GTC directs OBC to review tribal employee wage compensation

Kalihwisaks The General Tribal Council overwhelmingly passed a resolution proposed by the Oneida Business Committee concerning wage increases on July 8. The final vote was 94 in favor and 39 opposed with 6 abstentions. The resolution "directs the Oneida Business Committee to conduct a review of the Tribal employee

compensation system which takes into account the fiscal impact on the tribal budget." The meeting was held

regarding the petition for a wage increase submitted by Councilman Vince Delarosa. DelaRosa's proposal was to replace the current 3 percent increase with a 13 percent increase for employees that earn under \$25,000, a 5 percent increase for employees earning between \$25,001 and \$50,099, a 3 percent increase for employees between \$50,100 and \$65,000 and no increase for employees earning over \$65,000.

The Business Committee's (minus Councilman Delarosa) position paper stated "By simply increasing salaries for those below a certain number based only on percentages with no consideration of responsibility, no distinction between full time and part time, no distinction for seasonal workers, no consideration of performance, etc. the proposal builds on false numbers and results in a salary scale where some people with less responsibility would receive more income than their supervisors." Tina Danforth elected new tribal chair

The votes are in from the Milwaukee and Oneida polling sites, and the unofficial results shows Cristina "Tina" Danforth as the new tribal leader of the Oneida Nation.

Danforth, currently the vice-chair, defeated Gary Jordan, Artley Skenandore Jr. and Amelia Cornelius in the four person race for chair at the July 13 tribal elections.

Danforth received 477 votes, or 28 percent of votes cast, while Jordan received 420, while Skenandore and Cornelius received 409 and 398 votes respectively.

"I'm very happy and honored that I was elected," said Danforth, who was at home with her family when she received a phone call from

her sister who was at the polling site in Oneida.

Danforth, 40, succeeds one-term Chairman Gerald L. Danforth, who did not seek another threeyear term.

She wasn't surprised by

the close vote count and said she "didn't have a good indication where the other candidates stood.

"I felt pretty confident."

Saturday's election was the first time two polling sites were utilized as 1,472 enrolled tribal members voted in Oneida, and another 264 in Milwaukee, totaling





Robert Bennett, former Bureau of Indian **Affairs** commissioner, dies at age 89

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) Robert Bennett, an Oneida tribal member and former Commissioner of Indian Affairs who helped improve American Indian education, has died at a local hospital.

Bennett died Thursday, July 11, after a possible stroke and heart attack at Presbyterian Hospital. He was 89.

Bennett was born on the Oneida Reservation in Wisconsin. He moved to Albuquerque in 1969 after retiring from the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Bennett, who served as the bureau's commissioner from 1966-69, was the first Indian commissioner since Gen. Ely Parker during President Ulysses S. Grant's administration, said Sam Deloria, director of the American Indian Law Center.

"He never strutted around and said, 'I made history,' but he did," Deloria said.



President Lyndon Johnson appointed Bennett to head the bureau, Deloria said. Bennett's mother was Oneida and his father was white.

Bennett's wife, Cleota, said his big achievement was that "he wanted to get individuals to develop themselves and to be self-sufficient. You couldn't undo what happened (in the past) to Indians."

She said Bennett worked to improve education for Indians and helped to move the tribes "into the mainstream of society."

Survivors include his wife, four sons - William, Leo, David and Robert - and a daughter, JoAnne Bennett.

Annual Oneida pow wow receives bomb threat

A bomb threat phoned in at a Ridgeview Plaza office on July 3 heightened security at the tribe's annual pow wow.

A tribal employee who received the call at approximately 1:30 pm immediately contacted the Oneida Police Department.

James Danforth, chief of the Oneida Police Department, said a meeting between tribal police offi-Chairman Gerald cials, Danforth, and the tribe's public relations department was held on July 4 to discuss the

issue of heightened security surrounding the pow wow event.

At the same time, members of the pow wow committee met with Paul Ninham, business committee member.

