A special land claim meeting was held April 23 at the Norbert Hill Center. The meeting was held to update the General Tribal Council (GTC) on the Oneida land claim hearing held in Albany, N.Y. on April 20.

Much of the hearing was centered around the Second Circuit United States Court of Appeals dismissal of the Cayuga land claim. Attorneys for New York and Madison and Oneida counties believe the Cayuga ruling creates a precedent and should apply to the Oneida land claim. The attorneys then requested the Oneida land claim be dis-

Carl Artman takes oath in Washington DC

On Wednesday, April 18, Carl Artman was sworn into his new position as the Assistant Secretary for Indian Affairs by the Interior Secretary Dirk Kempthorn.

The ceremony took place at the United States Interior Building in Washington DC. On hand for the event were Tribal Chairman Gerald Danforth and Vice-Chairwoman Kathy Hughes, both of whom took part in the ceremony.

Artman, 42, will be tenth person to hold the position of the Assistant Secretary for Indian Affairs and will be filling a position that has been vacant since February, 2005 when the former Assistant Secretary, Dave Anderson, resigned.

Artman is an enrolled member of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin and has worked as Oneida's Chief Counsel as well as a tribal lobbyist in Washington DC.

He was appointed by President Bush and was then confirmed by Congress on March 5, 2007.

Violence Program and the Oneida Coordinated Community Response (C.C.R.) Team will be presenting funds to the Combined Locks Police Department and both the Brown and Outagamie County District Attorney Offices at the Oneida Police Department on April 25, 2007. A total of nearly \$49,000 will be awarded to theses organizations.

A portion of these funds will help support Combined Locks Department Digital Camera Project. This project's intent is to

provide law enforcement violence agencies The Oneida Domestic Outagamie linked computer technology to be used in the criminal prosecution of

domestic violence cases. The funds being presented to the Brown and Outagamie County District Attorney Offices will be used to update their technological resources in their efforts to prosecution of domestic violence cases.

The funds being presented come directly from the Oneida Tribe's discretionary STOP Grant, which is a Department of Justice initiative aimed toward eliminating

STOP Grant funds are used to support formal, informal and cross-jurisdictional efforts to coordinate the response of law enforcement agencies, prosecutors, courts, victim services and other agencies to prevent violent crimes against American Indian Women.

UWGB offers First Nations Studies major

The University Wisconsin – Green Bay was built upon land formerly owned by the Menominee Tribe of Indians. That would make it a suitable place to focusing on Native American education. That is exactly what has been happening at

past 18 months. The University will be offering a Bachelors degree in First Nations Studies starting the fall semester of 2008. The new program was recently approved by the UW Board of Regents and will soon be in

the UWGB campus for the

place for students.

and Sciences at the University of Wisconsin - Green Bay said, "The approval of the First Nations major significantly enhances the educational opportunities available to our students."

Although the Regents have extend a learning degree approved the program, it will not be available for students to declare until late next year.

> Lisa Poupart, Chairman of the First Nations Studies program, said, "It'll take another academic year for our campus system to get everything in place. So in fall of 2008 will be the first time they can signup for the major and graduate with it on a degree...but they can start now."


The degree focuses on Fergus Hughes, PhD, Native American studies and Interim Dean of Liberal Arts will provide and emphasis on

local tribes. The Oneida Nation, Menominee Nation and several other regional tribes will share the focus of the program according to Poupart.

It is this local and regional focus that is making this program at UWGB so innovative.

"The unique piece is called Knowledge Epistemology. This is pairing one student with one tribal elder. This, in the tribal world, is an ancient way of learning, to pair a young person with an old person so that old person can pass down the knowledge that they have," Poupart said.





Van Gemert is a licensed social worker with the state of Wisconsin and handles high risk tenants for the OHA.

The event is part of a nationwide network called People to People Ambassador Program. Dr. Margaret Eisenhart, University of Colorado, is head of the delegation traveling to China and is in charge of inviting the participants. "I think I was invited due to belonging to a few professional organiza-

tions and have a background in social sciences as well a technical field," said Van Gemert.

The group will arrive in Beijing and examine the status and delivery of

higher education and women's roles in China. After the delegation's time in Beijing they will head to the city of Xi'an and study the trends in women's participation and success rates in higher education. A brief stay in Xi'an will be followed by a trip to Kunming to look at women's experience in the workforce and historical perspectives on women in higher education. The 13 day of event will feature discussions with local women students and administrators.

Van Gemert added, "I am looking forward to meeting our professional counterparts... I am also looking forward to the fun, too, and being able to meet families in

their homes and doing some site seeing."

According to Van Gemert, China is focused on the education of its citizens in order to advance as a society. "China has learned many years ago in order to advance as a culture and country that they really needed to focus on educating their people and that women had to be part of that initiative. There are a lot of opportunities for women to get into higher education and technical fields, although there are some problems in rural areas and they are trying to reach them as of late," said

Van Gemert. Van Gemert believes this experience will greatly benefit her with her position at the OHA. "I deal with a lot of people who are trying to meet their basic needs, and I think becoming educated can really

help in Oneida. I believe I will gain insight in finding ideas and solutions to advocating for clients and the Oneida community," Van

Gemert said. Van Gemert feels that common citizens are better at connecting with their foreign counterparts when dealing with issues of peace and cultural understandings. Van Gemert added, "People are able to discover that we may seem very different but basically our hopes, dreams and what is important are the same. We are also given the opportunity to change the impression that others have of Americans."

All expenses for this program will be paid for by Van Gemert. She would be happy to share her experiences with anyone who is interested.

case dismissed. Latches are used when a party does not enforce it's rights in an appropriate time. An appropriate time is arbitrary and to be decided upon by the ruling judge.

Bobbi Webster, Communications Director for the Oneida Nation of Wisconsin stated legal counsel was pleased with the hearing. The Oneida Tribe was represented by attorneys for the Oneida Indian Nation of New York, Oneida of the Thames and the Oneida Nation of Wisconsin.

