

Exciting Future for Oneida's Past!

Since the Oneida Museum held its grand opening June 23, 1979 near the corner of Cty. E & EE in Oneida, it's been growing at an alarming pace, taking ownership of 6,000 artifacts, 80,000 photographs, and 75,000 pieces of archival and research material, making the need for a new location critically important.


Besides its age, physically, the prior location, according to the Oneida Engineering Department (OED), has many limitations, including an unstable environment for storing

antiquities and limited space. For instance, within the 1,500 square feet floor space, there is room to comfortably fit just 20 people. Furthermore, the space does not comply with the American Disabilities Act (ADA) nor does it have room for onsite collections storage, classroom activity, or workshops. OED went on to explain that intangibly, the location is far from convenient for most visitors to get to and thus, it's difficult to take advantage of the higher numbers of visitors a more prominent location will garner.

Increasing the number of visitors will lead to many benefits. Beyond the

apparent items such as more admission and gift shop sales, a new location could also lead to other revenue streams in the form of partnerships and grants. Most importantly, however, Stacy Coon, Museum Director, describes the responsibility our community has, "In addition to active participation from our community, we also have the responsibility as Oneida people that goes back to our Creation that can be interpreted to help give us a deeper sense of purpose in protecting these artifacts, which can also be further seen as an extension of our sovereignty. From a more contemporary perspective, having tribal museums and cultural centers can be thought of as efforts to remember our ways of knowing, and live them and to carry our knowledge with new knowledge to create a better future while preserving and sharing our past."

Over a 48 hour period, Wednesday and Thursday, February 22 and 23, 2023, the greater Green Bay area experienced widespread snowfall where 8-14 inches was commonplace. The storm also brought with it wind gusts that reached 52 mph, causing many schools, businesses, and organizations to close during the hazardous conditions. However, for several Oneida departments, including Elder Services and the Department of Public works (DPW), the show had to go on.

Elder Services employees John Hill, Judy Bozeman, and Dan Summers worked tirelessly to prepare and deliver meals to Oneida Elders. Along with delivering the meals for Wednesday during the storm, they also had to prepare and deliver Thursday's meals. It was a daunting task but they prevailed, along with the entire Elder Services team, led by Director, Elijah Metoxen, who explained that behind-the-scenes, many other services also continued during the closure.

Along with clearing the many Oneida Department drives and parking lots, there are approximately 100 elder residences that are either plowed, checked in on to make sure they are safe, or are ensured that their life-alert type devices are checked and functioning. The teamwork shown by Elder Services and DPW was only matched by the strength of Snow Storm Delilah. Thankfully, our Oneida elders are all cared for with steadfast dedication.

The KáNi Kuhlí Yo Family Center held their Winter Indigenous Games version of their Kunhí-Yo (I'm Healthy) event Saturday, February 25, 2023, featuring husband and wife team, Dr. Dan and Susan Ninham at the Norbert Hill Center.

The Ninhams had the participants smiling and laughing while sharing their knowledge of various games; snowsnake, Haudenosaunee wooden stickball, Inuit games, Ojibway stickball, string figures, and running games. Dan and Susan have been sharing these games mainly in Minnesota schools and communities for a few decades since retiring. Dan shares his

enthusiasm by proclaiming their motto, "The Indigenous games movement continues!" Wife, Susan, echoed her husband's sentiments, "I feel so proud when people participate in the Indigenous games we teach. Watching our people enjoy experiencing the games fills me with pride when they

acknowledge how the games make them feel connected to our ancestors. It's an honor to teach the games that have been dormant for far too long." Mr. and Mrs. Ninham also acknowledged Jackie Ninham and Shannon Hill for putting this event together.

Just prior to the Saturday activities, Dan's brother Paul was invited by Vicki Strzelecki, Oneida Youth Enrichment Services, to gift the students at Rock Ledge Elementary School in Seymour, WI with his knowledge of Indigenous games. During his interaction with the students, Paul explains, "There were several times I had to pause and feel the strong, beautiful energy I was receiving. There's something profound that occurs when I have forty students in a class, starting at four-year-old





kindergartners, and they are listening intently." In addition to the games, Paul intertwines Oneida cultural teachings, such as the matrilineal clan system and how the games were given to us by the Creator. Over the past four years, he's taught at numerous schools to around 8,000 students, which will be continuously increasing as he plans to teach about 80 students this April in the Milwaukee-based First Nations College Access Program and other surrounding Milwaukee schools. Another stop will include the Indigenous Health and Wellness Day at Madison College and even possibly a trip to the Alaskan Peninsula to the Aleut Village.