Sgt. Mary Antone said the individual who placed the call stated that an international hate group was planning a bomb threat sometime during the weekend of the pow wow. Antone said that local, state and federal authorities have been notified of the bomb threat.

"Since the event of Sept. 11 the United States has been

placed under yellow and cautioned to be aware and more observant and to report any significant activity in the U.S.," said Antone.

He said security followed the measures observed at Green Bay Packer home games and that all vehicles, coolers, camera bags and handbags were checked.

Extra patrol officers were on hand, as well as bike patrol, plain clothed officers, and extra pow wow security officials.

Sgt. Antone said the threatening call was generated in Northwestern Wisconsin and

that because of the distance the investigation is going slow.

"We're still adamanantly working on it," said Antone.

He said they are still conducting interviews but that no suspects have been identified.

Chief Danforth said he is hopeful there is good information we can get back to see who placed the call to a certain individual of the tribe. "There is no guarantee the search will come up with anything. The individual who placed the call could have been using a cell phone."

A continuing investigation

will be ongoing until there is resolution to the threat.

In a press statement by the tribe, released Chairman Danforth said the pow wow and related activities would not be cancelled.

"In light of heightened security and awareness throughout the nation during this holiday weekend, we have taken the threat very seriously," said Danforth in the statement."

"The Oneida Nation has taken every precaution to assure the security and safety of everyone attending our annual Pow Wow."

Milwaukee polling site makes a difference

For the first time in the history of Oneida tribal elections there was a poll off the Oneida reservation. The Milwaukee polling site gave the Oneidas from Milwaukee a more accessible place to vote instead of having to make the 100 mile plus trek from Milwaukee to Oneida.

Unofficially there were a total of 264 votes gathered at the site. Everything ran smoothly and according to plan. Oneida Election Board member Donna Richmond said that things went "really well."

"We worked with a good group of people and had a steady flow (of voters) all through the day," she added.

The Milwaukee polling site was key for Vince DelaRosa. He trailed Shirley Hill by 30 votes but he garnered 115 votes in Milwaukee while Hill only received 48 pushing him ahead of her for the final Business Committee position. as both Valdor W. John and

The only problem the Election Board experienced was that they had to remind people that visiting at the poll was not allowed and they would have to leave once their vote was cast.

Having the Milwaukee site did delay the time in which the results could be posted, because a collaboration of the totals had to be done and with the high number of candidates in this election. The adding of the numbers and re-checking vote totals with the Oneida poll took longer than expected. The results were posted at 9:45 p.m. at the SEOTS building.

Mary Edna Greendeer tied for the final spot with 651 votes each. One of three things can now determine the outcome of the tie. There can be a special run-off election within 30 days, a recount can occur or a coin toss. Both candidates must agree on the fashion in which the tie will be broken.

In the race for two spots on the Trust/Enrollment Committee Geno Danforth and Roberta Kinzhuma were victorious. Kinzhuma received 746 votes while Danforth had 655.

Hugh Danforth and Loretta V. Metoxen will be the two new members on the Land Commission. Claims Metoxen received 1,211 votes and Danforth gathered 844.

Both Debra J. Danforth and Three spots were open on Lois Metoxen Strong ran unopposed for the two spots open on the Oneida School Board parent position and were selected.

Newly-elected chair Tina Danforth received the most votes, but is expected to decline the position instead electing to accept the position Tribal Chairperson. as Danforth Following in rescinding order are Louise Cornelius (473), Oscar S. Schuyler (402) and Rochelle A. Powless (375).

Acting Election Board Chair Pre Leverance said there were no complications

with the elections. She said it ran smoothly and steadily and recalls only one five minute span when there wasn't anyone in line.

The election results are tentative until the board submits it's final report to the Business Committee. Candidates have the option to call for a re-count until this Friday at 4:30 p.m. Only candidates can make such a request.

