Highway 54 bridge spans past and future

Oneida residents may be excused for thinking they're witnessing a scene from the Dr. Seuss book *The Lorax* as trees are being felled where the new Highway 54 Bridge over Duck Creek is being built. Project Manager Chad Wilson assures the community the trees will be coming back.

"It's hard to envision the end product right now, but we do have a plan and agreements in place to replant trees, replant shrubs, get all the of that into place," he said.

Initially, the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) had planned to put in a temporary bridge and replace the current steel bridge with a four lane steel one. Oneida's Community Sustainable Design

From 1A/Highway 54: Old bridge for walkers

Team requested a change of plans.

"If you're going to disturb the habitat, could you create a new bridge?" said Wilson.

The new bridge will be wider than the old bridge. The WisDOT will also add another road to enter and exit Site I near the Enrollment Department. "With the highway shifted north it's going to give more safety to that library and enrollment area for Site I," said Wilson.

The new bridge and retaining walls will incorporate Oneida symbols and art such as images of the Three Sisters and an iconic depiction of Sky Woman falling to earth. The artwork was created by local Oneida artists.

"It will create a unique sense of place," he said.

Wilson stated that the replacement trees will be culturally significant as will be the medicinal plantings in the new green spaces.

The old steel bridge will be repaired, repainted

and will remain for pedestrians. The plan is to have a path system that will allow children to walk safely throughout the reservation.

"The kids don't have to walk the highways to go up and get a Popsicle at the One Stop or walk around the highway to get to school," said Wilson. The paths are funded by a Bureau of Indian Affairs Indian Reservation Road Funds grant.

With the addition of the new access road off Service Road, Site I will lose a ball diamond. However, there are plans to build a new community events center near the Oneida Nation Elementary School on Seminary Road.

"What we have planned for there is two regulation baseball diamonds, and then a multi-purpose field which will be lacrosse regulation. It will be the only one in the state," said Wilson. The center will also have a concession stand, bathrooms and showers.

Wilson stated that the WisDOT was a great working partner in the highway project.

"The DOT bent over backwards to work with us. They listened to our

concerns and they redesigned to fit the needs of our community," he said.

Wilson also thanked the community for participating in surveys and

giving input.

"They actually shaped the project. They told us what they wanted, how they wanted it," he said. "All those entities were really glad we had so

much community feedback ... it made their jobs easier for the support to make those decisions."

NY offers \$3M to settle Onondaga protesters' suit

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) ~ New York State has agreed to pay nearly \$3 million to scores of people beaten, arrested or chased away by state police during a protest on the Onondaga Indian Nation 15 years ago, the attorney for dozens of the plaintiffs said.

Terrance Hoffmann told the Post-Standard of Syracuse in a story published Sunday that the state and another lawyer representing others in the lawsuit have agreed to settle the case for just under \$3 million.

Hoffmann represents about half of the 98 people involved.

The settlement won't be final until all plaintiffs sign it, Hoffmann said.

State officials wouldn't comment on the settlement. The state would admit no wrongdoing, Hoffmann said.

Troopers and more than 100 protesters, mostly American Indians, clashed on May 18, 1997, on Onondaga land just south of Syracuse. The lawsuit accused troopers of using excessive force in break-

ing up a peaceful protest. The protest was held not long after confrontations between state police and Seneca Indians on one of the tribe's western New York reservations south of Buffalo. Seneca demonstrators had shut down the New York Thruway where it passes through reservation land to protest the state's efforts to get Indian tribes to pay taxes on products sold to non-Indians at reservation businesses.

The Syracuse-area protest was held along

Interstate 81 where it passes through the Onondaga Nation territory. State police officials have said the troopers broke up the demonstration out of concern for the public's safety.

Under the settlement, payments would range from \$8,000 for protesters who were chased away by police to \$200,000 to two men who were beaten by baton-wielding troopers, Hoffmann said.

Movie Review

Crooked Arrows hits the underdog highlights



Looking for an underdog sports story in the vein of the Mighty Ducks? Welcome, duck fans. Looking for a movie featuring lacrosse? Look no further. Seriously, there aren't any besides this one. Interested in Native American culture and history? Plenty to be had here. Fascinated by the complex issues concerning Native American sovereignty, poverty, lan-

guage loss, Indian gaming and the real life conflict of interest it causes the tribe depicted in the movie? Don't worry - we'll breeze right past that part.

