Economic downturn leads to increased readership for Oneida Community Library

Not many public operations will see an increase in business during an economic recession. Especially a recession as broad and far reaching as the one the US Economy and other global markets have just weathered. For some operations it actually makes sense that business will increase and will do so with no direct increase in costs. The Oneida Public Library is such and enterprise and it has seen double-digit gains in both readership and circulation in the last 12 months.

Oneida Community Librarian, Kymberly Pelky, said, "The amount of people with cards has library increased 35% and the number of books circulated is up about 20%. Last year we had just a bit over 8000 items checked out and this year it was 11,187."

In addition to increased readership, the library's collection has also grown.

"We were able to increase our collection last year...we are up to 32,000 items now between the two libraries," Pelky said.

The main library, The Oneida Community Library, is located on Elm Street just east of the Duck Creek Bridge on Hwy 54 and the second location, the Green

Earth Branch Library, is located on Redtail Drive off of Hwy H in the Green Earth Mobile Home Park.

The Green Earth Branch serves as a public library branch to Outagamie County in accordance with a money, but coming Agreement Service between the Oneida Tribe of Indians and

Outagamie County that was signed on 10 March 2006.

The Library has also seen an increase in activity from both the daycares and Head Start programs.

"Field trips cost down to the library is nothing more than making sure you have

the bus. And it's still just as exciting for the kids, and the kids are asking when they can come back again,' Pelky said.

The library has always been an after school destination for children, but since the economic downturn,

Oneida Artists Contribute to Hwy 41 Project

In Brown County, the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (DOT) is expanding Highway 41 from DePere to Suamico along the eastern side of the Oneida Indian reservation. The DOT is using the Community Sensitive Design (CSD) concept to include the artistic and cultural values of each community in the designs of the highway expansion project.

The CSD designs from Oneida artists will be on display the morning of Saturday, Jan. 30, 2010 at Oneida Nation the Elementary School, (Turtle School), Oneida, Wisconsin, for public review. The DOT worked along with representatives of several Oneida Tribal departments on the CSD Core Team to coordinate this project. The DOT and CSD Core Team will accept comments from Tribal members about the designs prior to the GTC meeting.

The DOT indicated five highway locations for Oneida artists to create designs on highway structural elements. Those locations include the Hwy 41 overpasses in Pamperin Park, in Howard, north of Home Depot, the junction of Hwy 41 and W. Mason St, and the junction of Hwy 41 and 172.

"In March 2009, the CSD for the US 41 expansion effort in Brown County began. CSD is a process that has been used in other communities to 'weave' the transportation project into the community's architectural, cultural, historical and environmental fabric. The design of retaining walls, bridges and sound walls will reflect colors, materials, patterns and architectural details that give Brown County its special visual character," according to the DOT public information office.

It was a long process of cooperation and consensus for the Oneida artists who volunteered their time to participate in this project. Works of public art with a tribal influence is a common sight in the Southwest, but not very common in the Midwest. Oneida has a unique opportunity to infuse tribal designs into public works of art in the Highway 41 expansion project.

Background

Last spring, after the first round of meetings in local communities, city representatives noticed there weren't any representatives from the Oneida Nation. The DOT promptly invited the Oneida Business

Committee, who in turn designated other Oneida staff and professionals to join in the CSD efforts for the Highway 41 expansion.

In April of 2009, the CSD Core Team was told they had four months to complete CSD designs reflective of the Oneida artistic and cultural values for the expansion project. Included in the CSD Core Team are the Oneida Legislative Affairs Office, Planning Dept., Environmental Dept., Cultural Heritage, Tourism, and the Oneida Nation Arts Program. Although the Oneida people were invited last to the table with the DOT for the Highway 41 project, the Oneida artists are now far ahead of other communities in completing their designs. Many Tribal artists were invited and contributed their time and talent to this project through the spring, summer and fall. Eventually, a core group of Oneida artists became committed to the project and worked together to create thoughtful designs that reflect and represent the Oneida community.

Tribal Services Addressed In Service Agreements

In the last edition of the Kalihwisaks, the Law Office outlined the basic components of the Service Agreements with the City of Green Bay. This week's article will focus on the governmental services addressed in the Service Agreements with the City and Brown County.

