GTC passes FY2019 budget with little debate

The General Tribal Council (GTC) wasted little time in passing the Financial Year (FY) 2019 budget at the Monday, December 10 Special GTC meeting held at the Radisson Hotel and Conference Center.

After accepting the oneitem-agenda, Oneida Business Committee (OBC) Treasurer Trish King introduced the FY2019 budget.

"Today, the nation provides approximately 1200 programs and services," said Larry Barton outlined some King.

She also explained why the OBC is bringing back the General Manger position.

"The General Manager position will shift the responsibility of operational administration so that the Business Committee can focus on other extremely important things such as federal legislation that challenges our sovereignty such as the Indian Child Welfare Act, land into trust, self-governance, and our continued efforts to address Hobart's claim that we, the Oneida Nation, do not exist," she said.

of the challenges facing the economy such as rising wages, international tariffs, and inflation.

"Our costs centers are rising faster than our gaming revenues and retail revenues are able to keep up," said Barton.

He expressed concern that Oneida doesn't have more money in reserve in case of negative revenue events such as a loss of profits or grants.

"We should decidedly reserve more liquidity, more cash," he said.

During the discussion, Mike Debraska attempted to Chief Financial Officer make a motion to double the

GTC meeting stipend from \$100 to \$200.

"If all of the boards, committees and commissions can get raises, and the Business Committee themselves can give themselves a raise while at the same time deny our per capita petition, then it's only right GTC should get a raise as well," said Debraska. The raise in question was .85 cents an hour which was given to almost all tribal employees in the FY2019 budget. There were two petitions this year requesting a \$5000 per capita that the OBC refused to bring to a GTC meeting.



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

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Powless' art work lands on book cover

To hear Oneida Nation citizen and Arizona State University (ASU) art major Tyson Powless explain it, leaving home to learn and grow was the best decision he ever made. Powless, 38, recently had one of his art designs grace the cover of a nationally published book titled 'Paradox,' penned by Arizona teen Piper Sehman with help from the Make-A-Wish Foundation.

"I'm currently the editor for Red Ink International Indigenous Journal," Powless said. "My senior editor, Dr. Blastingame, who is a tenured professor at ASU, led me into doing some painting, professional art, and logo designs. He was the one who happened to be doing the proof reading for Piper's book so that's how that connection was made. I wanted to create the cover without using Photoshop so the whole cover was pre-drawn and pre-spray painted. I just didn't want it to be computer animated because I'm really into comic books and I'm a selftaught artist. So, for me it was a matter of going back to basics and getting the black and white drawing done first and going from there."

Powless is thrilled his work is now featured on the cover of a book, but his self-taught artistic resume is much more dynamic and includes far more than drawings and paintings. "I've been going at it from several angles since at least 2005," Powless said. "I've been screen-printing and doing my own t-shirt business



Through laughter and tears, the family of Johnathon Tubby read a statement thanking the Oneida community for their support in the wake of his death.

"Johnathon was kind, he was funny, he made everybody happy ... and that got taken away from us," said Sarah Wunderlich, Tubby's aunt.

Friends of Tubby were encouraged to share their memories of him at a gathering held at Parish Hall Saturday, December

"The word is a darker place without the sunshine of his presence," wrote his former Sevmour High School councilor Amie Secor.

Tubby was shot by a Green Bay Police officer while in custody on October 19. The family stated they were pursuing a civil suit against the city.

The following is the family's full statement:

"The family of Jonathon Tubby wish to say how truly grateful everyone is for the outpouring of love and support we experienced when Jonathon began his spiritual journey.

First and for most we want to sav we all loved Jonathon and we are thankful there is a big community who helped raise him along with our family and to you who

on to his spiritual journey. We also appreciate the support and respect we received from the Oneida Business Committee and other community leaders.

A young man faces many challenges in this life and Jonathon was no exception. He faced his challenges as best he could and like every young man and woman in our community, he had many roads before him to choose. Sometimes Jonathon walked straight and proud on the right road, and sometimes he fell off the path. On October 19th, his path ended. From that day on, we have our own difficult challenge to move on in a good way. Our hearts are broken, and healing them will not be easy, but our family will heal.

