

Conference tackles issue of elder abuse

In the Oneida culture, elders are respected for their knowledge and life experience. To help revitalize that mindset, Oneida Elder Services hosted We Love Our Elders – Elder Abuse Prevention Education Conference July 9-10 at the Radisson Hotel and Conference Center.

According to Oneida Elder Services Program

Director Florence Petri the conference was held to get more information out into Oneida about elder abuse which is underreported in the community.

“A lot of times the elders don’t like to say anything, and those are the kind we would like to take care of,” said Petri.

According to keynote speaker Devon Christianson of the Aging and Disability Resource Center of Brown County, one in 10 elders seniors report being abused, neglected or exploited.

“For every one case reported, it’s estimated that 23 cases go unreported,” she said. “What is it that we can do to call attention to that, get our hands around it and begin to reduce the stereotypes and the fears that prevent people from reporting?”

Christianson noted that more attention is being paid to elder abuse as the baby boom generation grows older. She shared a chart that showed the age

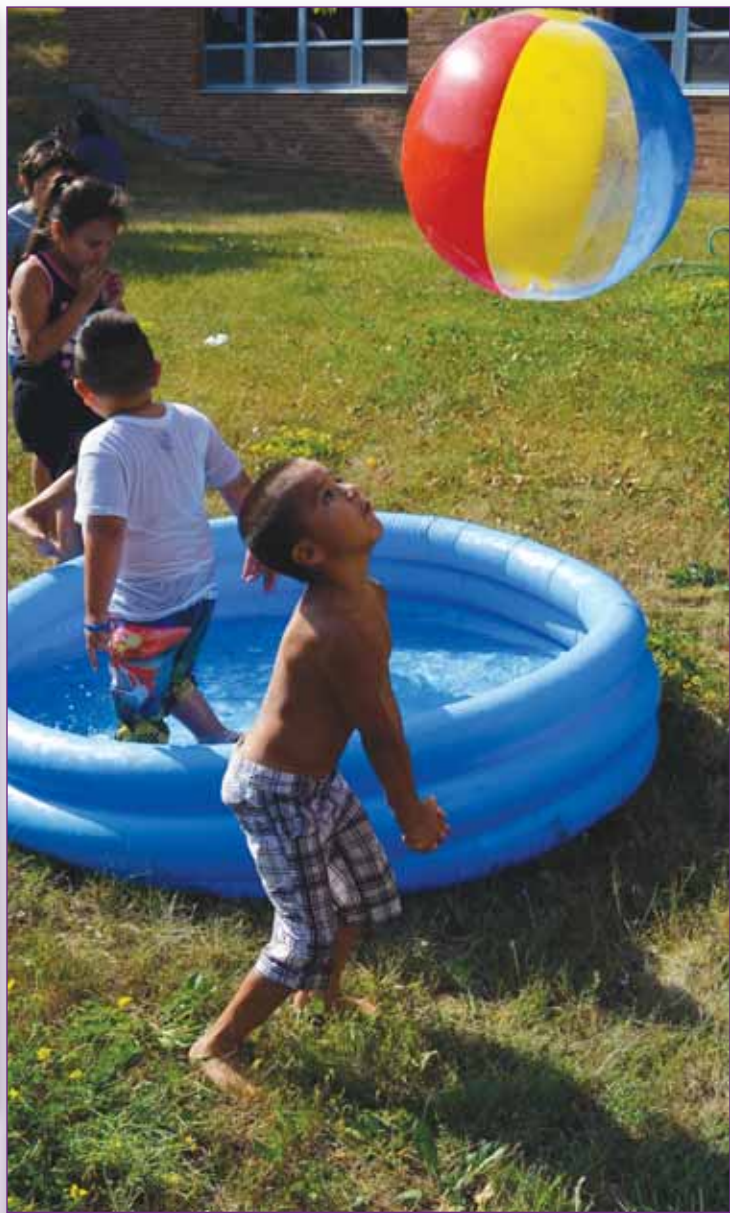

The Oneida Business Committee (OBC) made quick work of a short agenda during their July 11, 2012 OBC meeting.

Shortly after the agenda was approved Stephanie Muscavitch was sworn in as an alternate to the Oneida Election Board.

Minutes

Regular OBC meeting minutes were approved from the June 27 meeting along with the minutes from the emergency meeting on June 28.

Resolutions

A resolution was approved regarding the authorized account signers with the Native American Bank.

Directors and Managers

Quarterly Reports

Self-Governance, Ombudsman, Emergency Management and Homeland Security, Oneida Housing Authority, and the Environmental, Health and Safety Division were quickly approved with little discussion.

Board, Committee, and Commissions Appointments

The OBC approved posting one vacancy on the Environmental Resource Board.

The posting on the Oneida Nation Veteran’s Affairs Committee was reposted for 30 days and the recommended appointment for the South Eastern Oneida Tribal Services did not receive a second. Chairman Delgado will bring another recommendation to the next OBC meeting.

A report from the Oneida Police Commission was not submitted, it was deferred for two weeks.

Reports from the Environmental Resource Board, Oneida Gaming Commission, and Oneida Personnel Commission were approved.