United States District Judge Lawrence Kahn gave no time line in which a decision will made on the requests.

The land claim meeting was geared toward establishing a open line of communication between the Oneida Business Committee (OBC) and the GTC. Communication between the OBC and the GTC has been limited recently due to inactivity in the land claim.

The GTC inquired about what type of information and how

provided to them. The solution offered by the OBC was to set up regular meetings to update the GTC, but confidential information that could jeopardize the land claim will not be shared.

Oneida Land Claims Coordinator Commission Jennifer Stevens and her office are responsible for dispensing information in regards to the land claim to the GTC. "We are running into a lot of the information being confidential and by releasing the information to the general public would be a detriment to our claim. It's a difficult situation for us now, and we have to be creative in ways we are sharing land claim information," said Stevens. "We are trying to not stress (the confidential information and politics of the claim) but stress the spiritual stake we have with our homelands and let the creator make

the right decision." No dates have been established by the OBC for updates on the land claim, but according to Webster, meetings will

"Strength of Indian Women" premiers May 17

Oneida Nation Arts Program

The roles for 6 characters in the upcoming reader's thepresentation "Strength of Indian Women," was filled within weeks.

The actresses include Oneida tribal members Mindemoye, Jasmine House, Diane Jourdan, and Rosa Coenen; and Menominee tribal members Karen Washinawatok, Dorrie LaTender-Lyons.

The play will be presented in a storyteller format to include costumes, make-up, some props, and native music. However, the actresses will have scripts in hand as they portray their characters and speak the lines in the

The public reading will be held Thursday, May 17, in the Norbert Hill Auditorium. Oneida, WI., from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. followed by a question and answer session.

"Strength of Indian Women," written by Vera Manuel, is about the residential schools where generations of Native American children were placed by government agents, often against the will of the parents.

Manuel is a drama therapist. She said she finds that this play is therapeutic for Native American people and anyone who has similar issues in their family or personal histories.

It explains how and why many negative social conditions exists in Native American communities.

"I didn't make up the stories told in 'Strength of Indian Women.' They came from picture my mother painted for me with her words; words that helped me see her as a little girl for the first time. Each time we staged a performance of the play, I mourned that little girl who never had a childhood. I mourned the mother missing my childhood, and I gave thanks for the mother who became my loving teacher in adulthood, who had the courage to say the words ... 'I'm sorry I wasn't there to protect you when you were a little girl.' Other stories came from feelings attached to the little knowledge I had of my father's experiences ...' Manuel wrote in the forward of her script.

Arlene Manuel, sister of the playwright, will direct the reading. She strongly suggests that we have counselors and spiritual advisors available during the public reading, because she said this will bring out a lot of issues for people. So, counselors and

advisors will be called upon to attend the reading and be available to provide any assistance needed to audience members.

The characters in the play tell stories not only of the molestation, starvation, brutal beatings, rape, and murder we've heard our Native grandparents whisper about; but also what became of boarding school children as they grew up and how they dealt with these issues. The

play also touches upon the reasons why most Native people don't what is true, unconditional, spiritual love.

The play ends on a joyous note as the women help Suzie prepare for her "coming of age" ceremony with great hope for a better life for Native youth.

to an internship." According to Poupart, there was additional opposition that came from, as she said, "an unexpected place."

"So there was some opposition with question...'what job will this get?' And that opposition surprisingly came from some tribal people who said that this is a foolish degree, Poupart said.

She responds to those questions by saying, "Students that pursue [Liberal Arts] degrees are often less concerned about, what is the job, and [more about] how does this learning impact my individual growth?," she continued. "Of course you want to graduate students that end up with jobs. We want our students to be employable and get into positions where they're happy."

Poupart said one of the goal of the program is to put the First Nations degrees to work in the state to help educate our educators/teachers about Native American culture and to help them understand and adhere to Act 31. (Wisconsin Act 31 provides that all schools provide curriculum to educate students about Native American and other cultures.) "The provides

major opportunities for students to specialize and to graduate and to become teacher-trainers in the districts so that they can train teachers who are already

out of the pipeline," Poupart said. "The citizens in this state are ignorant about American Indians and so this degree can help some individuals mitigate that, in turn edu-

cate others." The program will be able to support about 40 students and it will be calling on some local elders to help fill the

"As the Chair of First Nations Studies I'm very committed to, and understand the importance of, hiring faculty from the communities. It's really important to bring teachers from the Oneida Tribe onto our campus," Poupart said.

Interim Dean Hughes said, "(The Program) offers a new option both in terms of course content and teaching philosophy. It allows us to create a

learning partnership with the community, an educational exchange in which the University and the community work as a team. It constitutes a strong statement about the University's commitment

to diversity." There are currently 30 students who have declared a minor on First Nation Studies and, according to Poupart, she expects 20 of those students to declare it as their major next year when it is formally offered.

"The students want the Major. (They) have been waiting for this degree because they're passionate about it. They want to work in tribal communities or interface with tribal communities. They're level in dedication is really intense," Poupart explained.

Legislative Review XXX



Chairman Gerald Danforth Sagoli,

This article will focus a bit differently from articles that I've written about previously. I decided, after giving it some thought, that I should share some information that may be helpful to others.

I recently had surgical procedures performed for the placing of stints in the arteries in my heart. The procedures Chairman's Corner...

were completed in two separate visits, Feb. 22 and Mar. 15 - both were complete successes, and I am feeling great! It's not that I wasn't feeling fine prior to that - at least most of the time, and therein lies the danger.

I am writing about this experience, first of all to express my "heartfelt" appreciation and respect to Doctor Edward Szabo, Oneida Health Center, and Doctor Timothy Tanke, Prevea Health, and their respective health care staff, especially Kristen Rodeheaver, MS, APNP. It is through their expertise and thoroughness that I have renewed opportunity to improve my health. For that, I have the deepest appreciation and am forever grateful. Perhaps even more importantly though, I want to caution those who may experience similar symptoms that I did, to not disregard even the most subtle signs.

