TAP is planning to have an informational presentation on Medically Assisted Treatment (MAT) done for adults in the community. The law office has suggested the contract be between OBH and the GB Comprehensive Treatment center. We are working with OBH to get this updated. 



TSS - Total Suspended Solids






Ashwaubenon Creek/Dutchman Creek (ACDC) Two-Stage Waterway

A two-stage waterway will be installed in the upper Ashwaubenon Creek watershed to double the capacity of the current stream while mimicking the positive impact of a natural floodplain. The lack of proper maintenance and conservation practices has resulted in thick sedimentation along several branches of the Ashwaubenon Creek headwaters. Due to the sedimentation, the proposed stretch of stream floods out of its banks in as little as a 1-year storm event flooding into adjacent agricultural fields which is further adding sedimentation and nutrients to the water, along with gully formations.

All land adjacent to the proposed two-stage waterway will receive a minimum 40' wide buffer from the top of the banks along with Critical Area Plantings or Grassed Waterways as needed in adjacent fields as part of the scope of work.

The two-stage waterway system is designed to flush sediment out of the main channel flow and onto the floodplain benches during storm events. This will keep the maintenance to removing sedimentation from the benches as they become noticeable along with annual mowing. The project will keep the main channel clear of future sedimentation and allow fish, frogs and other wildlife to use the channel freely and reduce the phosphorus and total suspended solids, improving water quality.

Oneida Implemented_BMPs, 5/3/2022

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Along Silver Creek, east of Freedom road. This is the field that is washing out the new trail and threatening to cause gully erosion along the restored stream channel. It needs permanent cover such as hay or Remove from farming. Reforestation, native prairie, and rock lined waterways at the "springs" are recommended.



All fields along Riverdale that drain into Trout or Duck Creek. Reforestation, NRCS BMP's, permanent cover recommended. Plan for future land use changes. Reforestation might interfere with future housing. Funding sources used to purchase these properties include NRDA and North American Wetland Conservation Act. The old railroad grade borders or bisects these properties. These lands could be future destinations when the trail is improved. Buffers around wetlands and permanent hay cover is recommended.



1071 Riverdale. Eastern field has been reforested, the center field is planted to native pollinator habitat and the western field along Riverdale is planted to a hay crop.



Purchased from Brown County. Its located at the southern end of the BC Golf Course. There's a major erosion problem along Duck Creek. Planted to a cover crop in 2020. Needs mowing and maintenance in 2021. Borders pristine habitat in the Duck Creek floodplain. It provides critical habitat for wood turtles and potentially other T&E species. Maintain access from Riverdale.



Field near the Intersection of North Overland and Riverdale. Has farmed wetlands within it. Could provide a reforestation opportunity.



West side of County U north of Pearl street. Extend access road to high point near west edge of little wood lot. Plant the wet front portion (along access road) to trees or prairie.



Cooper at Olson. Very wet fields flood out every year. This is a headwater area for Trout Creek. Reforestation will improve water quality and quantity. Stream restoration and reforestation.



East side of County U near Pearl Street. Put wet areas along County U into permanent hay. Back fields are wet and should be reforestation or wet prairie or permanent hay.



East side of Cooper road north of Pearl. Very wet farm field that is a headwater of Trout Creek. Take out of production and recommend reforestation and stream restoration



Ranch and Van Boxtel. Maintain access to the southern field and reforest the remainder. North of here is a planned 30 acre reforestation in 2021 funded by GLRI. Reforestation.



Cooper at County U, behind Conservation field office. Permanent cover is needed. Cover cropping would be a big help. No fall tillage or no tillage at all. Buffer road ditches. Trout creek headwater.



Moore Road south west of Culbertson. Potential to store water here to alleviate downstream flooding. No fall tillage, permanent cover, potential wetland restoration and reforestation. Part of the Army Corps study to alleviate flooding in the Oneida Creek watershed. This is a headwater area.




Fernando. Cover crops/pasture. The fields in the background show the preferred condition of permanent cover. NEW Water is planning on BMP's.



Between Old Seymour and Ranch. Take low yield and wettest areas out of production and reforest. Manage remainder with roots in the ground 365 days of the year.



Adam Drive at County U. Water and sediment control basins and wetlands constructed to filter sediment are part of the NEW Water Silver Creek project. The treatment wetlands appear to be overloaded with sediment from non buffered drainageways. Cover crops, grassed waterways, no fall tillage and permanent cover recommended.



A sediment plume in the wetland from concentrated flow. The sheet flow going through the wide wetland buffer does not contain sediment. The wetland buffer is functioning as designed but can be overloaded during large storm events and spring snow melt.


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North of hwy 54 between Olson and Cooper. This is looking west from Pearl street. Very wet field. Some BMP's are in place, needs more work. no fall tillage, roots in the ground 365, explore reforestation of wettest and low yield portions. Potential for expanding buffalo herd if properly managed.



365 Triangle Drive. The DOT is working here and will correct some of the issues. Put remainder in permanent cover and purchase remaining parcels for more control. Headwater area of Trout Creek.



These Oneida Creek headwater areas have a very large watershed upstream of the problem areas. Land ownership may interfere with opportunities to control flood water in the upper reaches.



County H at Government. Floods annually. Potential for wetland restorations to store water and alleviate flooding downstream. County H is being planned for resurfacing and culvert replacement.