General Tribal Council

The action report from the General Tribal Council semi-annual meeting on Monday, July 2 was approved.

The OBC also set the fiscal year 2013 budget meeting for Monday, September 23 at 6 p.m. at the Radisson Hotel and Conference Center.

A petition calling for the return of control of the Poplar Lane roadway to the Town of Oneida was acknowledged and the appropriate analysis was requested back in 30 days.

group of 45 to 64 ballooning past other populations. Along with the aging baby boomers, there is a rise in populations vulnerable to abuse such as poor, minority women.

Christianson stated that the older an individual got, the greater the risk for abuse.

"The age group from 80 to 89 is the demographic where the high percentage of abuse is occurring," she said.

Christianson shared her vision for the elderly in Brown County.

"Elders live in an inclusive, respectful

community where they are valued, safe and treated with dignity," she said. "Why is that not what our community is like right now, and what are the challenges to creating that?"

Nearly 100 people attended the conference which was funded by a grant from the US Department of Justice.

Oneida Longhouse needs help from the community for Kalihwiyo

(Greetings to all of you)

Many of you may not know, but here in Oneida, Wisc., we were given wampum by the Fire keepers and Delegates within the Confederacy. Symbolically, this means that our community has its own “fire,” or place within the Chiefs Council. In August we will “bundle up our words” and send a delegation out East to inform the Kalihwiyo Delegation Tonawanda that we would like to host the Kalihwiyo (the Good Message) this fall. There is a lot of responsibility to carry this message and to recite these words. WE are very fortunate to have Wolf Clan Faith Keeper, Leander Danforth – Shalihokt “Come to the End of the Words” and his helper Bear Clan Faith Keeper, Ron Hill – Lanuhsunihe “He Builds a House,” carry on with these traditions in our language.

Our Faith Keepers met on Sunday, June 11, 2012 after Strawberry Ceremony to discuss if, financially, we can host Kalihwiyo this year. We are in need of restroom

facilities and a new floor in the longhouse as well as money for expenses such as: gas, hotel and stipend for speakers who will recite Kalihwiyo, food for guests and community for five days. Considering all of this we have collectively decided to go forward with hosting Kalihwiyo because of the importance for the community.

Here are our financial needs:

1. \$8,000.00 to host the Kalihwiyo
2. \$14,500.00 to build rest rooms and run water to the kitchen
3. For supplies only, labor is covered

STRATEGY: Pulling Together/Wrapping Our Minds as One

At this time, we are asking people to do an automatic payroll deduction if you work for the Oneida Tribe or donate to the Longhouse Account at Chase Bank, Green Bay WI. There are two Longhouse Accounts established: Please be specific as to which fund you would like to make your donation;

1. Our existing account **Oneida Long House** taxpayer ID no. 45-5500611. This account will be used specifically for Kalihwiyo, paying gas electric, porta potties etc.
2. **Oneida Longhouse Building Fund** taxpayer ID no. 45-5500178

This fund will be used specifically for new bathrooms, kitchen upgrade, re-do hardwood floors in long house and other renovations specific to the buildings.

All our contributions are tax deductible and can be specific to either account.

Donations can be made to either account at any Chase Bank name of account is bolded above; contributors should print their names on deposits so they can be properly identified for tax purposes and acknowledgments.

If we had just 100 people donate only \$10.00 per week, we could potentially reach our goal in time for the

Kalihwiyo. We are mindful that we all have responsibilities and limited financial resources. Even if someone is able to donate \$5 or \$2 per week, this would be beneficial and greatly appreciated. We will also have some upcoming raffles or bake sales and we encourage people to sign up to work, cook, or volunteer with some of these events. Contact Michelle King-Hill at **920-569-9439**.

We think it is important to mention that we cannot do this with a small handful of people. There are hundreds of people that have come to the Longhouse to get names, have funerals, birthday socials, and many other things. These are all the good things that are encouraging us to continue to go on with what we need to do in our traditional ways. We hope we can look to them for support. Every little bit helps.

We send you our prayers and ask that you be mindful and come support your Longhouse.

As the Oneida One Stop - Westwind remodel project winds down to reopen at 6:00am on July 18, the Oneida One Stop – Larsen and Oneida Market project is starting the construction phase.

If you drive past the Packerland and Larsen site you will see a construction trailer and various construction machines completing site work. Oneida Total Integrated Enterprises (OTIE) is the general contractor, with Smet constructing the building. The CIP project is being managed through the Oneida Engineering area. The site work has begun with tree removal, surveying, earth moving to prepare the site to begin foundation work.

The building will be primarily split face concrete block matching the same materials and colors of the Packerland store. A bronze plaque, matching the ones at Packerland and Westwind, is a signature element that will be included in future One Stops. The plaque is of the Oneida Seal, marking the store as a business of the Oneida Tribe.

The Oneida Market is a re-imagining of the previous Tsyunhéhkwa store on Hwy 54. The goal is to re-invent the store concept, keeping

the Oneida traditional remedies and Oneida-produced products. The new Oneida Market location is a vast improvement for the business unit and will provide improved access to the larger Green Bay market, increased density of tribal member residence, and tourism traffic from Highway I-41.