My first indicator occurred last summer while playing golf (if you can imagine that). I was walking a slightly uphill fairway, which I had walked many times before. This time however, approximately twothirds of the way to the top, I felt noticeably more tired than normal, heavier breathing, and felt slight heaviness or strain in my chest - it wasn't painful, just this feeling of heaviness. Once I reached the top of the hill, the symptoms went away, and did not return. I recall thinking that because I had not been exercising regularly, or eating like I should, that I was out of shape and should expect that kind of reaction. Several months later, this time while walking rather fast trying to catch a plane, those same symptoms returned. Again I set them aside with the same logic as I previously stated.

This past December I was going through a routine annual physical examination with Dr. Szabo, I decided to inform him about the symptoms that I've described above. The Doc didn't kid around, he put two and two together in short order . . . slightly overweight, slightly high cholesterol, slightly high blood pressure, coupled with the symptoms I had described - he said "this is serious and is something that we need to get checked out." We scheduled a stress test which revealed rather serious concern with at least the main artery of the heart.

Doctor Tanke recommended Coronary Angiography, to get a direct look into the arteries of the heart. He also explained the potential corrective options, depending upon what was revealed with the angiography. After considering the low risk factors associated with the stenting procedure that I was facing, I decided to inform only my immediate family, and Vice Chairwoman Hughes, of what lie ahead.

The angiography and angioplasty/stenting procedure, except for minor tenderness around the incision, was painless. The closer examination of the arteries supported stints as the procedure of choice, and the entire process took only ninety minutes. After a few hours in the recovery room, I was up and about. I was out of the hospital and back in the office the next day, and a day later began one-hour walking sessions. The immediate results were amazing. Even after a one-hour brisk walk the symptoms have not returned.

However, my effort to keep this event relatively quiet was foiled. Unbeknownst to me, there were at the same time, about four other Oneida families, none of whom are small in number, also with relatives in Saint Vincent's Hospital for one reason or another. I think

we were only ten short of a quorum to convene a General Tribal Council meeting in the waiting room. I couldn't help but laugh to myself when several Oneida's walked past my room. The door was open and one of them glanced in - then did a double take. I was laying there hooked up with as many wires as a Christmas tree. So much for keeping this quiet.

The second procedure was completed with similar results on March 15, 2007.

The moral of this story is do not ignore the indicators. Sometimes they may seem rather insignificant, or what you might expect as a result of aging or inactivity. Onethird of all heart attacks are silent, meaning there were no indicators. I wish for everyone the best of health. But, if things don't seem right, don't wait. Talk to the Doc.

Legislative Update

I wanted to utilize this legislative briefing to discuss a few policy items with you in this report.

The Legislative Operating Committee (LOC) has been very busy over the last few months crafting needed policy changes. Here are a few noteworthy items that I'll cover in this report: the new Election Law (May 29, 11:30am public hearing), a Military Service Protection Act (June 12, 11:30am public hearing), the Judiciary and the Administrative Procedures Act (May 7 regular LOC meeting).

There are also other big issues that are ripening and need some attention soon, including wage increases. Oneida Housing Authority has also been an issue that my office has been working on, and I'll also cover that topic in this report.

Tribal Policy Issues **Election Law Amendments**

The LOC is advancing two sets of amendments for General Tribal Council (GTC) consideration, those

- (1) Primary election provi-
- sions; and (2) Necessary Election Law

amendments. A) The Primary Issue


Because the GTC has asked that amendments relating to primaries be presented for their review (by referendum and GTC motion), they will be presented separately from the other proposed amendments.

Here is a little background on the matter. Primaries for Oneida Business Committee (OBC) positions first officially surfaced on July 13, 2002. The Oneida Election Ballot included a referendum question, which asked: "Do we want a Primary for the 2005 General Election for Oneida Business Committee?" The answer was "YES," by a vote of 1,176 to 379.

A draft Election Law and a resolution containing amendments to allow for primaries was first presented to the GTC on March 5, 2005, but a quorum was not established. It was presented again to the GTC on July 11, 2005 and a quorum was established. At the July 11, 2005 GTC meeting a motion was made to

defer the draft Election Law back to the LOC and the Election Board to work together to come forward with a document that is approved agreed upon by both parties. At the same meeting, a motion

was made to



I will state, I do have problems with the whole primary issue but I'll cover that in a separate report. Today, I just want to lay out the concept of the primary provisions for the OBC:

If there are three or more candidates for any officer position or 16 or more candidates for a regular Council Member position a primary election will be scheduled.

The 2 candidates for each officer primary and the 15 candidates for the at-large council member primary that receive the highest number of votes will be placed on the General Election ballot.

B) The "Necessary Election

Law Amendments" There are some necessary Election Law amendments as determined by both the Election Board and the LOC. Some of these amendments include:

* A provision that limits a person in any single election to running for only one office at a time. Therefore, a person's name can only appear on a ballot once per election day, regardless of the number of entities or positions available. However, the law does not limit a person from serving on multiple elected entities as long as the elections are not on the same ballot.

The provision under "minimum requirements" which prohibits a person from being nominated or placed on a ballot when his or her election would create nepotism with another entity, member has been removed. This provision was removed because it is

believed that the voters

elections required to begin at 7:00 a.m. and end at 7:00 p.m. and any voters in line at 7:00 p.m. are required to be allowed to

* Additional locations were added to the definition of "prominent locations". Prominent locations are defined in the current Election Law as meaning the polling place, main doors of the Norbert Hill Center, main doors of the Oneida Community Library, and the One-Stop at Hwy 54 and Seminary. this draft, the Tsyunhehkwa retail store and all of the One-Stops were added to the definition of prominent loca-The amendment tions. does not affect the minimum number of locations that a notice has to be posted at, but instead provides additional options for where the Board may choose to post a required notice.

