

Oneida, Hobart spar over special event permit

The Oneida Nation and the Village of Hobart gave oral arguments in federal court on Thursday, November 27 in Green Bay, Chief Judge William C. Griesbach presiding. At the core of the hearing was whether Oneida should have obtained a special event permit from Hobart for its annual Big Apple Fest.

Attorney Arlinda Locklear, representing Oneida, explained the one-day event mostly takes place on trust lands within the Oneida Reservation, but there are some tribally owned fee (taxed) lands where parking and apple picking occurs. In 2016 Hobart amended its ordinance for special permits to include other governments. Some of the permit requirements asks that applicants pay a \$500 fee, provide proof of insurance, and use the Hobart Police Department for security if deemed necessary by the village.

"The village advised the nation that it's obliged to apply for and obtain a permit for the conduct of the Big Apple Fest. The nation declined to do so, and as a result the village has prosecuted the nation and attempted to impose a \$5000 fine upon the nation itself for its refusal to apply and obtain the permit," said Locklear.

Locklear stated that the Oneida Nation's stance was that the permit requirement was an attack on its sovereignty.

"The target here is the conduct of the nation itself, of its own event, on its own land working within the boundaries of its own reservation," said Locklear. "Given these facts and the terms of this ordinance, this case presents the basic question of whether the village has the authority to impose such a sweeping ordinance of the conduct on the nation itself."

The Village of Hobart, rep-

resented by Attorney Frank Kowalkowski, holds the argument that the Oneida Reservation was diminished by the allotment process under the Dawes Act of 1887, and the village, which is within the Oneida Reservation's boundaries, has the right to issue the special permit.

Locklear cited several Untied States Supreme Court cases supporting Oneida's ability to govern itself within its reservation boundaries. One case, Seymour v. Superintendent, upheld that the State of Washington did not have authority to prosecute a crime committed by a Colville tribal citizen on the Colville Reservation even if the crime was committed on the property of a non-Indian on fee land.

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Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals stays
recent ruling striking down ICWAOCHC craft and bake sale held

The Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals has ruled for a stay of proceedings in the October 2018 decision by U.S. District Judge Reed O'Connor who declared portions of the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) unconstitutional. The controversial case, Brackeen v Zinke, was filed by the states of Texas, Indiana, and Louisiana as well as three non-native foster families seeking to maintain custody of native children. The defendants listed in the case are the Department of Interior (DOI) Secretary Ryan Zinke, the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), and the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS).

Shortly after the case was filed the Oneida Nation, the Cherokee Nation, the Quinault Indian Nation, and the Morengo Band of Mission Indians joined together and filed an unopposed motion to intervene which was granted by the court. The four intervening tribes are listed as the "Tribal Defendants" in the court proceedings.

In his October ruling O'Connor wrote, "(ICWA's) blanket classification of Indian Children is not narrowly tailored to a compelling government interest and thus fails to survive strict scrutiny review." The ICWA was enacted by Congress in 1978 due to abusive child welfare practices which resulted in large numbers of native children being separated from their families and tribes and deliberately being set up for foster care placement or adoption with non-native families. ICWA mandates foster care or adoption preference be given to members of the child's extended family, other members of the child's tribe, or other Native families.

This current order by the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals to stay O'Connor's ruling is the first move in what is sure to be a years-long legal battle to keep the ICWA, widely regarded as the Gold Standard for child welfare policy, declared completely constitutional.

Following the Fifth Circuit Court stay, the four intervening tribes released a joint statement praising the decision. "We applaud the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals for staying a recent ruling in Texas that struck down the ICWA," the tribes wrote. "This stay decision protects children from potential abuse and forced separation from their families. By granting the stay, the protections provided by ICWA

will remain in full force pending an appeal of the ruling handed down in October."

