West Wind One Stop opens renovated station

The Oneida One Stop - West Wind location held a ribbon cutting ceremony on July 17, 2012 to celebrate the newly renovated station reopening.

Blending in with its West Mason street surroundings the One Stop closed due to construction on April 25, 2012.

The West Wind location, having been open for 22 years, was in need

of renovations to meet state regulations.

As a result the station was upgraded with a completely new design that includes new gas pumps, tanks and canopy.

To go along with the new station design the landscaping was also reworked and features more green space, new lighting, and sidewalks.

The exterior lighting of the gas station features environmentally friendly LED lights.

The WestWind One Stop also contains a Subway restaurant and

boasts a state of the art point of sale system.

With the new system and more checkout lanes customers will experience faster checkouts.

"This is a beautiful fueling station. This is a high traffic area for residents and tourists. So it is important that this be an example of two communities (Oneida and Green Bay) working happily together," said Green Bay Mayor Jim Schmitt.

The location will now be open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Hot, dry weather putting stress on Oneida Farm

While the rain on Tuesday, July 17 was welcomed by Agriculture Supervisor Dennis Vanvreeede, he stated it might not be enough to combat the hot dry summer the Oneida Farm has faced this year.

"It could rain for two days and it wouldn't bother nothing. I don't think you would even see a puddle, it's that dry," he said.

Dry weather with temperatures in the 90's has put stress on Oneida Farm's crops, livestock, equipment and employees. Director of Agriculture Jeff Scofield

says the situation isn't serious yet.

"Between all the rain that we had last year, we had pretty good sub-soil moisture for a while compared to a lot of the state and any place else that's got sand, so, knock on wood, we're right on the edge of really bad and ok," he said. "You go a few miles south of here and they're just bad, and the further south you go it's worse."

While hot weather has killed 10 of 200 fruit trees planted at the Oneida Orchard, it was a late frost that doomed the apple crop.

"Apples on the hill are ok, anything off the hill, there's nothing," he said.

The farm has put in a claim for disaster insurance to cover the crop loss.

Oneida Farm employees harvested alfalfa despite hot weather and hot equipment. Agriculture Supervisor Dennis Vanvreeede stated trucks are overheating.

"You've got a truck out in the field, you're expecting this truck to work, it's not just driving down the road, it's working hard, they're overheating," he said. "You can't look at the weather for you, you've got to go. We were averaging 12-14 hours a day all week. The staff held up pretty good. I've got a pretty good staff."

The Oneida Farm has made three cuttings of hay, but Vanvreeede is uncertain if they'll get their usual fourth cutting.

"You can drive by the fields right now, there's no re-growth there at all. There's nothing there, you've got to have water to feed it," he said.

In addition to rain, the cornfields need wind for pollination.

"If the corn don't pollinate, yeah, you've got a beautiful stalk, but there's no cob on it," said Vanvreeede.

For the most part, the Black Angus cattle and buffalo are dealing with the heat by moving very little during the day and

grazing at night.

"(The buffalo are) doing all right. We've been watching them really close, and they seem to be hanging in there pretty good, they're by the water a lot," said Scofield.

According to Tsyunhehkwa^ Director Jeff Metoxen the hot weather has killed some of the farm's chickens.

"I believe it also has

caused some predators to search more aggressively for food and we lost a lot of chickens to foxes in the area," he wrote in an email.

According to Scofield and Vanvreeede, the Oneida Farm benefits from having a lot of clay in the soil that retains moisture, and has fields scattered in several locations rather than in one large swath. For exam-

ple, the northernmost cornfield was damaged by a hailstorm, but all the other fields were untouched.

"We're hanging in there, but keep our fingers crossed that we get some nice rain," said Scofield. "Now you can start seeing a steady decline every day we don't get rain."

UW residence hall to honor American Indians

MADISON, Wis. (AP) ~ A new University of Wisconsin-Madison residence hall will be named in honor of American Indians.

Dejope Residence Hall opens Aug. 26 and will be home to 408 students near the Lake Mendota shore.

The name was selected after consulting with members of the Ho-Chunk Nation.

In the Ho-Chunk language, Dejope means "four lakes," a reference to lakes Mendota,

Monona, Waubesa and Kegonsa, which are connected by the Yahara River.

The Ho-Chunk and other American Indian tribes used to live on the land near the lakes.

The residence hall will also recognize tribal culture, including having a fire circle facing the lake and bronze plaques representing the 11 Indian Nations in Wisconsin.