The current Election Law requires candidates to resign from their salaried positions within 30 days of being elected to an OBC position. This draft closes the gap between the time a candidate is required to resign and the time that the candidate is sworn into office by only requiring that the resignation be effective prior to taking the oath of office.

The campaign requirements, which include provisions for contributions and campaign materials, have been reorganized in a more readable sequence. The Board is authorized to enforce the signage portion of the law instead of the Oneida Conservation Department. The intent was not to remove Conservation from the

process but instead require

the Board to address the

sign issues first and then determine whose assistance may be needed to enforce the provision. This will assist in giving the public and the candidates one point of contact for signage complaints.

If an election results in a tie, an automatic recount of the ballots is required. If the recount tally still results in a tie then a coin toss is conducted at a predetermined time and place. This was recommended in an attempt to avoid long delays in trying to get two candidates together for a

coin toss. **Judiciary Act**

What the Court would look like:

The Oneida judicial system, as currently proposed, would be comprised of the following:

A Trial Court for the initial disposition of a case, comprised of 5 elected judges.

A Peacemakers Court for mediation of disputes, as a division of the Trial Court.

An Appeals Court to hear appeals from the Trial Court, comprised of 5 elected jus-

The Tribe currently does not have full faith and credit for Appeals Commission decisions. With a Tribal court, the Tribe could use full faith and credit whereby the Tribal court's decisions would be recognized and enforceable by other courts. An example, of these orders are: custody and/or child support orders, garnishments for money owed to the Tribe, and injunctions.

The establishment of a Tribal court system would be a dramatic step forward and would enable the Tribe to assert its sovereignty in vital areas such as Indian Child Welfare.

The establishment of a Tribal court system would allow Tribal members to pursue justice here in Oneida, and not in State court. Having to rely on a State court to resolve Tribal issues undercuts the very notion of tribal sovereignty and this needs to change.

Spiritual Freedom

I am Oneida, although I'd grown up in the big city of Milwaukee. I have great respect for traditional Ways, being 39 years old I am still learning, that brings me to my current situation.

I am currently incarcerated "OSCI" (Oshkosh Correctional Institution) Our annual Ghost Feast is coming up and we the "Native Group' have come to a wall in own getting any type of traditional foods for our feast. The

"Institutions IMP" says we are allowed these foods yet getting them is a totally different story. It seems the

"DOC" sees fit to use the IMP to their own agenda, telling us we aren't allowed certain things, denying us our "Spiritual Freedom." The Chaplain here chooses to dictate what "she" feels is appropriate, not even having any knowledge of our Native Ways, or any respect for our ceremonies. She is, if anything, found to be disruptive towards our group and our traditions.

When I had got here I was

told that I am not allowed to have my eagle feather because it had beadwork on it. By the institution rules it is supposedly considered a "finished bead project." I was also told I couldn't have my medicine bag because of the same rule. I finally got my feathers and bag although I did have to take the beadwork off my feather. Our medicine bags are for the most part sewn shut. As for the beadwork, I'll have to send it out, I'll not destroy it, not for any rule. These are the rules that are made to keep us inmates from doing something wrong, as a native it only encumbers us from having what is considered spiritual items. We natives are supposed to be

allowed to have. Legally, I'm not sure where we would stand on these

issues Personally, I'm sure we as a group shouldn't be punished or denied what is our native ways of respecting our ancestors. These ceremonies and traditions have been with our people's way of life before any other religions came to our lands. How is it that one who is ignorant of our ways to tell us how to conduct ow group and it's known ceremonies (Pipe and drum and sweat lodges)?

I'm afraid that without anyone out there to help us, legal or otherwise, we as a native group may lose what we hold to be our one and only link with our spirituality. For some of us it is what gives us the strength and will to survive here inside these walls, fences and cells.

It seems we are all to be punished for the things we've done. So be it, but please let us not to be forgotten so easy. Please don't. We are still human and proud to be native people.

Maybe this is why I never had any opportunity to speak to our government.

Immediately after the meeting I went to St. Luke Hospital on 9-14-06 and they kept me overnight and attempted to keep me longer. I left the next day for our important budget hearing hoping for a small miracle, more assistance from our government for our families whom are in need. Many people and families on and off this great reservation do not have enough basic or fundamental operational utilities because of the high cost, they are living around the poverty level. A Tribal court would interpret Tribal laws by utilizing Tribal customs and culture as part of the basis for its decisions, thereby greatly strengthening our sovereignty. This bill is currently in the final review stages and it will be coming forward soon.

Military Service Protection

I authored this proposed law to address the rights for potential employees and curare serving in the military. This law would establish rights for re-employment and prohibit discrimination against those persons that serve in the military and those persons that are applying for employment with the Tribe.

This law is modeled after the Uniformed Services **Employment** Reemployment Rights Act (USERRA). Although the Tribe has not been required to follow the USERRA, it has

The Tribe's Personnel Policies and Procedures address a military leave of absence when an employee is entering active duty or reserve training, but does not sufficiently cover all aspects of employing military personnel and those military persons applying for employment.

Provides health plan coverage options for employees on a military leave of absence

Outlines an enforcement process for a person who has been denied employment, reemployment or benefits under this law.

This proposed law also combines the intent of the current Personnel Policies and Procedures of the Tribe and the Human Resource Department's voluntary application of the USERRA into one comprehensive law.

APA Amendments

The LOC is also developing amendments to the Administrative Procedures Act (APA) which would establish a streamlined law making process and administrative rules capability for Tribal entities, with OBC oversight, to make the Tribal laws they enforce clearer.

The current APA was adopted in 1991 and is antiquated and badly outdated. The new amendments would help bring the Tribe into the 21st Century from a governmental standpoint.

Under the new set up, Tribal Departments would be empowered to exercise greater responsibility in carrying-out their duties. In order for an agency to be able to promulgate rules, the agency is required to have been given specific administrative rulemaking authority in law. For example, under the amendments, the Resources Environmental

Board (ERB) could be authorized to clarify the Hunting, Fishing and Trapping Law.

