to Abramoff charges

WASHINGTON (AP) -The Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan was among the tribes caught up in the web of federal conspiracy, fraud and tax evasion charges filed Tuesday against lobbyist Jack Abramoff.


Abramoff pleaded guilty to the charges, promising to cooperate with prosecutors in what could be a wide-ranging influence peddling investigation involving members of Congress. Abramoff faces 30 years in prison and could be forced to pay \$25 million in restitution.

Prosecutors said Abramoff and former partner Michael Scanlon conspired to defraud American Indian tribes in Louisiana, Michigan, Mississippi and Texas of millions of dollars. Scanlon pleaded guilty in November in a separate case in Washington.

The filing by federal prosecutors does not specify the Saginaw Chippewa tribe, but Abramoff and Scanlon's firm was retained by the Mount Pleasant, Mich.-based tribe in 2002 to perform lobbying and grass roots services.

Prosecutors said in June 2002, Abramoff encouraged the tribe to expand its contract with the company without disclosing that he would receive about 50 percent of the profits from the tribe's payments to the firm.

From June 2002 to October 2003, the tribe paid the firm about \$3.5 million and about \$540,000 was secretly kicked back to Abramoff as part of the scheme, the court documents said. "Abramoff used his knowledge of lobbying and grass roots work, which was superior to the Michigan Tribe's knowledge of these areas, to secure and keep the trust and confidence of the Michigan Tribe," the complaint said. were left Messages Tuesday with tribal leaders. Bernie Sprague, formerly the tribe's sub-chief, told the Senate Indian Affairs Committee in September 2004 that his tribe paid Scanlon \$10 million and Abramoff \$4 million over three years but received little in return. The tribe paid Scanlon \$4.5 million for a database of Michigan voters, he said, only to learn later that it could have been purchased for \$75,000. "There is not a word in my language that is strong enough to describe what these people have done to my tribe," Sprague said in Senate testimony. "These unsavory characters who lie, deceive and steal from Indian tribes need to be exposed for who and what they are." The committee found that Abramoff and Scanlon spent \$100,000 to help get eight supporters elected to the Saginaw Chippewa's 12member council in 2001. Two days after the election, the new council voted to hire Abramoff and Scanlon.





"Go! Go! Go!" shouts Cathy Delgado as the O-Town Kickers take control of the soccer ball and head for the opposing team's goal.

After years of cheering for their children at sporting events, Oneida women are taking the field at the Sports Emporium in DePere to play indoor soccer.

"Most of us had been watching our kids at the Civic Center soccer league and went to the UW (Green Bay) Phoenix game and were enjoying it and saying, geez, wouldn't it be fun if we could play soccer," said Beverly Scow, one of the team organizers. Cindy Thomas who was at the game knew Rosanne Peterson who played in a women's soccer league.

"Before we knew it, we had a team put together," said Scow, "Alice Skenandore from the Midwives Shop, we invited her to play on our team and she offered to sponsor us instead."

Skenandore paid for the first registration fee and bought shirts for the new team.

"We're the best dressed worst soccer team in the league," said Scow, "But we're just having a good time."

The O-Town Kickers play in the SS Novice League and went 0-8 in it's first eight-

Oneida couldn't contain Bowler's Derrick Nillison. Nillison was on fire for the game and finished with 36 points, including 7 threepointers.



"One of the exciting things is if I'm elected, it's really a vote of confidence from both Oneida and Non-Oneida people that they're going to elect a person who just happens to be Oneida to give them a voice at the county level," she said.

Both Hoeft and Hinz would like to see more diversity on the county board.

"I think our community is changing, our county board, our political element, should represent our whole community," said Hinz.

"Because some of Oneida lies in some of Brown County, we have a strong voice here. This is our home and it will always be our home, and it's important when policies are shaped, that there's a voice that represents the views of Oneida, of women, of families in our community." said Hoeft.

Hoeft doesn't foresee the two-year position interfering with her duties as secretary of the Oneida Business Committee. She likened the once-a-month meetings to obligations held by other committee members such as positions on Great Lakes Inter-Tribal Council and other organizations.

"I really see it as an extension of my job for Oneida." she said.


