## Louise Cornelius-Global Gaming Business 25 People to Watch 2023

By GGB Contributing Editor Marjorie Preston Oneida's economy took off in 1976, thanks to bingo games played in double-wide trailers. Those twice-weekly games were the cornerstone of how Oneida became the third largest employer in the region.

"This is a multimillion-dollar business," says Louise Cornelius, gaming general manager of the ever-expanding enterprise. "If we were in the outside world, we'd be part of the Fortune 500."

Gaming is like a family business for Cornelius, who grew up on the reservation and began her career as a bingo supervisor in 1985. "I was lucky to work from the ground up and get hands on experience in many aspects of

the industry." This experience, coupled with her degrees in management and business administration and her commitment to her people, are key success factors for Cornelius.

She's held positions in both management and regulation, and served for seven years as chairwoman and executive director of the tribal gaming commission. In the latter role, she says, "I think I was instrumental in assisting a relationship that's sometimes adversarial—making it a win-win, so we could all be successful."

## Vigue is Making an Impact in Indian Country

Carla Vigue, Oneida Member, is a community affairs and outreach professional with more than two decades of experience, has been named director of tribal relations at the University of Wisconsin–Madison. Currently, Vigue is director of communications, events and community engagement for the National Council of Urban Indian Health in Washington, D.C. Prior to that, she served for more than a decade as communications director for the Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs, where she developed and implemented a statewide strategy for engaging tribal veterans.

Vigue also held positions with the National Indian Gaming Association, the Wisconsin Department of Administration, and the Office of the Governor,

In her new role, starting January 23, 2023, her scope of work will be to foster strong ties with the 12 First Nations of Wisconsin and lead initiatives, strategic engagement opportunities, and special projects with tribal nations and affiliated organizations on behalf of the university. Says Ben Miller, the

university's assistant vice chancellor for government affairs and strategic partnerships, "Carla's background and skills are a perfect fit for strengthening our existing partnerships with the First Nations of Wisconsin and developing new ones,"

According to Vigue, the position of director of tribal relations at UW–Madison appeals to her in part because of the crucial role higher education has played in her life, "Throughout my career, but especially now, I often think about all the opportunities education has afforded me and the encouragement I've received from people — especially tribal leaders — over the years and how powerful that's been.

Vigue lives on Madison's east side with her husband, Brian, the director of freshwater policy for Audubon Great Lakes, and their two sons, Hunter, 10, and Otto, 7.

## Khale sákahehwe ntwákalótn And again it returns for us to tap trees

This ceremony is held at the end of February or first part of March, after the first thunder which wakes up the trees. It all depends on the weather. When the warm winds once again begin to circulate, a day is set aside to give thanks.

A tobacco burning is done to honor the maple tree. Each camp in the community will have their own tobacco burning. A small fire is built near a maple tree. The words in the tobacco burning ask all of creation for a safe time while the people are in the woods working, thus calling on the Creator to assure that

no great harm comes to those harvesting the sap. All of creation is acknowledged. Then the people can go and set up their sugar camps.

#### Otsyi<sup>9</sup>khé·ta Twanehelatú (Maple Tree Thanksgiving -Closing)


Once the camps are all done harvesting the sap, and everything is cleaned up, a day is picked by the faithkeepers to give thanks for what people have been able to harvest. At this time, the sap is used as medicine for everyone to drink and give thanks. Two Great Feather Dances are done as a way to honor the maple tree and for Creation's cooperation during the harvesting of the sap.

Shannon Hill, operating out of Oneida Behavioral Health Services (OBH), is leading the charge to eradicate substance abuse in the Oneida Community.

At their KáNi Kuhlí Yo Family Center offices at 2640 W. Point Rd., Hill and his colleagues use the motto, Kunhi-yó (I'm Healthy) as they hold a variety of activities in regard to integrated mental health, alcohol, tobacco, and other drug abuse counseling services.

While at one of their events, you may notice their vision and mission materials that utilize an image of a warrior called Loto-Ka (He keeps his word, honest). This warrior represents honesty, to be honest with yourself and the ones who love you, and to stand up and








stay strong to face your demons because if you don't, they will get the best of you.

In December 2022, Hill and his team held Narcan information and disbursement meetings at the Oneida Health Center. Toward the end of this session, they also held an hour-long program to train individuals to use Narcan, which can offset the effects of someone experiencing an overdose of opioids. Hill also organized community drumming and dancing this past January at the Parish Hall, which will continue in February at the Civic Center.