The Oneida Market product mix will evolve based on sales and profit trends. This is an important guiding principle for retail profitability and success. The market will sell local, natural, and organic products, Oneida-produced products, and Oneida traditional remedies. Oneida-produced products include Black Angus beef, Buffalo meat, free-range chicken and eggs, white corn products, orchard products, and cannery products. Oneida traditional remedies include tea blends, herbs, tinctures, salves and essential oils.

The target construction completion date is late November, at which time ORE will need a couple weeks to stock and prepare the store to open. The target open date is mid-December for the Oneida One Stop and the Oneida Market. This prime location will be an anchor for the ORE for many years to come.

Many people have been confusing two recent Business Committee actions concerning the contracting process. First, the Business Committee amended the Independent Contractor Policy on April 25, 2012, to extend an existing prohibition on entering contracts with employees to also prohibit entering into contracts with employee owned businesses. Prior to these amendments, the Policy stated the Tribe could not enter into contracts with current tribal employees. The Policy also originally included an exception that allowed the Tribe to contract with an employee if the purpose of the contract was related to construction activities. The recent amendments removed that exception. Now, the Tribe cannot enter into any contracts with tribal employees or tribal employee owned businesses. We passed

these amendments based on advice from the Law Office concerning potential federal income tax withholding and overtime requirements that could potentially result in significant liabilities for the Tribe. Second, the other recent action concerned the Business Committee's decision on May 23, 2012 to repeal the Sole Source Resolution. Many people were confused as to the impacts this Resolution had on the requirements of the Indian Preference Law. My office in particular

felt this Resolution had been misapplied and created inconsistencies and uncertainty in the contracting process. The Resolution was never meant to force the Tribe to contract with a tribal vendor just because such a vendor was available. The Resolution was also never meant to force the Tribe to pay above market costs to tribal vendors. This is especially the case if the tribal vendor was unable to submit competitive bids during the bidding process. To force the Tribe to contract with tribal member vendors without considering other factors does a disservice to the Tribe and to the tribal member. During these tough economic times, the Tribe should not have to pay above market costs for goods and services. The Tribe should also not create a system that places tribal vendors at a disadvantage because it does not encourage our members to become competitive in the open market. We want our tribal mem-

bers to succeed no matter where they are located and no matter whom they do business with. We do not want them to solely rely on the Tribe to support their businesses. As a result, I supported repealing the Sole Source Resolution.

As an elected official, I am committed to exploring ways to fairly balance the needs of the Tribe to protect our liabilities while encouraging tribal member entrepreneurs. We also need to find a way to help our tribal members to develop their businesses in a way that allows them to be competitive in the open market.

For weeks I was getting ready for the Oneida Powwow making sure nothing would fall off my outfit as I know I would possibly lose it. At any powwow everyone knows veterans have a job to do as well as the drums, dancers and MC. The head veteran dancer has a special job. He has the power and authority to do what he feels right. He is the judge of what to do if an eagle feather falls – which represents a fallen warrior. An arena director doesn't have the authority to tell a head veteran or the veterans what to do! I have been head veteran at Oneida for 10 years and one year at the Menominee powwow. I have been instructed by elders and elder veterans here and around the United States of what my duties are! This is a first that an arena director tells me what to do with a feather. The grand entries, the two that I was in, went wrong. Once again the arena directors should know protocol. There was no invocation, no posting of the staffs and colors or recognizing the veterans. Women who were going to have babies were dancing. People were carrying young kids and more likely there were women who were on their moon. All these things should be said on the loudspeakers, which were working poorly to say the least. And an elder was wearing a kasto'we with horns, was told not to wear it, but still did. An eagle staff fell on the ground, was told not to bring it in the powwow, but still did. Until these embarrassing thing stop, count me out.

As soon as I left the longhouse and forgot who my priorities were to, I kept falling down. I dug deeper, went back and got my diploma. Did Mixed Martial Arts with Josh Kasee. I was not living to my full potential. I was a state wrestler three times over, boxing, tae Kwan do, Jo-jitsu. My son needs me and my other kids, too. Every time I went out there and took that drink and used I was telling my kids I love you. I was really saying I love myself. I have always worked two jobs several times, but that bottle put me back. I know now that a real man will not hinder his relationship with the Creator by developing friendships with people who have bad intentions or philosophies, to not walk in ways that are wise. We should strive to do goodness. I am not to get side tracked in my own selfish principles which could place me at odds with the Creator. Many times we learn lessons of life more by living than we do by studies we may pursue. I will not isolate anybody from reality of life. I now know that I have a divine love for the Creator and total commitment. I will give to all, both friends and enemy, I will do things for others without the slightest thought of self-

gain. It is not for us to choose what the Creators purpose is. He chooses the end from the beginning. In His love He gives us what we need more, nothing less. It is for us I know now to bring aid to the Native American people. Help your fellow brother and sisters. We are all the Creator's children spiritually speaking. Would you try to hurt your brother because he's not the same color or he's wearing the same colors of an opposition? We were meant to be peaceful beings and I believe paradox to our salvations is love. Love cures all sadness, hate, worry, ect. Don't come (to jail) unless you know how much we are psychologically tormented here. I was made to urinate in a wastebasket, asked to fight with another inmate. I didn't, I was thrown in the hold a week later. Don't come here, it's not always the inmates you have to worry about. I would like to say thank your for everything. I apologize for letting everybody down. I cannot take back the past but I can pave the future. Most and foremost I love my Potawatomi Princess Aimee. Also, I love you Grandpa and Grandma Madyln and Henry.