Crooked Arrows tells the story of Joe Logan, played by Brandon Routh, a citizen of the fictional Senecquoit Tribe in New York State who manages the nation's small casino. A developer wants to expand the busi-

ness, and needs Logan to persuade the tribal council. The council will consider the expansion if Logan will coach the struggling high school lacrosse team as well as reexamine his own spirituality.

The movie does best when it focuses on lacrosse, both playing it and the history and spiritual side of the game. The cast of mostly first time actors portraying the Crooked Arrows team are engaging on and off the field. Tyler Hill (Mohawk) does most of the heavy lifting as team captain Silverfoot, but Cree Cathers (Mohawk)

steals the show as the comical Chewy.

The film struggles to shoehorn the other conflicts such as the obligatory greedy business man or the misappropriation of Native American symbolism to turn a buck. The deeper conflicts hinted at can't find a footing in this breezy sports film. However, if you're looking for a fun flick to watch with the family, Crooked Arrows scores the goal.

Crooked Arrows is now playing at the Appleton East Marcus Theater with showtimes at 3:25pm, 6:25pm, 9:00pm.

CenturyLink offers telephone assistance to individuals living on Tribal Lands

Low-income consumers may qualify for assistance that will reduce the cost of basic monthly telephone service. The assistance program, known as Lifeline Affordable Telephone Assistance, is available to qualifying consumers in every U.S. state (territory and commonwealth). Qualifications for participation vary by state. In states that follow the federal guidelines, the subscriber must have a household annual gross income at or below 135% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines for a household of that size; or participate in any one of the following programs: Medicaid, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (Food Stamps), Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Federal Public Housing Assistance (Section 8), Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), National School Lunch Program's Free Lunch Program, or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF).

Residents of American Indian and Alaskan Native tribal lands may qualify for up to an additional \$25 of enhanced Lifeline support monthly and a credit of up to \$100 on their initial installation charges. An individual living on tribal lands may qualify for Lifeline and Link-Up discounts if he or she participates in one of the programs listed above, the Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance, Tribally Administered Temporary Assistance to Needy Families, or Head Start (only for those households meeting its income qualifying standard).

Lifeline eligible subscribers may also qualify for reliable home high-speed internet service up to 1.5Mbps for \$9.95* per month for the first 12 months of service. Further details are available at centurylink.com/internetbasics

 - f. Previous Oneida Child Protective Board experience.
 - g. Post Secondary Training preferred.
4. An individual must obtain and file a complete application with the Tribal Secretary's office. The Tribal Secretary's office shall forward copies of all applications under consideration to the Board. Within fifteen days, the Board shall return all applications and submit the name of a candidate whom they recommend. The candidate's name will be submitted, along with all other names of qualified applicants, to the

Oneida Business Committee for final selection and approval in accordance with the Comprehensive Policy Governing Boards, Committees and Commissions.

5. Board terms shall be for four years.

B. Restrictions on Membership:

1. A member shall not have a previous record of child abuse, neglect, or abandonment for the past ten (10) years.
2. Employees of the Indian Child Welfare Department shall not serve as Board members.
3. Any member desiring to resign from the Board must submit their resignation in writing with a thirty (30) days notice, to the Board. The Board will send this resignation to the Oneida Business Committee.
4. Any member causing discredit to the Board, or violating the provisions of these By-Laws, will be required to resign by action of the Board. The Board will send this resignation to the Oneida Business Committee.
5. If a member fails to attend three (3) consecutive meetings without notification or justification, he/she shall be required to resign. The Board will send this resignation to the Oneida Business Committee.
6. In the event an Board member refuses to resign, the Board will refer to the Comprehensive Policy Governing Boards, Committees and Committees section 6-5.
7. When a resignation occurs, the procedures set forth in the selection of new members will be adhered to.

Tribe makes changes to contractor policy

Contracts between employee-owned companies and tribe now banned

Action taken by the Oneida Business Committee (OBC) amending the tribe's current Independent Contractor Policy may harm the bottom line of some small businesses owned by tribal members.