"The Cherokee Nation, the Morongo Band of Mission Indians, the Oneida Nation and the **Ouinault Indian Nation** will continue to defend Native children and Native families by advocating for the constitutionality of ICWA by all available means," the "We statement reads. strongly believe the ruling holding the Indian Child Welfare Act as unconstitutional was wrong, will ultimately be reversed on appeal, and as a result, the rights of Indian children, families and communities protected by the Indian Child Welfare Act will be affirmed and reinforced."

The hot button issue is being closely monitored across Indian Country by groups such as National Congress of American Indians (NCAI), the Native American Rights Fund (NARF), and the Association on American Indian Affairs (AAIA).

NCAI President Jefferson Keel, of the Chickasaw Nation of Oklahoma, said the stay is a welcome and positive step. "NCAI will continue to support the intervening Tribal Nations and the Department of Justice as they fight to protect the best interests of all Indian children across the United States through the Indian Child

Welfare Act," Keel said.

NARF Staff Attorney Dan Lewerenz, of the Iowa Tribe of Kansas and Nebraska, said the ICWA is not some new. unimplemented statute that can be set aside without repercussions. "It is an act of Congress, 40 years tried and true, that is intricately woven into state and tribal welfare systems," Lewerenz said. "Its unraveling would have had serious and harmful effects on dozens, if not hundreds, of Native children. We're glad the Fifth Circuit recognizes that."



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

"The first of these contingents rest upon the assertion that the particular parcel of land on which this burglary was committed is held under a patent and fee by a non-Indian. The contingent is that even though the reservation was not dissolved completely by the act permitting non-Indians settlers to come upon it, it's limits would be diminished by the actual purchase of the land within by non-Indians, because land owned in fee by non-Indians cannot be said to be reserved for Indians. That's the argument that the village makes here, and that's the argument the Supreme Court explicitly rejected."

Kowalkowski argued that the point of the Dawes act and subsequent allotment of reservation lands to Oneida citizens was to dissolve the reservation.

"The defendants have moved to dismiss on four grounds, one that lists that the Oneida Reservation was lawfully discontinued," said Kowalkowski.

He cited Montana v.

United States which determined that tribes can't regulate hunting and fishing that takes place on non-tribal member owned fee land within reservation. Kowalkowski argued that the Big Apple Fest, which started in 2009, nearly doubles the population of the village.

"They invited thousands and thousands of non-tribal members onto these properties to pick apples, to purchase apples," he said.

He expressed Hobart's desire to be in the loop regarding the event and subsequent road closures that take place for safety reasons.

"All we want from the special event ordinance whether it's from the nation or anyone else is to start the communication process under which we can make a safe event that's great for all," said Kowalkowski.

Arlinda countered that Oneida worked with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation and Brown County to close part of Highway 54 and North Overland Road for the event, and that the Oneida Police Department worked with the Hobart/Lawrence Police Department.

"Were the nation to apply for ... a permit, this is the language that the ordinance actually includes. It doesn't talk about communication and cooperation, let's work it out, it says that the village is in charge and will tell you how to do it," said Locklear.

She also argued that the Oneida Reservation was not dissolved or diminished by the General Allotment Act, nor by the creation of the towns of Hobart and Oneida, as Kowalkowski alleged.

"The towns were created in 1909, but the state legislation that authorizes the creation of those towns specifically states that they are created within the Oneida Reservation. There is nothing on the face of that act that indicates that is intended to supplant the Oneida Nation government," said Locklear.

A decision isn't expected until after the holidays according to Oneida's Deputy Chief Council James Bittorf.

The Oneida Nation Museum was recently awarded the 2018 Guardians of Culture and Lifeways Outstanding Project Award for: "Tehuttsihkwa'eks: Lacrosse and the Oneida Community" exhibit.

The award was presented on October 10th in Prvor Lake, Minnesota at the annual Association of Tribal Archives Libraries and Museums (ATALM) conference which was attended by over 1000 attendees. The Outstanding Project Award was presented to ONM by Walter Echo-Hawk, Board Chair for ATALM and noted American Indian Attornev and Author.

