## GTC meets for semi-annual meeting

Nearly 1900 General Tribal Council (GTC) members worked efficiently through the Semi-Annual meeting's agenda.

The GTC approved meeting minutes from the July 4, 2011 Semi-Annual meeting, November 21 special meeting, November 28 Budget meeting, and January 2 Annual meet-

ing.

The Treasurer's fiscal year 2012 semi-annual report was accepted. The report was as of May 31, 2012. A wide-range of topics were discussed that didn't pertain exactly to the report but were entertained. The Oneida 2012 semi-annual report was then quickly accepted with no discussion.

Bulky amendments to the current Oneida Trust Enrollment Committee Bylaws were approved. They include the additions of the committee's ability to hire

personnel and oversee trust fund distributions, the requirement of the committee chair to gather input from other committee members when evaluating Directors. The amendments removed the committee's responsibility to interpret the tribe's Membership Ordinance, Trust Agreements along with any subsequent trust or enrollment laws. They also removed the committee's duty to assist with per capita payment distribution.

The amendments also

increased the committee chairperson's meeting stipend to \$100 from \$75 along with the ability to conduct a meeting even if the committee chair and vice-chair are not present. The secretary can call the meeting and a Chair Pro Tem is selected to preside over the meeting.

An amendment to the Vacation and Personal Day policy within the Personnel Policy and Procedures capping the accrual of vacation and personal time at 280 hours was approved.

Three referendum questions were turned down by the GTC by a simple hand vote. The long debated absentee voting option was voted down during an August 2010 meeting by the GTC but then supported in a vote in July of 2011. The OBC was looking for final direction. The GTC again voted to disallow absentee voting. No further action will be taken regarding absentee voting.

The referendum question prohibiting tribal employees that are

required to attend GTC meetings from collecting the GTC meeting stipend was voted down.


The final question asked of the GTC was if they wanted the Chief of Police position to be elected. The GTC again voted down the request to make the Chief of Police an elected position. Many cited the importance of consistency in a public safety position and that they didn't want political pressure to play any role in decision making during a Chief's tenure.



## Indian health care act permanently authorized

After passage of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) in 2010, the nation waited for the June 28, 2012 United States Supreme Court to ruling that declared act was constitutionally sound. As part of that act, the Indian Health Care Improvement Act (IHCIA) was permanently reauthorized. According to Oneida Comprehensive Health Division Director Debra Danforth, there was a 14 year wait on that legislation. As for the impact the Supreme Court ruling will make on the Oneida Community Health Center, "It's exciting it passed, but it's still a wait-and-see kind

of game," said Danforth.

The IHCIA permanently authorizes daily health care delivery to nearly 2 million American Indians and Alaska Natives served by the Indian Health Service (IHS), who are in critical need of improved health care services. A snapshot of health conditions highlights the critical need for improving health care in Indian Country; Native people suffer from higher rates of diabetes and related illness, heart disease, and substance abuse than any other group.

Part of the IHCIA allows for expanded third-party billing to federal programs such as Medicare and Medicaid. Also, under the PPACA individuals will be required to get health insur-

ance, although Native Americans are exempted from the penalties for not getting insurance.

"With the passage of the Affordable Care Act, that would allow us to decrease our demand for tribal contribution even more, because we would be able to generate and collect revenue from those services," said Danforth.

"To have everybody have insurance could mean tremendous impact for us in terms of the ability to generate revenue. We're only funded right now at about 44% to 45% of the level of need for the patients that we serve through Indian Health Service, so with that funding, what we've attempted to do is enhance our third

party coverage, our third party revenues, so that anybody that doesn't have coverage, we try to see if they're eligible for anything."

The IHCIA expands programs for mental health, dialysis services, and long-term care.

"That could have a tremendous impact for us, too, in terms of revenue generation coverage for the new Anna John Residence Centered Care Community," she said.

The act also allows tribes to enter into memorandums of agreement with the US Department of Veterans Affairs.

"We could negotiate with the Veterans Administration to allow our tribal members to access care for long term care at our facility. Those are some of the things that were still in the negotiation phase," she said.

Finally, tribal health services could do more to recruit and retain health workers in their facilities.