During an April meeting the OBC took emergency action that no employee or employee-owned business can be hired as an independent contractor. The ban also applies members of boards, committees, and commissions.

According to Paul Ninham, OBC Councilmember, action was taken to protect the tribe.

"The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has identified a concern regarding this type of employee-contractor relationship. And, based on discussions with the Tribal government liaison in the IRS, this concern is growing," said Ninham. "Rather than risk tax liabilities and limited Tribal funds, it is my opinion that we should protect the Tribe from this risk and seek clarification."

A fix may take some time but clarification is needed by the OBC before action can be taken.

"I believe our legal staff has worked diligently to find solutions regarding this area of the law and helping us to understand what the risks are and how we can

avoid them," said Ninham. "Once we get the IRS ruling, we can revamp the Independent Contractor Policy or omit it, whichever is more appropriate to better reflect our goals to build a strong economy and reduce all risks to the Tribe and its employees."

For Dennis King, owner of D. King of Images and Drop Count Supervisor at the casino, mixed signals have confused him.

"Plain and simple, I feel it's not fair to me. Last year I was getting great support from the Tribe because I was a native-owned business on the vendors list so whenever they need a photographer I would get the call to place a bid. Now, with this new policy, I won't even get a chance to bid on projects because I work for the tribe as well," said King.

"It feels like I was climbing the ladder to success with the support I was getting from the Tribe and now I come to find out they will no longer support me because of my job with the Tribe. To me, I feel like I'm being discriminated against because of my job."

Ninham says the OBC is asking for patience from business owners as they wait for answers.

"We have asked the Law Office to be as quick as possible to find those answers for us. I have also asked the Law Office to find a solution that allows us to provide

the broadest opportunities for contracting for member owned businesses that do not jeopardize tribal assets," Ninham said.

King feels this updated policy will financially hurt him and other small businesses.

"(Getting) future clients (will be harder) based on the fact that I will not have my portfolio of my work I have done for the tribe. Ninety percent of my work is word-of-mouth or visual. People see my work and ask who created it and now I won't have this going for me," he said.

Current contracts between tribal members or their businesses and the tribe will be allowed to expire.

"The Tribe has entered into valid contracts and will allow them to be completed. However, until we have a clear answer on this question of employee-contractors I continue to be of the opinion that we should not jeopardize tribal funds or create problems for members who are employee-contractors," said Ninham.

As for King, he has taken the news in stride and plans on keeping the positive momentum his company has gained.

"I am blessed that I get to share my gift with those that had the faith in my abilities and I will continue to keep reaching forward with or without the support from my Tribe due to this new policy," he said.

Congrats, Graduates! Now start saving for retirement

Nearly two million Americans will graduate from college with an undergraduate degree this year, and most of them will enter the workforce rather than continue on to a graduate degree. As these twenty-somethings begin earning wages from "real jobs" for the first time, many overlook the need to start saving for retirement. However, saving early is more important than ever. With pension plans becoming increasingly rare and Americans living an average 22 years longer than they did when Social Security was created in 1937, today's youngest members of the workforce are largely responsible for their own retirement income.

Here's a quick overview of the most common investment accounts used to save for retirement:

IRA - If your employer doesn't offer a company retirement plan (or if you're currently under- or unemployed), start your own nest egg by opening an Individual Retirement Account (IRA). These accounts provide tax advantages that a regular savings account does not. The maximum contribution to an IRA is \$5,000



per year if you're under age 50. The money in IRAs is invested by the company managing the account and it is also easier to withdraw from than a 401(k). However, there are still several fees and penalties associated with early withdrawal.

401(k) - This type of retirement savings account is directed by employers and contributions are deducted from paychecks, before taxes. The account is then taxed when a withdrawal is made. The current maximum annual contribution to a 401(k) plan is \$17,000. Also, many employer plans include a matching contribution, which is money that the employer will contribute to the account in addition to the employee's contributions. For example, if the company you work for has a program where they will match 50 percent of your contribution up to 3 percent of your paycheck, if you contribute the full 3 percent, you'll receive an additional 1.5 percent from your employer. That's

free money for your retirement!

