Hill takes Honor Flight to D.C.

Oneida Nation citizen and Vietnam veteran Mike Hill had the opportunity to take an Old Glory Honor Flight to Washington, D.C., on Wednesday, May 23. Hill, 72, is a United States Navy veteran who served onboard the USS Sutherland out of San Diego as a radioman second class (RM2).

"I was glad we were

coming home (from Vietnam) but some of us had a pretty hard time," Hill said. "We weren't treated very well and I think the only people who were happy we were home were my mom and dad. But now all these years later I found out my cousin Fran Bingham submitted my name for the honor flight. Her husband had already been on one and said it was the most wonderful feeling in the world."

The Northeast Wisconsin Old Glory Honor Flight organization offers

local WWII, Korean War, and Vietnam veterans a memorable, safe and rewarding tour of honor to the nation's capital. The tour happens in one day with the veteran departing on a flight from Appleton early that morning and returning that evening. During the trip, the veteran experiences accompanied tours of our national monuments and memorials, is well fed, and is well taken care of.

Be aware of bears in Oneida

The return of spring sets nature in motion as flowers bloom, birds migrate and black bears start lumbering into farm fields and neighborhoods.

"I was standing in the living room, and I just saw a big black presence out of the corner of my eye, and I turned my head and I seen that it was a huge bear," said Dave Skenandore who lives on County Highway H near the Town of Oneida Fire Station. The bear crossed his back yard as his daughter shot video from their back door

"Right now what you're experiencing is young, sub-adult males moving through the area looking for home range. If people come across them in their yards, it's because they're attracted to some sort of food source, whether it's bird feeders, their barbeque grill, trash, recycling,", said Natural Resource Director Shad Webster. "The department has received bear concerns for the past 10 years. There's always one roaming around the area."

Webster stated that a bear's sense of smell is that of a blood hound.

"If they get an easy meal, startled or scared away, they're going to remember that and they're going to come back," Said Webthem in closed contain- while you're out there,"

"If you come across the bear, make noise, do not run. It may trigger their chase or attack instinct. > The return of big animals such as bears, wolves, covotes and bobcats to the Oneida Reservation is a sign of a healthy ecosystem, said Webster.

"They've always been here. The division, the nation itself has done a lot of work around the restoration efforts in our natural world, and with those enhancements brings in the opportunity for a ... spe-

cies to come back," said Webster.

Webster wants people to contact his department about bear sightings.

"If (people) are experiencing some sort of aggressive or nuisance animal or bear, always notify your authorities, law enforcement, conservation department, but even if it's just a sighting, we like to hear those reports, too. It helps us to keep track of where they are, what they're doing, where they're moving," said Webster.

If you see a Bear...

- Don't run Make noise
- Make yourself as big as possible by waving your arms or using a jacket

Bear Checklist

- Don't put out bird seed and pet food
- Keep garbage in the garage and in closed containers
- Keep grills clean
- Rinse out recyclables before discarding
- Play a radio if you're going to be outside





The Sustain Oneida Initiative strives to engage Oneida citizens about the Oneida Nation's enrollment issues. The goal of these articles is to generate community conversations about citizenship and belonging.

The Sustain Oneida Project was started by the Oneida Trust Enrollment Committee (OTEC) in communicate order to concerns about the Oneida declining enrollment trends. At the upcoming General Tribal Council meeting on June 18th, the OTEC will present information trending of enrollment realities. The information is intended to encourage dialogue in the community and among particularly families. explore alternative options of enrollment and/ or citizenship.

There are many considerations to stimulate our thinking as we begin and continue this Great Conversation. This is not an all-inclusive list, yet it provides a perspective of being able to move forward and look backward at the same time.

Considerations for Sustaining Oneida

Oneida Nation will make in this century.

- 2. Blood quantum as a marker of citizenship is not sustainable over time.
- 3. This is a difficult conversation about who we are as a Nation.
- 4. All ideas need to be carefully considered.
- 5. The U.S. government cleverly devised a plan to terminate us by our own hand.
- **6.** This is a process of reinventing ourselves.
- 7. We need to think long term seven generations beyond ourselves.






The Thornberry Creek LPGA Classic is looking for additional volunteers to Marshal July 5th - 8th during the 2018 event.

A lifeline to the success of an LPGA event is the army of volunteers made up of willing and enthusiastic people in our community. Being a volunteer is a unique behind-thescenes way to experience a professional golf tournament. It's fun, exciting, and gratifying to know that you are playing a vital role in its success.