Lenny Hayes, MA, is a citizen of the Sisseton-Wahpeton Oyate of the northeast corner of South Dakota. Lenny is also owner and operator of Tate Topa Consulting, LLC and is currently in private practice specializing in Marriage Family and Therapy. He has extensive training in mental and chemical health issues that impact the Two-Spirit/Native LGBTQ and Native community. Lenny has traveled nationally and locally training and presenting on the issues that impact both the Two-Spirit/Native LGBTQ

individual and community. These issues include the Impact of Historical and Intergenerational Trauma on this population, violence of all forms, child welfare issues, and the Impact of Sexual Violence and Human Trafficking on Men and Boys which is a topic that is rarely discussed. Lenny is the former Missing and Murdered Two-Spirit Project Assistant for Sovereign Bodies Institute and a 2020 graduate of the Human Trafficking Leadership Academy Cohort 5.

As former chairman of the MN Two-Spirit Society, he assisted Native organizations in developing policies in the protection, safety, and nondiscrimination of Two-Spirit/Native LGBTQ people in the Minneapolis/St. Paul area. He is also a LGBTQ Advisory Co-Chair Council Member for SWIWC, formally the Southwest Indigenous Women's Coalition, Advisory Committee Member for the Human Trafficking Capacity Building Center, Capacity Building Center for Tribes, and board member for the First Nations Repatriation Institute. He is a former

Board of Directors of StrongHearts Native Helpline, former board member of Wac' ang'a (Sweet Grass) Inc. Victim Services, former Advisory Board Member for the National Quality Improvement Center (QIC) on Tailored Services, Placement Stability and Permanency for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Questioning, and Two-Spirit Children and Youth in Foster Care, former Committee Member for ACE-DV Leadership Forum with the National Resource Center for Domestic Violence, former Council Member for the MN HIV/AIDS Prevention and Care Council, and a former Two-Spirit/ Native LGBTQ Advisory Committee Member for the Center for Native American Youth, Washington, D.C. He is an Advisory Council Member for many national projects across Indian country. Lenny was selected to be a recipient of the 2018 Bonnie Heavy Runner Advocacy Award at the 16th National Indian Nations Conference "Justice for Victims of Crime."

## Oneida Retail's Generosity to Safe Shelter

Oneida Retail answered the call when Safe Shelter put out a notice that they were in need of items for their residents and their building. Safe Shelter, located at 2155 Hutson Rd., put that notice out late last year, and Oneida Retail responded not just in one way, but with three donations to the shelter.

An Oneida Retail employee hygiene drive for the shelter was first. This drive started on December 1, and asked Oneida Retail employees to donate hygiene type items for shelter residents. The response was amazing. Over 800 items were collected from the employees and delivered to Safe Shelter Friday, January 13, 2023.

Next, Oneida Retail reached out to the shelter and asked for children's ages that were staying at the shelter. With that information, employees donated toys for the children right before Christmas. Each child received at least one toy to help celebrate the holidays.

Finally, a donation of nearly \$1,000 in cleaning supplies was donated to the shelter to help with cleaning, maintaining, and upkeep of the shelter. Items included Lysol, cleaning wipes, floor cleaner, bathroom cleaner, trash bags, laundry detergent, towels, and more.

# Changes to Death Benefit Effective April 1, 2023

The Oneida Trust Enrollments Department has transitioned from a life insurance policy program to an internally disbursed death benefit program called the General Welfare Assistance Oneida Life Insurance Plan Plus, or GWA OLIPP for short.

Under its new format, the death benefit will remain tax free, in the amount of \$15,000, while saving the expense to the nation of paying monthly insurance premiums. Recently, you should have received a mailer providing information to help you understand how the GWA OLIPP works.

As part of the change, we strongly encourage that all Oneida Nation Members have a beneficiary form on file at the Trust Enrollments Department. If not, the following applies:


- Only funeral expenses will be paid.
- Remaining funds, after funeral expenses, will not be disbursed. The designated funds will remain in the GWA program.

Blackowl said the Cannery tries generate revenue via holiday-themed sales or giveaways for end-of-year, Halloween and Valentine's Day. This year, because of the generosity of the Oneida Community Integrated Food Systems (OCIFS), the meal was provided free-of-charge.

Blackowl is optimistic that they will continue finding funds to give back to the community, whether by providing traditional meals (hopefully for free again) or incorporating more free workshops through the cannery.



When was the last time you truly assessed your mental health? National Self-Check Month in February offers a great opportunity to check on our mental health and overall well-being.