The Association of **Tribal Archives Libraries** and Museums (ATALM) is a not-for-profit educational organization that serves the needs of those who work to protect and advance indigenous cultures.

Established in 2007 by the Association of Tribal Archives, Libraries, and Museums, the awards program identifies and recognizes organizations and individuals who serve as outstanding examples of how indigenous archives, libraries, and museums contribute to the vitality and cultural sovereignty of Native

Nations.

Nominations are sought for seven award categories. The Outstanding Project Award recognizes an outstanding project that has greatly benefited indigenous archives, libraries, and museums.

The nomination process consisted of submitting information about the exhibit and the various components used to create its content, i.e interactives, community involvement, presentations, artifacts and any other supplemental information in the nominating process.

engaging exhibit that focuses on documenting, preserving, and perpetuating the cultural significance of Lacrosse as it relates to the origins of the Haudenosaunee and its direct impact and relevancy in the Oneida community today. The interactive timeline utilizes over 800 photos from ONM's archives and the community. This begins with the role the game plays in the Haudenosaunee Creation story to the current effects in building community and a positive sense of cultural identity. A display of material objects from ONM's permanent col-

lection and other items loaned from past and present Oneida lacrosse players accompany the timeline.

In addition, outreach and programming were used to further explain the role lacrosse plays in Oneida Culture. This included presentations by Oneida tribal member, Ernest Stevens III, a co-producer of the movie 'Crooked Arrows', and Curtiss Summers, one of the founders of the current Oneida Community Lacrosse team and Oneida Language Trainee. Coach Curtiss Summers and his coaching staff teach young players

"when they are out there playing that this is a reminder of who gave you this game, [who] you are actually playing for, your Creator".

Interactive gaming content was created by the Oneida Nation Museum Educator, Eric Doxtator. This game gives the visitor a glimpse of how a traditional Lacrosse game would have been played and scored. It utilizes the use of encouraging words in the Oneida language giving visitors a chance to hear the language being used in a more relatable setting.

Oneida Nation citizen and artist Chris T. Cornelius was recently awarded a 2018 Greater Milwaukee Foundation's Mary L. Nohl Fellowship for individual artists in the Established Artist Category. Selected from a field of 177 applicants during the sixteenth annual competition, Cornelius will receive a \$20,000 Fellowship to help fund new work and complete work that is already in progress.

Cornelius received his Master of Architecture Degree from the University of Virginia. He is currently an associate professor of Architecture at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee as well as the founding principal of studio:indigenous, a design and consulting practice that primarily serves indig-

enous clients. He was also a cultural consultant and design collaborator with Antoine Predock on the Indian Community School of Milwaukee.

He has also been the recipient of numerous awards and honors including the inaugural J. Irwin and Xenia S. Miller Prize, an Artist in Residence Fellowship from the National Museum of the American Indian, Smithsonian Institution, and multiple wins in the Ken Roberts Architectural Delineation Competition. Progressive magazine looks for donations after 110 years

 \sim The Progressive is looking for donations as the magazine founded by Wisconsin U.S. Sen. Robert "Fighting Bob" La Follette nears its 110th birthday.

Editor Bill Lueders says he wants to raise \$110,000 to ``get our head above water." Lueders donated \$10,000 of his own money to kick off fundraising, and hopes to prompt 10 other people around the country to do the same, The Capital Times reported Sunday.

"That will go a long way toward erasing our debt and putting us on firmer financial footing so we're not just getting by, we're able to take a breath," said Lueders, who was promoted from The Progressive's managing editor to editor in October

Donations to The Progressive can be made online. Lueders said he also would love to have an endowment for the Madison-based magazine. which turns 110 in January, but acknowledges that is "quite the dream from where we are."

La Follette, a political reformer, founded the magazine in 1909, while serving as a U.S. sena-

MADISON, Wis. (AP) tor. The Progressive is a nonprofit publishing a bimonthly magazine and online news. It also runs The Progressive Media Project and the Public School Shakedown project

> "We are, not for the first time and perhaps not the last, in critical need of a cash infusion. The magazine is tens of thousands of dollars in debt; our income is not keeping up with our outgo. It's serious," an editor's note in a recent issue of The Progressive said.