The resolution passed also states that the new method of the employee compensation be reported back to the Oneida General Tribal Council at the January, 2003 Annual Meeting and an action plan to be implemented in the Fiscal Year 2004 Oneida Tribal Budget.

seats as Paul Ninham and Vince DelaRosa were reelected. New council members joining Ninham and DelaRosa are Trish King, Curtis Danforth and Brian Doxtator. Out of the 58 total candidates vying for the five seats on council, Ninham received the highest vote count of 570. Trish King following Ninham with 493 votes, followed by Danforth, Doxtator and DelaRosa with 483, 448 and 437 votes respectively. The next highest number of votes received was by Shirley Hill who trailed DelaRosa by only 37 votes.

With only three incumbents retaining their seats on the business committee, newly elected chair Tina Danforth says they have their work cut out for them.

"I want to build teamwork and cohesion of our new members," said Danforth. "I look forward to working with them, and there is good positive energy that's going to be brought to the table."

She said she has already talked to most of the new members and discussed current issues and what their issues of interests are.

"If those issues overlap it would be a great benefit," she said. "I want us to move forward as a team."

A referendum question seeking a primary for the 2005 elections received over two-thirds votes in favor of a primary. The question, "Do we want a primary for the 2005 general election for the Oneida Business Committee," received 1,176 votes in favor, with 379 votes opposed to the primary.

Pre Leverance, acting chairperson of the election committee, said the candidates have until July 19 at 4:30 pm to either challenge the results or ask for a recount. The election committee will be meeting later this week to prepare a report to provide to the Oneida Business Committee so they can declare the election results official.

The newly elected officials will be sworn into office on Aug. 5. All terms are three years.

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Long overdue recognition for Korean War Veterans Oneida veterans among those honored on the 4th of July

Governor Scott McCallum and Green Bay Mayor Paul Jadin were on hand to recognize Korean War Veterans from Wisconsin at a ceremony held on the 4th of July in conjunction with Celebrate Americafest in downtown Green Bay.

Approximately 120 veterans were presented with a Korean War Service Medal on the 50th Anniversary of the Korean War. Letters of appreciation signed by South

Korea's current president, Kim Dae-jung were also distributed.

Amongst those honored, were four members of the Oneida Nation, they are: A/1C Nathan Smith, (U.S.A.F.); Army Sergeant first class Valder John, (U.S. Army) and P.O.W. survivor; Kenneth F. Hill, (U.S. Army); and Clifford Doxtator, (U.S. Army).

Of the four men, Valder Sunchon Tunnel Massacre. John was a prisoner of war

than 370 men on July 19, 1950. He shared his experiences as a P.O.W. with fellow Kalihwisaks reporter Phil Wisneski in a story that was published in the August 9, 2001 issue. His ordeal as told to Wisneski, lasted three years. He said he never spent time in a camp, instead he was put on what is now called the "Korean Death March." The prisoners were forced to march across mountainous terrain from Seoul to Pyongyang - a distance of about 380 miles with little or no food. When the North Korean's wanted information about American Forces they would torture the captives. Valdor was cut up numerous times and had his finger nails pulled out. Only 250 men made it to the destination. Throughout his ordeal, Valdor never gave out any information. His troubles were far from over. "After Pyongyang we were put on a train and packed into open gondola cars like wood," said Valdor. The train stopped in a tunnel where several of the prisoners were led to a ravine and massacred. Valdor was one of 21 soldiers to survive the

At the time he was caphaving been captured by the tured Valdor weighed 227 North Koreans with more pounds, but when American

troops found him two days after the massacre, he weighed less than 90 pounds.

After serving 26 years for his country Valdor retired from the Department of Veterans Affairs in Dallas, Texas in the early 1990's. His rank was Army sergeant first class. He currently resides in Oneida with his wife Linda.

Nathan Smith also has a National Defense medal. He is a lifetime member of

Oneida Post #7784, a member of AmVets Post #54 and American Legion Post #11 out of Green Bay. In receiving the medal, Smith said, "(He was) glad to still be alive to receive the medal."