After several decades, Allen Green finally received three medals and two badges that he had earned as a Private First Class in the United States Army during World War II.

"We wanted simple and elegant, and that is what we got," said Oneida Appeals Commissioner Winifred Thomas.

Thomas also said the that the decision to select the new logo was unanimous.

"It's very rare to have everyone agree on something," Thomas said. "It was total consensus."

The Commission staff meet with Rod Hill and conveyed

to him their thoughts on the new logo and a few weeks later he brought back a handful of drawings.

After a quick discussion, they had made their decision to go with the new logo.

"At first we thought about adding the scales, then we decided no we don't want the scales," said Thomas. "Then we wanted to add the clans, then we backed off and decided no we don't. Through that process, viola this is what we got."

The Appeals Commission said that this was just a soft unveiling to give the Oneida community a glimpse of the new logo, but a grand unveiling is hoping to take place sometime this summer at the annual powwow. Thomas said she is hoping to unveil the logo along with the new judicial act.







Process

The screening process is an important step in the hiring process. However, there are many misconceptions about how the screening process works. Some believe the Human Resources (HR) Specialist is the only one who decides who gets an interview. Others believe the HR Manager chooses. Still others believe there is a "secret list" of who does not get an interview. Each of these beliefs is a misconception. Let's walk through how the screening process works.

The Screening Committee

The screening committee consists of the open position's supervisor, the HR Specialist, a Personnel Commission member and the Area Manager (at his/her option) who are each voting members in the screening. This committee comes together after the position is closed to screen the applicants. The Personnel Commission member is a part of the committee to represent the Oneida community-at-large in the selection of Tribal employees. The Area Manager may participate as a member of the screening committee at their choice. (Please note: Only if the Area Manager is a part of the screening committee can the Area Manager also serve as a voting member in the interview process.)

ensure the application:

- * is complete
- * is accurate
- * was submitted on time
- * meets minimum required and essential qualifications on the job description

An application must be entirely filled out to be considered complete. Applicants cannot leave portions of the application blank to be completed later. Applicants must also provide accurate information. Some information disclosed on the application is verified by HRD through background checks. All applicants receive a written receipt of the arrival time/date of certification, drivers license, etc. Applications must meet ALL the requirements to be eligible for an interview. The screening process is complete when all the applications have been reviewed and a list of qualified applicants to be interviewed is established.

Applicants who have been screened out will receive notification that they have not been chosen for an interview. Applicants who are eligible for an interview will receive a letter with the date, time and location of their interview.

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Schools asked to drop mascots

Madison, Wis. (AP) The state schools superintendent is asking Wisconsin school districts to drop American Indian names, mascots and logos, saying they perpetuate stereotypes.

Superintendent Elizabeth Burmaster sent letters making her request to 39 districts in late December.

According to a group representing Indian educators, the Wisconsin Indian Education Association, the state has 39 schools with Indian logos, mascots and names, including the Auburndale Apaches, the Wisconsin Rapids Red Raiders, the Rib Lake

Hatchets.

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Burmaster wrote in her letter, "As you know, I believe that stereotypical American Indian logos do not support sound educational practice because they interfere with a school's efforts to provide accurate information related to history, culture and tribal sovereignty of American Indian nations."

She said the state's schools must make sure all students feel welcome.

"Stereotypical logos can hurt our children, albeit unintentionally," she wrote.

Burmaster said she supports two identical bills in the

Redmen and the Tomahawk Legislature that would force districts to prove their mascots did not promote discrimination and stereotypes if a resident complained. If they could not, they would have to change their mascots within a year or face fines of up to \$1,000 a day.

The bills have not been assigned to committees yet. Sen. Luther Olsen, R-Berlin, chairman of the Senate Education Committee, said he did not agree with the bills or Burmaster's position.

"If we ever believe in local control, we have to let them choose their mascots," he said of schools.

But Barb Munson of the

Wisconsin Indian Education Association said all school boards need to address the issue.

"I think the thing I find particularly pernicious about using (Indian names) in the public schools is that's where we're teaching people; that's where we're telling people what life is," she said.

At Mukwonago High School, where sports teams are known as the Indians, senior Tim Reiter said he sees no reason to find a new name, and few people have asked for one.