Rivalries impede Chicago-Milwaukee metroplex

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (AP) ~ The greater London area needs only 34 government entities to oversee all its public safety, services, transportation, zoning and schools. Greater Toronto gets by with only 28.

When it comes to overlap and political fragmentation, the Chicago-Milwaukee metroplex is in a league of its own – the two adjoining metro regions are splintered into a profusion of 2,155 separate governmental entities, the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel reported Sunday (<http://bit.ly/OHIE3A>).

The Paris-based Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development says the inefficiencies and jurisdictional rivalries undermine what otherwise could become a vibrant economic bloc.

"Proliferation on this scale sometimes leads to myopic decisions, while area-wide consensus and long-term strategic thinking become difficult, if not impossible, to achieve," the global economic think tank wrote

in March. "Examples of duplication of service, over-taxation, and inefficiency are numerous."

Milwaukee's future in the region is the focus of a daylong conference Tuesday at Marquette University, sponsored by the newspaper and the Lubar Fund for Public Policy Research at Marquette Law School.

The OECD joined others who have argued that Milwaukee belongs to one of the world's emerging megacities - a three-state, 21-county hub stretching from Milwaukee to Gary, Ind. Advocates see advantages in creating a critical mass of universities, industries and globally minded entrepreneurs.

But Chicago and Milwaukee show as much interest in collaboration as the Brewers and Cubs or Packers and Bears, the Journal Sentinel reported.



Wis. town barred from beefing up farm water rules

MILWAUKEE (AP) ~ The Wisconsin Supreme Court ruled Wednesday that a rural town lacks the authority to impose tougher water-quality standards on a livestock farm than the state requires.

Magnolia, a community about 30 miles south of Madison, granted Larson Acres Inc. a permit in 2007 when it wanted to expand, but included a number of conditions because residents blamed it for polluting their water supply. The farm initially had

watched by rural Midwest communities struggling to deal with the expansion of so-called factory farms. States throughout the farm belt have seen big farms get bigger as the agriculture industry continues to consolidate.

Similar cases have been filed in six other Midwestern states, but Wisconsin's is believed to be the first to reach a state supreme court.

The lead plaintiff was Magnolia resident John Adams, who says he can't see the nearly 3,000 cows on Larson Acres' farm two miles from his

home, but when the wind blows he can smell them.

The stench gives him and his wife headaches. They blame the farm for contaminating their air and polluting the groundwater well they use for drinking, bathing and watering their garden. They no longer feel safe eating the vegetables they grow.

"A township should have the right to establish guidelines to keep its people safe, but it doesn't," Adams said in September when the high court first heard arguments in the case.

It takes a congregation to Build... And, to Restore...

Most people in Oneida know that Holy Apostles Episcopal Church is in serious trouble; spiritually, physically, and financially. I will comment on these troubled areas regularly as Holy Apostles moves through the phases of restoration over the next two decades. With that, Save Our Sanctuary Custodianship Trust (SOS) was created to help restore, repair, and maintain Holy Apostles

by supporting the Vestry in those efforts. The idea is the Vestry would contract out restoration work and SOS would help pay down that contractual debt through various fundraising activities. Information to support SOS or Holy Apostles directly is at the end of this editorial.

I was reminded that our people are buried there, our children are baptized there, and weddings are celebrated there. I am also reminded that Holy Apostles is special to all

Oneida's because it was built by our grandfathers. Holy Apostles is truly historical and it would be a shame for it to succumb to further deterioration and just allowed to crumble. These words may seem distant to you but the reality is the current congregation cannot support long-term restoration and maintenance costs.

The Vestry is currently charged with obtaining a balanced budget by the end of this year. I plan to report the progress of this

important fiscal responsibility. On a positive note Holy Apostles finance committee is meeting regularly at the Parish Hall on Mondays at 5:30pm to help the Vestry



Greetings to all the Tribal Nations here in Wisconsin and Kalihwisaks. I would like to bring forth an issue that has came to light here within the confines of the Wisconsin Department of Corrections that is appalling, not only to me, but I'm sure that a great many of you out in the free world may find quite disturbing.

We prisoners here with the Dept. of Corrections (hereinafter DOC) must rely strictly on "canteen catalog" vendors (monopolized) for our supplies, such as clothing, shoes, writing supplies, electronics, ect. Such catalogs also offer "religious" items for the prisoner faiths: Christian, Muslim, Pagan, Buddhist, Jewish and Native Americans. These

items as offered now, include a "FAKE EAGLE FEATHER" to be used in prisoner's worship. I believe that only Native Americans can use the Eagle Feathers in their ceremonies, and I firmly believe that this is strictly aimed at us.