"We have a shortage of primary care, we have a shortage of internal medicine, we have a shortage of psychiatrist and psychologist and so if those things get funded by the federal government, it's going to mean a tremendous impact for us in terms of being able to approve our access and potentially improve the level of access to the community and recruitment of providers. All of

those kinds of things that will have a direct impact on," she said.

However, the IHCIA is dependent on funding which hasn't been allocated.

"When the Supreme Court came back with their decision, a lot of those things that were included in the affordable care specifically through the Indian Health Care Improvement Act basically were ... unfunded mandates. They said 'you have to do this, but there's no money,'" she said.

Also, politics makes the future of the PPACA and possibly the IHCIA uncertain. While some states have started setting up insurance exchanges, including the Fond du Lac Band of Lake Superior Chippewa in Minnesota,

Wisconsin's Republican led government returned federal funds that were to be used to set up the state's exchange. This may cause some organizations to wait until after the Presidential election in November to see what party is in power before making plans.

"Overall, it's a tremendous step in the right direction for us in terms of what we want to do. Even if they do repeal, I think they're going to have a lot of opposition to repeal the Indian Health Care Improvement Act after all the benefits that it has brought forward as far as a permanent ruling on Indian Health Care. That's the biggest win that we have in terms of moving forward," said Danforth.






## Loretta Says... WWII and the War Effort

**W**e are at war, the term for it is War on Terror. This war ensued after the attack on the World Trade Center in New York by two United States commercial airliners hijacked by foreign terrorists.

The Twin Towers of the World Trade Center collapsed killing approximately 3000 persons.

I decided to write about this because we are oblivious to the war. We seem to have very little connection to it unless we have an immediate family member involved. Over 6000 of our military have already perished in this war.

During World War II, we were involved in the war every day—every man, woman and child. We collected cans and flattened them for recycling. Kitchen grease—pork and bacon fat—was saved and collected to produce nitroglycerine for explosives. All scrap metal went to produce ships, tanks, and jeeps.

The soft down of mature milkweed pods were gathered by children to fill life-saving jackets for the Navy. It was called Kapok.

Many, many Oneida men and women enlisted in all branches of military service. Men and women moved off the Oneida Reservation to work in defense plants at Sturgeon Bay, Manitowoc and Milwaukee. Women who worked in the shipyards or factories producing big machinery were called Rosie the

Riveters. All young men were drafted. Many were volunteers. All able bodied men on farms had to go, but at least one was exempted to run the farm. Our next door neighbors sent three brothers to the Army.

Families purchased War Bonds. Famous people, primarily movie stars, participated in tours throughout the United States called bond drives to encourage

everyone to participate in the War effort. Children would buy stamps at school for a quarter to put on a card. When the card was filled with about \$18.00 worth of stamps, it could be redeemed at the end of the War for \$25.00. After Ira Hayes (Pima from Gila River Reservation) assisted in raising the U. S. Flag on Iwo Jima, he was recruited to circulate around the Country to raise funds for War Bonds. These funds were used to finance the War.

Food was rationed. Gas was rationed. Shoes were rationed. Ration books with stamps in them were issued to every family. Sugar and meat were two items that were controlled by the number of stamps issued, depending on family size.

We always had plenty of our own food on the farm whether it was meat or vegetables, so we could trade some things we produced for sugar. Sugar stamps could be obtained from acquaintances or relatives who lived in Green Bay. More gas was allowed to farmers with tractors because they had to produce as much food as possible for the war

effort. They had to produce for the troops as well as for the civilian population. I believe we got one pair of new shoes a year. We passed them on down anyway. We all ran barefoot all summer. My brother, Jerry, said he had to join the Marines to get a pair of boots, but he was too young during the war to recall if he had shoes or not. Only the pictures of that time show proof.

My mother wrote letters to Joe Ninham, one of the Ninham cousins she grew up with. He was called Joe Diamond. I don't know why he had that name. He was killed while aboard a ship off of Saipan. Mom knew he was a casualty before the telegram arrived to tell his mother (Aunt Adeline) so. Mom also wrote to Martin Van Schyndel from the next door farm. He served in the Army in the South Pacific. Letters were important to boost the morale of those in the front lines. Letters were written in one direction in the normal fashion.

Then, the letter would be turned sideways and the writer would write over the original message directly across it. The letters were censored. Everybody's letters were read by somebody to screen out dangerous messages. A slogan was "Loose lips sink ships". The letters would be copied in a smaller version before sending to the military recipient. This method reduced the tonnage of all the mail.