> A veteran journalist, Lueders said his \$10,000 donation is about half of his total savings and checking. But Lueders said the magazine's journalism is vital, and he pointed to a number of full-length original reporting pieces included in The Progressive.

> "We're not just surfing the web and spewing opinions. We're doing reporting on things that are happening, and we're trying to shine a light on the good work that people of conscience are doing all around the country," Lueders said.

Arrest made in recent armed robberies

A Green Bay man has been formally charged with five counts of armed robbery for a string of hold-ups that took place around the city in recent weeks. Charles D. Skenandore, 25, was taken into custody on November 27 by the Green Bay Police Department following a brief standoff on the city's far west side.

Skenandore is believed to be responsible for these robberies:

- Toppers Pizza, 2042 Main St., November 6
- Elf's Gifts, 1132 S. Military Ave., November 8
- Bake My Day, 1203 E. Mason St., November 17

• Stoneridge Shell, 1053 Velp Ave., November 21

• Subway, 2440 W. Mason St., November 25 Police say Skenandore got away with approximately \$1,000 total between all five hold-ups and was using the money to purchase drugs.

Skenandore's initial appearance date in Brown County Court has not yet been set.

relationship between the district and Cibola High School teacher "was severed." Armenta wouldn't say whether the teacher resigned or was fired.


The statement followed calls from the Navajo Nation president for cultural sensitivity training within the schools as a result of the Oct. 31 incident.

Babies born in withdrawal now complicate opioid cases


The expansive court case seeking to hold drugmakers responsible for the nation's opioid crisis has a new complication: How does it deal with claims covering the thousands of babies born dependent on the drugs?

Attorneys representing the children and their guardians want their claims separated from the federal case in Cleveland that involves hundreds of local governments and other entities such as hospitals. They told a skeptical panel of judges in New York on Thursday that they have different legal issues, a need for faster relief because the babies need services in the first years of their lives. They also told the

judges that as it is, they lack the leverage to exact a settlement from drug companies.

Babies, unlike governments or businesses, have been directly harmed by the actions of drugmakers and are entitled to their own payments, said Scott Bickford, a lead lawyer for the children and their guardians.

Bickford said more



than 150,000 babies were born in opioid withdrawal from 2012 through 2016, and that the number grows each year.

He said initial hospital stays for babies born to an opioid-addicted mother can cost \$200,000 to \$250,000 more than other infants born without complications.

"Then you have to address their developmental and learning problems," Bickford said in a Tuesday interview. "A lot of them have organ problems. A lot of them have problems we don't even know about."

Drug manufacturers and distributors oppose creating a new structure for the lawsuits over the children and judges on the Judicial Panel on Multidistrict Litigation hearing the matter in New York on Thursday wondered what good it would do.

Opioids _ including prescription painkillers, heroin and synthetic substances including fentanyl killed nearly 48,000 Americans last year, according to the U.S Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The cost of treatment, providing an overdose antidote, foster care, jail stavs, ambulance runs and addressing a growing homeless crisis have added up for governments and taxpavers. Studies have found that opioid addiction also has depleted the workforce, harming the economy.

More than 1,400 plaintiffs have had their federal cases consolidated under a single judge. They include county and local governments, hospitals, unions, American Indian tribes and individuals. Hundreds of others have sued in state courts. Cleveland-based federal Judge Dan Polster has been pushing the parties to reach a settlement.

The judicial panel's chairwoman, Judge Sarah Vance, said it's unlikely any settlement would be reached without considering the children.

"It's hard for me to see how the defendants are going to settle if they've got 150,000 children unhappy because their needs are unmet," Vance said.

Angela Vicari, a lawyer for the drug manufacturers, told the judge that she wasn't aware of the lawyers for the babies seeking to negotiate.