I do not believe the DOC has consulted any Bona Fide Native Religious Leaders our in the Wisconsin Native Community regarding the use of such "eagle feathers", but instead went ahead to offer this. What are they thinking?




GET OUT THE VOTE

Purpose: Oneida Child Support Law Amendments

The intent of the Oneida Child Support Law (the Law) is to establish the legal responsibility of parents to provide financially for their children's well-being based on the real earning capability of parents. The Law establishes a standard of support for those children whose paternity has been established or acknowledged and encourages the use of voluntary agreements to resolve any disputes over child support obligations. The proposed amendments to the Law are as follows:

Amendment of Name. Change the name from Oneida Child Support Enforcement Agency to Oneida Tribe Child Support Agency (Agency). The purpose of this change is to better portray what the Agency does, as enforcement is only a portion of the work being done.

Overtime Pay. Specifically include overtime pay in the definition of Gross Income

for the purposes of paying child support.

Jurisdiction. Add long-arm jurisdiction as is provided in the Wisconsin State Statutes. This allows for broader jurisdiction over those respondents' who may not reside in the normal defined jurisdiction of the Appeals Commission.

Notice. Amend notice of hearings, thereby requiring that only the notice of the initial action be served via certified mail and all subsequent notices by first-class mail.

Publication. Amend the provision regarding notice via publication. Due to the Kalihwiaks changing the frequency of their publication, the law now requires publication three consecutive times in either the Kalihwiaks or other newspaper in the county where the respondent resides.

Past-due Obligations. Update the section on arrears to now include past-due obligations.

Review. Require the Agency to review the child support order

every two years. If a substantial change in circumstances exists, then the agency is required to file a motion with the Appeals Commission to have the order amended if the parties cannot agree to the amendment.

Motion to Amend. Authorize any party to file a motion to modify the child support order, and sets the timing for scheduling a hearing to no sooner than ten calendar days after the date of service on the opposing party.

August 9, 2012
Purpose: Oneida Paternity Law Amendments
The intent of the Oneida Paternity Law (the Law) is to establish paternity of Oneida children and other Indian children in order to protect the best interests of these children regarding such matters as enrollment, customs and traditions of the Tribe, survivorship and inheritance, health, support, and social security benefits. The proposed amendments to the Law are as follows:

Amendment of Name.

Change the name from Oneida Child Support Enforcement Agency to Oneida Tribe Child Support Agency (Agency).

The purpose of this change is to better portray what the Agency does, as enforcement is only a portion of the work being done.

Jurisdiction.

Add long-arm jurisdiction as is provided in the Wisconsin State Statutes. This allows for broader jurisdiction over those respondents' who may not reside in the normal defined jurisdiction of the Appeals Commission.

Timing of Filing.

Allow a petition to determine paternity to be filed at any time after the child is born.

Notice. Amend the provision regarding mail delivery to allow for regular first-class mail rather than registered or certified mail.

Update of Address.

Require the alleged fathers' who appear and participate in an action to inform and keep updated their current

address at all time with the Agency and the Appeals Commission.

Administrative Subpoenas.

Authorize the Agency to issue administrative subpoenas to require the mother, child and alleged father(s) to appear and take a paternity test.

Reopening of Judgment.

Clarify that either the adjudicated father or the Agency can reopen a default judgment of paternity.

Stipulations.

Allow for the alleged father to stipulate to paternity and then to custody, placement and child support matters.

Public Hearing Process

I. Testimony:

A. Oral: There will be a 5 minute limit for all oral presentations. Each participant is encouraged to provide a written transcript of his/her oral testimony, to be submitted while present at the public hearing or within ten (10) business days from the date of public hearing to the below named individuals.

B. Written: For those

scheduled public hearing or do not plan to speak at the hearing, the Oneida Tribe encourages those to submit written testimony. A maximum of ten (10) pages, doubled spaced, can be submitted within ten (10) business days from the date of public hearing to the Tribal Secretary (Patricia Hoeft) or to the Legislative Reference Office Paralegal, Tonya Boucher, at the Norbert Hill Center, 2nd floor or mail to PO Box 365, Oneida WI 54155.