Roth vs Traditional - There are two types of both IRAs and 401(k) plans, Roth and Traditional. The basic difference is when the contributor pays taxes on the account. With a traditional retirement account the taxes are paid when the money is withdrawn. With a Roth account the taxes are paid when the money is added to the account. Roth accounts are especially valuable to young workers, as they are more likely to climb into higher tax brackets as they age, meaning they would owe more in taxes on the same amount of money later in life.

Notice that keeping cash under your mattress isn't on this list. Money that isn't invested or placed in a bank account earns no returns or interest. Make your hard-earned money work for you by investing in an IRA or 401(k) or depositing it into an interest-earning savings account.

Currently, PTAC is located within the Skenandoah Complex. The purpose of PTAC is to assist Tribal business owners business with contacts, networking opportunities, training, technical

assistance, and resources so our tribally owned businesses can grow and possibly be awarded government contracts. The businesses currently enrolled with PTAC are Green Bay Foot Designs, Oneida Printing, Jordan Trucking, Go-Green Painting, Northeast Construction, Landscaping, Jeta Corp, Big Horn Trucking, Arrow Trucking, Handaid, Arrow Maintenance, Pro Electric, Standing Stone Architecture, and DAT

Inc., to name a few.

This past Christmas season, Leida Wesolaski was spotted at Wal-Mart with two shopping carts full of toys and games. A curious Tribal member stopped her and inquired about the amount of gifts she had in her cart. Leida explained that she knew from personal experience how hard it was to be a single parent, especially at Christmas, and not being able to have enough gifts under the tree for her children. She went on to explain the struggles she experienced and how hard it was for her to know her children had to go without because she just could not afford all the things they needed. A few years ago, Leida teamed up with Bart Cornelius and the two of them formed Big Horn Trucking. Their goal was

simple, to be successful. They started with one low limit personal credit card and used every dollar they made to support their business. With some help from their friends, PTAC included, they were able to grow a very successful business from a very humble beginning. All the games and toys in her carts, Leida explained, were not for her children but for charity. She and Bart wanted to give back to the community that gave them a new start and the tools to grow their business into a prosperous venture. This is a very touching story and one we can all be proud of.

Big Horn Trucking has been recognized as one of the top ten Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBE) of 2012 in Wisconsin. As one of DBE's most noted

businesses we are sure that PTAC is on the right track. Our Tribal members are working hard to become accomplished entrepreneurs and sometimes we overlook the struggles they face. While every story cannot be as encouraging as Big Horn Trucking, all of our Tribal business owners do have resources they can rely on to assist them in their journey toward success. Unfortunately the Tribe no longer has a small business fund to provide start-up monies but a small business loan program is available through Bay Bank. I encourage all Tribal members who are considering starting a business or currently have a start-up business to contact PTAC and discover what opportunities are available.

Big Horn Trucking's story is very inspirational and gives us hope that each Tribal member with a dream of owning a business can also become successful. ORCC

Everyone can see this project is moving along at a rapid pace and there is no doubt when one looks at this building that it is going to be spectacular. I wanted to update you, not on the progress of the building, but in figures that are related to the 36 Indian Preference workers working throughout this project. To date, there has been a total of 7,982 hours Indian Preference workers have worked on this

project and the total wages these workers have received is \$353,857.00.

On another note, we are still proceeding through the process of renaming this facility to the Anna John Residential Community Care Center. This has been sent to the Land Commission and they have followed through with the process of renaming buildings on the reservation. Recommendations are due back to the Division of Land Management by June 8th and should be on the Land Commission's agenda for their meeting on June 11th at 5:00 p.m. at the Division of Land Management office.

Larsen Road

The design for this project is in its final stages. The Tribe and the vendor are finishing up both the interior and exterior drawings and specification for this project and in the next few weeks they should be complete. At that time construction should begin and everyone will start to see the starting element of a new One Stop. This project is projected to be finished by late November or early December.

Also the West Wind One Stop is still closed for remodeling and should be finished by late July. Progress on this project is moving along nicely. Please continue to utilize one of the other One Stops available.

Sole Source

At the last Business Committee meeting the subject of Sole Source was debated. The Committee took action to rescind a previous BC Resolution, 11-24-10-C, which mandated using Oneida vendors to complete work or services for

Tribal entities if they were the only vendor providing that type of work or service. In theory, this sounded like a good thing, to get our Oneida vendors some of the work being done throughout the Tribe and/or providing services.