As Oneida people, it is our way to acknowledge one another as family, we are all family. We hope to bring a sense of togetherness, support and love for one another in a way that builds unity, strength and a strong desire to make our community better.

We are not going to tolerate, hate, finger pointing, racist accusations or threats to protest. We don't see any value in being that way. We don't believe our ways include hate, violence and vengeance.

We are asking for support for Twahwatsilay^, this means we are all family. We would ask



Although Betters explains that her now-100+ wins are "for the team." the Oneida Community should recognize that Jamie deserves her plaque in WBCA. She's the very first of Oneida to be in that Hall of Fame, located in Wisconsin Dells. ever!

Betters exclaimed that she was "astonished" when she received an email about her 100th win. She expressed that the award was "just a

reminder at how far the basketball program has come" and added that the success of the team would "help continue the basketball program even after she's gone."

It's amazing to know what this coach has been through. Betters stepped up to the plate when no one else did. She put a lot of time and, even, a lot of her own money to support the girls on the team. Whether it was driving them to their games in her car, buying them dinner, or simply just being there to support them emotionally on and off the court.

The paycheck was "peanuts" compared to the time required, she expressed, but she cared so much for the game and her girls, Betters stuck through it all.

Considering she's always been a strong woman used to getting everything done on her own, she said she was hesitant about working with a male. Jamie's partner and JV coach, Lee Laster, is a person she "never expected to share this journey with." However, it has been "a relief" for Betters that she could "work so well" with Laster and she's "very grateful" he helps the girls. They both "pick up where the other one leaves off," said Betters, working hard to coach the team.


Cornelius, Mary H. "Mary Rags" October 11, 1925 - December 8, 2018



access them. The result is the newly created Full Timeline link on the ExploreOneida.com webpage under Oneida Culture and History. The Full Timeline will continue to expand and evolve as more of the documents are scanned and placed online. Due to the sheer volume of documents, the project is only about halfway to completion

"The accumulation of this information began in the mid-60s," McLester said. "Some people may not find this to be of much value, but others may find it to be useful in doing research. A group of us formed the Oneida Indian Historical Society and we hadn't been able to put this information into a format that is accessible by the public. (Marketing and Tourism Director) Michelle Danforth heard about the documents and offered to help get them into the proper order and placed online."

A co-author of approximately seven books about the Oneida people who also served on the Oneida Business Committee (OBC) for many years, McLester accumulated most of these documents while researching information for the Oneida Indian Historical Society. "I served for 12 years on the OBC," McLester said. "During that time

the OBC assigned me the task of putting together Oneida history conferences and in doing the research for these conferences and books we accumulated a lot of this material. Much of this was also used to help develop a Native American history curriculum for the Seymour School District.

"In much of the early material that's been written about the Oneida people I kept hearing the name Daniel Bread," McLester said. "I became very intrigued with this individual so (co-author Laurence Hauptman) and I teamed up and put together the story of Chief Daniel Bread from Wisconsin. Chief Shenandoah, Chief Cornelius Hill...we'd find things that weren't commonly known in our community but there wasn't a place where people could go and look up this information. So that was our goal and hope with this when we hooked up with Michelle and now she's been moving forward with it. But to do that (her staff) had to put my material in some formal order so people could access it and use it."

Now that McLester's educational documents are finally finding their way online, he's been able to turn his focus to finishing yet another

book which he expects will be completed by the spring of 2019. "This new book deals with the relationship between the Episcopal Church and the Oneida people of Wisconsin," McLester said. "It's a collaboration between myself, Laurence Hauptman, Ken House, and Judy Cornelius and the University of Indiana will be publishing it.

"Another project we're working on is a historical overview of the Oneida Nation which will include the significance of Salt Pork Avenue and who lived there," McLester said. "There was only one well to drink from and who were those families? Why was it called Salt Pork Avenue? Another neighborhood is Chicago Corners and who lived there? Why was it called Chicago Corners? We have people working on these and other areas of Oneida that are familiar with that history. These are some of the things we hope to have completed within the next year or so."