Conservationists, hunters clash on Wis. wolf hunt

STEVENS POINT, Wis. ~ Conservationists and animal lovers pushed the state Department of Natural Resources' board Tuesday to reduce kill goals for Wisconsin's new wolf hunt, arguing the population remains fragile.

The DNR has proposed limiting the harvest to 201 wolves, roughly a quarter of the state's population. The agency's board was expected to vote on the plan Tuesday.

The wolf hunt has emerged as one of the most contentious wildlife issues the DNR has had to navigate in recent years. Nearly 100 people packed the board's meeting at a Stevens Point hotel, and 43 had registered to speak, promising a long, bruising debate before the vote.

Hunt supporters argued wolves have more than re-established themselves in the state. Ecologists, conservationists and wolf lovers countered a hunt combined with other wolf deaths from illegal kills and car crashes could result in a drastic dip in wolf numbers.

Howard Goldman, the Minnesota state director of the Humane Society of the United States, told the board there's no biological reason to hunt Wisconsin wolves, noting President Barack Obama's administration just removed Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin wolves from the endangered species list in January.

"What's the rush?" Goldman said. "The wolf is not just another game species."

Orman Waukau, a member of the Menominee Nation tribal council, told the board his people revere the wolf.

"In effect, we're saying we're going to go out there and hunt our brothers and sisters," he said.

But hunter representatives countered the quota is too low, pointing out the DNR estimates as many as 880 wolves roam the state, far exceeding the agency's goal of 350.

Ralph Fritsch, chairman of the Wisconsin Wildlife Federation's wildlife committee, called the harvest goal "ultra-conservative" and said it will do nothing to decrease the population. Bob Welch, speaking on behalf of the Hunters Rights Coalition, said it's ludicrous to think hunters will wipe out Wisconsin's wolves. Hunters want wolves around because they're a trophy species, he said.

"Hunters are going to become the strongest advocates for wolves," Welch said. "That's how it's worked with every other species."

Gov. Scott Walker signed a bill earlier this year that calls for a wolf hunt from Oct. 15 through the end of February. The legislation set out almost all the hunt's parameters, including permit fees and allowing hunters to hunt at night and use bait and traps. The measure left the total harvest and permit limits to the DNR, however.

The agency released an emergency rule package earlier this month that set the total kill quota at 201 across six management zones, establish higher sub-quotas in areas that have seen more depredation and limit permits to 2,010. Bill Vander Zouwen, chief of the DNR's wildlife ecology section, told the board the agency is trying to find a balance between hunters and wolf lovers, but warned the first season will be touch-and-go.

"This whole first season will be a time for us to learn and adapt," he said.

DOJ supporting inmates in ceremonial tobacco suit

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. ~ The U.S. Department of Justice is supporting Native American inmates in their lawsuit challenging South Dakota's ban on tobacco in religious ceremonies.

Inmates Blaine Brings Plenty and Clayton Creek in their 2009 federal lawsuit against the South Dakota Department of Corrections contend that a prison policy that bans the use of tobacco during religious ceremonies is discriminatory. The state said ceremonial tobacco inside the state penitentiary was becoming increasingly abused, and the policy is not overly restrictive because it allows other botanicals such as red willow bark to be burned.

The Justice

Department, in a brief filed late Friday, said the state's position runs contrary to the Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act and U.S. Supreme Court precedent.

"The court should decline this invitation to determine the importance of tobacco use to practitioners of Native American religions," the Justice Department attorneys wrote. "Accordingly, the court should also reject defendants' argument that they have not placed a substantial burden on plaintiffs' religious exercise."

The South Dakota prison system went tobacco-free in 2000 but made an exception for tobacco used in Native American ceremonies. But officials in October 2009 eliminated that exemption, saying tobac-

co was being sold or bartered and inmates had been caught separating it from their pipe mixtures and prayer ties.

Members of prison-based Native American Council of Tribes sued, arguing that for Native American prayer to be effective, it must be embodied in tobacco and offered within a ceremonial framework.

Brings Plenty and Moore in their suit said the policy change violates their U.S. Constitutional rights ensuring that no prisoner be penalized or discriminated against solely on their religious beliefs or practices.

Their attorney, Pamela Bollweg, argued before U.S. District Judge Karen Schreier in March that prison officials have to show there's a compelling interest in limit-

ing access, and even if there is a compelling interest they have to use the least restrictive alternative.

James Moore, the attorney representing prison officials, argued that South Dakota's policy change followed more than 10 years of conversations with tribal elders and traditional healers, some of whom perform pipe ceremonies without tobacco. He said prison officials stopped short of banning the use of pipes.