However, in the past year and a half, it has shown this resolution has been a detriment to the Tribe, in that the bid process did not have to be followed. The Purchasing Department found several instances wherein the service provided was actually higher in cost than from a non-tribal vendor, however, due to the BC Resolution being enacted, the entity requesting the service was required to use the Oneida vendor. This was a downfall of the resolution.

On May 23rd this resolution was rescinded and effective immediately the Purchasing Department's three bid process will be reinstated for all tribal purchases over the \$1,000 dollar limit. Bids will be competitive in

nature and more appropriate to the cost of services being provided. Vendors, Oneida and non-tribal, will compete for tribal dollars to complete a project or provide a service and the Tribe will benefit from the bids being presented are at reasonably expected levels, essentially, no price gouging.

Trans Program

Congratulations to the individuals who recently completed this lengthy program sponsored by the College of Menominee Nation and we wish them the best of luck in finding employment in this field of work. The commitment these individuals made through classroom and on-the-job training will prepare them for the ethics of finding and keeping employment.

Native Nations Institute

On May 15th and 16th I attended a seminar on Governance Analysis for Native Nations. Throughout these two days the individuals in attendance focused on some key factors in sustainable economic development as well as

strengthening indigenous governance. What is and what is not working within our government and how can it be fixed. How comprehensive a change do we need to make, a top-to-bottom overhaul, some fine tuning of our system, or something in between.

Some of these included strengthening our direction, where are we going? Self-Determination, who's in charge? Governing tools through a capable tribal administration and supporting tribally owned enterprises, what currently exists and whether we are capable of supporting these things.

Menomonee Valley Tour

Several weeks ago I had to opportunity to do a day visit to the Menomonee Valley Development Project in Milwaukee. We were there to see how it has changed from an area that was uninhabitable due to the type of businesses located there years ago, such as stockyards and rail yards, to the vibrant beautiful economic area it is today. A large part of this success was because a business from Spain decided to build in this area over 30 other cities in the United States. Within a short

distance from this area are walking and biking trails. The river that ran through this area was an environmental mess, but has been cleaned up to where companies can now move this area and build their new or relocated businesses.

SEOTS

This past weekend also marked the 20th Anniversary of the Southeastern Oneida Tribal Services operation in Milwaukee. We want to acknowledge Mark Powless and his office staff for all the work they have done to make this a better place for Oneidas in the Milwaukee Area.

A big thank you also to the SEOTS Advisory Board for their input and continued work they have done in providing guidance to this office.

Topic: Starting Child Support Services FAQ's

Question: Why is my child support case with Oneida and not in the county?

If you are receiving public assistance benefits through the tribe's Center for Self-Sufficiency, Oneida Health Center or local county economic support agency, the referral is automatically sent to us as the tribe has jurisdiction.

Question: How do I start receiving child support?

A parent or caretaker can apply for services with the agency by phoning for an application or accessing it on our website at: [http://www.oneidanation.org/uploadedFiles/Departments/Social_Services/Child_Support/Application%20for%20Services\(2\).pdf](http://www.oneidanation.org/uploadedFiles/Departments/Social_Services/Child_Support/Application%20for%20Services(2).pdf)

Question: My case is currently in another county in Wisconsin. Can I have it transferred to Oneida?

Yes, cases can be transferred from another county if the parties in the case meet the jurisdictional laws to have the case with Oneida Child Support. Contact the agency to discuss the transfer process.

Question: What happens after the referral or application? How long will it take to start seeing child support payments?

After a referral or application for services is sent, the case will be delegated to the appropriate case manager in one of our four stratified areas: paternity, enforcement, interstate, or sub-care case management. A case manager will then contact you to follow up with the referral or application. The time from referral or application to the start of child support payments can be somewhere between two-three months. If you receive any certified mail, be sure to pick it up right away to avoid any delay in the child support process.

