary, the Election Board shall declare the next highest primary vote recipient the primary winner. This procedure shall be repeated as necessary until the ballot is full or until there are no available candidates. If the ballot has already been printed, the procedures for notifying the Oneida public in section 2.5-11 and 2.5-12 shall be followed, including the requirement to print a notice in the Tribal newspaper if time lines allow.

Why have a primary?

To give members a chance to select from fewer candidates or the Business Committee positions in the General Election.

Will there be a primary for all vacancies? No. The primary election is for Business Committee vacancies only.

When will the primary be held? In late April or early May, depending on which timetable the GTC chooses at the Annual GTC Meeting in January, 2011 (per the Oneida Election Law)

If there are only two candidates running for an officer position, will a primary still be held for that position?

No. The primary is designed to get the top two candidates for each officer position. If only two applicants run for that position, each applicant will automatically be placed on the General Election ballot as a candidate.

When can I submit application for candidacy?

Officially this is done at the Caucus by being nominated and submitting the required application by the deadline date.

If I can't attend the Caucus, can I still

submit my application to be a candidate? Yes. You will need to complete a petition and submit the required application by the deadline date.

How long do I have to submit an application to become a candidate?

All applications are due by 4:30 p.m. five (5) business days after the Caucus. This deadline date will be noticed in the Caucus mail-out.

When is the General Election?

Excerpt from Oneida Election Law: **2.9. Election Process**

Section A. Polling Places and Times

2.9-1. In accordance with Article III, Section 4 of the Tribal Constitution, elections shall be held in the month of July on a date set by the General Tribal Council. The General Tribal Council shall set the election date at the January annual meeting, or at the first GTC meeting held during a given year.

When can I begin campaigning?

Whenever you wish.

Excerpt from Oneida Election Law: **2.5-9**. Campaign Signs and Campaigning: (a) Placement of campaign signs:

- (1) Campaign signs shall not be posted or erected on any Tribal property except for private property with the owner/tenant's permission.
- (2) No campaign sign shall exceed sixteen (16) square feet in area. A maximum of seven (7) such signs may be placed on a building or on a lot.
- (3) No campaign sign shall project beyond the property line into the public right of wav.
- (b) Removal of campaign signs. All campaign signs shall be removed within five (5) business days after an election.
- (c) Employees of the Tribe shall not engage in campaigning for Tribal offices during work hours. Tribal employees shall be subject to disciplinary action under the personnel policies and procedures for political campaigning during work hours.
- (d) Enforcement. The Zoning Administrator shall cause to be removed any campaign signs that are not in compliance with this law, in accordance with the Zoning and Shoreland Protection Law.
- (e) Fines. Violation of the campaign sign restrictions shall result in a fine imposed by the Election Board in an amount specified in a resolution adopted by the Business Committee.

Can I vote by absentee ballot?

No. Article III Section 2 of the Constitution

No. Write-in candidates are not allowed. When will the Caucus be held?

In February or March of 2011 depending on which timetable the GTC chooses at the Annual GTC Meeting in January, 2011 (per the Oneida Election Law).

Is the Caucus just for vacancies within the Business Committee?

No, the Caucus will be for ALL vacancies of all boards, committees, and commissions with elected positions to be filled at the 2011 General Election.

SALAMANCA, N.Y. $(AP) \sim Seneca Nation$ Indians are asking federal officials to reject a deal that would allow a Wisconsin tribe run a casino in the Catskills.

President Seneca Robert Odawi Porter recently wrote a letter to U.S. Secretary of the Interior Ken Salazar saying the deal sought by the Stockbridge-Munsee Band of Mohicans would be bad public policy and likely unlawful.

The casino proposal and a complementary settlement of a Mohican land claim in central New York are championed by Sen. Charles Schumer and other offi-

cials who believe a casino near the lucrative New York City market will boost the economy of the old Borscht Belt.

But the Senecas and the Oneidas, which each run casinos in New York, have denounced the deal. It's unclear when Interior officials will make a decision.

Winfrey said her community opposes any moves to undo the current moratorium and still is waiting for the federal government to find a place to store spent nuclear fuel, including thousands of tons near their homes.

"A Nation within a Nation: Voices of the Oneidas in Wisconsin" first-person gathers accounts, biographical essays, and scholars' investigations focusing on the period of 1900-1969.