Under the payment formula 1n Service Agreements with the City and the County, the Tribe pays for municipal services which benefit non-governmental trust properties, and the Tribe receives credits for services it provides. The formula begins with the determination of the value of the non-governmental tribal trust property. This value is then viewed as a percentage of value of all property in the municipality. For instance, if the value of tribal trust property were \$1, and the value of all property in the municipality were \$100, the percentage would be 1%. The percentage is applied to each municipal budget line item to determine the Tribe's share of the cost of each governmental

service. Finally, the Tribe receives credits for specific line items if the Tribe provides similar services.

For example, in the Service Agreement with County, Brown the County expends approximately \$1,426,205 for administrative costs. If the Tribe's non-government trust property were taxable, in theory, the Tribe's approximate share of this budget line item would be \$13,905. However, because the Tribe has its own administrative expenses, the Tribe and the County have agreed that the Tribe is entitled to a 100% credit for that line item. Similarly, the Tribe receives a 50% credit for the line item dedicated to the County Sheriff, recognizing the Tribe's contributions to the community through the Oneida Police Department while also recognizing the benefit the Tribe realizes from the County Sheriff. The Tribe provides services to Tribal members, including health care, elderly care, social services, housing, public works, waste and recvcling pickup, and education, and receives credits for these services under

the Service Agreements. The Tribe also provides services to all residents of the Oneida Reservation, and receives credits for them. These services include police protection, parks and recreation areas, cultural events, library, hunting permits, wetland/woodland/habitat restoration, public transportation and utility services. In making these services available to tribal members and to residents of the Reservation, the Tribe decreases the cost to other local governments

of providing services.

The Tribe looks forward to entering into new and renewed Service Agreements with other local governments that are willing to negotiate in good faith and recognize the value of working with the Tribe on a government-to-government basis to provide for the common benefit of everyone in our commu-

Oneida Trust Scholarship Amendments

On December 30, 2009, the Oneida Business Committee (OBC) approved resolution #12-30-09-A, Amendments to the Oneida Trust Scholarship Fund Policy.

The Oneida Trust Scholarship Fund provides financial assistance scholarships to assist eli-Oneida Tribal gible members in securing higher educational opportunities, by providing funds for expenses that are not covered by the Higher Education Scholarship - including pre-requisite credited classes, post-graduate preparation and admission exams, or related preparatory courses.

The amendments were

The OBC will be allowed to fill vacancies based on the need of the Election board, rather than being automatically required to fill a vacancy.

- Candidates for the Business Committee and Appeals Commission may only run for one position.
- Once a candidate has been determined eligible to run for office, the candidate's name and the position he or she is seeking will become a public record, and may be made available to the public by the Election Board.
- A provision addressing nepotism is deleted, since the Code of Ethics Law sufficiently addresses nepotism.

submitted by the Trust/EnrollmentCommittee, and made two basic changes to the policy:

- The amount of the scholarship was increased from \$2500 to \$3000.
- The payment was changed to a "life-time" payment, instead of a "one-time" payment. This means an applicant can receive the \$3000 over the course of their lifetime, instead of only receiving a onetime scholarship of up to \$2500.

Election Law Amendments

On January 4, 2010, the Oneida Business Committee approved resolution #1-04-10-A, Amended Election Law.

The law was amended after a referral from the General Tribal Council, which directed the Tribe to provide comprehensive amendments to the Election Law, so that the law could be updated and improved where necessary. Changes include:

- The Election Board will be reduced from 12 to 9 members.
- Members of the Election Board shall be elected, no longer selected at a caucus.
- Provisions are added to address the filling of a vacancy on the Board.

ducting candidate debates are deleted, as it was determined these did not belong in the law.

• A provision for a swearing-in date is added. Unless otherwise provided, newly elected officials must be sworn into office no later than 30 calendar days after the official results of an election are declared by the OBC.