But lawyers for the children said they don't have a voice in the committee of plaintiffs' lawyers leading the case, making it hard to request the information from the industry that they believe would help prove their case. Attorney Kevin Thompson said it's essential to request information on any industry laboratory studies on the impact of drugs passed from mothers to children. Lawyers also wor-

ry that any settlement reached by government agencies won't go to help the people who have been hurt. "They end up paving a road with that," Bickford said.

Other plaintiffs in the omnibus opioid litigation have not objected formally and did not speak in court Thursday, but some are cool to the idea of separating the cases involving the children. One of the lead lawyers for the local governments. Paul Farrell Jr., said he is trying to get help for children born with opioid dependency and have prenatal care funded by the drug industry.

He said in an interview that the plaintiffs share a goal: holding drug manufacturers liable for the crisis. Unless that happens, he said, no one will get the payouts they're seeking.

"You've only got to shoot the pig once," he said Tuesday.

Lawyers representing the children and their guardians say there is precedent for their request to go it alone, after Polster granted the American Indian tribes a separate test trial for their claims. In August, the judge denied similar status for the cases brought on behalf of babies.

That decision prompted the lawyers to ask the panel of judges to put their cases under another judge in West Virginia or Illinois.

A ruling is expected in the next several weeks.



Students always seem to have a good time on the trip.







Haskell falsified crime stats

LAWRENCE, $(AP) \sim Administrators at$ Haskell Indian Nations University underreported crime statistics for a twovear period and failed to follow internal policy when handling misconduct complaints, according a federal report.

The inspector general of the U.S. Department of Interior issued the report Friday after investigating the Lawrence school, which enrolls about 1,000 representing students about 140 tribal nations and native communities, The Topeka Capital-Journal reports.

Haskell President Venida Chenault told federal investigators that Haskell's annual crime reports for 2014 and 2015 were inaccurate, but she denied intentionally misrepresenting the statistics.

The inspector general's office said Haskell's annual reports on crime listed a total of three of-

Kan. fenses in 2014 and five in 2015. However, the report said, the actual number of offenses that should have been reported was 19 for 2014 and 32 for 2015, based on law enforcement documents.

> "A Haskell employee said she adjusted statistics because she feared the Haskell president," the report said. "The employee said she tried to explain the requirements to the president, but it just made her angry. The employee said, 'I know it's wrong, but I'm scared to death, you know. I mean, I need this job."

> The federal report also concluded the president influenced a family member's appointment to a high-level campus job. Chenault was the subject of complaints from employees and students that she ran afoul of anti-nepotism rules by allowing her son, Joshua Arce, to lead the university's in-

formation technology department while also working as acting dean of students and, for brief periods, as acting president of the university.

Other issues dealt with the handling of sexual assault allegations. The federal report said Chenault "admitted she treated an allegation of sexual assault differently because the victim was male" and confirmed Haskell mishandled allegations about an instructor sexually assaulting a student, and in the process "likely re-victimized the student."

Inspectors with the Interior Department said allegations involving the instructor were referred to Lawrence police.

Officials in the inspector general's office said the report would be forwarded to directors of the Bureau of Indian Education and the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

STEM food drive held at Martin Luther King Elementary School



Trump OKs disaster declaration for Tohono **O'odham Nation**

SELLS, Ariz. (AP) - facilities damaged by the President Donald Trump has approved a disaster declaration for a southern Arizona tribe affected by severe flooding.

Erratic weather and a novice hiker are a bad combination. Fortunately. good Samaritans and rescue personnel can avert disaster.

Oneida citizen Bill Quistorf, Einar Espeland, and Nancy Abell were honored by the German Consulate on November 13 for their actions to save German citizen Katharina Groene who got caught in an October snowstorm in the mountains of Snohomish County, Washington.