Purpose: Oneida Child Support Law Amendments

The intent of the Oneida Child Support Law (the Law) is to establish the legal responsibility of parents to provide financially for their children's well-being based on the real earning capability of parents. The Law establishes a standard of support for those children whose paternity has been established or acknowledged and encourages the use of voluntary agreements to resolve any disputes over child support obligations. The proposed amendments to the Law are as follows:

• **Amendment of Name.** Change the name from Oneida Child Support Enforcement Agency to Oneida Tribe Child Support Agency (Agency). The purpose of this change is to better portray what the Agency does, as enforcement is only a portion of the work being done.

• **Overtime Pay.** Specifically include overtime pay in the definition of Gross Income for the purposes of paying child support.

• **Jurisdiction.** Add long-arm jurisdiction as is provided in the Wisconsin State Statutes. This allows for broader jurisdiction over those respondents' who may not reside in the normal defined jurisdiction of the Appeals Commission.

• **Notice.** Amend notice of hearings, thereby requiring that only the notice of the initial action be served via certified mail and all subsequent notices by first-class mail.

• **Publication.** Amend the provision regarding notice via publication. Due to the Kalihwisaks changing the frequency of their publication, the law now requires publication three consecutive times in either the Kalihwisaks or other newspaper in the county where the respondent resides.

• **Past-due Obligations.** Update the section on arrears to now include past-due obligations.

• **Review.** Require the Agency to review the child support order

every two years. If a substantial change in circumstances exists, then the agency is required to file a motion with the Appeals Commission to have the order amended if the parties cannot agree to the amendment.

• **Motion to Amend.** Authorize any party to file a motion to modify the child support order, and sets the timing for scheduling a hearing to no sooner than ten calendar days after the date of service on the opposing party.

August 9, 2012

Purpose: Oneida Paternity Law Amendments

The intent of the Oneida Paternity Law (the Law) is to establish paternity of Oneida children and other Indian children in order to protect the best interests of these children regarding such matters as enrollment, customs and traditions of the Tribe, survivorship and inheritance, health, support, and social security benefits. The proposed amendments to the Law are as follows:

• **Amendment of Name.** Change the name from Oneida Child Support Enforcement Agency to Oneida Tribe Child Support Agency (Agency). The purpose of this change is to better portray what the Agency does, as enforcement is only a portion of the work being done.

• **Jurisdiction.** Add long-arm jurisdiction as is provided in the Wisconsin State Statutes. This allows for broader jurisdiction over those respondents' who may not reside in the normal defined jurisdiction of the Appeals Commission.

• **Timing of Filing.** Allow a petition to determine paternity to be filed at any time after the child is born.

• **Notice.** Amend the provision regarding mail delivery to allow for regular first-class mail rather than registered or certified mail.

• **Update of Address.** Require the alleged fathers' who appear and participate in an action to inform and keep

updated their current address at all time with the Agency and the Appeals Commission.

• **Administrative Subpoenas.** Authorize the Agency to issue administrative subpoenas to require the mother, child and alleged father(s) to appear and take a paternity test.

• **Reopening of Judgment.** Clarify that either the adjudicated father or the Agency can reopen a default judgment of paternity.

• **Stipulations.** Allow for the alleged father to stipulate to paternity and then to custody, placement and child support matters.

Public Hearing Process

I. Testimony:

A. Oral: There will be a 5 minute limit for all oral presentations. Each participant is encouraged to provide a written transcript of his/her oral testimony, to be submitted while present at the public hearing or within ten (10) business days from the date of public hearing to the below named individuals.

B. Written: For those who cannot attend the scheduled public hearing or do not plan to speak at the hearing, the Oneida Tribe encourages those to submit written testimony. Report: WI DNR should drop deer goals

MADISON, Wis. ~ Wisconsin wildlife officials should scrap local deer population goals, let landowners hold mini-hunts on their property and establish better connections with the public, Gov. Scott Walker's deer trustee wrote in a report released Tuesday.

Texas researcher James Kroll's 136-page study focuses largely on the Department of Natural Resources' shortcomings but takes hunters to task too, saying they expect the agency to maintain a herd so large the landscape can't support it. His plan offers the two sides a chance to compromise and save Wisconsin's hunting traditions from disappearing, he said.

"This is a reset button," Kroll said of his recommendations. "If we're going to continue to have the hunting heritage in Wisconsin, we're going to have to do this."

DNR Lands Division Administrator Kurt Thiede issued a statement saying agency officials haven't reviewed the report yet.

"We are not afraid to face recommendations and critiques that are contained in the report and adjust accordingly," Thiede said.

Deer hunters have been feuding with the DNR over the last decade or so, contending the agency's herd control tactics have become so ham-handed and rigid they're leading to anemic hunts.