What is a Marshal? Stationed throughout the course to ensure fair play among all participants, as well as safety for spectators. The focus is on the tees, landing areas, greens and spectator crosswalks. This committee will also assist in handling the movement of the players during an evacuation (if necessary).

For a registration fee of \$55, volunteers receive a tournament shirt and hat, four weekly grounds passes (\$300 value), one parking pass, and food and beverage during their shifts. Volunteers that work a minimum of 18 hours during the course of the event are eligible for one round of golf at Thornberry Creek at Oneida with greens fees waived (\$25 cart fee still applicable). 

Shekoli: **Employment Law**

The Oneida Business Committee has fulfilled the March 19, 2017 GTC Directive and is recommending that the General

Tribal Council direct the Oneida Business Committee to continue working on this item and bring 2. Administrative it back to the GTC at a later date.

There are three considerations the LOC has been working on which may be of particular interest to the membership. More changes may come in the future, but right now the LOC is considering three changes to the current draft of the law.

1. Personal/Vacation Accrual Rates -Reduce the amount of personal and vacation time a new employee can accrue starting on a specific date. Current employees would

be exempt from this change.

Rulemaking – There are two ways this law can get adopted. One method is through rulemaking which means the law would be adopted by the GTC and the details would be in a separate document, Employment Law Handbook. Any changes to the handbook after adoption by the GTC would be made by the Human Resources Department and/or the Chief **Executive Director of** Administration.

The other method is for

the GTC to adopt both the law and the handbook as one. Using this adoption method would mean that only the GTC could make amendments to the Employment Law.

3. Personnel Commission /Personnel Selection Committee - On April 11, 2018, the Oneida **Business Committee** adopted a resolution dissolving the Personnel Commission and transferred their hearing duties to the Oneida Judiciary. Using the Judiciary to hear grievance cases saves the tribe money and also reduces the amount of time it takes to complete cases.

The OBC also adopted another resolution recreating the Personnel Selection Committee. The role of this committee will be to protect against issues of nepotism and enforce Oneida and Indian Preference Laws.

The cumulative effect of these actions has essentially achieved the LOC's goal to make hiring more efficient and to save time and resources.

Election Law Amendments

The GTC directed the Legislative Operating Committee (LOC) to bring back these amendments by the end of this

year. In keeping with this directive, the LOC has met with the Election Board to gain input on these amendments and in conjunction with the Tribal Secretary's office, this may be an agenda item for the September 24, 2018 GTC Meeting. Further updates will be sent to the membership.

The LOC will be hosting a public hearing to gather comments on the draft Comprehensive Policy Governing Boards, Committees and Commissions on June 21, 2018 at 12:15 p.m. in the BC



Menominee Tribe Disappointed on Michigan's Issuance of Wetlands Permit for the Back Forty Mine Project

Menominee Reservation. Wis. ~ The Menominee Indian Tribe is disappointed by the decision by the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality to issue a wetlands permit for Aguila Resources' open pit sulfide mine project that will endanger a crucial interstate waterway of the Menominee River and will jeopardize the Tribe's ancestral homelands and sacred sites.

"Our Tribe maintains our stance against this open pit mine project, and we made our objection throughout the permitting process," said Menominee Indian Tribal Chairman Cox. "We are not surprised by the issuance of the wetlands permit by Michigan Department of Environmental Quality, but we

Indian are surprised that many of the concerns raised by the public, tribes, and EPA were not addressed. Michigan Department of Environmental Quality has made minimal efforts to communicate with the Tribe on our concerns of project tremendous impact to our cultural resources."

This permit will allow mine developer Aquila Resources, Inc., to fill and excavate Menominee River wetlands for a large, open-pit mine and industrial minerals-processing facility on the banks of the Menominee River, which borders Wisconsin and flows into Lake Michigan. The site is located within an expansive Menominee cultural landscape that includes Tribal burial grounds, ancient agricultural sites and ceremonial

sites of significance to the Menominee Tribe, some of which have already been deemed eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places. The Tribe has filed a lawsuit against the United States Army Corps of Engineers and Environmental Protection Agency's decision to allow the State of Michigan to oversee the Clean Water Act federal permitting process, asserting permitting fill and excavation on the Menominee River and its wetlands cannot be delegated to a state under the Act.