All of this continuing effort was headed up by the United States government. I do not know why we are not unified in doing something like this today, even if the motivation was to reduce the national debt. The war costs trillions of dollars and we are going deeper in debt every day. It would be far less costly if every man, woman and child participated in the war effort.

## Minutes

Minutes from the June 13 regular meeting were approved along with minutes from the June 18 special meeting.

## Resolutions

on a more permanent funding solution.

"We're thrilled that provision was included in this bill," Hanna said.

Petri had voted against an earlier House version. He said the bill that passed Friday has a funding formula that's more favorable for Wisconsin.

"Today's bill essentially maintains the favorable formula we have been working with since 2005," Petri said. "We are getting this bill through just in time to avoid disrupting our state's road construction season."

Under the formula, Wisconsin would receive \$719 million next year and \$725 million in 2014, Petri said.

The other major aspect of the bill involved averting interest-rate increases on new loans to millions of undergraduate college students. Interest rates of 3.4 percent for subsidized Stafford loans were slated to double on Sunday. Instead they'll continue for another year.

Had the measure failed, interest rates would have mushroomed to 6.8 percent for 7.4 million students across the nation who are expected to get the loans over the coming year, adding an extra \$1,000 to the average cost of each loan.

U.S. Rep. Tammy Baldwin, a Madison Democrat and U.S. Senate candidate, said the agreement will benefit more than 160,000 Wisconsin college students in the upcoming school year.

"In passing this important legislation today, members of Congress have shown that they can work together in bipartisan fashion to address challenges facing our nation," Baldwin said. "I sincerely hope that today's action marks a new commitment to focus on the issues that matter most to hard-working, middle class Wisconsinites."

Appleton Mayor Tim Hanna applauded the results, saying the outcome buys more time for transit officials to work

## BIA issues environmental impact statement on Kenosha project

(Keshena, WI) - The Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) has released the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin Kenosha Casino - Hotel Fee-to-Trust Acquisition Final Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). The Final EIS analyzes the potential effects of the proposed acquisition of 223 acres in Kenosha, Wisconsin for the Menominee Indian Tribe and the Tribe's subsequent proposed development of the property as a casino-hotel; offering Class III gaming pursuant to the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act.

Upon notice of the completion of the EIS, Menominee Tribal Chairman Craig Corn stated: "This is a great

step forward for the Menominee Tribe, citizens of Kenosha, and the State of Wisconsin. A project of this magnitude will bring over 5,000 good paying new jobs to Wisconsin, while also creating thousands of family sustaining construction jobs."

Chairman Corn went on to state, "I commend the BIA for taking the time and effort to thoroughly review the effects of the Tribe's proposed Kenosha facility and ensure that all applicable regulations have been met. I believe the EIS provides the Secretary of the Interior the information he needs to make a decision that this Project is in the best interest of both the Menominee Tribe and the greater Kenosha community."

## Treasurer's Report

### Sheku, Greetings

We have had a few successes in the Finance area over the past few weeks. Our first big triumph is that we paid off the Wastewater Treatment Center Bond in the amount of \$6.8 million dollars. We also were able to pay off the Health Center Bond Redemption in the amount of \$4.710 million

dollars. Paying off these bonds has reduced our overall Tribal debt by \$11.510 million dollars. Our second accomplishment is we have reached \$11 million dollars in our reserve account. This is a huge victory for us as we have struggled for quite some time with the ability to put money into savings. These major achievements are due to our execution of prudent

fiscal management. While none of the decisions have been easy, they have been necessary in order for us to regain comfortable footing.

One of the largest issues when debating due diligence and fiscal management is, needs versus wants. Getting to the root of what each area needs has been instrumental in deciding what has to be budgeted for. Yes we all want more, more money to hire additional staff, more money to travel to seminars, more money for the latest computer system (in some cases, a current one), more money for additional supplies, etc., but are those things really necessary? While

some areas were and are still resistant to the implemented changes, the Finance Department has not lost sight of the goals and have pushed for less discretionary spending. With the goals of putting money in reserve and paying down our debt, all the changes were necessary.