In the wake of removal from their native New York, the Oneida people settled near what is now Green Bay, on 65,000 acres of commonly held land. Through the Transition Incentives Program (TIP), producers with land for sale or lease are introduced to qualified beginning or socially disadvantaged farmers and ranchers who want to buy or rent

land for their operations. TIP provides up to two additional Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) annual rental payments to a retired or retiring owner or operator with an expiring CRP contract. To qualify, the landowner must sell or lease the CRP land to a beginning or socially disadvantaged farmer or rancher so the new operator can convert some or all of the land to production using sustainable grazing or crop production methods. For beginning and

socially disadvantaged farmers or ranchers who cannot qualify for conventional credit, FSA offers financing as well. FSA makes direct loans and guaranteed loans made by conventional farm lenders to finance the purchase and operation of a farm. Each fiscal year, the agency targets a significant portion

of its direct and guaranteed farm ownership and operating loan funds to beginning and socially disadvantaged farmers or ranchers. In addition to the funding reserves, FSA operates a special "down payment" loan program to assist socially disadvantaged and beginning farmers in purchasing a farm. Fish, frogs and other aquatic wildlife use submerged trees for food and cover, but DNR officials say fewer trees are falling in the lakes. The agency says more shoreline lawns have meant fewer trees and shoreline

property owners tend to clean up fallen trees.

The so-called "Fish Sticks" project calls for the DNR, property owners and conservation groups to anchor fallen trees to shore in Upper St. Croix Lake in Douglas County and in Upper Eau Claire, Shunenberg and Devils lakes in Bayfield County. When ice on the lakes melts, the trees will sink.

Work is expected to begin this month.

Over the years we have seen tribal youth become more entrenched in the justice system. In 2001 as group of individuals from different departments got together Great Law. We also looked at current situation where youth were getting involved with law enforcement and courts. Here we found that often youth who were getting in trouble in the community were not successful in school and youth getting in trouble in school weren't successful in the community. We therefore looked to develop early intervention strategies in schools and in the community. First we began with Shasakotinikuhlaslunihe, (saw-saw-go-dee-neegoo-lah-sloo-nee-heh), those who gather around to readdress their minds early intervention community teams. The we looked at Yethyatanunha, (yea-tee-ya, da-noon-

hah), we are watching over them a program for youth who are not succeeding in traditional schools. We are now looking at building a stronger community of support through you.

In order to give you more information and to have an opportunity to share (good ideas), while having fun (a social dance) and enjoying a meal (good food), we are having a community dinner on January 24 at Parish Hall at 5:30 pm. Review Contracts Before Making Any Commitments In The New Year

MADISON - The start of a new year often means the start, or at least intentions, of a healthier lifestyle for many Wisconsin consumers. The Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection encourages consumers to do their homework before signing a contract, or making an upfront payment to a fitness or weight reduction center.

"The exciting prospect of a 'new you' can cloud a consumer's better judgment," said Michelle Reinen, Director of the Bureau of Consumer Protection. "Take the time to visit different centers. Compare the programs, facilities and membership fees before entering into any agreement. If you are going to put more than \$100 down or consider paying in full, verify the center has proof of financial responsibility on file with Consumer Protection."

When in doubt, consider a short-term membership to begin with; don't be persuaded to purchase an expensive long-term program unless you are sure you will stay with it. Consumers sometimes feel pressured by persuasive sales techniques.

Wisconsin consumers are protected by state laws regulating both fitness and weight reduction centers.

Fitness Centers

Memberships cannot be sold for a period greater than two years. All memberships must have an expiration date. If a center collects more than \$100, in advance of providing services, it is required to have a \$25,000 form of financial responsibility filed with the state. The law includes specific contract and staff requirements. In addition, Wisconsin law requires fitness center contracts to include a three-day right to cancel. Consumers regretting a membership purchase must put their cancellation request in writing.

Weight Reduction Centers

Memberships cannot exceed two years; unless the contract includes a weight maintenance program. In this case, the contract can be extended to a period not to exceed three years. The full price of the membership must

Vaccine Preventable **Disease of the Month**

Pertussis (whooping cough) can cause serious illness in infants, children and adults. The disease usually starts with cold-like symptoms and maybe a mild cough or fever. After 1 to 2 weeks, severe coughing can begin. Unlike the common cold, pertussis can become a series of coughing fits that contin-

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ues for weeks. Early symptoms can last for 1 to 2 weeks and usually include:

- Runny nose
- Low-grade fever (generally minimal throughout the course of the disease)
- Mild, occasional cough • Apnea – a pause in breathing (in infants)

As the disease progresses, the traditional symptoms of pertussis appear and include:

- Paroxysms (fits) of many, rapid coughs followed by a highpitched "whoop"
- Vomiting (throwing up) • Exhaustion (very tired) after coughing fits

The best way to prevent pertussis (whooping cough) among infants, children, teens, and adults is to get vaccinated. Also, keep infants and other people at high risk for pertussis complications away from infected people.

In the United States, the recommended pertussis vaccine for infants and children is called DTaP. This is a combination vaccine that protects against three diseases: diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis. For maximum protection against pertussis, children need five DTaP shots. The first three shots are given at 2, 4, and 6 months of age. The fourth shot is given between 15 and 18 months of age, and a fifth shot is given before a child enters school, at 4-6 years of age. Parents can also help protect infants by keeping them away as much as possible from anyone who has cold symptoms or is coughing.