Right now, the Hunting Fishing & Trapping law includes very specific requirements on the diameter of ice fishing holes. These types of requirements could be removed from the under the new system and ERB could be responsible for establishing the dates for various hunting seasons and establishing bag limits. However, the OBC would have oversight over the rule making at all times.

The new system would allow for greater efficiency and more control at a local level. However, the OBC would not be required to be involved in every little issue.

Oneida Housing **Authority Issue**

Recently, there have been some issues that have surfaced regarding the Oneida Housing Authority and we're working on those items. Our work involves three areas of follow-ups, those areas are: audit, legal, and legislative (policy).

Here is a quick overview regarding the type of work that we're (The OBC) engaging in on this matter.

1) Audit Committee/Internal Audit Department.

The Audit Department is focusing on the past. An internal audit of the Oneida Housing Authority response to a September 30, 2006 audit has been ordered by the Audit Committee.

Outcome: Identification of any specific issues and/or other items that may need to be corrected.

2) The Legislative Operating Committee

The Legislative Operating Committee is working with Attorney Brian Pierson of Godfrey Kahn to look at options for the housing ordinance. This includes the drafting of a new housing ordinance.

Outcome:

Review of Oneida Housing Authority and programs and proposed

legislation and prepare for the adoption of a new ordinance.

In addition to the action above, the OBC has requested that the Oneida Housing Authority report to the OBC on a monthly basis.

A Few Closing Policy Reflections

I am hoping that this year we can lay to rest the issue regarding merit increases that utilize a competitive scoring process for distribution calculations. This whole system is ill-conceived and stacks workers against one another in terms of who is eligible for what size of distribution per-

centage. I will also say the whole issue regarding bonuses has concerned many tribal employees. My office has received some calls from people describing big bonuses that were paid out. In fact, I know of one area where management totally forgot to even write in the employee's bonuses, but those same people wrote in their own pay increases. This cannot contin-

Several years ago I worked on a petition to forge a new pay scale system and I'm sure it's time to revisit that issue. In fact, some new study work is going on in that area, so hopefully this year we can bring forward a more mobile and adaptive plan. I'll also be supporting a more standardized approach towards the distribution of bonuses. The devil is usually in the details when it comes to these plans, but more importantly the administration of such plans can also have a big impact on how well they're carried out. I'll try and provide a report

on this matter this summer. I am happy to report that the "Honor the Elder" luncheon is scheduled to be held on Friday, May 11. Thanks for reading my report. Take care.

ceremony, "Carl's extensive work with tribal governments, his work in the private sector, his legal training, his passion for Indian Country, his intensity as well as his experience in the executive and legislative branches of the U.S. Government prepare him well for this new responsibility."

Kempthorn says that two issues will be priorities while Artman is serving. First is the use and trafficking of methamphetamine in Indian Country and the second is improving Indian performance in school. He proposed two programs that would combine to total \$31 million dollars toward Indian services.

"To give Carl the tools that he needs to fight methamphetamine addiction, we're proposing the Safe Indian Communities Initiative. This \$16 million program increases law enforcement in Indian

Country and provides the training and education needed to help tribal government stop methamphetamine trafficking,' Kempthorn said. "The Second Priority is to improve Indian performance in school. We have no greater responsibility than preparing the next generation and we're asking congress to approve a \$15 million program to provide leadership and training for teachers so they can help Indian students succeed in classrooms."

Upon being sworn into his new office Artman addressed those in attendance. He outlined his plan of action in his new position.

"My goals would be to foster an interaction between the Department of the Interior and Indian Country, forming a partnership and mutual goals, not just fiduciary requirements. To use the Office of the Assistant Secretary to promote communications between tribes who have realized financial success and those who strive for a portion of that. To use my office to promote more ...goal oriented communication between tribes and their neighbors, whether state or local governments or businesses and to foster the growth of tribal governments."

Oneida Tribal Chairman, Gerald Danforth, said, "It really does not come as a surprise that (Artman's) name rose to the ranks and levels of discussion of the Presidents office of the United States that ended up with his appointment. He continued, "On behalf of our Oneida community...we are very, very proud."

"I look forward to working with Carl, tribal leaders across Indian Country and Congress to resolve current challenges with meaningful initiatives designed to expand self government and assist tribal communities," Kempthorn said.

"I will do my best to provide Indian Affairs with leadership while relying on the professionalism and dedication of our employees and the other individuals that we work with to help tribes to achieve their dreams," Artman stated.

Also in attendance for the event were students and faculty from The Oneida Nation High School. They performed for the Secretary, the Assistant Secretary and all those in atten-

Upon the closing of the ceremony, a small reception was held on the penthouse terrace of the Interior Building where Artman spoke with various tribal members from across the country. He also took time out to pose for photographs with students, veterans and others.

Oneida student making tremendous rehabilitative strides

The memory of another date remains vivid in her mind and in the minds of her parents and extended family. The date was Friday, October 15, 2004.

It was a day that began like any other. Amanda, a senior at Oneida High School at the time, had complained of a

headache and just wasn't feeling good overall. Her parents thought she was catching the flu or so they thought at that point in time.

Initial testing was conducted at St. Mary's hospital, the prognosis wasn't good.

A cat-scan revealed a brain aneurysm and the leak was already about 2 x 4" wide, recalled her mother Doreen. She was then transported to Milwaukee to undergo further testing.

"They ran a lot of tests when we got to Milwaukee," said Doreen. Dr. Kaufman told us she had an arteriovenous malformation vein (AMV) that ruptured and they were putting her on

steroids to absorb the blood," she added.. Doreen was told her daughter was born with AMV, which most people don't have any problems with until they are in their mid 30's. Amanda was 17.