One of the projects I have been working on for quite a while now is the creation of an Oneida Health Board. In the past, our Health Boards have been oversight boards without any authority. The Health Board I would like to promote would have authority over the business as well as the personnel. The discontinuation of the General Manager position has left the Division Directors reporting to the OBC Chairman. There is a fine line between supervising the Division Directors and being involved in the day-to-day business. The creation of a Health Board with authority would allow for supervision of the Health Care Directors

and it is my hope that we would see improved customer service as well as more available appointment times.

The Health Board would be staffed with people who have health care backgrounds as well as those with business backgrounds.

My thought is to have a well-rounded board that is able, not only to understand the issues, but to also implement solutions in a timely and efficient manner. This new idea, considering none of our other Boards have authority over their respective areas, has met with some resistance. Change is not something that everyone likes or can buy into immediately. While I understand the hesitation to try something new, I believe the creation of this Board will be instrumental in the Tribe's re-organization process. When the new Health Board proves to be successful, we can implement these types of Board's throughout the Tribe and that is what I believe the GTC is asking for when they men-

tion re-organization. They are not looking for boxes to be moved around on a chart, they are looking for accountability and responsibility.

It is too easy to point fingers at others and say things like, they're not doing their job, or they don't do anything all day long. These comments are out there because it is someone's perception of what is occurring. Remarks of these types are made about everyone in a supervisory capacity, including myself. Rather than taking the time to ask questions and determine what is really happening, many of us choose to take the easy route and place blame. While this is unfortunate, it occurs very regularly and I hope with the creation of authoritative boards, we will see more compliments than complaints.

I wish you all continued happiness and health through these beautiful summer months and hope you find the time to enjoy the good weather.

### Holy Apostles

#### Church: Correction

In a proactive effort to be more accurate about church documentation (and the Kali is kept for historical reference) I provide the following information.

1. *Clarification One:* The Vestry of Holy Apostles Episcopal Church met at a specially called meeting by the Finance Committee on June 27, 2012 and passed the following motion:

"Motion to close access to church based on imminent danger to our parishioners and/or anyone who comes within the parameters of the front of Holy Apostles Episcopal Church. The vestry member who made the motion requested to be put on record with the following statement: "It is the responsibility of the vestry and the "priest in charge" to assure the safety and wellbeing of the church community and all others who come within the church grounds and should the motion fail I absolve myself from any responsibility."

The motion passed.

2. *Clarification Two:* The funds which will be utilized for the critical repairs are from a trust fund set aside for Holy

Apostles Episcopal church by one Mildred Davis and in no way is the Diocese of Fond du Lac paying for this repair. On the contrary, since the Bishop holds the control for the Davis Trust the wording in the Kali states, "Funding for the repairs will be though the Diocese in Fond du Lac" - it can be misleading. Those funds belong to our church.

3. *Clarification Three:* The information given the Kali states, "A fair estimation for repairs is approximately \$100,000 to \$130,000 for the exterior. For the record that estimate is from four (4) years ago with the understanding that every year that went by the damage would increase - and it has! So, to say \$100,000 to \$130,000 is "fair" does not do justice to our situation.

4. *FOR THE RECORD:* The vestry passed a motion which would set aside \$250,000 to accommodate the most critical needs as based on the 2008 appraisal which we know has four years of additional degradation.

The Finance Committee continues to work very diligently on correcting our beautiful as well as historically significant and spiritual beacon. We meet every Monday evening at 5:30 pm in the former convent if anyone is interested in helping figure out a way to help save our sanctuary you are welcome to join us.


#### Church Restoration

Every Oneida, no matter where you live con-

tinues to be impacted by Oneida Holy Apostles Episcopal Church. The historical church building is in need of "tip of the iceberg" repairs consisting of the bell tower and east elevation side walls and has temporarily closed. The June 21st Kalihwiaks repair costs and funding sources are not accurate and thus the reason for this comment. Now and in the next few years, Holy Apostles will have no choice but to undergo a series of major "below the iceberg" repairs starting with the roof; steep pitch, brittle slate shingle perhaps containing asbestos, and three chimneys in poor repair. Then the west elevation walls will need repair. Also, the ceiling will need insulation and west end ventilation.

The point is this... fixing the church is a long-term community commitment because the "true" costs of restoration and repair cannot be sustained by the congregation. What does this mean? The congregation can start fixing some of the needed repairs but without community financial support; Holy Apostles will eventually degrade beyond the congregational ability to maintain it. This brings us to current repairs for which it is all from congregational (mostly Oneida tribal member money) and not from Diocese of Fond du Lac or other sources such as the Oneida Tribe. It is currently up to us (tribal community) to fix the church building and in the future it will still be up to us.