Together, Dan, Susan, and Paul will continue to engage their communities to ensure that both the Indigenous games they share and the cultural origins of the games will thrive in the hearts of all who are fortunate enough to learn from them.

Brad Thomas, Snipe Clan of the Tuscarora Nation, was recently hired as the Oneida Nation Forester in January 2023.

Thomas graduated from Canisius College of Buffalo, NY and furthered his studies with a Masters of Forestry from the State University of New York College (SUNY) of Environmental Science and Forestry. He is also a Sloan Indigenous Graduate, a fellowship program that strengthens and expands university initiatives to recruit, train, and graduate American Indian and Alaska Native Students in science, technology, engineering or mathematics (STEM) programs. It was within this program that Thomas had the opportunity to study under the tutelage of Neil Patterson Jr, former Director of Tuscarora's Environmental Program and Robin Wall Kimmerer, who is most recently known for her book, Braiding Sweetgrass.

Before completing his studies in May 2022, Thomas gained experience from

numerous organizations, including, but not limited to; the US Fish and Wildlife Service, Cornell University, and the Haudenosaunee Environmental Task Force. It was during his work at Gutchess Lumber in Cortland, NY, though, that affirmed his passion for forestry. Thus, when he was made aware of the Oneida forester position it was a perfect fit to be the caretaker of our forest resources. It was also a chance to ask him about a hot topic about one of the more culturally important trees to Oneida.

The October 2022 issue of the Kalihwisaks chronicles the devastation that the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) is causing to the Ash trees all across Turtle Island. When asked about this issue and the plans to combat it, Thomas mentions that he is still in the information-gathering stage for this issue here in Oneida. He discussed few of the mitigation factors surrounding this environmental concern, one of which these involves releasing insects that prey on the EAB. He advises to wary of such methods as they can result in unanticipated problems. Therefore, his current recommendation is to harvest the at-risk ash trees to keep EAB numbers down as they would have less Ash trees to infest. We also get to retain any material we can for our basket makers. There is also hope that there is a small percentage of resistant Ash trees that will withstand the test of time and outlive the EAB. The plan for Ash on Oneida will evolve as I have more time to collaborate with more community members as well as other foresters from around the state and region. Another factor, which he is still working on, is what types of resources, financial or otherwise, that Oneida wants to provide to overcome the EAB.



Whose Land? Project Continues

Denis Gullickson, along with his Oneida Nation High School (ONHS) journalism students, invited community members to share their memories, keepsakes, photographs, letters, and other documentation on Saturday, March 4, 2023 with James Levy and his colleagues as they continue their research regarding the Whose Land? project.

When Levy began this effort in 2012, it was a Wisconsin state-wide project that gathered the oral histories of farming practices of various nationalities in the area, such as German, Hmong, European, African American and Oneida. The result was an audio/visual exhibit titled, Lands We Share, in 2019. Since then, Levy and his partners, including Associate Professor in the History Department at the University of Oshkosh, Stephen Kercher, explained that the project shifted most of its focus not just to Oneida farming, but to a broader focus of all the land originally owned by Oneida, but lost possession of due to various circumstances

The Saturday conversation began as a roundtable discussion of how Oneida members, living away in larger cities, moved back home and the circumstances they faced while doing so. After a quick lunch break, attendees gathered around hand-drawn memory maps. It was a lively discussion which included many insightful and historically significant comments from community members such as Oneida Public Relations Director, Bobbi Webster and Oneida Legislative Affairs Strategist, Bill

Gollnick. Topics included the location of walking paths, the original site of Council Meetings, the origins of the name, "Chicago Corners," and the purchase of the Norbert Hill Center in late 1970's.

Stay tuned as Levy, Gullickson, and the ONHS Students organize the information into an array of mediums, including a podcast.



Choosing the Right Contractor

Choosing the right contractor to make repairs to your home is an important decision.

Take the proper steps to protect yourself and think through your decisions.

Avoid becoming a victim of home improvement fraud by following these tips.

Do your research. Ask friends and family for recommendations. Ask the contractor for references. Do online research and look for negative reviews.



2 Verify the license. Many state and local governments have licensing for contractors. Check with your local consumer protection agency, licensing board, or building department to determine the requirements.

3 Obtain at least 3 estimates in writing before signing a contract. Estimates should include a detailed description of the work, the start and completion date, payment schedule, list of materials,



total cost of the job and any warranties.