"It's been around for a while. It's part of our heritage," he said.

State to resume talks with Ho-Chunk

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Madison, Wis. - Within a matter of months, state government will resolve a bitter dispute with the Ho-Chunk Nation over \$60 million in gaming revenues it claims the tribe owes, Gov. Jim Doyle's top aide predicted Tuesday.

The state believes the Ho-Chunk owe that amount under a compact that called for the tribe to pay \$30 million in 2004 and 2005 to run its casinos. The Ho-Chunk withheld the money after the state Supreme Court in 2004 ruled tribal compacts signed by Doyle were unconstitutional.

If negotiators fail to reach an agreement, an arbitrator appointed last month by a federal judge in Madison will issue a binding ruling on the dispute by June, Department of Administration Secretary Stephen Bablitch said. A tribal negotiator said Tuesday he hoped to reach an agreement soon.

"The arbitration will actually be along a parallel path with negotiations," Bablitch said. "I'm confident that the state will get money but the question is, is it \$60 million or something other than \$60 million?"

Bablitch spoke to reporters at the Capitol after a Senate to appoint an arbitrator.

Other Wisconsin tribes reached new agreements after the state's high court ruled in 2004 that Doyle overstepped his authority in approving agreements with tribes that allowed more games such as craps and roulette and that had no expiration dates.

The Ho-Chunk tribe, which runs casinos in the Wisconsin Dells, Nekoosa and Black River Falls, stopped offering the new games after the ruling and said it would withhold payments to the state until it reached a new deal. With negotiations at a stalemate, the state asked U.S. District Judge John Shabaz in October

Buffalo, N.Y. (AP)Assemblyman Sam Hoyt, preservationists and antigambling groups will go to court next week to try to halt construction of a Seneca Indian Nation casino in the city.

The group on Friday announced plans to file a lawsuit in U.S. District Court Tuesday that claims federal agencies, including the Department of the Interior, ignored laws governing the approval process for gambling on Indian land.

They'll ask a judge to declare the casino illegal.

The announcement came as the Senecas celebrated the partial opening of a 26-story luxury hotel adjacent to their existing casino in Niagara Falls. The Senecas Friday opened the first 10 floors of the hotel, which towers over the Niagara Falls, N.Y., skyfull hotel in March.

The Senecas' broke ground on the Buffalo casino Dec. 8 on nine acres of land currently occupied by an early 1900's grain elevator complex which preservationists say is eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.

In addition to challenging the casino approval process, the lawsuit will claim that government officials did not consider the social and environmental effects of a casino on historical and natural resources, the plaintiffs said.

"The rule of law is only as strong as the will to abide by it and to enforce it," said Joel co-chairman Rose, of Citizens Against Casino Gambling in Erie County, "and sometimes it falls to private citizens to step forward for the public good."

Others involved in the lawsuit include the National Coalition Against Gambling

Campbell says no to running for governor

DENVER (AP) - First it was state Rep. Mark Larson, a moderate Republican who decided not to run for the state Senate, citing arm-twisting by conservatives.

Then it was Sen. Norma Anderson, a respected GOP moderate, who resigned a year short of the end of her term Tuesday, saying "it has become too partisan for me."

Hours later, former U.S. Sen. Ben Nighthorse Campbell, a Democratturned-Republican and until his retirement from Congress the only American Indian in the Senate, announced he wouldn't run for governor. He said he had lost his taste for politics because conservatives were demanding "absolute obedience."

In Colorado and other states, an ideological split is dividing the GOP, said Bob Loevy, a political science professor at Colorado College in Colorado Springs. "The moderates are opting out" in a backlash from the demands of conservatives, he said, and the split is allowing Democrats to make gains. Independent pollster Floyd Ciruli said the GOP's problems in Colorado are compounded by the fact that Republican Gov. Bill Owens is term-limited and has alienated the right wing of the party by supporting last November's successful campaign to persuade voters to ease tax limits. Ciruli said the split could prevent Republicans from regaining control of the state House and Senate, which they lost in 2004 for the first time in 42 years, and could even allow the Democrats to win the governor's office and a fourth congressional seat. Larson's decision not to run for the state Senate could be especially damaging to the party. He was considered a key player in the GOP attempt to retake the chamber, where Democrats have a onevote majority. "They're making it so hard, you either follow them or you're not a Republican," Larson said of the party's conservatives. Republican John Andrews, a former president of the state Senate, said Larson, Anderson, Campbell and other moderates are out of step with the party on such key conservative issues as taxes, labor unions, abortion

and the role of government.