**NOTICE TO SPECIAL ELECTION CANDIDATES**

The Oneida Election Board hereby informs you of the laws as they pertain to campaign signs and campaigning within the Oneida Election Law:

## 2.5-9. Campaign Signs and Campaigning:

- (a) Placement of campaign signs:
  - (1) Campaign signs shall not be posted or erected on any Tribal property except for private property with the owner/tenant's consent.
  - (2) No campaign sign shall exceed sixteen (16) square feet in area. A maximum of seven (7) such signs may be placed on a building or on a lot.
  - (3) No campaign signs shall project beyond the property line into the public right of way.
  - (b) Removal of campaign signs. All campaign signs shall be removed within five (5) business days after an election.
  - (c) Employees of the Tribe shall not engage in campaigning for Tribal offices during work hours. Tribal employees shall be subject to disciplinary action under the personnel policies and procedures for political campaigning during work hours.
  - (d) Enforcement. The zoning Administrator shall cause to be removed any campaign signs that are not in compliance with this law, in accordance with the Zoning and Shoreland Protection Law.
  - (e) Fines. Violation of the campaign sign restrictions shall result in a fine imposed by the Oneida Election Board in an amount specified in a resolution adopted by the Business Committee.

For 2.5-9 (3) above, all signs located within any right-of-way need to be moved. If they are not moved, the Zoning Administrator will remove these signs. If any signs are erected in any right-of-way, they may be subject to fines per 2.5-9 (e) of Oneida Election Law.

**Purpose: Oneida Child Support Law Amendments**

The intent of the Oneida Child Support Law (the Law) is to establish the legal responsibility of parents to provide financially for their children's well-being based on the real earning capability of parents. The Law establishes a standard of support for those children whose paternity has been established or acknowledged and encourages the use of voluntary agreements to resolve any disputes over child support obligations. The proposed amendments to the Law are as follows:

**• Amendment of Name.**

Change the name from Oneida Child Support Enforcement Agency to Oneida Tribe Child Support Agency (Agency). The purpose of this change is to better portray what the Agency does, as enforcement is only a portion of the work being done.

**• Overtime Pay.**

Specifically include overtime pay in the definition of Gross Income for the purposes of paying child support.

**• Jurisdiction.**

Add long-arm jurisdiction as is provided in the Wisconsin State Statutes. This allows for broader jurisdiction over those respondents who may not reside in the normal defined jurisdiction of the Appeals Commission.

**• Notice.**

Amend notice of hearings, thereby requiring that only the notice of the initial action be served via certified mail and all subsequent notices by first-class mail.

**• Publication.**

Amend the provision regarding notice via publication. Due to the Kalihwiaks changing the frequency of their publication, the law now requires publication three consecutive times in either the Kalihwiaks or other newspaper in the county where the respondent resides.

**• Past-due Obligations.**

Update the section on arrears to now include past-due obligations.

**• Review.**

Require the Agency to review the child support order

every two years. If a substantial change in circumstances exists, then the agency is required to file a motion with the Appeals Commission.

updated their current address at all time with the Agency and the Appeals Commission.

**• Administrative Subpoenas.** Authorize the Agency to issue administrative subpoenas to require the mother, child and alleged father(s) to appear and take a paternity test.

**• Reopening of Judgment.** Clarify that either the adjudicated father or the Agency can reopen a default judgment of paternity.

**• Stipulations.** Allow for the alleged father to stipulate to paternity and then to custody, placement and child support matters.

**A. Oral:** There will be a 5 minute limit for all oral presentations. Each participant is encouraged to provide a written transcript of his/her oral testimony, to be submitted while present at the public hearing or within ten (10) business days from the date of public hearing to the below named individuals.

**B. Written:** For those who cannot attend the scheduled public hearing or do not plan to speak at the hearing, the Oneida Tribe encourages those to submit written testimony. A maximum of ten (10) pages, doubled spaced, can be submitted within ten (10) business days from the date of public hearing to the Tribal Secretary (Patricia Hoeft) or to the Legislative Reference Office Paralegal, Tonya Boucher, at the Norbert Hill Center, 2nd floor or mail to PO Box 365, Oneida WI 54155.