The Tribes of Wisconsin are very fortunate to have a relationship with the Governor and his administration that allows us to work together and improve the services to the communities we represent. In November I attended a consultation session with Secretary Timberlake for Department the of

Health Services. Health care is changing on the federal level and is going to have an impact on the State. Tribes must plan from both perspectives. While there are many aspects to this discussion, the primary focus for now has been long term care and Medicaid reimbursement to the Tribes for those services. Secretary The has assured us that billing reimbursements should take place at the start of the New Year. It is too soon to know what this will mean to us in additional revenue but I know it will be an increase to what we

presently are getting. Once again some very informative discussion took place at the Annual meeting on January 4. At points, it may have gotten a little contentious but overall the tone of meetings the has improved greatly. Just being in an environment where you are able to listen helps to be able to learn more about the Tribe and its government. Oneida is a very large and complex operation that is difficult to absorb in a brief setting.

Our next meeting will be dealing with the annual budget. Since our fiscal year began on October 1, it is very important to adopt a plan for the fiscal spending. Community meetings will be held and the document will be available at the Library and in the Committee Office for review by any Tribal Member wishing to see more detail. Many years ago, the General Tribal Council passed a resolution prohibiting the publication of any financial material. I'm sure the reasons at the time were valid because of the detrimental impact the disclosure could have on the Tribe but there is discussion about that action needing to be changed. Having parties knowing too much about our affairs was one of the reasons this was done. We were negotiating the Gaming Compact with the State of Wisconsin and service agreements

with the local municipalities. Some of that still occurs and what needs to be determined before changing that practice is, will the release of the information to the community at large make it more difficult for the Tribe to make reasonably beneficial agreements with non-tribal entities doing business with the Tribe? Perhaps there is another option that will provide the Membership with the access to information needed without making it openly accessible to the community at large. I don't have an answer. I just know more discussion needs to occur prior to making the next move.



Sticking to the thoughts around fiscal matters, I come back to the annual budget. There is a lot of information in those documents. It is not really possible to get a good understanding of the program or department or service by just looking at those numbers. I see them on a regular basis and still need to ask questions of the director/manager about utilization of funds. We attempt to provide this information when the annual narrative reports are given but it is still way too much to get at one setting. All I can suggest is for the GTC to take advantage of any opportunity to ask your questions.

succeed. OTIE was chartered a few years ago and has received all certifications required through SBA (Small the Business Administration) for a minority/Tribally owned engineering firm.

The purchase of an engineering firm happened in late 2008. That purchase is the \$6.2 million that the treasurer referred to in her report at the GTC's annual meeting on. That purchase was necessary to allow the growth of OTIE at a faster pace then if we had not. The original purchase of the engineering firm was with the Bank of America line of credit. This money was originally loaned to OTIE from the Nation. Later it was brought to our attention that the classification of this loan on OTIE books would preclude OTIE from getting Contracts because the balance sheets would not look good. We asked

> was that we were able to convert the loan to equity. Payment for accessing the Nations line of credit will be made by OTIE's annual distribution of profits to the Nation. OTIE already repaid \$132,000 back to the Nation which equates to about 21% return on investment after about 10

months of operation. On another positive note, the Chairman has convened a group of management and BC members to formulate a plan on how to generate more revenue for the Nation. This group is assessing what we have that already works and how to expand as well as looking at new ideas to further diversify the Nation's revenue. We welcome any suggestions from the community. We have received some ideas and are presently discussing all options on the table. I am optimistic that with working everyone

together, we can make our Nation stronger then it has ever been. At this time I would

like to commend Councilwoman Trish King for pushing what I hope to be a very positive benefit for Oneida citizens, a Tax free per capita. She has asked for a legal opinion and further research. On another note, the budget meeting is fast approaching. I would like to thank the budget team and all the managers who have put forth their program/division budgets. Due to this year's new budget process, the GTC has yet to see and consider the new budget. There is no one person to blame for the tardiness of the budget. As a BC member, I felt the need to know the what, how, and why, the budget is what it is. This was a long dif-

diligence is done.

ficult process. We also needed to identify additional cuts, as gaming was not performing to projection. On the upside, Oneida Retail out performed 2009 projections. Great work Retail! I would also like to thank the Treasurer for bringing forth the idea of a three year budget planning cycle. This assists all areas of our Nation to plan more diligently.