Moore did not immediately return a phone call Monday seeking comment on the Justice Department's intervention.

Other states, including Nevada and New Mexico, have prison smoking bans but allow Native Americans to use tobacco during religious ceremonies.







Rec. kids Explore the Outdoors

What interesting, nasty, yet important creatures can be found in our local wetlands? Some local community kids from the Oneida Summer Recreation Program recently found out at an outdoor, hands-on Bugs and Wetlands class.

During the week of June 11, Oneida Environmental, Health & Safety Division presented their Bugs and Wetlands class to approximately sixty community children around the ages of seven and eight. The purpose of the class is to teach kids the important role bugs and wetlands play in our environment and to gain an appreciation for wetlands. As the kids learned, wetlands are an important natural resource because they mitigate pollution and provide habitats for many different creatures. The biodiversity present can help determine health of the wetland.

The kids went out to a wetland and observed fish and other invertebrates in a tub that contained animals that call the wetland home. The critters were captured in the wetland prior to the class. The obvious big hit was the giant water bug. About two inches in size, the giant water bug is a very nasty predator of the wetland as seen by the kids when the giant

water bug took on a crayfish and killed it. The giant water bug also made quick work of the many more fish that fell victim to its viciousness.

After observing the diverse variety of creatures in the tub, the kids then got to get hands on. They used nets to catch critters such as leeches, fish, predacious diving beetles, dragonfly larvae, water scorpions, and many other invertebrates. The critters were then put into a cup to be observed more closely and probed under a microscope. The excitement and fright from the kids observing these

strange critters was evident, but it did not impede their curiosity to see and learn as much as they could.

At the end of the class the kids were given magnifying glasses to take home to see what other kinds of bugs they could find in their own backyard. You don't just have to be a kid to enjoy bugs and wetlands and it's not limited to your backyard.

There are many places to go on the Oneida Reservation where the best of the bugs can be seen. Some of the top natural areas to go see are Coyote Run around Olsen and Cooper Rd., Where the Water Birds Nest, and the Oneida Buffalo Overlook. 

Community Education Center GED-HSED update

soon as possible. It should be noted that the National Testing Services (NTS), which prepares and distributes all the GED tests for the United States, is scheduled to change and update the GED test questions and subject matter. The new test format will continue to include the standard mathematical concepts, but will add advanced branches of math, including questions in trigonometry. The new test will include short answers, sorting and multiple choice questions. The essay portion of the GED test will remain and the whole test will be computerized. **The new format of the GED-HSED is scheduled to be implemented on January, 2014.**

In addition to other classes and programs, the CEC has recently collaborated with the Oneida Human Resource Center, the College of Menominee Nation and the Department of Transportation on a successful TrANS program. TrANS is a public-private model to prepare the underemployed with skills needed to gain access to skilled jobs. It is a free program. In May, 2012, this program graduated 10 people who immediately began to work for the Oneida

Housing Authority. CEC hopes to provide more opportunities of this kind to address the preparation and placement of Oneidas in skilled jobs.

Enrolled Oneida Nation young people will continue to be helped with PASS Units and 5.09 HSED services, free of charge, regardless of which area public school they attend. Quality instructional services will continue to provide limited high school credit through PASS units.

A College Bound Boot Camp will be offered at CEC from July 23 through July 26. This program will provide basic training to anyone who would like to review their computer skills, and to refresh and enhance the basic math and writing skills needed to satisfy the demands of college course work.

The Oneida Community Education Center will continue to provide updates on new programs, services, and classes offered throughout the year to meet the needs of the community. The CEC website is updated regularly and contains scheduled programs and planned development. CEC staff members invite community members to take a look at this valuable resource.

A new sign hangs on the wall of the Community Education Center. It reads: "Change (Classes, Services and Programs) is headed for the CEC!" What does this mean? The Community Education Center is revamping its current services, classes, and programs to better meet the needs of the Oneida Nation community. For instance, the CEC will be reducing and minimizing services that community members can access elsewhere in the community. The CEC will provide Oneida community members with new services, classes, and programs that will help them become more qualified for jobs, prepare them to succeed in their educational endeavors, and enable them to become more self-sufficient learners.