Before you begin your mental health self-check, set the tone for your emotional and mental review. Remind yourself that it's OK to delve into how you feel. When you try to ignore them, your negative feelings can escalate into larger mental health issues. Review the good feelings too. Recognizing positive parts of your life can lead to improved mental health.

Start your review with some simple questions, "How do I feel in this moment and recently?" When experiencing or recalling a feeling, recognize how your body reacted to that feeling. Did you clench your teeth or feel something in the pit of your stomach? Did your heart start to pound? Stress, anxiety, and depression can manifest as head or body aches, rashes, flares of existing health conditions, changes in your appetite, stomach aches, loss of energy, and muscle tensions.

Ask yourself, "Have I had any recurring thoughts or does my mind keep moving back to a particular thought, encounter,

or conversation?" Recall these memories and review how you felt each time the recurring thought occurred. Does the emotion dissipate or intensify with each recurrence? More questions you can ask yourself, are:

- · "Have I been worrying lately, and if so, what have I been worrving about?"
- "What am I doing for enjoyment and relaxation?"
- "Am I taking care of my physical health; am I eating well, moving, and sleeping well?"
- "How often do I rely on alcohol or drug use to deal with my emotions?"
- "Am I afraid to tell someone how I am feeling?"

If you find that your assessment reveals any surprises, remember that Oneida Behavioral Health has resources you can use to help restore harmony in mind, body and spirit.

In November 2021, the Oneidas celebrated another milestone, opening the Badger State's first sportsbook. It was an instant hit in the four-season sports community, which alternately roots for the Milwaukee Bucks, the Milwaukee Brewers and the Green Bay Packers.

"The sportsbook is doing really well in terms of hold percentage; it's increased foot traffic as well as revenues," says Cornelius. Though mobile and online sports betting aren't yet legal in Wisconsin, a geofenced app lets players make virtual wagers on casino grounds.

Cornelius anticipates even greater growth in the new year. By spring, she will propose a multimillion-dollar casino expansion with luxury amenities to appeal to Gold Players Club members. "We've got to cater to those high rollers. Hopefully, I'll get the support to go ahead with that."

She will also continue the fight against "eight-liners," unregulated video slot terminals that operate in state gas stations, bars, and even laundromats.

"Wisconsin calls them amusement devices, but these are illegal machines" that unfairly divert business from tribal gaming halls, according to Cornelius. "We're as highly regulated as a bank because of our assets, and we also compete for that discretionary income. We're working on a process to address the matter."

Most of all, she looks forward to leading her staff, and learning from them, with a management style that combines guidance, communication and mutual respect.

"I try to keep that balance, providing direction while coaching and mentoring my staff," she says. "Our leadership team has a strategy to improve HR management, which means taking care of all our employees. And I always go with the philosophy that says to be successful in your field, pick people that are smarter than you. Of course, our other strategic priority is to always grow gaming revenue."

As in public Fortune 500 companies, Oneida Nation gaming benefits the "shareholders"—in this case, the Oneida community, sustaining education, housing, health care and other essential services. "Gaming is our No. 1 support, and the money we generate is the key to our success," says Cornelius. "It's always about growth."



The Notre Dame Academy Girls Lacrosse (NDAGL) is currently in its 2nd year of existence as a high school lacrosse club at Notre Dame Academy. With great pride, the inaugural NDAGL began a tradition of inclusivity with strong participation from coaches, players, and volunteers from members of the Oneida Nation.

NDAGL is one of the few high school club teams offering players a chance to compete at either the junior varsity or varsity level. As the program developed, young Oneida Nation ladies attending Seymour High School, Green Bay Southwest High School, Ashwaubenon High School, Notre Dame Academy, and of course, the Oneida Nation School System, including Oneida Community Lacrosse, and Oneida Recreation. Players have also joined from Johnson O'Malley funded programs, Green Bay Lacrosse Club, North American Indigenous

Games, and Sconnie Team Wisconsin travel teams. All in all, the program has a proportionately higher number of Indigenous players.

Currently, high school lacrosse in Wisconsin is considered club status, meaning they are not recognized by the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA) for the 2022-2023 school year. However, club teams are recognized through the Wisconsin Lacrosse Federation (WLF). As a result, most non-WIAA recognized club teams do not receive financial support from their school system. For this reason, NDAGL requires player team fees to cover expenses.


The inaugural season resulted in a 15-3 record, earning second place in the Bay Valley conference. Two losses came from a team that played in the State Championship while the third loss was to a team that played in the State Semi-Finals. The team was honored with over nine all-conference players. Another accomplishment was upsetting a higher ranked team in the first round of the playoffs.