The Menominee Tribe remains adamant, committed, and responsible to protecting our sacred sites and the people, the wildlife, and the water on the Menominee River.

and fit our income guidelines you are eligible. We cannot service any city that is over the population of 10,000 with the exception of Green Bay which receive a waiver

a food package to help **DEDUCTION** - Households that incur at least one monthly shelter or utility expense are allowed a standard income deduction of \$400.00 for Wisconsin.

EARNED INCOME DEDUCTION - Households with earned income are allowed a 20 percent of their gross earned income.

DEPENDENT CARE DEDUCTION - Households that qualify for the dependent care deduction are allowed a deduction of actual dependent care costs paid monthly to a non-household member.

CHILD SUPPORT DEDUCTION - Households that incur cost of legally required child support to or for a non-household member are allowed a deduction for amount of monthly child support paid.

MEDICAL EXPENSE DEDUCTION holds that incur monthly medical expenses by any household member who is elderly or disabled are allowed a deduction in the amount of out-of-pocket medical expenses paid in excess of \$35 per months.



Wandering Wisco Waterfalls: Dave's Falls

Sure, everyone loves cascading waterfalls. She is both beautiful and graceful with her long sleek water falling into perfect splashes that accentuate the pool below. She is photogenic and automatically improves the look of all those who

this is great, these are not the falls that I like the most. The best falls to experience are ones that create the most energy! The ones that are rapid with rock creating friction. The ones with the raging waters, that meet the most resistance, create the best mist. You need only approach with

photo around her. While caution and take a breath this is great, these are not in to feel her power.

It is almost a perfect mistake naming these falls a widely accepted male name, Dave. These falls are currently named after a lumberjack, Dave Frechette, that died trying to clear a log jam in what was then named Pem-a-wan Falls in 1881. These falls are so strong

and formidable, that giving this female Spirit a masculine name, seems appropriate.

These falls are reminiscent of a female transitioning from a young woman to a mature woman. She is in the beginning stages of an awakening. One she may not have prepared for but is here, nonetheless. She is turbulent, full of energy, and surrounded by protective walls of rock. The rock underneath the falls is the resistance, generating this powerful energy. The subconscious is becoming conscious. The lessons are coming to surface. The past is coming to heal in the now. From an onlooker, having had this experience, the whitewater created by such resistance is a beautiful depiction of what a woman experiences mentally, emotionally, and spiritually during this phase in life. It is a reminder of my own transition and I hope you let her be yours, as well.

When you hear her from afar and approach her from the trail that leads you to the rock wall located next to her, you may find yourself a little dizzy at first, if you are not careful. You don't approach this Spirit in this state of being without respect. She is strong enough to insist upon it now. This kind of energy is heard from afar for a reason. Almost like a cautionary alarm, you hear her rage the moment



Dave's Falls is located on State Road 141 in Amberg, Wisconsin.


you step out of your vehicle in the park. It is strong in every way. The water works through a narrow chute with such force the water froths at surface level from the very beginnings all the way to the bottom of the fall. When you stand on top of the rock wall and look down and around, vou see a way around the rock. With a little clamoring, one can get near this raging rapid fall at the bottom. Like a woman going through this transition, you must approach with caution. She is so powerful; it is easy to see how she got her name.

The good news is that

you do not need to enter the fall to reap the benefits of her energy. You don't even need to get that close to feel it! It is pushed over the rock, despite the height of the surrounding rock on the beginning trail side. There is a path that veers left that allows you to walk over a bridge to view the falls from downstream but with enough height to enjoy the full view. Depending on your level of comfort, you can choose how you wish to experience her presence.

- Claim All You will receive 100% of your Account
- Deferral All or a portion of your account will remain invested if you elect any of the following options:
 - ► You elect to defer 100% don't receive any

 - ► You elect to defer 50% you receive 50%
 - ► You elect to defer 25% you receive 75%

Wisc. working to stop fraudulent cryptocurrency schemes

MADISON, Wis. (AP) ~ Wisconsin is joining securities regulators across the U.S. and Canada to crack down on fraudulent cryptocurrency-related investment schemes, while also warning the public of their risks.

"Operation Cryptosweep" will focus fake investment products and schemes that guarantee high returns on investments in cryptocurrencies, which are digital curren-

cies such as bitcoin, Wisconsin Public Radio reported.

While some investments may be legal, investors should research products before investing, said Joseph Borg, head of the North American Securities Administrators Association, which is launching the operation.


"Mainstreet folks have to take the time to investigate before they invest and one way to do that is to contact your state regulator to see if in fact these folks are licensed and registered," he said.