The CEC will continue to assist the Oneida Nation community members with GED preparation. Anyone who wishes to prepare for the GED exam would be advised to begin this process as





Oneida Housing Authority Comprehensive Plan Community Meeting Report

The first of ten monthly community meetings on the comprehensive plan elements was held on July 5, 2012 at the Little Bear Development Center. The July topic focused on housing. There are currently three entities in the organization that provide housing to our membership. They are the Oneida Housing Authority, managed by Dale Wheelock; the Division of Land Management, managed by Dr. Fred Muscavitch; and Elder Services from the Governmental Services Division, managed by Don White. PCSD finalizes \$29.9 mil. referendum plan

After five years of study, the Pulaski Community School District Board of Education recently approved plans for a \$29.9 million referendum at their meeting on Wednesday, July 11. The original price tag of the referendum hovered near the \$46 million mark but, after eight listening sessions with community members around the district, board members scaled back their referendum projects.

"We went out, spoke to the community, listened to our taxpayers, and sharpened the pencil," PCSD Superintendent of Schools Dr. Mel Lightner. "These updates are desperately needed, and we feel confident that these proposals will not only give our students the facilities they need and deserve, but will ensure that taxpayer money is used as efficiently as possible, as well."

Board members also

approved a second part of the referendum for technology upgrades: a \$650,000 revenue cap increase over five years. A revenue cap increase allows school districts to exceed the state mandated revenue caps for needed projects.

The \$29.9 million dollar proposal will increase result in a 73 cent mill rate increase for individuals living within the PCSD, while a 42 cent mill rate increase will cover technology costs. If both questions pass, PCSD residents would see a mill rate increase of roughly \$1.15 for five years before it would drop back down to a 73 cent increase.

As part of the \$29.9 million proposal, nearly every school in the district would receive updates, upgrades and/or additions.

Fairview Elementary, which hasn't seen any major updates since it opened more than 40 years ago, would receive

a new gymnasium (currently, the school only has one multi-purpose room that serves as both a cafeteria and a gym) as well as updated classroom space, a new library (the school's library is now housed in a classroom) and new HVAC components.

Renovations to Glenbrook Elementary would make the area around the school safer for students. Presently, the school's parking lot is too small and crowded to serve its student population, many of whom walk to school each day or are dropped off by parents or guardians. A larger parking lot with a more efficient traffic-flow pattern proposed in the referendum will solve these problems while providing a less hazardous environment for students.

Hillcrest Elementary, currently the district's fastest growing elementary school, would receive an updated

library space (which will allow more than one classroom to use the library at a time) while the old library would be converted into two classrooms to better serve the growing student body.

At Sunnyside Elementary, classrooms located in the school's windowless basement would be moved to a first-floor addition, allowing natural light into the rooms, while the old classrooms would be converted into a larger library.

The district's athletics and aquatics facilities, which are now housed at Pulaski Community Middle School, would be moved to Pulaski High School as part of the referendum proposal.

The updated athletic facilities would include a multi-purpose field for varsity football and soccer use, and would accommodate the community's rugby program as well. The sports complex will also feature an

updated track, a new baseball diamond, a new softball diamond and a competition soccer field. The new community aquatics facility would include an eight-lane competition swimming pool, as well as a warm-water therapy pool and a community fitness center with ample daytime hours for use by Pulaski area residents.

Technology updates, funded by the district's increased revenue cap, will help bring the PCSD more comparable to other school districts across the state.

Presently, the district spends roughly one percent of its total budget on technology, in contrast to the statewide average of about three percent. The increased revenue would bring the PCSD more in line with the state average while also replacing several hundred aging machines that have reached the end of their lifecycle and can no longer efficiently run

new technology. Other long-term technology updates and upgrades include increased access to classroom devices for students at all grade levels.

"These devices will help propel student learning to prepare them for the world they'll enter after school," Amy Uelmen, District Technology Instructional Coordinator said. "These are important 21st century skills necessary for success in society today."

At their meeting on Wednesday, August 15, Board of Education members are slated to approve resolutions to that will bring the referendum to the citizens of the district in November. The meeting will be held in the PHS library at 6:00 p.m.

(Greetings to all of you)*

Many of you may not know, but here in Oneida, Wisc., we were given wampum by the Fire keepers and Delegates within the Confederacy. Symbolically, this means that our community has its own "fire," or place within the Chiefs Council. In August we will "bundle up our words" and send a delegation out East to inform the Kalihwiyo Delegation Tonawanda that we would like to host the Kalihwiyo (the Good Message) this fall. There is a lot of responsibility to carry this mes-

sage and to recite these words. WE are very fortunate to have Wolf Clan Faith Keeper, Leander Danforth – Shalihokt "Come to the End of the Words" and his helper Bear Clan Faith Keeper, Ron Hill – Lanuhsunihe "He Builds a House," carry on with these traditions in our language.