The hard work and dedication of these young women is a direct benefit to the Oneida Nation community. The coaches and organization stress hard work, commitment, skill development, maximum effort, respect, and sportsmanship. Not only are these young women the future mentors, head coaches, assistant coaches, officials, and leaders of the lacrosse community, but they are the future leaders for both the Oneida Nation and Northeast Wisconsin.

The late Gordon McLester, a respected Oneida Nation elder and historian, conducted a vast number of tribal community elder video interviews between 1994-2007.

Valder John was born March 15, 1931 near Chicago Corners. He lived with his parents Guy and Naomi John, who first met while cherry picking and then again at a dance. He was named after a place where his mother worked. With his maternal grandparents and 8

siblings, his family worked the land they lived on while his father found employment at various jobs such as logging or painting.

He fondly remembers going Hoyaning in large groups of kids, despite the snow and the cold they would grab their bags and walk for miles. "We looked forward to different houses with their different cookies and some of them had gingerbread and whatever you know, and we knew which house we'd get the goodies at." he said, chuckling.

At age 17, Valder joined the military, and served in the Army for 26 years and

is known in Oneida as a veteran who survived as a POW during the Korean War through horrific conditions. The story of his military experiences were shared in the Kalihwisaks published on August 9th, 2001, and July 16th, 2002. He was recognized along with other Oneida veterans by the Mayor of Green Bay and the WI Governor. Valder was very proud of his military service and believed it was important for the youth to learn from, appreciate and, honor veterans.

When asked what he thought of the Oneida Community and where it was going, he expressed how proud he was to see the initiatives Oneida had taken for its citizens, such as medical care. He praised Oneida for looking to the future, and no matter where he traveled, he received the Kalihwisaks to stay informed of what was going on in Oneida.

There, the groups of 5 each looked at original source documents like pictures of boarding schools and the Native students that attended those schools. Many of those documents were about Norbert Hill Center and the boarding school that was on that site over a century ago. We also saw a lot of historic artifacts.

Students found the trip educational and inspiring. For this writer, it was a very cool time. We all felt it was cool and inspiring. The group has more field trips to other museums and archives planned for spring including UWGB's archives and those at the Brown County Library.

### **Lacrosse Dreams**



I picture a beautiful spring day when the team is practicing out on the field playing a lacrosse game.


The team is passing the ball back and forth moving it gracefully downfield for a goal. The stick feels right in my hands and I am at peace.



#### DRUG AND ALCOHOL FREE WORKPLACE LAW AMENDMENTS

The purpose of the Drug and Alcohol Free Workplace law is to establish a drug and alcohol-free workplace program that balances respect for individuals with the need to maintain an alcohol and drug-free environment. Amendments to this law are being proposed to provide that an external applicant's confirmed positive THC test result shall be exempted from the requirement of a negative drug test result for pre-employment eligibility in certain circumstances.

Individuals may attend the public meeting for the proposed amendments to the Drug and Alcohol Free Work-place law in person at the Norbert Hill Center, or virtually through Microsoft Teams. If you wish to attend the public meeting through Microsoft Teams please contact LOC@oneidanation.org.

## Flash Back **Chief Tallfeather**

In the March 23, 2022 edition of the Kalihwisaks. the Bicentennial Team first announced that July 25-30, 2023 was going to be the week that Oneida will commemorate 200 years of existence here in Wisconsin.

The article also spoke of August 5, 1921 as the date Oneida held its 100 Year Centennial events, which included various athletic contests such as baseball, lacrosse, and a foot race featuring the legendary runner, Levi Parker "Chief Tallfeather" Webster.

Also known as the Copper Streak, Levi's athletic ability was billed as the "Greatest Drawing Power of any Single Act Anywhere." As a professional runner, he was contracted for many events, including a nonstop run from Milwaukee to Chicago on September 5, 1929. (See newspaper clipping on left.) Webster was also a World World I veteran. In the upper right, is a photo Levi's marriage to Servilla Skenandore.







### SQUASH, GREEN BEAN AND CORN SOUP

#### **INGREDIENTS:**

1/2 lbs. Lean pork or beef

10 oz. Box frozen corn, or fresh equivalent

10 oz. Box frozen bean, or fresh equivalent

4 cups Diced squash anything except acorn

Season to taste


#### **DIRECTIONS:**



The blanket features artwork from renowned artist Dawn Dark Mountain. It symbolizes our migration here via the waterways and duck creek, the white pine peace tree, and the maples trees. The leaves transition into stars that rise to the skyworld representing our ancestors. Finally, the wolf and bear clans are over the six nations wampum belt.