Walker, a Republican, tapped into the rancor on the campaign trail two years ago, promising to respond to hunters' complaints. The governor's administration hired Kroll in October for \$125,000 to undertake an extensive review of the DNR's policies. Kroll and two other researchers have spent the last nine months studying DNR documents and data and meeting with DNR employees, stakeholder groups, Wisconsin's American Indian tribes and the general public.

Kroll issued preliminary findings in March that were highly critical of the DNR. He picks up where he left off in his final report, picking apart

everything from the DNR's population estimates to a lack of easily accessible, computerized maps.

The report says the department's population estimates aren't precise enough to serve as the basis for population goals in individual management zones. Zone goals are crucial to hunters because the numbers determine what herd control strategies, such as antlerless hunts, the DNR might impose on that area.

The agency should do away with zone population estimates and goals, saying most hunters have little faith in them, the numbers are indefensible statistically and the constant argument over the figures erodes the DNR's credibility. The DNR instead should adopt simple goal statements such as increase, stabilize or decrease population density and establish criteria to measure success based on local trends, such as crop damage, forest degradation or car-deer crashes.

The report recommends the DNR start a program that allows landowners and hunting clubs to run hunts on their property after consulting with DNR biologists. At least 20 states already allow such hunts, according to the report.

The hunts would help manage the local herd, build trust between hunters, landowners and the state and provide the DNR with valuable scientific data from the dead deer. The program could yield up to 25,000 deer and cost about \$100,000 annually. The money would come from enrollment fees and antlerless permit fees.

Wisconsin Democrats have accused Kroll of favoring private hunting clubs over public lands, pointing to remarks he made to "Texas Monthly" magazine in 2002 calling people who want more public land "cocktail conservationists who are really pining for socialism." They feared Kroll might recommend privatizing public lands.

Kroll dismissed that criticism as politically motivated - it came during the height of Democrats' attempt to

recall Walker this past spring - and he insisted his mini-hunt idea could apply across swaths of public land too.

The study also recommends the DNR step up its attempts to connect with the public and stakeholders. Agency biologists should spend more time working with forestry and agricultural specialists and develop local management teams that would include tribal representatives, the agency should involve volunteers in projects as much as possible and involve members of the Conservation Congress, a group of influential sportsmen who advise the DNR, in local deer management decisions.

"You guys almost overnight can go from heels to heroes just by working with people," Kroll said he told agency officials.

Still, Kroll praised DNR employees as competent professionals trying to do the right thing

for Wisconsin wildlife. He ended the report by admonishing hunters, saying they want to see more deer than the land can sustain. They want government officials to maintain a herd so large the state's forests would suffer and more motorists will crash into the deer.

"Ironically, by attempting to raise more deer than the land can sustain, they wind up with fewer deer," the report said.

Kroll warned that if the DNR and hunters can't agree on his recommendations the state's rich hunting tradition could vanish. Legislators will step in and start mandating heavy-handed changes, he said. Hunter numbers will decline and the DNR will have to rely on predators to control the herd, he said.

"Everybody's sick and tired of this and they're ready to do something," Kroll said. "The ball's in your court, pure and simple."

Pedestrian killed by hit-and-run driver

p.m. Sunday. He was taken to the hospital with a head injury and later died. WLUK-TV says the hit-and-run driver was in an older model silver or white Pontiac Grand Am.

Upstate NY historic site marks bloody 1758 battle

TICONDEROGA, N.Y. (AP) ~ The bloodiest battle fought on American soil before the Civil War is being remembered at Fort Ticonderoga.

The reconstructed 18th-century fortification on Lake Champlain's southern end is hosting events this weekend marking the 254th anniversary of the Battle of Carillon (kehr-ih-LAHN'), the French name for the fort built in the 1750s.

On July 8, 1758, a British-led force attacked

French positions outside the fort during a daylong battle that claimed the lives of hundreds of soldiers. The French repulsed multiple frontal assaults in what was considered their greatest victory of the French and Indian War. It was one of the largest battles in North America until the Civil War.

Special tours, musket demonstrations and battlefield programs are being held Saturday and Sunday as part of the fort's living history weekend.

2012 Oneida Spring Turkey Season a Success

The 2012 Spring Turkey season had a considerable increase in the number of permits issued to Oneida Sportsman and the total number of turkeys harvested. There was an increase of over 12% in the total number of Spring Turkey permits issued, compared to the 2011 Spring Turkey Season. You may recall, the 2011 season opened with much colder weather and had considerable snow cover on the ground. The warmer weather this year may have been a strong contributing factor to the increase of permits issued by the Oneida Conservation Department (OCD).

In all, the OCD had issued 323 Spring Turkey permits to Oneida Sportsmen for the 2012 Spring Turkey season. This Spring Turkey season Oneida Sportsman had the option of harvesting a total of four (4) turkeys. Each Oneida Sportsman had been issued a set of tags, which included one tag for a bearded bird (Tom/Jake) and an additional tag for a hen. Oneida Sportsmen were given the option to purchase an additional set of permits after successfully filling their first set of issued tags. All Oneida Sportsman were required

to register harvested turkeys with the Oneida Conservation Department staff or designated staff of Oneida Retail at the One Stop on Highway 54 in Oneida.