Our Faith Keepers met on Sunday, June 11, 2012 after Strawberry Ceremony to discuss if, financially, we can host Kalihwiyo this year. We are in need of restroom facilities and a new floor in the longhouse as well as money for expenses such as: gas, hotel and stipend for speakers who

will recite Kalihwiyo, food for guests and community for five days. Considering all of this we have collectively decided to go forward with hosting Kalihwiyo because of the importance for the community.

Here are our financial needs:

1. \$8,000.00 to host the Kalihwiyo
2. \$14,500.00 to build rest rooms and run water to the kitchen
3. For supplies only, labor is covered





Woodland Indian Art Show & Market celebrates 6th year



The Woodland Indian Art Show & Market successfully completed its 6th Annual year on July 1, 2012. It ran at the same time as the Oneida Powwow and for the 3rd time, you could find the Market in the Norbert Hill Center Building.


Fourteen artists from midwest American Indian Tribes set up booths and entered the juried art competition that took place on Friday, June 29th, 2012. An art

The Traditional Art category of the Woodland Indian Art Show features artwork that comes from the artist's tribe, expresses the artist's heritage and has usually been practiced for several generations. The skills to create the artwork are typically passed on informally, for example, through some sort of apprenticeship. Artists must disclose use of synthetic hair, commercially tanned leather, plated metal, plastic beads and commercial synthetic materials used in the artwork. The artists who won in this category exemplify these standards. Ken Metoxen won 1st place for his "Stagger Lane Clay" pot. He explained his techniques for creating the pot: "The clay was dug up from Stagger Lane, Oneida REZ, WI. I processed the clay by taking out roots, stones,

etc. Traditional gathering and processing was done through prayer, tobacco and guidance of Rose Kerstetter, master potter. This is a traditional Oneida hand built vessel with 16th century form and Oneida incising of female effigies. It was traditionally hand built and pit fired. No electric. No gas, No wheel throwing." Doug Limon won 2nd place for a traditional cradleboard. Cradleboards have been used for centuries by Indian tribes in North America. Doug's winning cradleboard was made from cedar, oak, rawhide and glass beads. He carved and bent the wood used and assembled it with rawhide and leather. He used a straight line method of beading to create a beautiful Monarch Butterfly, which was inlaid on the head of the cradleboard.



Kateri

Dawn Dark Mountain, a member of the Oneida Nation in Wisconsin and a world class winning water colorist, took first and second place for her "Evergrowing Tree" and "Kateri" in the category of Two-Dimensional Art. The "Evergrowing Tree" depicts a wampum belt which was an open invitation for all nations of the earth to come under the centuries' old Iroquois laws of peace. There is no beginning and no end to it, and it can grow to accept as many nations as there are who want to sit under the tree of peace with the league of five Iroquois nations (Oneida, Mohawk, Onondaga,

Seneca, Cayuga). The 38" H X 30" W "Evergrowing Tree" is painted in transparent watercolor on paper, which was cut and manipulated with glue and linen tape to depict the Wing Belt or Evergrowing Tree wampum Belt of the Iroquois. Dawn's second place artwork is called "Kateri." This piece honors a Mohawk woman named Kateri Tekakwitha, and reclaims her as a woman of the Iroquois. Kateri was born in New York in 1656 and died in Caughnawaga, Canada in 1680. During Kateri's short life, she

impressed all who knew her with her remarkable life of virtue. Upon Kateri's death, devotion to her began immediately by her people. This year, the Catholic Church announced that she would be canonized as a saint. Dawn used transparent watercolor on paper to complete her 30" H X 38" W "Kateri."




Unmatched Pair of Boots

Iroquois Raised Beadwork is a unique art category that is only found at the Oneida Woodland Indian Art Show because there are so many excellent beaders here.

Betty Willems, who took first and second place for her "Victorian Memories" and "Unmatched pair of Boots" is no

exception.

Besides at the Woodland Indian Art Show and Market, Betty has won Best of Show for her garments and beadwork at the Cherokee Indian Art Market in Tulsa, Oklahoma. Iroquois Raised Beadwork became a highly prized commercial product when it

began to be sold at world fairs and to tourists in the Niagara Falls area. This art was recently revived with the Oneidas in Wisconsin through the commitment of a growing number of men and women.