Clifford Doxtator received the Elks National Veteran Volunteer Award at their annual conference in May 2002. He is a member of the Elks Lodge #259 out of Green Bay. The award is the second

highest award an Elks Club member can win. Doxtator is the Wisconsin Fifth District AmVets Commander and the Oneida AmVets Post #54 Commander. He is also the Vice Chairman for the National Veterans Service Commission.

Dinner was provided for the Veterans and their families at the West Theater after the ceremony.

Drivers in recent car crash escape serious injury

Ralph Cornelius, 48, of Oneida and Jerry Tremel, 80, of Green Bay, were the sole individuals involved in a two car collision on state highway 54 at the Service Road intersection in Oneida Tuesday afternoon, July 2.

According to Cornelius, he was on his way home from the Family Fitness Center going west on highway 54 when he was struck on the passenger side of his 1988 Ford Aerostar van by a 2002

According to a police report provided by the family, Tremel's vehicle pulled out from the Service Road. Cornelius's wife Sharon witnessed the crash as she was in a vehicle behind her husband.

Larry Jordan of the Oneida Police Department was the officer at the scene.

Cornelius was taken to St. Mary's Hospital in a private vehicle where he was prescribed medication for gastrointestinal trauma which she said was caused by the seatbelt upon impact.

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Governor said he'll consider proposal to buy Crandon mine

MADISON, Wis. (AP) -Gov. Scott McCallum said Thursday he will consider a proposal from a coalition of conservation groups and tribal governments for the state to buy a mine near Crandon and the surrounding areas in northeastern Wisconsin.

The coalition wants the state to buy 5,000 acres that includes the proposed mine to prevent mining from ever taking place at the site.

"We want the land forever to be taken out of the hands of mining companies," said Zoltan Grossman of the Wolf Educational Watershed Project.

Nicolet Minerals, a subsidiary of BHP Billiton, is seeking state and federal permits to remove 55 million tons of zinc and copper ore from the Crandon site located near the headwaters of the Wolf River.

McCallum said he intends

representatives for Nicolet Minerals before making any commitments. He said he wanted a thorough explanation of the environmental consequences and any impacts to the local economy and to the state budget.

Administration Secretary George Lightbourn said his agency has not spoken with Nicolet and won't until it gets two independent appraisals of the property, as it does with every purchase using the state's stewardship fund.

"If the price is prohibitive, then we won't take it any further," he said.

The stewardship fund, which is not part of the state's annual budget, provides money for the state to buy land to preserve valuable land, forest and water resources. The Legislature's Joint Finance Committee must approve using stewardship money to buy land.

Dave Blouin of the Sierra Club in Madison said to meet with the groups and Thursday the coalition has had informal contact with a buy the land themselves and Nicolet representative who indicated the company would consider a public purchase of the site. Blouin said he did not know what the price would be, but the purchase could be made using both the state's stewardship fund and private sources

"Some will ask if this is a buyout or a payoff of this mining company ... it is not," Blouin said.

"Not only does the purchase end the potential for mining in the northwoods, the public and the tribes will gain almost 5,000 acres of land that future generations will cherish."

But the proposal was criticized by the state's largest business group.

"The state's only role should be to either approve or reject the permit for the mine," said James Haney, president of Wisconsin Manufacturers & Commerce. "If they want to stop mining in Forest County, they should not stick it to the taxpayers."

Blouin said the land should become a conservation area open to tourism and be jointly managed by affected groups including local and tribal governments. The area also includes Indian burial sites.

Dale Alberts, president of Nicolet Minerals Co., said the company is continuing to pursue the permits necessary for the mine. The company would consider an offer to buy the land "if the purchase is in the best interests of Nicolet's parent company, BHP Billiton, and the offer reflects the value of this project to our shareholders," he said.

Supporters of the mine contend it will be environmentally safe and provide badly needed jobs. Critics say the mine would pollute the area and jeopardize clean water in the Wolf River.

The regulatory process for the mine's state permits already has taken seven years.

Earlier this month, state regulators rejected one of three mines that Nicolet submitted as examples of similar mines that have operated pollution free.