Groene had been doing her first long distance hike along the Pacific West Trail which runs from Campo, California near

the Mexico-US boarder to the Canada–US border on the edge of Manning Park in British Columbia. Abell, an experienced Washington based hiker, ran into Groene on October 22. Abell tried to persuade Groene end her trek due to the upcoming weather forecast, but Groene pressed on.

"We're up on the north end of the PCT, right before Canada, so there's time when we get early winter in October," said Quistorf.

Abell contacted Snohomish County Volunteer Search and Rescue October 29 to alert them that Groene might be caught in the storm out on the trail. Chief pilot Quistorf and pilot Espeland set out in a Cayuse helicopter to search the area.

"Normally, if we do a

rescue, I'd take the bigger helicopter, it has a hoist, and I don't have to land, I can insert a team from the air," said Quistorf. "Since this was a search, we didn't know where this person was, and we didn't know if we could find them, we used our little search helicopter."

According to Quistorf, Snohomish County is very rugged with large areas with no cell phone service.

"There are no roads back there, you cannot drive in about half of our county because it's so mountainous," he said.

Fortunately, the twoman crew was able to find Groene before it was too late.

# Wisconsin reaches new deal with Potawatomi, ending dispute

#### **By Scott Bauer** Associated Press

MADISON, Wis. (AP) ~ Gov. Scott Walker's administration announced a deal Tuesday to end a long-running dispute with the Forest County Potawatomi Tribe, an agreement that cuts the state's liability by half if a casino opens near the tribe's existing facility in Milwaukee.

The deal would reduce from \$500 million to \$250 million how much the state would have to refund the Potawatomi if a casino opens within 30 to 50 miles of the Milwaukee casino and the existing facility loses money because as a result.

The Potawatomi have fought for more than 15 years and two governor's administrations, including the past three years in federal court, over what would happen if a new off-reservation casino was built by the Menominee Nation in Kenosha. That is just over 30 miles awav.

Walker rejected a proposal in 2015 for an \$800 million Kenosha casino at the former Dairyland Greyhound Park dog track that was to be a joint venture between the Menominee Tribe and Hard Rock Casino. Walker cited the potential risk to taxpayers because of the hundreds of millions of dollars the Potawatomi

may be refunded as the through 2031. reason for rejecting it.

The deal Walker reached with the Potawatomi was signed on Friday and released by Walker's administration just over a month before he leaves office. The Bureau of Indian Affairs has 45 days to take action on the amendment once receiving it.

Walker's Department of Administration Secretary Ellen Nowak said she briefed Gov.-elect Tony Evers' transition team on the amendment. Evers' spokeswoman. Carrie Lynch, had no comment.

Under the deal, the Potawatomi could withhold up to \$250 million in payments to the state if a new casino is approved. An arbitration panel in 2014 would have allowed for \$500 million payments to the state to be withheld. The Bureau of Indian Affairs rejected that amendment in 2015.

The Potawatomi sued in federal court, but its challenge was rejected in September.

Under the new deal, the Potawatomi could recoup a maximum of \$250 million in payments if a new casino is built between 30 and 50 miles away that results in revenue losses at the Milwaukee casino. There is an outright ban on any casinos being built within 30 miles of the one in Milwaukee.

The deal would run

Forest County Potawatomi Attorney General Jeff Crawford applauded the agreement in a statement, saying it will ``clarify the obligations" made between the state and tribe in a 2005 gaming compact. Crawford said he looked forward to working with the Bureau of Indian Affairs on its final approval.

Walker's Department of Administration spokesman John Dipko also praised the deal.

``Ûltimately, this amendment resolves an issue that has existed since 2003 in terms that are favorable to Wisconsin's taxpayers," he said.

The original compact was negotiated by former Democratic Gov. Jim Dovle.

Earlier this month, four of Wisconsin's eight members of Congress sent Walker's administration a letter calling for a ``swift and successful conclusion" to the negotiations, saying not having a deal in place created "more risk and uncertainty" to both taxpayers and the tribe.

That letter was signed by Democratic Reps. Gwen Moore, Mark Pocan and Ron Kind and Republican Rep. Sean Duffy.