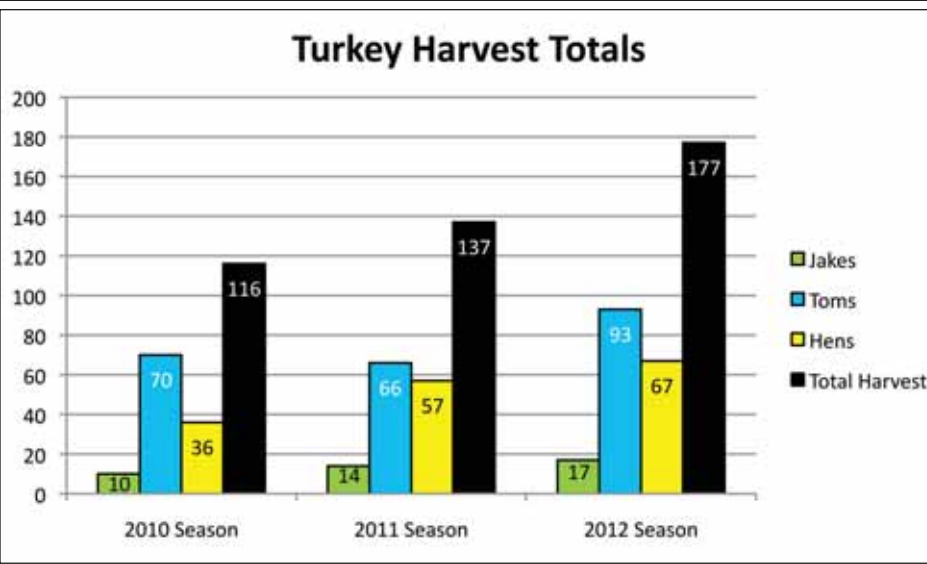
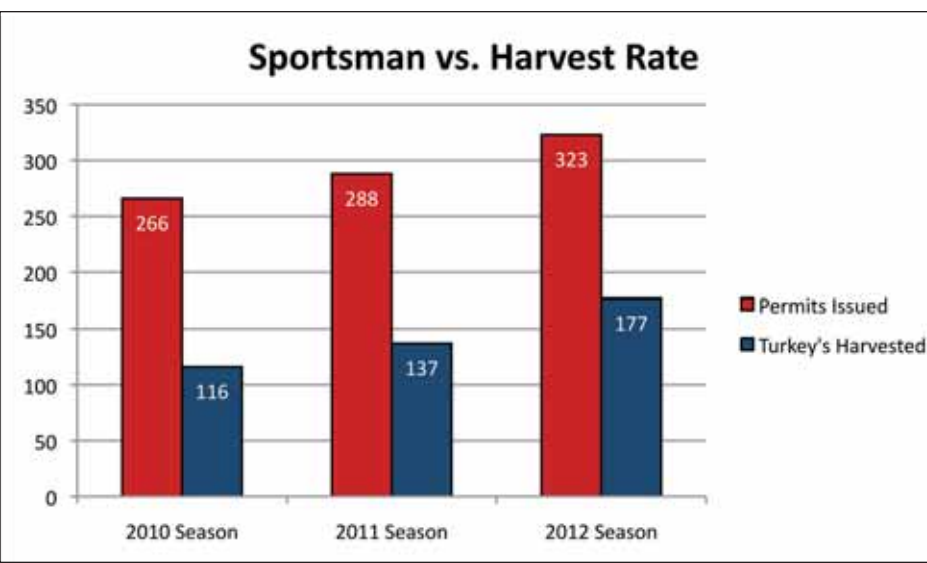
For the 2012 Spring Turkey season Oneida Sportsmen had an extended season, consisting of seven (7) consecutive weeks (4/7 – 5/27) to successfully fill their tags. This was one week longer than the traditional six (6) week season of years past. The legal hunting hours had remained the same and allowed Oneida Sportsman to hunt from a ½ hour before sunrise to ½ hour past sunset.

With the extended season and the 323 Sportsmen that had participated in the spring turkey hunt, the overall harvest of both bearded birds and hens had increased. The Oneida Sportsmen harvested a total of 93 Toms, 17 Jakes, and 67 Hens during the spring season. The overall total harvest was 177 birds for the 2012 spring season and resulted in a success rate of over 54% for Oneida Sportsmen. This high success rate was an increase of over 29% compared to the 2011 Spring Turkey season. The following graph illustrates the harvest

numbers from the 2012 Spring Turkey season compared to the past two (2) Spring Turkey seasons.

Overall, Oneida Sportsmen were extremely successful during the 2012 Spring Turkey season, as the harvest numbers and success rate indicate. The data collected from the Spring Turkey season will be considered as OCD staff plan for the upcoming Fall Turkey season. The annual Fall Turkey season will consist of twelve (12) consecutive weeks and open on October 6, 2012 and continue till December 31, 2012. Sportsmen will be allowed to harvest one bearded turkey and two hen turkeys. Legal hunting hours will remain the same as the Spring Turkey Season which are a ½ hour before sunrise to ½ hour after sunset. Oneida Sportsmen will be required register all harvested turkeys at the Oneida Conservation Office or other designated locations.