Vaccine protection for pertussis, tetanus and diphtheria fades with

time. Before 2005, the only booster available contained protection against tetanus and diphtheria (called Td), and was recommended for teens and adults every 10 years. Today there are boosters for pre-teens, teens and adults that contain protection against tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis (Tdap). Preteens going to the doctor for their regular check-up at age 11 or 12 years should get a dose of Tdap. Teens who did not get this vaccine at the 11or 12-year-old check-up should get vaccinated at their next visit. Adults who did not get Tdap as a pre-teen or teen should get one dose of Tdap instead of the Td booster.

Most pregnant women who were not previously vaccinated with Tdap should get one dose of Tdap postpartum before leaving the hospital or birthing center. Getting vaccinated with Tdap is especially important for families with and caregivers of new infants.

The easiest thing for adults to do is to get Tdap instead of their next regular tetanus boosterthat Td shot that they were supposed to get every 10 years. The dose of Tdap can be given earlier than the 10-year mark, so it is a good idea for adults to talk to a healthcare provider about what is best for their specific situation.

WASHINGTON Certain combat Veterans who were discharged from active duty service before Jan. 28, 2003 have until Jan. 27, 2011 to take advantage of their enhanced health care enrollment opportunity through the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA).

"While there is no time limit for Veterans to apply for the VA health care they earned with their service, I highly encourage this group of combat Veterans to take advantage of the enhanced enrollment window to use their health care benefits through this simplified process," said Secretary of Veterans Affairs Eric K. Shinseki. "VA has health care eligibility specialists online and at every medical center eager to help Veterans take advantage of this opportunity."

The enhanced enrollment window was provided for in Public Law 110-181, the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2008. That law gave combat Veterans who served after Nov. 11, 1998 but separated from service before Jan. 28, 2003, and did not enroll before Jan. 28, 2008, three years, beginning on Jan. 28, 2008, to apply for the enhanced enrollment opportunity.

These Veterans will still be able to apply for health benefits with VA after Jan. 27, but will have their status for receiving VA health care determined under normal VA procedures that base health care priority status on the severity of a service-connected disability or other eligibility factors. This would mean

some Veterans could face income or asset-based restrictions, as well as delays in establishing their VA health care eligibility while their disability status is determined.

Since the inception of the enhanced enrollment opportunity, VA has sent more than 750,000 personal letters to eligible Veterans and hosted thousands of outreach efforts through OIF/OEF and enrollment coordinators stationed at every VA medical center.

Since June 2010, VA sent another 194,000 personal letters to give every eligible Veteran a chance to take advantage of this opportunity, but to date only 13,000 of these Veterans have enrolled.

The law does continue to provide the enhanced health care enrollment window to combat Veterans who were discharged or released from active service on or after January 28, 2003. For these Veterans, the fiveyear enrollment period begins on the discharge or separation date of the service member from active duty military service, or in the case of multiple call-ups, the most recent discharge date.

Oneida The Community Health Center's Diabetic team received federal grant money to help individual's manage their diabetes. The epidemic of Type 2 diabetes in Tribal communities is associated with decreasing levels of physical activity and an increasing prevalence of obesity. Promoting physical activity is a crucial component of the management of type 2 diabetes. The Oneida Community Health Center (OCHC) Diabetes Team partnered with Oneida Adventures to offer patients with diabetes an opportunity to make snow shoes. Maraget VanDen Heuvel from the Diabetic Team worked with her team to evaluate the individuals and Kip Miller and Mark Steinbach from the Oneida Adventure proprovided the gram instruction on how to tie the snowshoes. The collaboration was an effort to increase physical activity, which is one of the goals of the OCHC Diabetes Team. Physical activity is anything that gets a person moving if performed on a regular basis, at the right intensity. Physical activity can have a positive effect on body composition, heart health, flexibility, and strength. Most importantly, physical activity

can have a direct impact on improving blood sugar control. The

Oneida Adventure program strives to provide programs that help people use adventure based activities as a way to learn about themselves in a fun and challenging way. When participants learn the art of snowshoe tying, they will quickly realize the importance of following a well-prescribed plan on correctly tying the patterns. If

one small step is missed, it may not be notice until later. Even though missing a step may have little impact on the structural/safety of the shoe, it does affect the lacing strength and durability. Experientially this can teach participants about the importance of following a well-prescribed plan to manage their dia-The Oneida betes. Adventure program is doing a similar program with the teens in the community through а Prevention grant administrated by Kristen Shaw, Prevention Specialist, Health Behavioral Department. The focus is on getting the kids involved in healthy, physical activities which will hopefully lead to making better choices after school. The experiential approach is very effective in teaching



teens important life lessons. The staff applies concepts to prevention and how they relate to following steps to tying the snowshoes. This activity can be very challenging and requires the individual to develop some patience, which is a great life lesson to learn.