However, although I know and understand all the hard work that has been done on the budget proposal, I cannot support it. I cannot support our Nation's budget without money for land acquisition. In 1998, our GTC approved a 20/20 land acquisition plan that directed the reacquisition of 51% of the Nation's Territory within ten years - by 2008. According to a legal opinion by the Oneida Law Office, the funding component of this resolution has expired. This was not brought to BC attention until the majority of the budget work was done. I am a strong advocate for Land acquisition, environmental quality, as well as social and economic health. This budget proposal does not speak to my core values and does not align with the Nation's core values of protecting sovereignty and reacquiring our territory, our Land.

Sovereignty has four main components Land, Р e o p l e Language/Culture, and Government. Without the land our people won't have a place to live, they won't have a place to work, nor will they have a place for recreation. Without our people, the Nation will have no Language/Culture. Without our Language/Culture we have nothing that defines us as unique from any other people on Mother Earth. If we are no longer unique, we no longer require our own government.

We are the original caretakers of this great turtle island now known as North America. We as individuals have a great responsibility to ourselves, our families, our community, our Oneida Nation. We also have a distinct responsibility to our Mother the Earth to protect and ensure that she is well taken care of. Our unique culture, government, and way of life naturally carry out that responsibility and through that we will continue to flourish. who shared his constable stories with him. Ted worked 29 years for the Brown County Sheriff's Department, 2 years for the Oneida Police Department (OPD) and 20 years for Oneida Security.

"It was something I wanted to do as a child, either a policeman or fireman," he said.

Ted carried on his grandfather's mentoring ways with his cousin Larry Jordan.

"When I was a little

fellow, I wanted to be a soldier or something, but I never thought I'd be a police officer, but I was always mentored by Ted here," said Larry.

"I was always telling him 'you can do it, Larry," added Ted.

Larry's nephew Brian Jordan followed a similar path to police work. Originally, Brian worked in security to save money for school, and would often run into friends and family police officers on the job.

"Seeing them and what they do, every time they'd come into the casino and just how people looked up to people and the brotherhood, always helping out, got me hooked a little bit," said Brian who worked nearly five years at OPD and has been with the Green Bay Police Department for nine and half years.

The family members compared the changes to police training and equipment over the span of their lifetimes.

"We've seen it change so much over those years from when we were young to where we are now," said Ted.

"Dad said the same thing to me," added Larry. "We came from the horse and buggy to

flying to the moon, and he says the tribe being in a poverty state to going to prosperous."

"They've been there for me when I was babysitting and my grandchild Kegan almost died, and I think Larry was the first one at Heidi's house. They come in and you just feel confident, you just feel safe that they're going to do their job and take care of things," she said.

Red Lake band opens new casino on reservation

Grand Opening set for this weekend

RED LAKE, Minn. (AP) – The Red Lake Band of Ojibwe is opening a new casino, hotel and conference center on the reservation in northwestern Minnesota this week.

Grand opening events take place Thursday through Saturday.

According to a statement from the band, the casino was built with all-Indian funds. Instead of going to a traditional bank, Red Lake officials borrowed \$31 million from the Shakopee Mdewakanton Dakota Community, which runs Mystic Lake casino.

The Red Lake band will run the casino, which features a swooping eagle sculpture with a 30-foot wingspan. The new hotel will have 40 rooms, and a swimming pool carved in the shape of Upper and Lower Red Lake. The restaurant will seat 75, and an additional 25 on an outdoor patio in good weather. It will serve local walleye.

The gaming hall has 300 slot machines, four blackjack tables and two poker tables.

Special for the Kalihwisaks For decades our nation has had helping hands spread far and wide for our members, and it all began with a simple goal; to provide opportunities for growth in our community. The Oneida Social Services Department's mission statement reads: It is the mission of the Oneida Nation's Social Services Department to strengthen and empower Oneida Families, to maximize their potential for physical, emotional, spiritual and intellectual well being for the next seven generations. This statement is put simply, but has many complex elements to it that have developed throughout the years from a community based initiative to help one another, and will continue to grow for years to come.