On August 20, 2012 the Fall Turkey tags can be purchased, at the same time as Oneida Sportsman purchase their 2012-13 Oneida Sportsman permits. The OCD will issue a set of three (3) Fall Turkey tags for a \$10 fee and will be

in addition to the annual Oneida Sportsman permit fee. The issued tags will allow Oneida Sportsmen to harvest one bearded bird and two (2) hens during the established season. All Oneida

Elders with a valid 2012-13 Oneida Sportsman permit will receive their Fall Turkey permits at no cost and may designate a sportsman to harvest turkeys for them. Any designated sportsman

will be required to harvest only hen turkeys for one specific Elder during the season and are required to register all harvested turkey with the OCD or other designated staff.

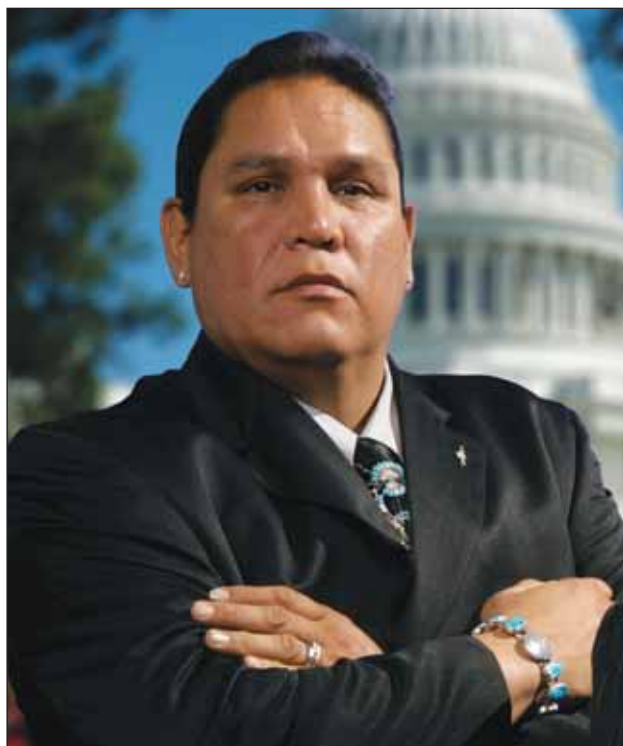

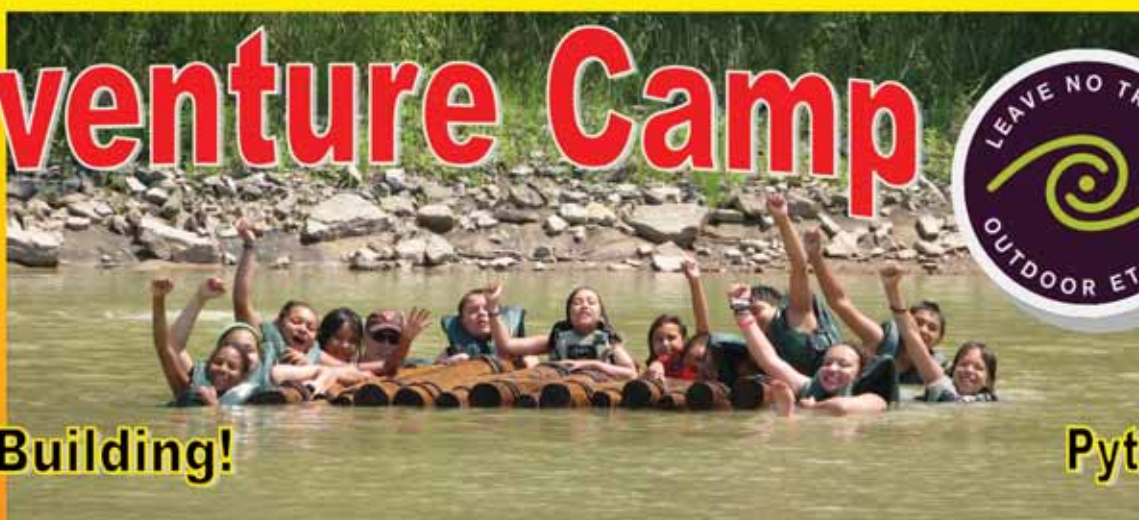

Information on Pregnancy and Prenatal Vitamins

What are they? Specially formulated multivitamins that help pregnant women get the extra nutrients needed during pregnancy. Prenatal vitamins have many different vitamins and minerals. Typically they will have more folic acid, iron and sometimes calcium than standard adult vitamins. Folic acid, iron and calcium are very important for a pregnant woman and her baby's health. Prenatal vitamins should be taken in addition to a healthy diet not a substitute for good nutrition.

Where/When can I get them? The Oneida Community Health Center guidelines specify that women who suspect they are pregnant or who have had a positive home pregnancy test can be seen at the clinic when they are 7-8 weeks. At that time a prescription for prenatal vitamins can be given. However, most women find out they are pregnant when they are 4-5 weeks and it is very important prenatal vitamins are started as soon as possible. Or if a couple is trying to get pregnant prenatal vitamins should be taken during this time even before pregnancy occurs. Wal-Mart sells a small container for 88 cents or any of the pharmacy stores

(Walgreens or CVS) will also have prenatal vitamins. All prenatal vitamins are not the same. Look for key ingredients and doses: 400-800 mcg folic acid, 400IU Vitamin D, 250mg Calcium, 50mg Vitamin C, and 30mg Iron.