Snowshoeing is a fun, inexpensive and an active way to get outdoors and enjoy nature in a beautiful setting. It's very easy to learn and a cardiovascular great workout, along with being an entertaining activity. social The Adventure Oneida Program has been working with the Diabetic team the past couple of years providing lifelong recreational opportunities for individuals who may qualify for the diabetic team program.

Several years ago a church restoration company was asked to give the Holy Apostles Church authorities an estimate as to what it would cost to fix the many areas of depreciation the church experiencing. was/is Over the years Holy Apostles has had various

touch up areas fixed and some are still holding. However, the major structure of the church is in dire need of repair, not only for liability purposes but for the longevity of the church itself.

As mentioned in the last issue of the Kali a core group of individuals are moving forward to recruit more members to help Save Our Sanctuary (SOS). We want Oneida People to understand that

this effort is inclusive of all Oneidas, full well knowing that after coming to Wisconsin Oneida members traveled different roads in their spiritual journeys. In the meantime Holy Apostles stands as a reverent reflection of the love the Oneida had/have for an awesome God or Creator.

The CRC (Church Restoration Committee) has extensive documentation on the repairs which are critically needed. The restoration we refer to will be done in approximately twelve phases; nine on the outside and four within. The most critical will be addressed first. Also, as mentioned, the consultants who specialize in church restoration, have expert experience in this field. The CRC has set a goal of approximately two mildollars which lion includes maintenance of

the structure. We are not talking about church services nor pay for clergy.

This past week while hanging the cedar boughs made by church members two of the gentlemen who climbed into the church rafters took note and pictures of the openings on the roof which allowed them to see straight out to the sky.

As Oneidas we often refer to our history and when we look around (here in Oneida) we see a few remnants of that history, some preserved at the Cultural Heritage site. However, one of the greatest historical structures, built by our people and protected by Her

stands tall and proud on Freedom Road.

We have come a long way as a community, our ancestors should have had it so easy. They labored hard and long to quarry the stone, haul it by horse and buggy and then build it. That was then, this is now. Can we who have so much, neglect the work and love of our last seven generations of ancestors?

Restoration fund raising plans are in process and we will put forward our best efforts to save this historical, cultural monument built by our people, we hope and pray there will come others to help us in this cause.



he early years... Stone hurch: 'I

Apostles Episcopal Church is often referred to as "the big stone church" - she is a church whose history in interwoven with all Oneida People whose ancestors migrated here in Wisconsin from New York. Our connection goes back over three hundred years ago when the Oneidas worked with the Queen of England who in turn sent missionaries through The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel.

Ultimately the Oneida Indian Mission was built in 1702. During that time the missionaries helped the Oneida translate their songs and prayers into the Mohawk language to better understand the Christian religion.

During the 1700's the Oneida faced some very difficult times; the French and Indian War, The Revolutionary War, the split in the Confederacy and the forever land hungry colonists. The US government was (and still is

not) a friend to Indian Country. There is not doubt in my mind that most Oneidas have no clue about the incredible hardships suffered by our ancestors.

In the early 1800's many Oneida moved West to Wisconsin Territory and settled at Duck Creek, no easy task. In 1838, once settled, they built a small wooden church (such was there dedication to their Creator/God). Bishop Kemper traveled to Oneida to consecrate the new church and thus it is the first consecrated Episcopal Church in the Territory of Wisconsin; September 1839.

The Oneida had barely settled into their new homes when the government was seeking to move all Indians west of the Mississippi, this away the prosperity has included some very prominent "Green Bay Men" as referred to in some of the history written by Oneida authors. The Episcopal Oneida Indian Mission had some great Oneida leaders who

were supported by the missionaries and were able to old the ground (reservation) and prevent the removal - again, no easy task. The Church and Her missionaries are part and parcel of our Oneida History, they fought the good fight right along side our ancestors.

That was then, this is now. I often use or over use the quote by Charles Dickens in his book, The Tale of Two Cities: "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times". The "Big Stone Church" stands in the middle of our reservation as a reminder about our history and our ancestors who with much love, sweat and tears built her. However, as our community grows more prosperidle with so much to be thankful for and not preserve this beautiful historical structure. An organization has been formed which we call CRC (for Church Restoration Committee). The goal or object of this committee is to seek and find ways to restore the Church and make sure it is maintained for all posterity, this is our only mission. We hope there will be others who will join us, those who will contribute in any way they can. We are made up of church members and community people - religion is not the basis. We met every Thursday evening in the former convent building on the church property at 5:00 pm.

Future plans include a series of articles outlining the history of the Oneida Mission and the Oneida People.