Regulators in North America have launched almost 70 investigations into cryptocurrency-related investments since May.

Wisconsin hasn't seen any such schemes, but regulators want to get ahead of the problem, said Robin Jacobs, with the state's Division of Financial Institutions. "There are very few legitimate ways to make 10, 15, 20 percent off your investment," she said. "And if they're offering you guaranteed high returns, do not give them your money. You can call DFI and ask us to review it and see if it sounds legitimate."

Investors are unlikely to get their money back if they fall for one of the schemes, regulators said.

University of Wisconsin researchers study bats, mosquitoes

MADISON, Wis. (AP) The study was published ~ A recently published study by University of Wisconsin researchers found the bats they studied ate 17 different types of mosquitoes, including nine that are potential carriers of the West Nile Virus.

Researchers studied two species of bats; the little brown bat and the big brown bat, Wisconsin Public Radio reported . in the Journal of Mammalogy.

Researchers analyzed the bats' fecal material from samples collected at more than 20 Wisconsin sites in 2014.

The study found that bats eat a lot of mosquitoes in the spring, said Amy Wray, the study's author and a UW-Madison Department of Forest and Wildlife Ecology

PhD student.

"They come out of hibernation and bats are super hungry, and there might not be a lot be a lot of insects around," Wray said. "Mosquitoes may not have a lot of calories or provide a lot of energy, but if they're the only thing around, it might mean they could be important for bats at certain times of the year."

DNA analysis identi-

fied 17 different mosquito types, including nine that can carry the West Nile Virus.

"So, that's sort of an interesting thing to consider, whether (bats) potentially having an effect on (limiting) any kind of disease spread," Wray said. Bats are more likely to

eat mosquitoes that breed multiple times a year, the study found. Researchers hope fu-

ture studies will examine the volume of mosquitoes bats eat and how that impacts mosquito suppression, according to a university release.

both do well in school. They've been very dedicated in trying to get to state by being at practices, and having fun with it. I am proud of Glen and Lorenz's hard work throughout the season and I wish them the best of luck in future academics and athletics.

Jenkins is glad Fowler and Jordan were able to receive the All-State honors despite a season that saw more than half of their scheduled meets canceled. "This season was hard on everybody because all spring sports were affected," Jenkins said. "I don't think our track athletes got to go to their full potential overall this year but both Glen and Lorenz set personal records in their respective events."

These disparities highlight the importance of addressing the barriers to higher education for Indigenous peoples. They also demonstrate the importance of recognizing communities that have worked diligently to address those issues, e.g. the Oneida Nation who has implemented a Higher Education program, and individuals within those communities who have accomplished a great deal both inside and outside of academia.



MADISON, Wis. (AP) ~ A concrete company can't dig up American Indian burial mounds located within its southern Wisconsin quarry, the state Supreme Court ruled Tuesday without any explanation.

The court deadlocked 3-3 after Justice Daniel Kelly withdrew from participation, meaning the appellate ruling protecting the mounds stands. The three-sentence opinion doesn't offer any legal analysis or explanation, doesn't explain why Kelly withdrew and doesn't say which justices voted to uphold or overturn the lower court's ruling.

The case revolves around Wingra Redi-Mix's eight-year effort to excavate effigy mounds within its quarry in Blooming Grove. The mounds are listed in the Wisconsin Historical Society's burial sites catalog, which means Wingra needs a state permit to disturb them.

Wingra made the request for a permit in 2010 but the historical society denied it. The company asked the state Division of Hearings and Appeals to overrule the society.


tribal or religious interests and the mounds' historical value outweigh the economic benefits that would come with excavating.

Wingra sued in Dane County in 2014 demanding a permit, arguing there's no evidence the mounds contain human remains and the Ho-Chunk don't have a specific interest in the quarry mounds. A judge ordered DHA to reconsider Wingra's permit application, but the 4th District Court of Appeals reversed him last summer.

The appellate court found that the question of whether human remains are present isn't a factor in deciding whether to grant a permit and the authority to determine whether remains are present rests with the historical society.

The court also found that the Ho-Chunk have an interest in all American Indian burial sites in southern Wisconsin because the entire region was the tribe's homeland. The tribe considers disturbing the quarry mounds a desecration because the tribe believes disturbing the dead condemns their souls to wander, the court added.

Wingra attorney Bryan Nowicki didn't immediately reply to a Tuesday voicemail. Ho-Chunk Nation spokesman Collin Price had no immediate comment.