"She was moving when we found her.' said Quistorf. Groene had hypothermia and some frostbite but was otherwise ok.

"We're quite honored to receive an award from the German ambassador and the German government. They recognized that if she hadn't been rescued, she would not have made it ... one more night out there, because her sleeping bag was soaking wet," said Ouistorf.

Quistorf says he enjoys the challenge of being a rescue pilot.

"It's rewarding to just being able to pull people out if they're lost or injured or sick up in the mountains," he said.

other benefits that are cur- ue? Do we value benefits and per-capita more than nationhood? I suspect some would suggest dividing the tribal budget into 17,000+ individual pieces. Then we could battle Hobart as individuals. The debate boils down to perks versus tribal values. Values comprise the glue that bonds us together as a nation. An outspoken Oneida suggested that her/ his grandchildren should be enrolled because they "looked" Oneida. I don't know what that means!

includes not only knowing our values, but also living them. Saying that you are Oneida and being Oneida are two different things. The Code of Handsome Lake is an important lesson of the past. Handsome Lake was much more than a good-looking Seneca. He set down rules of behavior that are applicable today. The prophecy indicated that greed, drink and gambling would prove detrimental to the Haudenosaunee.

Many Oneidas rely on programs, per-capita and services. We are all beneficiaries of the benefit bonanza that the tribe provides. Other municipalities and governments do not come remotely close to the array of benefits that Oneida dispenses. Oneida people receive these benefits without a tax base. As a retired elder on a fixed income. I. too, receive many of the benefits that are offered. Some tribal members are economically self-sufficient, while some barely make ends meet. Perhaps, the blood quantum dialogue is about the "haves and have nots." The distribution of tribal wealth may require a need-based formula.

Another year has gone by and the Oneida Community Integrated Food Systems (OCIFS) members had another busy year. We started out 2018 by showing a food film

one Saturday a month. In January we showed the film 'FRESH'. That same month the OCIFS members started taking turns going into the Oneida Nation Elementary

School once a month and doing various food related demonstrations to the 6th grade class.

In February the Oneida 4-H club partnered with the National 4-H Council

and Microsoft to create a special agricultural version of the popular 3-D video game Minecraft lead by youth from the local 4-H Tech Changemaker program. Tech Changemakers is part of Microsoft and National 4-H Council's combined efforts to bring more economic opportunity to communities through the power of technology, connectivity and digital skills

In March we offered a Saturday morning Apple Tree Pruning workshop where we had 52 community members attend and learn the process of pruning apple trees. Also, in March, we hosted several gardening workshops to assist people in learning to plant a garden in their own back vard.

May is the month when the Oneida Nation Farm hosts the annual 'Youth Day on the Farm'. # The FY '19 *Community Fund* The Finance Committee is now taking Com-

The Finance Committee is now taking Community Fund applications for the FY19 year. The purpose of the Community Fund is to serve the Oneida community members by offering funds and/or Coca-Cola products. The Community Fund is available to all enrolled Oneida member and is designated specifically for:

- 1. Self-Development (for youth and adults),
- 2. Oneida Community Events and
- 3. Fundraisers that benefit Oneida members or the Community

All funding requests do oblige the requester to provide a 10% match. Individual requests are limited to a maximum of \$500 once per year and group requests to \$750 once per year.

Any travel or travel related request; a request that can be obtained from another tribal program; or any type of personal request are excluded. See SOP's for other exclusions. Tribal programs are also excluded from funding requests, but may be eligible for product requests, provided the event is open to and benefits the community/public.

The Finance Committee reviews all requests once each month. There is one application for funding requests and one application for Coca-Cola product requests. The FY19 forms are available on the Intranet under Frequently Used forms/Finance, and on the Oneida Tribal Website page under the Finance Committee.

You can also call the Finance Administration Office at **920-869-4325** to obtain forms or to find out more information. All requesters are asked to submit requests at least six weeks before actual need or event date. 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