Many community members view Oneida Social Services as a place to go when they are in need of assistance. They are correct, but there seems to be a "what can Oneida do for me men-

tality". Social Services is more then just assistance, Oneida Social Services promotes a "what can Oneida do to help me, help myself" mentality, which brings us to the Center for Self Sufficiency (CSS). Vision: An Exceptional team guiding families to achieve success. Mission: With respect and encouragement, we provide essential services and resources focusing on self sufficiency.

Since its inception, the CSS has been involved in diligent efforts to find both funding and human resources for the work that it takes to provide assistance in the many forms that they do. Based on specific eligibility requirements on a case by case scenario, Oneida tribal members can seek help from anything like paying bills to employment job skills training. You never know when emergencies will take place, so the CSS has made it a goal to be there for those who see them so they can stay on their feet, or get back on them if need be. In any case, this is, again, a means to help members help themselves, so the

Hopefully you know we will be hosting the Annual Home 3rd Resource Fair on February 10, 2010, at the Vets Building from 2-6pm. This will be an interactive way to learn more about: buying a home, leasing land, home construction, mortgages, permitting, home efficiency, renewable energy, home maintenance, buyer beware topics, composting, healthy homes, and much more. We'd like to share another real life success stories

of people here in Oneida, who are saving energy and money.

We interviewed Manthe, Laura Environmental Resource Board Director, and this is what she told us:

Q: When did you start your efforts with making your home efficient?

Ten years ago we built an Energy Star Home and installed a solar hot water system during construction.

Q: What got you interested?

Attending the Midwest Renewable Energy Association Fair each June in Custer, WI and reading about energy issues on my favorite environmental website www.Grist.com.

Q: What steps have you taken towards energy efficiency?

One key step we took was getting a Home Performance Test. A trained profession came to my home and assessed how efficient it is. The information about my house was valuable because I learned about my house, determined what I should do first, and what was the best use of my dollars. That was invaluable.

We installed a programmable thermostat that goes down to 63 degrees at night and when I'm not at home. We invest in energy star appliances and get tips from Consumers Reports on for the best products to save energy. We use power strips for the entertainment center and turn it off when not in use, to cut all energy to

the TV and computer. We also unplug the toaster and microwave when not in use. We have compact fluorescent lights (CFL) in every light fixture lighting because accounts for about 20% of the average home's electric bill. CFLs use about 75% less energy than a standard bulb and they come in globes, 3way and dimmable. Lifetime savings for just one CFL are approximately \$30-40 compared to one incandescent bulb. Q: Have you seen

results? How?

Hard to say because we have always had low energy bills and the variability of the weather during summer and winter doesn't make for an easy comparison. We are definitely saving propane in the winter, because on a sunny day, the solar thermal air system is

blowing about 70-75°F air into the house during the day, and the Energy Star Home is efficient at keeping the warm air inside.

Q: What renewable energy systems do you have?

We have Solar Hot Water, Solar Electric (PV), Solar Thermal Air. Wend welcome visitors who are interested in learning more about the systems, the costs, and the available rebates and tax incentives.

Q: How do you feel about the projects you have done so far?

Great!. Love the solar heat- on a sunny day in the winter it keeps the house warm for hours after the sun goes down! *Q*: *What is next for you?*

I still need to make window quilts (keeps the heat in during winter and cooler air in during summer), add extra insulation to attic, and foam insulation in the sill boxes. Every home is a continues improvement project and the best place to start is by having a Home Performance Test done to assess how your home is balanced between the human, mechanical and structural systems.

This year's program also will include two Faculty and Student

1984 – AFDC (Aid for Dependent Families) and Food Stamps was contracted with the State so both RNIP and AFDC were relocated to the Tribal Bldg on Fish Creek/Cty H. Staff consisted of the Director, one Clerk Typist, two eligibility case workers, one Energy Assistance case worker, one RNIP case worker

1991 – Community Support, formerly administered by the BC, was transferred to the Social Services Dept. located in the North wing of the Norbert Hill Center

FDA debates tougher cancer warning on tanning beds

WASHINGTON (AP) ~ Just as millions head to tanning beds to prepare for spring break, the Food and Drug Administration will be debating how to toughen warnings that those sunlamps pose a cancer risk.