Currently the work at the Oneida Resident Centered Care Community (ORCCC) is full steam ahead. As of the end of June the current progress is as follows:

The structure is complete. All roofing is installed and the building is dry, with the exception of the sky lights that are scheduled to be installed the week of July 9. If you have been by the new facility you may have noticed the spray applied insulation on the building. This is the complete exterior insulation assembly; no batt insulation is installed in the wall cavities. Currently the exterior siding is being installed and is roughly 40% complete. The stone work is also now complete with some very attractive engraved granite Oneida medallions at the canopy at the main entry. All of the

stone you see on the building was purchased several years ago in preparation of the original expansion, now the great majority of it has finally been used for its intended purpose.

Inside the building the drywall has been under way for a few weeks and by the time you read this three of the five resident wings will be complete, along with the main kitchen and many of the offices and back of house areas. Currently I would place the drywall installations at roughly 50% complete.

Mechanically the facility is moving nicely. You may have noticed the solar array on the roof, this system is not for electricity, it supplies the building with hot water for both domestic and for heating uses. All of the air handling systems are in place and the duct work is going well. The plumbing in the entire facility is complete; it is now down to running the

main lines to tie it all together.

To the south hopefully you have seen the parking areas installed. This is only the first of a two layer system that will be completed later this summer. The areas along S. Overland Rd. and Howard Rd. have been landscaped and are complete other than the walking/bike path that goes around the facility.

Currently the project has 58 workers on site daily. Of these workers 31 are tribal affiliated, 22 Oneida, 2 documented descendants and 7 from other tribes. All of the employees here are proving themselves to be some of the best in the business and are working hard to put out the best product possible.

I would like to take the time on behalf of Kraus-Anderson construction to thank you all for the opportunity to bring this facility to life for you. It is our honor and pleasure to be here.



# Story Sticks used to help individuals find balance

What is your story? Your life story is as unique to you as your fingerprint. Now, those persons working to overcome substance abuse at Oneida Behavioral Health are making progress with the help of a culturally traditional lesson called Story Sticks.

Scott LaLonde, a Certified Substance Abuse Counselor, who has been working at Oneida Behavioral Health for over 11 years, has found that the lessons of the Story Sticks have proven quite helpful. Often times the men and women seeking to overcome addiction and balance in their lives are unaware of their strengths, talents and those who have touched them in a positive way during their lives.

So, as part of their work to seek balance in their lives, Scott asks them to take a walk in the woods near the Behavioral Health Building and choose a stick. He said that, at first, some are resistant to the task but when they walk into the woods their eyes start to search and their ears are listening so they can soon choose their own part of a tree of learning, their very own stick. Once they have chosen their stick, they learn about the traditional meanings associated with the story sticks, which represent their lives. They can choose items to add to their story sticks that represent personal strengths, those who have positively affected them and experi-

ences that have taught them important lessons.

After they spend a couple of weeks creating their story sticks, they share with their group that their story sticks represent and what went into creating them. The people can then look upon their story sticks to help them stay on a good life journey or on the Red Road. They can keep adding strengths and lessons to their story sticks. Their story stick is a symbol of their strengths and those who have given them strength.

Scott has seen how the lessons of the story sticks have helped him become a better counselor. The experiences have helped him appreciate through the stories of others how the hurts experienced by past generations have affected those who come to seek balance even today. He has seen how such a cultural and traditional lesson such as the Story Sticks can reach out to indigenous people in a manner that improves more conventional substance abuse treatment approaches.

So, what are the origins of the Story Stick within the cultures of Indigenous Peoples? Sandy Dennett, an Oneida Tribal Elder, completed her Doctorate in 2007 with her thesis focusing on the valuable lessons of Native women creating story sticks as symbols of strength in their lives. Additionally, Sandy was looking at how the creation of personal story sticks could improve the quality of

counseling for Indigenous people. Many may remember Sandy Dennett as the Health Promotion Coordinator for the Oneida Tribe for 5 years when all Tribal employees received a weekly wellness message as one of her duties.

In her thesis, Sandy offered an example of how a teacher explained story sticks to her class by saying, "Traditionally, American Indians would gather together to discuss concerns within their tribe. The individual speaking held a stick that contained objects symbolizing his personal history or a specific event. As long as the stick was held, he (or she) was not interrupted by anyone, out of respect."