Why do pregnant women need folic acid, iron and calcium?

- **Folic Acid:** reduces the risk of having a baby with a serious birth defect of the brain or spinal cord (neural tube). A common neural tube defect is spina bifida where a baby is born with a spine that is not closed. The exposed nerves are damaged, leaving the baby with different degrees of paralysis and sometimes mental retardation. Neural tube defects develop in the first 28 days after conception, before women know they are pregnant. Therefore, it is recommended if a woman is trying to conceive to take 400 micrograms of folic acid each day and continue this dose for the first 12 weeks of pregnancy. Natural sources of folic acid are: green leafy vegetables (broccoli, beans, peas), nuts, beans, and citrus fruits (oranges, orange juice). It is also found in many fortified breakfast cereals.
- **Calcium:** prevents a new mother from losing her own bone density,

since the fetus uses this mineral for bone growth. Natural sources of calcium are: milk, hard cheeses, yogurt, calcium fortified orange juice, breads and cereals. Vitamin D is also needed to absorb calcium otherwise it would be sent out of the body as waste. Natural sources of Vitamin D are limited: tuna, cheese, egg yolks, foods fortified with Vitamin D and sunlight exposure.

- **Iron:** helps prevent anemia, a condition where blood does not have enough healthy red blood cells to carry oxygen. Natural sources of iron are: lean red meats, salmon, chicken, and iron fortified foods.

What to do if Prenatal Vitamins cause nausea?

- Switch the time of day you take prenatal vitamin (if morning switch to bedtime).
- If you took on an empty stomach, try taking prenatal vitamin with food.
- Purchase children's gummy vitamins that have same components of prenatal vitamin.
- Talk with your doctor who may be able to prescribe something different.

Tsyunhehkwa gets 30K grant from First Nations

LONGMONT, Colo. ~ First Nations Development Institute (First Nations) has awarded 10 grants totaling \$300,000 through its Native Agriculture and Food Systems Initiative (NAFSI). The grants were made possible through the generous support of the Walmart Foundation.

The grants will help develop or expand locally controlled and locally based food systems in numerous Native American communities while addressing the critical issues of food security, family economic security, and health and nutrition, along with promoting American Indian business entrepreneurship. These NAFSI projects are expected to positively influence much of the populations of 10 separate tribal nations located in seven states, along with other Native nations that are not directly involved.

The 10 grants awarded were:

- \$30,700 to the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin in Oneida, Wisconsin, to support Tsyunhehkwa a project to improve food-preservation processes of white corn to mitigate the negative effects of climate change and to support a symposium for the other 10 tribes in Wisconsin that are working with traditional foods.
- \$22,355 to the Eyak Preservation Council in Cordova, Alaska, to develop an environmentally friendly food-processing and cold-storage plant to support and preserve sustainable and independent food harvesting in rural Alaska.
- \$32,129 to Bay Mills Community College

Land Grant Department in Brimley, Michigan, to develop the capacity to produce, process, and make available naturally raised poultry for the Bay Mills Indian Community.

- \$32,200 to White Earth Land Recovery Project in Callaway, Minnesota, to assist local growers with independent food production, recovery of local food system production, restoration of Native varieties of foods and to expand the farm-to-school pilot project.
- \$31,920 to Fort Peck Assiniboine and Sioux Tribes in Poplar, Montana, to purchase and install two large walk-in freezers, a walk-in refrigerator and shelving for the Wolf Point Food Bank. The food bank serves nearly 300 emergency food baskets each month to residents of the Fort Peck Reservation and five counties: Roosevelt, Valley, Daniels, Sheridan and McCone. The new food cold-storage system will double the freezer space and triple the refrigeration space.
- \$30,117 to Hays Community Economic Development Corporation in Hays, Montana, to establish a food co-op, develop a community garden, and provide classes on preparing wholesome meals, menu planning, and budgeting.
- \$32,179 to Cochiti Youth Experience at Cochiti Pueblo in New Mexico to create a localized food system by supporting existing farmers, instruct Cochiti youth on traditional farming techniques, and recreate the tradition of farming to

strengthen the Cochiti community.

- \$27,200 to Hasbidito in Cuba, New Mexico, to increase Navajo-controlled food production infrastructure in three chapters on the eastern edge of the Navajo Nation Counselor, Ojo Encino and Torreon by increasing certified food-production sales, developing food entrepreneurs, providing healthy cooking classes and holding social events centered on healthy food.
- \$30,000 to Wind Hollow Foundation, Inc., in Anadarko, Oklahoma, to provide for the completion of its business incubator for agribusiness, and to support a seasonal farmers market, a local farmer co-op and a greenhouse program.
- \$31,200 to Lac Courte Oreilles Ojibwa Community College in Hayward, Wisconsin, to support the continued development and expansion of canning and preserving classes, provide community members access to local foods throughout the year, and promote community farming and gardening.