At the moment Powless' future after college is a bit uncertain but he has some lofty ideas that are well worth pursuing. "There's some talk about me going straight into my Master's Program after graduation." Powless said. "Not knowing what the possibilities are right now I also think it would be really nice to work in a different country. I'd like to see what I can do with a different university down in Mexico City. My ultimate goal is to help create jobs for people through my art whether it be through jewelry, fashion, or music."

Following his life of leaving home and learning to create and sell his diverse artistic creations to survive, Powless says today's young people need to try and gain certain experiences at an earlier age. "You can teach our culture and with the kids it's going to sink in," Powless said. "But I think you have to add the hustle into the culture. And what I mean by hustle is having kids making their product and knowing how to sell it efficiently and not just doing that stuff in high school. For example, if kids can pick up the grassroots of our culture and jewelry in elementary school imagine where they'd be by high school. They'll be able to take it further than just creating it.

"Another thing people need to know is you can't expect to create Native art within your reservation and think 'I dominate," Powless said. "You have to go to Chicago, New York, Phoenix, somewhere so you can make your presence heard and get to learn a different environment. That's the only way to do it. I'm privileged to have Phoenix in my backvard and I use it to my full capability. If I had stayed in Oneida would I be able to talk about the things I've done? No. There are Oneida members all over who are proud of where they come from, and even though they don't stay in Oneida doesn't mean we hate on our town."



Case of dog poop cleaning mistaken for burglary in appeals

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) _ A lawsuit involving a well-known Native American artist who was cleaning up dog poop in his car but was mistaken for a burglar by Santa Fe police remains in court.

The Albuquerque Journal reports Mateo Romero's case now is before the New Mexico Court of Appeals over public

records and police immunity from liability.

Romero filed a lawsuit alleging the violation of his constitutional rights in 2014 that he says began when his Shih Tzu defecated in his car. Romero told The Associated Press a Santa Fe officer pointed a rifle at him during the bizarre misunderstanding.

Last year, a judge ruled an officer's belt recorder showed the officer acted properly.

However, officials had told Romero's lawyer no belt recording existed.



consin Historical Society Press published its first children's coloring book series, Oiibwe Traditions. The four books in the series contain pictures to color, stories, vocabulary, and often also include activities like word scrambles and mazes, to help kids learn more about Wisconsin's American Indian -- and specifically Ojibwe -- culture and traditions. Each book focuses on a different aspect of Ojibwe life and traditions, including: The Powwow, Storytelling, The Sugarbush, and Wild Ricing.

The Northland College Indigenous Cultures Center team, in Ashland, Wis., developed the content and produced the drawings for the series in order to engage and teach the traditions of the Ojibwe people. The idea for the series was sparked by a comment from a college trustee who recognized the resurgence of interest in detailed coloring books for kids/adults, and the way they can be used for outreach education. As a recent graduate of Northland College and a member of the Keweenaw Bay Ojibwe Community in Michigan's Upper Peninsula, writer and illustrator Cassie Brown produced these informative books for the cultures center project.





In 2010, Bishop David Ricken granted formal Church approval to the Marian apparition at the Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help. In 2016, it was designated as a National Shrine by the U.S. Catholic Conference of Bishops. It is the first and only confirmed appearance of the Blessed Virgin Mary in the United States.



The Finance Committee is now taking Community Fund applications for the FY19 year. The purpose of the Community Fund is to serve the Oneida community members by offering funds and/or Coca-Cola products. The Community Fund is available to all enrolled Oneida member and is designated specifically for:

- 1. Self-Development (for youth and adults),

All funding requests do oblige the requester to provide a 10% match. Individual requests are limited to a maximum of \$500 once per year and group requests to \$750 once per year.

Tribal programs are also excluded from funding requests, but may be eligible for product requests, provided the event is open to and benefits the community/public.

The Finance Committee reviews all requests once each month. There is one application for funding requests and one application for Coca-Cola product requests. The FY19 forms are available on the Intranet under Frequently Used forms/Finance, and on the Oneida Tribal Website page under the Finance Committee.

important and most valuable wampum belts in existence. The exact age of this belt is unknown.