The state's mining moratorium law requires that those seeking permission for new mine projects submit examples of a similar mine that operated for 10 years without environmental problems and one that has been closed for 10 years, also with a clean

environmental record.

The Department of Natural Resources determined the Sacaton Mine, an open-pit copper mine near Casa Grande, Ariz., was not an acceptable example to comply with the moratorium law.

DNR Secretary Darrell Bazzell said the permitting process for Nicolet will continue to move forward and a draft environmental impact statement could be ready by the end of the year.

Graham's decision to file the injunction was based upon that he was left off the election ballot as a chairman candidate. The Oneida election board decided to exclude Graham from the ballot citing that Graham had not given sufficient proof that he resided in either Brown or Outagamie county. Residing in either Brown or Outagamie county is one of the require-

McCaleb confirms Aurene Martin as deputy assistant secretary to Indian Affairs

WASHINGTON - Interior Assistant Secretary - Indian Affairs Neal A. McCaleb announced that he has confirmed Aurene Martin as his Deputy Assistant Secretary -Indian Affairs. She had been acting deputy assistant secretary since May 28, 2002. Ms. Martin, a member of the Bad River Band of Lake Superior Chippewa, came to the Interior Department in October 2001 as Counselor to Assistant Secretary McCaleb. Before joining the Interior Department, Ms. Martin had served as Republican senior counsel to the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs since January 1999, where she covered Indian health care, gaming and self-determination issues and appropriations. From October 1998 to January 1999 she was Director of Congressional and Public Affairs for the National Indian Gaming Commission (NIGC). From June 1993 through October 1998, she worked for the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin and left as Senior Staff Attorney. While there she worked on all aspects of tribal representation including Indian Child Welfare Act

ments to run for the Oneida Business Committee.

One of Graham's arguments was that he was not given the opportunity to appeal the election board's initial decision to not allow him on the ballot. The defense argued this issue stating that he received certified letters on June 4, June 7 and June 21. Thus giving him ample time and notice to file an appeal.

The Appeals Commission entered a verbal decision of no injunction for the tribal elections due to the nature of the decision and time frame factor.

Brad Graham was re-instated back on the election board on July 8, 2002. He was suspended due to the fact that he was running for tribal office.

Request for Milwaukee polling site injunction denied

The Oneida Nation of Wisconsin Appeals Commission denied a request for an injunction just days before election day to prohibit tribal members from casting their votes July 13 at the Southeastern Oneida Tribal Services building in Milwaukee.

Commissioners Marj Stevens, Carole Liggins and Leland Wigg-Ninham ruled July 9 that the polling site in Milwaukee was in compliance with election board policies and that tribal member Don Mclester, who filed the appeal, would not be harmed in any way by the establishment of that site.

McLester stated that the polling site would be unconstitutional because other tribal members across the United States would not be afforded

tion and we're going to lose it. "According to the constitution in Article 3, Section 2, the General Tribal Council shall enact necessary rules and regulations governing the elections of tribal officials. What that means, is that when the election board makes a ruling – you bring it to the BC - the BC passes that ordinance, (or) resolution – that resolution therefore has to come back to the General Tribal Council for ratification according to the constitution which they never did,. The reason for that is that everybody can't make a new ordinance every time there is an election to fit their purposes."

Election Board member Ed Delgado said the polling site in Milwaukee is not a new issue and that he brought the idea to the BC in 1999

fied voters provided they present themselves in person at the polls on the day of election and Article 3, Section 4 states that qualified voters of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, the General Tribal Council, shall enact necessary rules and regulations governing the elections of tribal officials - the Oneida General Tribal Council enacted the election laws."

He added that the election laws under Article 2.8-5 "states the election shall be held in a Oneida Tribal facility as determined by the election board – the election board determined the SEOTS building in Milwaukee a tribal facility where the election can be held. This is in conformance of the constitution. What Mr. McLester is asserting is that we can't put an election-polling place in Milwaukee without putting your family, you take care of all members of the family. It's not taking away anything, it's not affording the same activities of the tribe to other tribal members as written in the constitution.'