Amanda was becoming less and less responsive to the treatment so the family had to make a tough decision - to have their daughter undergo brain surgery. She was in a coma for 5 days after the surgery.

Unfortunately, it was much more serious than that. Amanda also had a stroke during surgery, which affected the right side of her body explained her mother.

The family was given an

added. After she woke up from her coma, Amanda underwent physical and occupational therapy twice a day everyday. "When she got moved to the children's ward, they added speech therapy everyday, she had to re-learn everything. She would just cry during physical and occupational therapy, but she would do everything they asked her to do," explained Doreen.

Amanda's recovery process was amazing. She exceeded the expectations of her doctors.

When she was in ICU the family was told she would be there for at least 2-3 weeks, before they could move her to the children's ward. She was there for 7 days.

The family was also told that she would remain in Milwaukee for at least 2 months before she could be transported to St. Vincent's Hospital, in Green Bay. "We moved her to Green Bay that Friday," said Doreen. Amanda was at St. Vincent's for approximately 7 weeks. She walked on her own for the first time around Thanksgiving of that year.

She is currently in speech, occupational therapy, and the brain injury program at N.E.W. Curative, and will soon begin the literacy program. Her mother said she has made so much progress since she's been at N.E.W. Curative. She has neuropsychological testing every 6 months. Tests have determined that she is at age 11 years, 11 months and at the 7th grade level.

Amanda has proven to herself and her doctors that she has the determination to recover. "Sometimes I feel like breaking down and crying, but I never give up," explained Amanda (after giving it some thought) through







Me & Them **Pet Bakery**

Specializing in gourmet pet treats

Jan Niec's custom kitchen was a stranger of sorts to her. She never did much cooking and always left that task to her husband John. Jan is now baking in the kitchen daily. though not for her or her husband's pallets, but for dogs, cats and horses throughout the country. Niec operates Me & Them Pet Bakery out of her home in Seymour.

Me & Them Pet Bakery was established in January of 2005 after Niec read an article about a pet bakery. Niec was downsized from her position as a Mechanical Designer in 2001 and had a hard time finding permanent work. This is when the idea of owning her own business began to cross her mind. "Initially I was going to go into a doggy daycare, but with great liability I knew there had to be something else I could do with dogs and cats," said Niec. "After I read the article I decided I wanted to give that a try even though I don't

Niec decided to take a gourmet pet treat class at Fox Valley Technical College to see what these treats would entail. With the experience gain from the class, Niec develops all her recipes for her treats. All the treats have no salt or preservatives added, which makes them more healthy for pets. Niec adds, "They still are treats and should be fed to pets as

Niec is even able to make custom treats for her cus-

tomers if they request. "A customer from Texas has dog that is allergic to everything. I am going to send her some custom made treats to see if her dog would like them and if a customer wants a certain ingredients added I can do that," said Niec.

Me & Them Pet Bakery sells Niec's home made treats and toys off her website, www.meandthempetbakery.c om, expos and farmer's markets. Niec said, "Most of my customers are from my website and now at local market's people expect me to be there every week to make sure they get fresh treats for their pet."

Niec relies heavily on word of mouth to get her products exposure, but because of the recent recalls on pet food and treats, she has been asked to supply more of her treat information to customers. "I really haven't seen an increase in business but more people are asking what are in my treats and are more cautious," said Niec.

Me & Them Pet Bakery's prices are very comparable to big box pet stores like PetSmart and Petco. Niec said, "Their treats will last rather longer than mine would, but that is due to the unhealthy preservatives they add. If you put my treats in the fridge they should last about four weeks."

Treats like Beggin for Bacon, Belly Draggers and Bu-ruffalo Burgers all are backed by Me & Them Pet Bakery's tail waggin, cat purring, horse whinning guarantee. If the customer is not happy the treat or toy will be replaced or refunded.

The Niec's two dogs, Luke Skywalker and Princess Leia,

are the treat taste testers. They are responsible for tasting the treats after baking. I was not able to confirm if tasting the dough was part of their job description but I witnessed the pair, more than once, jump on the counter and steal the dough before it could reach the oven.

A typical day starts at 6:30 AM for Niec. She will mix and then bakes for about six hours to ensure treats are fresh for her customers. On days she is not baking she can found at her small retail store inside of Liberty Canine Resort and Spa at 1550 Cornell Road in Howard.

"I am much happier now (with owning my own business), I don't make as much money as I did, but it's worth much more being my own boss," said Niec.

Autumn Elm was set to do a PowerPoint presentation on her business plan for Triple A Embroidery as part of the Third Annual Future Native Entrepreneur Business Plan Competition Awards in front of a panel of Native American

and local business owners, there was only one problem. "My disk wrecked," said

Elm who attends United Tribes Technical College (UTTC) in Bismarck, North Dakota.

Elm was able to call upon her friend and fellow student Florine Burning Breath to help her out in a pinch.

"She scanned in my business plan and e-mailed to the site person, so I really lucked

out," said Elm. Elm took first prize in the competition, a laptop computer with Microsoft Vista software donated by Community Generation Services Corporation out of Titusville, Florida.

The competition was part of the Ninth Annul Great Regional/Tribal **Plains** Development Economic Summit held April 17-18 in Rapid City, South Dakota. Native American High school juniors and seniors and colstudents attending schools in the Great Plains region could apply to take part in the competition and attend the conference.

According to one of the conference organizers Onna Lebeau, the competition was started to educate future business leaders on economic development on reservations.

"They are our students, our youth, they're the ones that should actually be made aware of what their future can hold," said Lebeau.

As part of Elm's presentation, there was a question and answer period with competition judges "to test our knowledge and bring into reality our business plans," said Elm.

Elm also attended several panels at the conference.

"We talked about every

aspect of developing Native American businesses on the reservation," she said, "I was so much fun, I learned a lot about Native American businesses and how to better the economic development within Native American reservations."

UTTC Department Chair of the Business Management Department Carole Anderson instructed Elm in Advertising I where she developed her presentation skills.