"I think if there is a thread with what these three have said and done recently, they seem to be facing up to the reality that maybe their times have come and gone," Andrews said.

State Republican Party Chairman Bob Martinez said the criticism was just grousing by term-limited Republicans on their way out.

He said Republicans have always disagreed over the best ways to deal with conservative issues, and those divisions were in plain view during the debate over relaxing tax limits.

But the split is starting to heal, he said.

"We've had some positive meetings with elected officials and everyone seems focused on the job at hand, focused on taking back the Legislature and keeping the governorship," Martinez said.

The new Niagara Falls hotel is topped with a fivestory high-definition television screen shaped like a feather that is expected to be the brightest landmark seen

from across the border in Canada, and visible from the upper floors of buildings in Buffalo 25 miles away. The building also has 19-story illuminated waterfall symbols on two sides.

The single feather is recognized within the Iroquois Confederacy as the symbol of the Seneca Nation.

Larson said the divisions run deeper than Martinez has acknowledged.

"If you're pro-reproductive rights, which is not necessarily pro-abortion, you're not a Republican. If you believe taxes play an appropriate role in government, you're not a Republican. I hope this will be a wake-up call for the party," Larson said.

State Democratic Party Chairwoman Pat Waak said the split is helping her party.

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"People walk up and say, 'I used to be a Republican and I don't have a party anymore.' This does create an opportunity for us," she said.

Campbell, who won nine races and served 22 years in public office, said right-wing Republicans are driving away good candidates.

"You can't be held to a strict ideological code that you can't do anything about. What they want is absolute obedience," Campbell said. He refused to name names.

He mentioned running for governor early as as September 2004, after announcing he would not seek another term in the U.S. Senate.

Campbell said Tuesday the prospect of long hours, low pay, high stress and "constant attacks" were also factors in his decision not to seek the governor's mansion.

"If you read it in the classifieds, nobody would run for that job," Campbell said. "I wasn't worried about losing, I was afraid of winning," he said.

One such service is provided through the Veterans Affairs Department, which is managed by Director Kerry Metoxen. Kerry has been working in the Veteran's Affairs Department for the past three years after accepting the position following the retirement of Mr. Gary Metoxen. Kerry is the proud father of 5 children and has

been happily married to his wife Colleen for the past 30 years. Kerry was previously in the Air Force for 20 years and retired in February of 2000. His service record includes the Persian Golf War, time in the country of Oman during Dessert Shield and in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia during Dessert Storm. As a member of the Oneida VFW Post 7784 and a veteran, Kerry brings the experience and knowledge to provide the best services possible to our veterans across the state.

Another valuable asset to Affairs the Veteran Department is Veterans Benefit Specialist Carolyn Miller who has worked in the office since September of 1997. As a Benefits Specialist, Carolyn assists veterans and their families in securing all possible entitlements and other benefits, and she also serves as an advocate in providing referral and follow-up services. In June of 2003, Carolyn traveled to Milwaukee and successfully completed the State Accreditation Test. Carolyn

also assists the VFW, AmVets and WIVA Oneida Chapter. Carolyn's spouse is Rendell Miller and they have four children.

The valued staff of this department act as a point of contact for Oneida Veterans, and they also coordinate and provide services to Oneida Veterans living in other parts of the state. Eligible veterans participate from all agencies of the armed forces: Army, Air Force, Navy, Merchant Marines and Coast Guard. Highlights for this program in 2005 include the following points: a total of 1,189 client visits was made to the department, 135 veterans were assisted with compensation claims, 7 veteran home loans were provided and 26 -DD214's, medals and headstones were provided. The Veterans Department is also able to provide gas vouchers to eligible participants. Annually. Veterans Affairs Department also assists with facilitating state and federal funding in the amount \$600,000.00 for veteran compensation (due to disability by injury or disease incurred as a