Dilweg said McLester's request for an injunction was a request that "the July 13 elections be postponed and that all Business Committee members who approved the polling site be fined \$10,000."

He said legal inquiry determined that the polling site is legitimate.

"We did a full legal review of it (the legitimacy of a Milwaukee polling site) and found that the constitution allows it, the election law allows it - if the election board allows it - they have chosen to do so. So it's fully constitutional."

He added that "everyone has the same opportunity to

the same opportunity to vote as other off reservation voters in the 2002 elections.

He said eligible voters in other states should be given equal opportunity to vote just as Milwaukee voters are by having a polling site there.

"You can't do it for one and not the other," McLester said. "Lets take care of all us, not just a few."

He added that he would probably have to file another appeal because the ruling did not address the legal question that he initially had hoped would be.

"It was a constitutional question," said McLester. "They never addressed the constitutional question. They turned it around the other way on how I was going to be harmed. How does that take care of our constitution - we

for the benefit of the seven to eight hundred eligible voters in Milwaukee," Delgado said. "It is a question of whether it (polling site) is tribal – it is a tribal facility as determined by the election board and the Business Committee."

Chief Counsel Rory Dilweg said by law everything is in accordance with Oneida Nation laws, especially within the constitution.

"Mr. McLester mentions that this is violation of the constitution," Dilweg said at the hearing. "The constitution states that tribal members have to show up at the polls on the reservation to vote. Actually what the constitution says under Article 3, Section 2 is that enrolled members of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin who are 21 years of age or over shall be quali-

Dilweg emphasized to the appeals commission that there is no harm alleged to Mr. Mclester and wonders why the people who might be affected have not come forward.

"As Mr. McLester said, this is not for him; he is not asserting any harm to himself. He mentions that he is speaking for individuals from Hawaii, Alaska and California - why haven't those individuals brought this forward - why haven't they contacted their Business Committee members, why haven't they asked for a GTC meeting, why haven't they filed for an injunction?"

McLester said his intentions are not to take anything away from anyone, that he only seeks equality among tribal members of the Oneida Nation.

vote. Not everyone has the same distance from a polling place They are afforded the opportunity to vote in now two locations and it's their choice I guess not to live near those locations where they can vote there. It might be nice to have absentee balloting but that is not allowed by the constitution - the constitution would have to be amended. And Milwaukee has by far the second largest population of Oneida tribal members and Milwaukee tribal members brought this forward and if other tribal members bring this forward (request for a polling site) then the Business Committee and the Election Board would have to consider it. But no one brought it forward from any other place."

The appellate decisions of Oneida Appeals the Commission are final. A dispute cannot be appealed any further.

To our elected officials

I hope this little letter finds you all in good stead, fine stride, and apt spirits.

The brief note is in regards to the proposed land settlement with the state of New York. While I live in the state of Missouri, I am grateful via the Kalihwisaks paper to have some basic information informing me of your efforts. With interest as one who is a writer, student of history, speaker on matters of culture, and a clergyman, I would like to offer an opinion on this issue.

It is my judgment, given the times, when more terrorism is on the horizon, Wall Street is more than jittery, and the economies of most states are tottering, that the Oneida Tribe take the proposed 500 million from the state of New York and wisely distribute monies lest the well of this opportunity go completely south.

The mood of the times as well as the foreseeable times does not look good when it comes to securing settlements such as the one you good folks are attempting to land. Of one of our federal government agencies it was recently said, "We are like a giant ship, teetering on toothpicks, waiting to collapse." What is true of that agency, regrettably, is true of most State and Federal agencies today. Enrons are all too common. A loss of the moral ought is common. The premises of your good effort are that the moral ought is in place and that the economy is strong enough to remit the settlement you seek. These premises, I believe, are weak scaffolding not able to withstand your heavyweight efforts.