Yes, sunburns are particularly dangerous. But there's increasing scientific consensus that there's no such thing as a safe tan, either.

This is a message that Katie Donnar, 18, dismissed until a year ago when, preparing for the Miss Indiana pageant, she discovered a growth on her leg - an earlystage melanoma, the most dangerous form of skin cancer.

She can't prove tanning beds are to blame, but started using them as a sixth-grade cheerleader, says she stepped every other day during parts of high school, and at one point even owned one. No more.

"It seemed somewhat of a myth that I was putting myself at risk," Donnar, says of Bruceville, Ind., who found the melanoma before it spread.

"The warning label was so small, nothing to make me stop and think. 'This is real,'" she said of the tanning bed.

The World Health Organization's cancer division last summer listed tanning beds as definitive cancer-causers, right alongside the ultraviolet radiation that both they and the sun emit. They'd long been considered "probable" carcinogens, but what tipped the scales: An analysis of numerous studies that concluded the risk of melanoma jumps by 75

used tanning beds in their teens and 20s.

Next comes the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, which has long regulated tanning beds as "Class I devices," a category of low-risk medical devices that includes bandages. Tanning beds do bear some warnings about the cancer link, but the FDA recently decided those labels aren't visible enough to consumers and don't fully convey the risk, especially to young people.

So in March, the FDA's scientific advisers open a public hearing to explore stricter tanning bed regulation, both stiffer warnings and reclassifying them to allow other steps.

"We don't recommend using them at all, but we know people do use them so we want to make them as low-risk as possible,"

under the bulbs about percent in people who says FDA UV radiation removed specialist Sharon Miller.

The Indoor Tanning alreadv Association, fighting pending legislation that would tax tanning salons to help pay for Congress' health care overhaul, argues there's no new science to justify increased FDA regulation. Any risk is to people who overdo it, says ITA President Dan Humiston. arguing that's easier to do in the sun.

The industry is open to some change in warning labels, Humiston says, to ensure customers "understand the whole process, so there's no chance they could be overexposed, no chance they could get a sunburn."

But the FDA also says some people go too often, using tanning beds three times a week, for when example, its research shows once a week would provide visually the same tan.

The tanning bed debate isn't an excuse to roast in the sun instead. Nor is melanoma the only risk. Also linked to UV exposure are basal and squamous cell carcinomas, which affect more than 1 million Americans a year. They're usually easily

but the American Cancer Society counts 2,000 annual deaths. Melanoma is more lethal: Nearly 69,000 U.S. cases were diagnosed last year, and about 8,650 people died.

Fair-skinned people who don't tan easily are highest at risk. Melanoma is particularly linked to sunburns at a young age, and while it usually strikes in the 40s and 50s, doctors are seeing ever-younger cases like Donnar.

A good tan provides the equivalent of a sunscreen rated just SPF-4, and even good tanners can get melanoma, says Dr. Margaret Tucker of the National Cancer Institute. Their risk, like everybody's, increases with increasing UV exposure.

Why? "If there was enough (UV) to give you a tan, it had to have triggered DNA damage," says Dr. David Fisher of the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute and а spokesman for the Skin Cancer Foundation.

Here's how: A protein called p53 is activated by genetic damage from UV rays. Its main job is to

mend such damage, but it also sets off a chain reaction - triggering production of a hormone that filters down to pigmentproducing cells called melanocytes and orders them to color the skin's surface, Fisher explains.

In other words, "the very pathway for tanning is directly biochemically linked to the same pathway of carcinogenesis," says Fisher.

He acknowledges it's impossible to predict if a drop in indoor tanning might translate into less cancer because everyone gets sun.

"We don't want people to become indoor cavedwellers," says NCI's Tucker.

So be out in the early morning and late afternoon, when those UV rays penetrate less, and sunscreen. use In Indiana, that's Donnar's new lifestyle, plus some spray-on tanners for pageants.

"My friends call me 'snow princess' now but I feel comfortable in my own skin."