In the fall of 2006, Sandy brought together 23 Indigenous women, ages 13 to 88; to create their own story sticks. They met in small groups over a period of 5 dates with each group meeting for 3 to 4 hours to complete their own story sticks using an assortment of tree branches, a large assortment of items to symbolize sources of strength. Questions posed to the participants evoked sources of strength from formal recognition, family, friends, employment, personal skills, one's own creativity or constant learning their traditional beliefs to name a few.

With this preparation, everyone began by choosing a tree branch

and adding symbols that represented personal sources of strength. Once completed, each spoke about the choices they made to create their story sticks and what their story stick said about them. Their sources of strength came from family members, nature, Tribal sources, spirituality, creativity, freedom, happiness, grounding and belief in self. In response to questions to participants months after the creation of their story sticks, they shared how the experience helped them to become more self-aware, accepted, insightful and complete. They expressed how their story stick continued to bring them calm, a peaceful feeling and helped them

recall beautiful memories. Their Story Stick continued to remind them of good sources of strength.

Scott's use of the Story Stick process is to be commended. He teaches with enthusiasm and a belief in using various techniques to remind us that we all have many sources of strength.

We see the continued value of the Story Stick, as researched and experienced through Sandy's group of Indigenous women. Clearly, this valued ceremony and the symbol of the Story Stick representing the many strengths within one's life story can assist healing and personal growth within the Recovery programs at Oneida Behavioral Health.

## Breaking the Chain of infection

Breaking the chain of infection? What does that mean? Well, when we talk about infection control, it means stopping a microorganism or germ (infection) from spreading any further. By breaking any link in the chain you can stop the infection from spreading.

Below are the links in the chain.

- Infections agent –These are the germs that travel around, and visit lots of different people and places.
- Reservoir - These are the places the germs like to hang around until they can make it to the next link in the chain. These germs can be found in our water, foods, human waste or secretions that happen when we talk, sneeze or cough.
- Portal of Exit – This is

how the germs get from the reservoir to their next destination. The portal of exit can be your nose, mouth, open sore, cuts, etc., or any other opening in your body.

- Method of transmission – How the germs move from one person or object to another. Sometimes the germs just infect another person right away and sometimes they hitch a ride on an object or wait around for their next victim. For example, the act of sneezing is one way that germs are spread. When you sneeze the germs leave your body and can contaminate another person or object like a table, desk, computer or telephone.
- Portal of Entry – How the germs get in your body. For example if you touch a contaminated object you may become infected by

touching your face. Or the germs can enter your body through any opening in your skin like a cut or sore. Remember these germs are very small and can enter through the tiniest opening in your skin.

• Susceptible host- That means that the person being exposed to the germ has an immune system that is not functioning properly and they can become infected more easily.

So what is the good news? You have a pretty awesome body that comes fully equipped with a state of the art defense system which includes your "intact" skin and your immune system.

4. The Oneida retail gift card will NOT be dispensed at the nutrition class.







The Farm has approximately 450 - 500 head of Black Angus cattle, with about 200 plus cow/calf pairs which is used to stock their beef feedlots. Selecting livestock genetics increases the amount of meat that animals produce. The cow/calf operation works like this: about 6-7 months of the year, the beef cows will be grazing in a 237.4 acre pasture to feed along with a couple of excellent breeding bulls. These cows/bulls are supplemented with mineral, vitamins and a total mix ration of hay and some corn.

When a beef cow is at about 2 years of age, she will give birth, nurses her calf until 6-8 months of age. To make sure we have a healthy beef calf, it also receives a free choice of a grain mix supplement, vitamins and minerals.

When it is time to sort



off the calves from the mom, the male and some female go to the comfortable feedlot area and are raised for finished beef sales for our valuable beef customers.

The other selected female calves are then raised as cows for reproduction of the herd and

should around the age of two give birth, which is increasing the point of origin beef herd.

Normally a beef cow can give birth up to 8-10 calves in her lifetime.


But to keep our herd growing, at times the Farm will need to purchase some replacement

beef cows to give birth at Oneida Nation Farms.

The Farm can tell you exactly where that meat came from, which is now being called 'Point of Origin' and adds much value to your products.