So prudence must be a key consideration in your negotiation. Utopian dreams come easy to all of us. However, the tenuous times, the terrorism season, and the teetering marketplace ought to argue for securing what one can before even more adversarial factors make even a 500 million settlament a long reach

were disappointed, especially those who had traveled a great distance to attend.

Now on the platform in the meeting room, there were 7 or 8 members of the Business Committee all sitting silent when the Chairman called the meeting for lack of quorum. Now these Committee members have been in office long enough to know that the Chairman was about to call the meeting unless more members signed in pretty quick.

Directly after the meeting was called, the Chairman was asked if he and his fellow members had signed in. He didn't. Next Eugene (Yogi) Metoxen admitted that he also had not signed in and, well Vice Chairwoman Tina Danforth would have, but she, "ah" couldn't find her drivers license. I don't know if the other Council persons signed in or not. I was informed that Councilman Vince DelaRosa was observed signing in. I haven't been able to ask Paul Ninham Sandra Ninham, Bischoff, David Judy Cornelius or Julie Barton, but it's interesting that during the discussion. Sandra Ninham and Julie Barton didn't offer up whether they had signed in or not.

I'm very disappointed in those Business Committee persons who didn't sign in. With a little ethical consideration for their fellow GTC members, they should have simply stood up and told the Chairman to hold on while they went and signed in. None did!

There's an old saying that, "Power corrupts." What goes on in the mind of someone elected to serve the people but they do just the opposite? Could it be that our leaders didn't want the Hotel deal and accompanying side deals to be discussed? Could it be they have no confidence in the wisdom of the people they serve? Three years ago nine people promised to clean things up. Today, Councilman Vince DelaRosa has done most of the positive work and seven others are asking to be re-elected. In closing, to call a GTC meeting costs approximately \$5.000 dollars. I'm asking that those BC members who stood silent and allowed the GTC meeting to be called by not signing in, pay the people back. It's never too late to start doing the right thing. An apology would also be nice.

I went back into the room and said, "Mister Chairman there is a rumor that some BC members did not sign in. I'm asking for an investigation!"

At that point Councilman Eugene Metoxen, Chairman Gerald Danforth and Vice-Chair Christina Danforth admitted that they did not sign in. There was no quorum but it was too late.

People were very angry that the G.T.C. lost their right to vote on the hotel ADVEN-TURE because BC members chose not to sign in.

After things settled down, there was a presentation of the status of the New York claim and the hotel adventure. Yvonne Metivier said that former Chairman Rick Hill would get a lot of money if the hotel deal went through. At the very end of the meeting, Rick Hill said, he would be getting a finder fee and that the dollar figure was undetermined at this time. I said that I felt that our tribe is already to deep in debt. We need to take care of the customers at the casino where we really make money. We cannot afford more of these costly adventures. We should use the Venture Fund to pay off some of the principle on the big loans we acquired for our other FAILED ventures. The

interest must be huge. We also need money to take care of the needs of the Oneida people.

I wrote to Secretary, Julie Barton and asked for the names of the BC members who did sign in. She wrote back that the list was confidential. However, I witnessed Councilman Vince Dela Rosa signing in.

On June 26th the BC voted to proceed with the HOTEL ADVENTURE. Councilman, Vince DelaRosa was the only BC member to vote, NO!

According to a draft budget document, Chief Financial Advisor, Terry Cornelius, states with

revenues leveling off over the last several years, we are forced to reexamine two G.T.C. resolutions,

Educational scholarships and the extent of Service eligibility at our Oneida Heath Center. Once

again, the BC and Upper Management are considering targeting the Oneida people!

I feel, there should be an investigation to ascertain if there are more BC members who did not sign in and also, who all stood to profit from the hotel venture and at what price.

Congratulations and thank you to everyone who participated in Fishing I.


Summer Golf I









Oneida Job Training Summer Youth Work Program

The Summer Youth work experience program began June 10th with 13 youth working at various sites throughout the Oneida community. The goals of the program are to provide job training, career exploration, and to teach employment skills. Tutoring hours are also included in the summer plan for youth to improve academic skills and make up credits in the basic core subjects required for a high school diploma. Youth ages 14-22 are eligible to work a maximum of 32 hours a week at \$6.50 an hour.