Verify the contractor's insurance. Obtain a copy of the insurance certificates from the contractor and make sure they're current. Call your state insurance regulator to confirm the appropriate liability, workers' compensation, and property damage insurance are in place.



Avoid potential liens.
You could be on the hook if there are subcontractors and suppliers and the contractor fails to pay them. Check with your state or local consumer protection agency about whether they could place liens on

your property in that case, and if so, ask the contractor to give you a written "release of lien" stating that all subcontractors and suppliers have been paid before you make the final payment for the work.



Avoid paying a large deposit to start the work. Never pay for the entire job up front.

5 The contractor should pull the applicable permits, not the homeowner. Ensure that inspections are completed and passed before making final payment.



Watch out for scammers.

Don't do business with any contractor who approaches you unsolicited, claims to have material left over from a previous job, or pressures you for a decision immediately. These are red flags of home improvement fraud.

Buenrostro-My Message Could Save Lives

In November 2009, according to Gina Powless-Buenrostro, Oneida member, she was diagnosed with Ovarian Cancer due to her use of Johnson & Johnson (J&J) Talcum Powder. Since then, Buenrostro and 40,000+ other women are in involved in a lawsuit seeking damages from Johnson & Johnson.

Buenrostro's goal is to inform the Oneida Community and anyone reading this article to first be aware of this issue and second, to get screened for cancer, especially if you have used this product consistently in the past, and third, that it could also affect your children, especially if you've used this product during pregnancy. She points out that the Johnson & Johnson powder contained asbestos, a very carcinogenic material that once absorbed by your body, can attach itself to organs and cause cancer.

Buenrostro states, "It was strange and out of the ordinary that I contracted this specific type of cancer. None of my family has ever had this ovarian cancer. It doesn't run in either my paternal or maternal sides. The tissues of my ovaries were tested and were found to have asbestos fibers embedded in them. Ovarian cancer is usually called the silent killer because there are no symptoms. Like many other women, I underwent chemotherapy. However, unlike other women, I stopped the chemotherapy against my doctor's advice because it was affecting me in such a devastating and harmful way. I couldn't eat or sleep. I became very depressed and everything that brought me happiness prior to using chemotherapy now brought me only emptiness. The chemotherapy was killing the cancer cells in my body, but it was also killing my mental, emotional, and spiritual health. I felt I was only buying more time. However,

that time meant nothing to me because my quality of life was so diminished. It was then that I decided to utilize our Native indigenous traditional medicines and ceremonies to heal. Those ceremonies were on my mind since day one of my diagnosis. Our Native people across North and South America have traditional uses of medicines and ceremonies still intact within their communities. Those ceremonies are ancient and can be still used for healing diseases that are not indigenous to Native people." Buenrostro continued on by saying she's grateful that others are also building awareness, including a well known national and international news company.

In November 2022, CNN conducted an interview with Buenrostro that chronicles both her journey to over come ovarian cancer using Native ceremonies & medicines and the litigation involving J&J. This special report will air April 16 and April 23, 2023.



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



What If...? asks what would happen if the Tesseract fell to Earth and landed in the sovereign Haudenosaunee Confederacy before the colonization of America.



- 5 Season to taste with salt and pepper. Serve on hamburger buns or smaller slider size buns.





A February 2023 fire caused an estimated \$500,000 in damage (only 20% of which is covered by insurance) to five of Aspiro's buses, which are used to transport people with disabilities to their workplace or to locations where they volunteer.

Aspiro, Inc. is local non-profit whose mission is to create opportunities for people experiencing disabilities to live their lives by reaching their goals, connecting to their community, and achieving their independence.

Since the fire, the community, including local radio and television stations are building awareness to help Aspiro's fundraising campaign to purchase new vehicles. 

This the old woman of the tribe, she was born at Oneida, NY and moved to Wisconsin in 1829 when she was about 14 years of age. For a number of years, she was the family nanny among many of the white families in Green Bay and De Pere. From the very beginning of the hospital building, a room was promised for her to occupy during her old age, as she has no home of her own. She is happy most in her pleasant surroundings at the hospital. During

the summer months she goes away on little visits to her white friends but is always glad to get back to the hospital. Mary Ann is closely connected with the church work. For many years she was the interpreter at the sewing guild and in various ways was a help to the missionary. She is not able to get to church very often by reason of her blindness and increasing infirmities, but she makes her communion weekly in the little white chapel of the hospital.