NOTICE TO SPECIAL ELECTION CANDIDATES

The Oneida Election Board hereby informs you of the laws as they pertain to campaign signs and campaigning within the Oneida Election Law:

2.5-9. Campaign Signs and Campaigning:

- Placement of campaign signs:
 - Campaign signs shall not be posted or erected on any Tribal property except for private property with the owner/tenant's consent.
 - No campaign sign shall exceed sixteen (16) square feet in area. A maximum of seven (7) such signs may be placed on a building or on a lot.
 - No campaign signs shall project beyond the property line into the public right of way.
- Removal of campaign signs. All campaign signs shall be removed within five (5) business days after an election.
- Employees of the Tribe shall not engage in campaigning for Tribal offices during work hours. Tribal employees shall be subject to disciplinary action under the personnel policies and procedures for political campaigning during work hours.
- Enforcement. The zoning Administrator shall cause to be removed any campaign signs that are not in compliance with this law, in accordance with the Zoning and Shoreland Protection Law.
- Fines. Violation of the campaign sign restrictions shall result in a fine imposed by the Oneida Election Board in an amount specified in a resolution adopted by the Business Committee.

Per 2.5-9 (3) above, all signs located within any right-of-way need to be moved. If they are not moved, the Zoning Administrator will remove these signs. If any signs are erected in any right-of-way, they may be subject to fines per 2.5-9 (e) of Oneida Election Law.

Report: US archdiocese paid priests to leave ministry

MILWAUKEE (AP) – The Archdiocese of Milwaukee confirmed that it had a policy to pay suspected pedophile priests to leave the ministry.

The acknowledgement was prompted by a document made public by abuse victims' advocates from the archdiocese's bankruptcy that references a 2003 proposal to pay \$20,000 to "unassignable priests" who accepted a return to the laity. The policy was crafted under then-Archbishop Timothy Dolan, who is now a cardinal and head of the archdiocese in New York.

The Survivors Network of Those Abused by Priests characterizes the payments as a payoff and bonuses to priests who molested children. The archdiocese disputes that characterization, saying the payments were in part to more quickly move those men out of the priesthood.

The group is calling on the archdiocese to release all records involving the payments and its handling of clergy sex abuse

cases. "You don't give a bonus to a man who rapes children," the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel quoted SNAP Midwest director Peter Isely as saying Wednesday outside the federal courthouse in Milwaukee. "If they paid them anything it should have been for therapy and counseling."

According to the Journal Sentinel, the 2003 bankruptcy document appears to be the first public acknowledgement of a formal policy to pay trouble priests to leave.

Disputing that, archdiocese spokeswoman Julie Wolf told The Associated Press late Wednesday that both the payments and the policy regarding them had long been acknowledged by the archdiocese.

"It's not new news," she said.

"SNAP sounds like they're saying these were kind of payoffs to priests who had substantial allegations against them," Wolf added. She said the payments were to help the men transition to lay

life without completely losing access to needs such as health care.

The Journal Sentinel article noted that Dolan used similar language in 2006 when he defended a payment to one former priest. A phone message seeking comment from the Archdiocese of New York late Wednesday was not returned.

Wolf also called the payments "a cost-savings for the archdiocese" because the process to involuntarily remove a priest is lengthy and involves Vatican approval.

The bankruptcy document highlighted by SNAP references a meeting of the archdiocese's Finance Council in 2003 that included Dolan, who was then archbishop in Milwaukee.

According to the document, members discussed offering "unassignable priests" \$20,000 to accept the process known as laicization.

UW regents take up proposed tuition hike Thursday

MADISON, WI (AP) – It would cost Wisconsin residents more than \$10,000 a year in tuition and fees to attend the University of Wisconsin-Madison if a recommended 5.5 percent tuition increase is approved.

The university's Board

of Regents is scheduled to take up the proposed increase Thursday.

It's the sixth straight year that University of Wisconsin System President Kevin Reilly has recommended a 5.5 percent tuition hike for in-state students attending any of the system's

13 four-year campuses, the Wisconsin State Journal reported (<http://bit.ly/MteS64>). It's the most he can ask for under a legislative cap in the current budget.

"These are challenging times for our colleges and universities, as well as for our students and families," Reilly said in a statement. "With that in mind, we've recommended a modest, predictable tuition increase that provides some additional revenue for our campuses."