Ren Katchenago, Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa & Chippewa, won first place in the Three Dimensional Art category with a piece he called "Winter Song." His artwork captured four singers around a drum similar to what you would expect to see at a northern woodland Powwow. It was a beautiful piece of art carved from plaster on pine with copper accents on the drumsticks. Each figure was intensely involved with their song, and it was captivating, no matter what direction you were looking at it. Mark Fischer's "Rabbit Dance" won second place in the Three Dimensional Art category. The rabbit dance is a social dance done at most gatherings of the Longhouse people. It is a fun, lively dance, and Mark has captured this happy feeling in his rabbit dancing the "Rabbit Dance." It is so amazing

how much life Mark Fischer can hammer and hand form from copper and hard silver. All his pieces are story tellers, and the green patina of the copper comes from Mark's fascination with ancient Indian pictographs. Mark is a member of the Oneida Nation in Wisconsin.

Functional Items and Apparel is the most diverse category in the Woodland Indian Art Show, and includes clothing, jewelry, beadwork, rattles and drums, for example. Sandra Peterson, a member of the Lac du Flambeau Band of Chippewa, won first place in this category with a pair of "Ojibwe Moccasins." They are described as being handmade and sewn out of buckskin and decorated with beads. Robyn Buschke, a member of the Oneida Nation in Wisconsin, took 2nd place in this category with a ruffled seed bead necklace, decorated with amethyst.



Kalihwiaks

Dangerously high temperatures along with high humidity prompted the Emergency Management Homeland Security (EMHS) area to open the Oneida VFW to provide relief.

Temperatures reached the 90-degree level numerous times making Monday, July 16 the fourth time an emergency cooling shelter was utilized in the Oneida area.


The process to open a cooling shelter may not be as easy and defined as thought.

"We have a plan that's adopted by resolution. The problem is getting all of these departments to go with the plan. We have buildings that have been walked through by public safety officials that have been designated as shelters," said EMHS Director Marty Antone.

According to Antone, the adopted plan calls for an assessment to be done by primary responders, such as police officers, to determine the need and level of response needed to a situation.

There are no criteria like certain temperature thresholds, to utilize a cooling shelter. Antone said resources must be wisely used and a few heat related incidents will not necessarily open a shelter.

"We have to weigh how many people versus cranking up the electricity and cooling a building



down," he said. "We have the library, casino, and the mall. There are places people can go to get cold. That's why the initial assessment is so critical."

Once a shelter is open public safety officials complete a series of evaluations to determine what is needed.

"We do have partnerships with the Red Cross and we do make on-site assessments to determine what services are needed. Depending on the needs that walk through the door we have contacts we can contact for assistance," Antone said.

Antone acknowledges that everyone may not know when the shelter is available some outreach work was done.

"We've had presentations at elder sites but people can forget, too. We have a public information officers and we depend on

them to get the word out for us," he said.

Antone does offer some simple but effective advice.

"If you don't have to be outside be inside. Don't risk it. Watch for blotchy skin and dizziness. Sun block should be required," he said.

Wis. officials confirm 8 heat-related deaths

MADISON, Wis. (AP) ~

Wisconsin health officials confirm eight heat-related deaths since July 1. And another 11 deaths also may be heat-related.

While half of the confirmed deaths happened in southern Wisconsin, officials say two of the deaths were in Barron County and two in La Crosse County.

Officials continue to urge Wisconsin residents to take precautions as the hot weather continues this week.

State Health Officer Dr. Henry Anderson says people should keep hydrated, slow down, stay indoors and avoid strenuous exercise during the hottest part of the day.

The Department of Health Services continues to gather information on the number of heat-related deaths statewide.

Conviction reinstated in NY cigarette case

NEW YORK (AP) ~ A federal appeals court has reinstated a racketeering conspiracy conviction of one of New York's biggest cigarette dealers.

The three-judge panel in Manhattan reversed a lower court decision vacating the conviction of Rodney Morrison.

The ruling on Monday means the already jailed Morrison must return to court for sentencing on the conspiracy count. No date was set.

Morrison had been targeted by an investigation of untaxed tobacco flowing from the state's Indian reservations. He was accused in 2004 of running a violent criminal enterprise that fed the cigarette black market.

He was acquitted of murder, robbery and arson, and later convinced the judge to toss out the conspiracy conviction. But he was convicted of gun possession.

A judge sentenced him to 10 years in prison on the weapons count.