"(Elm) has always taken her college career very seriously, and I see her becoming a very successful young lady in the years to come," said Anderson.

Elm also won third prize in a student art show held at the American Indian Higher Education Consortium with her parfletch medicine bag.

"That was really fun, also, interacting with all the other Native American students that go to Native American colleges," she said.

Elm will graduate from UTTC with an associates degree in small business Management May 4. She plans on continuing her education at the University of Wisconsin - Green Bay.

During the meetings, Community members asked some questions which we have received responses to. The responses below are from Debbie Thundercloud General Manager. Watch for additional questions and answers in future Kalihwisaks.

March 21st Community **Meeting:**

Q:Still hard to access Service and can be degrading from non-Native employees. It is a problem that has been around for a long time who is finally going to address these problems?

A:Debbie Thundercloud -Each member of JET will need to address this...The Scorecard has an objective of increasing access to services which will be measured and we will be implementing ways of measuring customer satisfaction. It is also our intent to include **Customer Service Training** as one of the "Core Competencies" employees.

Q: Why is our sovereignty different or how from other nations? I.E. Menominee A: Debbie Thundercloud -

The Oneida Tribe's Sovereignty doesn't differ from other Tribal Governments. We have more resources which allows us to exercise more jurisdiction.



Menominee's also have a unique relationship in that they have a State "County" status as well. Inter-governmental cooperation between the Tribe and the County has enabled them to exercise more jurisdiction with the use of State tax monies.

Q: Will newly elective BC(s) members change the strategic themes?

A: Debbie Thundercloud - A newly elected Business Committee could change the strategic themes; but that will most likely be based on their constituencies input (GTC).

Q: If the organization is the Driver, will it mean the agencies within the organization be required to get input on the community needs for measuring their successes?

A: Debbie Thundercloud The Balanced Scorecard is based upon a measurement system and this system will be driven by formulas that show how the membership needs are being addressed. (Satisfaction, access, quality of life, communication, etc.)

Q: How does the Community have input in this process?

A: Debbie Thundercloud -The community will be given opportunities for input through community meetings, intranet communications, telephone hotline, feedback cards, surveys, etc.

American Heart Association meeting report

Drinking heavily in college may lead to heart disease later in life

CHICAGO, ILL – Collegeage students who drink heavily may increase their risk for heart disease, researchers reported at the American Heart Association's 8th Annual Conference on Arteriosclerosis, Thrombosis and Vascular Biology.

In a small study, Minnesota researchers found that a group of college students who drank heavily had higher levels of C-reactive protein (CRP), a blood marker for inflammation that can increase the risk for heart disease. Increased CRP placed heavy drinkers at moderate risk for cardiovascular disease in early adulthood. Moderate drinkers had the lowest CRP levels.

"These students may be setting themselves up for an increased risk for cardiovascular disease," said Elizabeth Donovan, lead researcher of the study and an undergraduate student at the College of Saint Benedict in St. Joseph, Minn. "This highlights an additional reason to be concerned about heavy drinking in college-age individuals."

While most studies of alcohol and CRP levels have focused on older people, this small study examined individuals in early adulthood.

"If high CRP levels are recognized at an early age, the person has a chance to make healthier lifestyle choices," Donovan said.

Twenty-five college-age individuals completed surveys that assessed factors that can affect CRP levels such as alcohol consumption patterns, medication use, smoking habits and recent weight loss. Researchers assigned the students to one of three groups:

- non-drinkers, meaning they consumed one or less drinks one day a week;
- moderate drinkers, who consumed two to five drinks of alcohol on a typical drinking day, one to two days a week; and
- · heavy drinkers, who consumed three or more drinks at least three or more days a week or consumed five or more drinks in one sitting at least two or more days a week.

One drink was equal to 12 ounces of beer, five ounces of wine or 1.5 ounces of hard alcohol.

Students on oral contraceptives, hormone therapy, cholesterol-lowering therapy or who had a significant recent weight loss were excluded from the study.

The average CRP for students in the study was 0.9 milligrams per liter (mg/L), placing the group as a whole at low risk. CRP levels less than 1 mg/L are associated with low risk for cardiovascular disease. CRP levels between 1 and 3 mg/L are associated with moderate risk and CRP levels above 3 mg/L are associated with high risk for future cardiovascular dis-

The researchers found that college students who were moderate drinkers had significantly lower CRP levels than heavy drinkers, with the average level at 0.58 mg/L for moderate drinkers, but rising to 1.25 mg/L for heavy

drinkers. While the non- or low drinkers had CRP levels of 0.85 mg/L, the difference between them and moderate drinkers was not significant.

J-shaped pattern emerged indicating that even in a young, otherwise healthy population, heavy drinking is associated with elevated CRP levels," Donovan said. "CRP levels of individuals who consumed high amounts of alcohol were significantly greater than CRP levels in individuals who consumed moderate amounts. CRP levels in those who consumed no or low amounts of alcohol were greater than those who consumed moderate amounts, but the difference wasn't statistically significant."

The researchers also found these CRP relationships:

- CRP levels and a high Body Mass Index were more strongly correlated males.
- Higher consumption of fruit and vegetables were associated with lower CRP levels.
- Those with a family history of cardiovascular disease had higher CRP levels.

"While moderate alcohol intake appears to have some health benefits, we must advise against heavy and binge drinking," Donovan said.

Caution should be exercised in interpreting these findings as the results were from a non-random survey of a small group of college students. Researchers suggest further investigation is needed.

Association recommends that people who drink alcohol do so in moderation. This means an average of one to two drinks per day for men and one drink per day for women. (A drink is 12 ounces beer, four ounces of wine, 1.5 ounces of 80-proof spirits, or one ounce of 100-proof spirits.).

Drinking alcohol excessively increases such dangers as alcoholism, high blood pressure, obesity, stroke, breast cancer, suicide and accidents.