Funding to the UW system was cut by \$250 million over two years in the 2011-13 budget. The system also is returning a total of \$65.7 million in state funding from 2011-2013 to cover budget deficits.

If approved, Wisconsin residents would pay an extra \$431 at UW-Madison, bringing tuition and fees to \$10,379 per year. Tuition for out-of-state students would go up the same amount – meaning it would cost a non-resident \$26,096 to attend the Madison campus.

Rep. Steve Nass, R-Whitewater, chairman of the Assembly Colleges and Universities Committee, said he wants to extend the 5.5 percent tuition cap for two more academic years.

From 1A/SEOTS Milestone observed

Milwaukee SEOTS reaches milestone with Twenty Year Anniversary

In January of 1992 a group of volunteer Oneida Tribal members, residing in southeast Wisconsin, officially organized as the Oneida Indian Council of Southeastern Wisconsin. The original Board members, elected by the general membership, were Chairperson Alberta Metoxen, Vice-Chair Madelyn Genskow, Secretary Fred Muscavitch, and Treasurer Roy Huff. Additional members included Kim Reyes, Jim Cooper, James Zakhar, and Ester Olszewski. The budget for their first year of operation was \$21,000.

The Oneida Indian Council focused on improving conditions for elderly and youth as well as act as a referral source for Oneida services. They also coordinated events such as Bingo trips for the elderly, graduation banquets, and a learning center. Ultimately, the volunteer work of the council placed a full-time staff person in a suite rented on Milwaukee's Mitchell Street and established official Oneida Tribal representation in Milwaukee.

The actions of the Oneida Indian Council sprouted and grew into Southeastern Oneida Tribal Services (SEOTS). Today, SEOTS focuses on improving the well-being of our elderly and youth, connects Tribal members to Oneida and Milwaukee-area services, offers cultural education, and coordinates community gatherings. SEOTS currently leases a 7,000 square foot facility to provide Tribal community offerings. Two full-time staff and two part-time staff coordinate all activities with the assistance of many volunteers.

Helping to guide SEOTS into the future is the SEOTS Board. Current members are Chairperson Jackie Zalim, Vice-Chair Andraea Gaffney, Secretary Pamela Ninham, Ed Pero, Valerie Webster, Carol Wenzel, and Chris Luttrell. Their activities in the community, working with the Tribe, and professional experience allow them to provide advice and direction for all aspects of the SEOTS operation. As the eyes and ears of the community, they have been instrumental in securing a new 14 passenger shuttle, assisting in the search process for a new and permanent home for SEOTS, fund raising for the new SEOTS GED Program, plus donating time and skills for SEOTS events.

Overall, the SEOTS mission is strengthening our cultural connection and providing services and programs to enhance

the well being of On·lyote?aka in southeastern Wisconsin. During the second and fourth Tuesday of each month at 6:00pm the SEOTS Board meets to ensure that we are achieving our mission. All Tribal members are

encouraged to attend Board meetings and offer feedback on any aspects of the SEOTS operation.

EPA creates Great Lakes protection advisory board

Traverse City, Mich. (AP) — The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is creating a board to advise federal agencies carrying out two wide-ranging programs to protect the Great Lakes, EPA chief Lisa Jackson said Thursday.

Jackson leads a task force with representatives of 16 federal agencies that have roles in the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative and the Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement. The new panel will make suggestions.

The EPA will accept nominations for membership and expects to estab-

lish the board this summer. Candidates could include representatives of environmental advocacy, agriculture, academic research, state and local government, and Indian tribes.

"As we work to set a new standard of care for these waters, it's important that we hear from experts and stakeholders who can strengthen our efforts," Jackson said.

The Great Lakes Restoration Initiative is designed to make progress on some of the region's most longstanding environmental problems, such as invasive species, toxic pollution, disappearing wetlands

and other wildlife habitat, and runoff from farms and cities.

Congress has appropriated more than \$1 billion for the initiative. President Barack Obama has requested \$300 million for the next fiscal year.

The water quality agreement is a U.S.-Canadian blueprint that identifies problems needing long-term attention. The two nations are renegotiating the agreement, first signed in 1972 and amended several times since.

Wisconsin DNR sets hearings on wolf hunt rules

Madison, WI (AP) — State wildlife officials are looking for public input on a draft rule setting up Wisconsin's new wolf hunt.