The current Youth Work Experience Program is entirely funded by the Department of Labor – WIA. Eligibility requirements for this federally-funded program are: enrollment with a tribe; meet federal low-income guidelines; receive Medical Assistance, W-2, food stamps; SSI; or have a medically-diagnosed disability.

The summer slots are filled and Oneida Job Training now has a waiting list for future slots. 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Effective **Brushing Techniques**

Many patients will ask their dentist which way is best to brush. According to the Academy of General Dentistry there are many brushing techniques. The one thing that all techniques have in common is the use of a soft bristled tooth brush. The toothbrush should be small enough to reach the back teeth comfortably. During the dental exam the dentist or hygienist can determine which method is best for each individual. The choice of method depends on patient age, dexterity, and condition of teeth and gums. The easiest method involves holding the tooth brush at a 45E angle and brush in a circular manner. Its important to brush teeth, tongue and roof of the mouth. Ideally you should brush for about 4 minutes to effectively remove the plaque that forms on teeth. Dentist also recommend brushing after lunch at work. Brushing after lunch prevents plaque acids from forming on the teeth and creating caries. In addition to this, it is important to floss after brushing. Flossing the teeth helps to remove plaque and food particles from between the teeth. Food that remains between the teeth will eventually cause cavities. Food that is impacted between the teeth may also eventually lead to periodontal or gum disease.

Insulin Resistance...Metabolic Syndrome...Syndrome X...

Insulin Resistance is spreading rapidly in America and may soon reach epidemic proportions. Many health care specialist refer to Insulin Resistance as Metabolic Syndrome or Syndrome X. All of these terms mean the same thing. Symptoms include:

- 1. Abdominal obesity, when you carry the majority of your fat around the middle of your body.
- 2. High blood pressure.
- 3. Elevated fasting blood sugars.
- 4. High triglycerides and/or low HDL "good"

cholesterol levels, which are both a measure of fat in your blood stream.

Approximately 50 million people in the U.S. have Metabolic Syndrome and the keeps number rising. Metabolic Syndrome and Insulin Resistance predicts a higher risk for diabetes or impaired glucose tolerance which is pre-diabetes.

Insulin Resistance is when your body makes insulin, but the insulin does not work as it should. Ultimately, when insulin does not work properly, it results in tiredness, and food cravings which eventually can lead to obesity and heart disease. The good news is that Insulin Resistance is treatable and Diabetes is pre-

ventable. There is hope. Diabetes is not inevitable. The good news is that a recent study has shown that a healthy diet and daily activity and exercise can reduce the risk of diabetes by 58%.



The parcel is located north of Service Rd, west of County Road U/County J, in Section 33, T24N- R19E, Town of Oneida, Outagamie County, Oneida Nation Reservation, Wisconsin. A draft environmental assessment (EA) has been prepared regarding this proposed action in compliance with the Oneida Environmental Policy (2-13-93B) National and Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). The draft EA contains project information, affected environment, project alternatives and consultation letters.

Comments were requested from the US Fish and Wildlife Service regarding possible impacts to threatened and endangered species, and from the Oneida Tribe and State Historical Society of Wisconsin about possible impacts to historic properties. No significant impacts to these resources are anticipated, and recommendations from these sources will be followed.

Need for Project: The need for housing for tribal members in the area is critical, over 400 members are on a waiting list for affordable housing to become available. Construction of any homes for tribal members will help fulfill this need. The road will run west from County Highway U and at about 500 feet, curve southwest, ending in a cul-de-sac. Three home lots will be south of the road, the fourth home will be at the end of the cul-de-sac. The four homes will be single family dwellings. This alternative will avoid impacts to the wetland to the west. Other alternatives were considered, however they all impacted the wetlands on site. The No-Action alternative was also evaluated, however this will not help to meet housing for Oneida community members.