Also, it's not possible to predict in which people alcoholism will become a problem. So the association cautions people not to start drinking alcohol if they do not already. Consult your doctor on the benefits and risks of consuming alcohol in moderation.

How to be safe around black bears

Specialist-Environmental Protection What? Black bears on the Oneida Reservation! Yes, black bears were seen on the reservation in 2006 and at least one spent the 2006-2007 winter here. What should people expect from a wild bear? Should they be afraid for their pets, children and themselves? What are some things that people should not do when a bear is known to be in the area?

At one time black bears ranged over almost all of the Continental United States, only being absent from the driest and highest locations. With settlement, the black bear was largely eliminated from much of the country by hunters and those who viewed bears as a threat to livestock or themselves.

Now that people are becoming more tolerant of wildlife and less likely to shoot animals on sight, both bears and humans are readjusting to each other and co-existing in areas where bears were unheard of only a few years ago. This co-existence is a learning process for both species and there are some fundamental things to know when dealing with black bears in the neighborhood. Remember, black bears are large powerful wild animals, equipped with lethal weapons. They can move much more quickly than we

can and should never be regarded as tame. Black bears normally have very large areas (25 square miles or more) in which they search for food and cover. They are like humans in their liking for both meat and plant material. Bears have a highly developed sense of smell and can become used to people. Like most of us, they will make use of the most accessible food source they can find and will continue to use that food source until it is no longer accessible. Kind of like the relative that always shows up at dinner time.

DO NOT feed the bears! The more a bear habituates with humans as a food source, the greater the risk of having that bear bite the hand that

feeds it. The animal may abandon its normal food sources to rely solely on humans for food. Such animals may become dump bears, feed exclusively at bird feeders, decide to come inside houses to attain food and not take no for an answer. Far better to keep wild animals wild and allow them to find food naturally.

DO NOT approach a black bear, particularly if you are down wind and/or it does not see you! Black bears have poor eyesight, are unpredictable, and may charge if startled, feel threatened or if their cubs might be threatened. Make sure that the bear is made aware of your presence. As soon as you detect a bear, BACK AWAY from the animal in a slow, deliberate manner. If you suspect a bear is in the area, make plenty of noise to make it aware of your presence.

DO NOT turn and run! Like the brave dog in the yard, if the cat runs, it will chase it, if the cat holds its ground the dog will back off. Bears can run up to 30 miles an hour, and they can climb trees; running away is not an

DO NOT leave garbage in open outside areas, dog dishes outside with food in them or other food such as bacon grease, fish parts, or grain in accessible areas. Bears love to get into the grease traps of barbecues.

DO NOT repair and refill your bird feeders that have been destroyed by a bear. The bear will soon return for a repeat performance. Quit using your bird feeder until the bear finds another food source.

DO NOT chase a bear on foot or with any vehicle. Bears can turn very quickly and attack. They are unpredictable and can become very aggressive toward humans.

DO enjoy the experience of viewing bears at a distance.

Be thrilled in seeing tracks and knowing that a bear has passed near you.

Make noise to ensure that the bear is aware of your pres-

Make sure that your garbage and other food items are in protected places with bear proof lids.

Bears and humans can live in harmony as long as we respect their privacy and needs.

Officials deal with standing water at local cemetery

The Oneida Cemetery Board and Engineering Department have been working together for nearly a year to come to a viable conclusion concerning the standing water at the Oneida Cemetery. Working together they have formed a project team for the situation.

The project team identified two factors in the standing water. The first factor was the site has a high groundwater level. The second problem was the site had poor contouring to properly drain the storm water from the area.

To get an even better understanding the Engineering Department awarded a contract to Graef, Anhalt Schloemer Associates, Inc. (GAS).

GAS installed five monitoring wells through out the cemetery on April 23, 2007. These wells are very small and are not near any burial sites. The wells will be monitored for an entire year in order to understand the flow of groundwater through all four seasons. The work will

be conducted under the supervision of Corinna Williams, Cemetery Chairwoman.

To date the Oneida Department of Public Works (DPW) has begun to develop swales and grading to properly drain the surface storm water. The project team has initiated a process to monitor and identify standing water at the site. If this occurs DPW will take action and move the standing water to the ditch.

In the future GAS will complete their study of the groundwater in the cemetery. They will report their conclusions to the project team. The team will then bring forward the conclusion to review with **Business** the Oneida Committee and the Cemetery Board. This study will take approximately 18 months.

If the study indicates that the groundwater situation can be handled through a civil engineering project another phase will be initiated. This phase will include actual design and engineering construction to prevent further water issues.

If you are camping, take the time to waterproof your tent. Even if it doesn't rain, dew buildup can still leak into your tent. Use a good waterproof sealer from a sporting goods store and pay special attention to the seams.

If it's hot out, be sure to drink plenty of water to avoid dehydration.

Wear sunscreen on all exposed skin.. Even on a cloudy day, it's possible to get a sunburn.

Digging my Garden for Healthy Results

With the rising temperatures, many gardeners are thinking about the upcoming vegetable growing season. Whether you're a seasoned grower with a green thumb or just starting your first garden, there are a few reminders before preparing your garden.

First, before planting a garden, practice sanitation-the removal of crop debris from last season. Many diseases and insects live throughout the year in decayed organic materials. The removal of all crops from the previous season (including roots) will also help prevent disease and insect growth.

Remember to compost. Composting is a good practice unless the compost is diseased. Temperature in com- help your garden grow

to kill disease organisms. Make sure to remove all old compost and replace with new compost. Composting is a greatway of breaking down disease-free vegetation as it produces an organic material for plant growth.

When to plant

Cool weather plants include (peas, lettuce, greens, and root crops). They should be planted two weeks before the last spring frost (40 F) so the plants don't mature before the arrival of summer heat.

Warm weather plants include (squash, beans, corn, melons, and cucumbers). These plants need warmth and should be planted two weeks after the last spring frost. The temperature should be 60-70F).