The Department of Natural Resources is planning four public meetings on the rule around the state this month. The first is set for

Wednesday in Spooner, with others to follow Friday in Black River Falls, June 14 in Fond du Lac and June 15 in Rhinelander.

The meetings will begin with an open house with DNR staff followed by staff presentations and time for questions and comments.

State lawmakers passed a bill earlier this year calling for a wolf hunt. The DNR is currently developing an emergency rule setting up the details and logistics. The Natural Resources Board expects to take up the measure at a meeting July 17 in Stevens Point.





The award is presented by the American Indian Student Services of University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee to individuals who display the highest level of dedication to the Milwaukee Indian Community.

Ushakow was honored for her work with the Wisconsin Pink Shawl Initiative as well as her

work with SEOTS and other community activities. In the words of her nominator, Carol Cameron, "From her job at Southeastern Oneida Tribal Services, to working with the community as an advocate for women's breast health, she has been a champion for the American Indian people."

Ushakow has been heavily involved with the Pink Shawls since its inception. The mission of the Pink Shawls is to reduce breast cancer in American Indian communities through education, advocacy and service and to increase the number of American Indian women accessing screening opportunities.

Ushakow is not only a co-founder of this amazing group, but is also the current Board Vice-Chair and a family mentor.

Roger Thomas was an Ojibwe language teacher at UW Milwaukee and a proud veteran of the U.S. Marine Corps. His efforts in the community supported Native families in countless ways. One of his nominators, Mary Hicks, stated, "He served our country with honor as a Marine and he's done many things to empower, support, and sustain the Indian community through projects and activities almost too numerous to list."

Thomas' accomplishments include two Masters degrees from

UW-Milwaukee, helping to establish a Native American Studies program at UW-Milwaukee, Director of the Native American Studies Program at UW-Oshkosh, establishment of the LCO Community College, assistance with the establishment of the Indian Community School, Director of the WE INDIANS Program of Milwaukee Public Schools and a lifelong dedication to learning and teaching the Ojibwe language.

Recently Thomas passed and will be dearly missed by friends, family, students, and the community.

Website offers Native Americans diabetes forums

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP) ~ Two Native American professors living in Kansas say Type 2 diabetes has ravaged their race for so many years they felt compelled to help spread information and hope for those battling the disease.

Rhonda LeValdo and Teresa Trumbly Lamsam said they hope the Native American tradition of storytelling will help combat the spread among Native Americans of Type 2 diabetes, a chronic blood-sugar disease often triggered by obesity.

“It seemed inevitable,” said Lamsam, 50, a visiting journalism professor at the University of Kansas who grew up on an Osage reservation in Pawhuska, Okla. “You’re going to get older. You’re going to get diabetes because you’re Indian. When I saw complications, I used to think, ‘I wonder how long before they lose their feet?’ Amputations were so common.”

Diabetes also ran in the family of LeValdo, 37, a

member of the Acoma Pueblo from New Mexico. LeValdo is a media instructor at Haskell Indian Nations University and president of the Native American Journalists Association.

In response, the two women launched WellboundStorytellers.com, a website that originally invited Native American journalists to discuss their health struggles and successes. The Kansas City Star reported. Within days, Native Americans across the country were asking that the site be opened to bloggers too.

“We have a Hawaiian guy who is working on the website. I have an educator and filmmaker who say they want to be part of it,” Lamsam said. “They are all on health journeys and they want to share and receive support.”

Diabetes is only one of several health problems among Native Americans and Pacific Islanders, who rank at or next to the bottom of nearly every health category among

all races. “Diabetes, obesity, heart disease, cancer, suicide rates,” said Darryl Tonemah, a Native American health psychologist of Kiowa, Comanche and Tuscarora descent who is a board member of the American Diabetes Association.

Lamsam said the website originally was part of journalism research she was doing on the mainstream media’s coverage of a federal initiative known as the Special Diabetes Program for Indians, which has spent about \$1.5 billion over the last 15 years battling diabetes in Native American communities.

During the research, LeValdo’s uncle died from complications from diabetes, and she and Lamsam decided to start the website.

“We thought we needed to be role models,” Lamsam said.