On this belt the Great Tree of Peace stands at the center flanked on each side by two hollow white squares. All of the figures are joined by a band of white that runs the length of the belt and extends outward form the two outermost figures. When the belt is laid out so the tree points to the

north, reading from right to left (or east to west), the first square is the Mohawk Nation, the Keepers of the Eastern Door. The square to its left is the Oneida Nation. The tree in the center represents the Onondaga Nation where the council fire for the League burns and where the Great Tree of Peace is firmly rooted in the heart of the Con-

federacy. The next square to the left is the Cayuga Nation followed by the Seneca Nation of Keepers of the Western Door.

Circle Wampum

The Circle Wampum also referred to as the Magna Carta of the Iro-

quois Confederacy. It is the most sacred record of the foundation of the League. The original Circle Wampum was made at the time of the founding of the league and has been handed down through a long line of wampum keepers. It

consists of two outer strands that are twisted together to represent laws of peace and the interrelationship between government and spirituality. Everything related to governing the people must take into account the spirit of the people. The inner strings of equal length represent the 50 chiefs of the Haudenosuanee, each being equal and unified. The titles of those chiefs still exist today. The longest of the strings represents Onanwire.tu, the seventh Onondaga chief, who was appointed keeper of all the other records of the League.

The circle of strings also represents the seating plan of the fifty chiefs during Grand Council.

The chiefs are joined together at the outer circle as a sign of strength and unity. If a tree should fall upon them they would not loosen their grip. They converge into a smaller circle which holds the culture and ways of the people: the beliefs, the language, the ceremonies, and the customs of our people. The people inside of this circle are to follow the ways set down by the Creator. It is the chief's responsibility to protect all that is within the circle. It is said that if a person does not follow the ways of the Creator they have "left the circle" and are no longer under the protection of the 50 chiefs.

The Clan System - Get to know your relatives

The clan system is the building fundamental block of the Iroquois people. Much like the bones that create the structure and ability to function for the human body so are the clans that structure Iroquois society.

The most basic unit in Iroquois society is a group of relatives that can trace its lineal descent to a single woman. The eldest woman of each of

these groups is generally the head. Several such groups together make up a clan. Everyone in a clan considers every other member in that clan to be a relative.

Every new person born inherits the clan affiliation of its mother. Because of this unique arrangement marriage between clan members is forbidden. Persons adopted into a clan take on and the responsibilities of the clan that adopted them and therefore must follow the same rules of that clan. Each member of his adopted clan becomes a relative

Each clan has the name and symbol of a bird or animal. The three clans of the Oneida and Mohawk are the Bear, the Wolf, and the Turtle. In addition to these three

TURTLE CLAN (A'nowalu)

In the Iroquois Creation Story the earth was created on the back of a turtle. It was on the turtle's back that life began to grow. The Turtle Clan represents the shifting of the earth and cycles of the moon. The people of the Turtle Clan are considered to be the well of information and keepers of the land. The responsibility of the Turtle Clan has everything to do with

WOLF CLAN (Lati'kwaho)

The Wolf Clan represents the path finders. Their responsibility is to guide the people on living their lives the way the Creator intended.

BEAR CLAN (Latisklewake)

The Bear Clan are known as Medicine People, the healers. There are stories passed down about how the Bear Clan people were given the gift of medicine from an elder woman who had the knowledge of all the medicine plants here on

The Great Law speaks of how all members of each clan have a relationship to each other. The laws of clanship are quite rigid. For instance, since you have a family relationship with everyone in your clan it is forbidden to marry a person of the same clan. Even if one is Mohawk and their partner is Oneida. Additionally, the clans have a relationship to each other. The Wolf Clan is considered a cousin to the Turtle Clan and an uncle to the Bear Clan. The Turtle Clan is the older brother to the Bear Clan.

Iroquois Medical Botany is a book in the Iroquois/Haudenosaunee section of the Oneida Community Library. It is a fascinating book I find myself gravitating toward often when wanting to read culturally relevant materials.

Dr. Herrick begins the book by explaining the plants in the cosmos of the People, and he does this by starting with his version of the Creation Story.
