


# **STEVENS'** Moving Gaming Forward pg 2 **ONEIDA EMPOWERS COMMUNITY** with Employment & Resource Fair

The Bay Area Employment & Resource Fair was held Tuesday, April 11, 2023 at the Resch Expo on Armed Forces Drive in Green Bay was a culmination of the strategic partnership Oneida recently formed with the Brown County Job Center.

The free event, hosted by the Oneida Nation, was put together by the Oneida Economic Support Department, led by Director Delia Smith and her colleague, Sean Powless, who works as a Job Counselor in Oneida's Economic Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Program.

Smith mentions she and Powless were able to utilize funds provided by the WIOA, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), and Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) programs as well as

The Indian Gaming Association (IGA) Chairman Ernie Steven, Jr. was recently honored at the ICE (International Casinos Exhibition) London 2023 gaming conference in London, UK with the ICE Landmark Award, which, as Stuart Hunter, Managing Director of Clarion Gaming describes, "Recognizes extraordinary achievements of the individuals and organizations that make up the gaming industry."

Stevens received the recognition for his leadership during the COVID-19 pandemic. Stevens and the Indian Gaming Association helped to protect and preserve tribal gaming and secure the vital funding needed to keep tribal casinos solvent through the worst of the pandemic.

"This recognition is an acknowledgment beyond me," said Stevens. "It is a recognition of the outstanding commitment of our tribal leaders who guided the Indian Gaming Association in our work to secure the vital funds needed to help bring our tribal government gaming industry through the worst of the COVID pandemic. It took a team beyond those who are joining tonight. I must also credit the creativity and flexibility of many of our experts on the ground throughout Indian Country. This is a recognition of the hundreds of thousands of Indian gaming managers, employees, and regulators at the frontlines who took temperatures, put up the dividers, wiped down machines, and did all they did to get Indian Country's economic engines moving again. They imposed the highest standards industry-wide to stop the spread of the virus by putting the health and safety of people first."

In addition to Stevens' ICE Award recognition, all of Indian Gaming also recently recognized Stevens' leadership by re-electing him as IGA Chairman. Says Ernie's wife, Cher, "Congratulations on another unopposed successful run for the IGA Chairman position! We're very proud and happy to support you 100%. I've watched you for the past 22 years' work so hard in all you do! You have a great team behind you, and we have your back."

# **COUNCILWOMAN WEBSTER CREATES** Videos for Small Talks Campaign

Councilwoman Jennifer Webster has been asked to create content for the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) for their Small Talks campaign entitled Talking to Your Kids About Underage Drinking. DHS is focused on reaching Indigenous communities and helping adults in those communities talk to the kids in their lives about underage drinking and substance use. They have requested her to share, normalize, and broaden the message of Small Talks while celebrating Oneida's culture and the activities that go along with it. In partnership with the Wisconsin Department of Health Services and the Oneida Nation, they are encouraging parents, caregivers, and community role models to help prevent underage drinking through small, casual conversations with kids about alcohol.

Along with the Nation's Communications Department, Councilwoman Webster is creating four videos surrounding the Small Talks campaign. Each video highlights various tools and techniques on how parents and other caring adults can start the conversations as well as some statistics. Research shows that parents and other caring adults are the most powerful influence on children's choices about underage drinking.

Things have been happening here at Duck Creek! The Grounds crew from the Oneida Department of Public Works Department gathered at the arbor the morning of Thursday, April 13, 2023 with heavy machinery to start demolition. Before doing so, the middle two panels of artwork created by Scott Hill on the façade of the arbor were removed and brought to the Oneida Museum.

Planning has gone on for quite some time to be able to take say "Tear down that Arbor!" On April 12, 2023, the Business Committee approved \$500,000 from Tribal Contribution Savings (TCS) funding to replace the 22-year-old Oneida pow wow arbor. The new arbor will be 140 feet long by 31 feet deep and will feature an air-conditioned center section with areas for M.C.s /Arena Directors, tabulation, and pow wow storage. Like the previous arbor, the new arbor's slanted roof design will divert water off the back of the structure when it rains. It will also feature a concrete base so it can serve as a multipurpose location to host outdoor classrooms, meetings, and community gatherings. The goal is to complete the project in time for the 50th Annual Pow Wow in 2024.



The University of Wisconsin-Green Bay (UWGB) began accepting applications in March

2022 for the First Nations Education Doctoral Program (FNED), the only one of its kind in Wisconsin whose coursework is centered in Indigenous knowledge systems and draws upon Indigenous teaching and methods learning

from elders, oral scholars, and faculty expertise in First Nations Eduation.

During UWGB's commencement ceremonies in May 22, four students received their Doctoral degrees from the program, including Crystal Leah Tourtillott Lepscier, Vicky Lee Young, along with two Oneida members, Yekuhsiyo Rosa King and Artley Skenandore, Jr.

Jennifer (Powless) Benally established Shinymoon Creations, an Indigenous clothing business she has operated out of her home in Rio Rancho, New Mexico for the past 19 years, which now includes her potter as well. However, Benally recalls that the roots of her journey in the clothing industry go back much further than this.

Benally's parents instilled in her a solid work ethic and to be independent. Therefore, it was no surprise how Benally, a former champion Fancy Shawl dancer, described the time her mother encouraged her to begin applying the lessons she taught her, "I was about 12 when Mom said I can't make your outfits anymore. You need to start making your own." It was during this time, too, that Benally was attending the Oneida Tribal School, who she also credits for so many lessons in her life, "School laid the foundation of who I am and where I come from."

As Benally continued the legacy of her late father, also a Fancy Dancer, she was also refining her skills as a maker of fashion and traditional wear, and people took notice. "People saw the work I did and started asking can you make this for me," says Benally. She goes on to say that she didn't have intentions of making clothing for others and that it was just kind of a natural progression.

Fast forward to 2016 with Shinymoon Creations in full swing. With her young family now grown, she and her husband Randy had more time to dedicate to the business, which was flourishing. Then, the pandemic hit. Benally said business survived but it did slow. Again, Benally's upbringing and experience, along with the support of her family, enabled her to pivot to pursue a Bachelor's Degree in Fine Arts from the Institute of American Indian Arts (IAIA) and this May 2023, she will be graduating. During school, Benally was able to network and learn more about her craft and strategic businesses practices that she will be using to begin re-building Shinymoon Creations to pre-pandemic levels, and beyond.



the Oneida Veterans Department. Smith mentions that her team partnered with Josh Bahr of the Department of Workforce Development and the Brown County Job Center to coordinate the event, "Josh has been our go-to because of his extensive experience with event-coordinating job fairs."

The job fair featured over 100 participating employers doing on-site interviews along with 30 local community resource organizations. Although it was very hectic putting the event together, Smith says, "This is a dream-come-true for us. We're both super-new at it. We've learned a lot and had to be patient. We were also fortunate enough to have the right people in the right places, such as our Intake-Coordinator, Kimberly Ninham who has done a lot of leg work to make sure everything was organized." All the Economic Support/Community Education Center employees and our leadership have been integral in making this event In addition to the suppossible. port staff, Powless emphasized that Smith's leadership was critical in making this event a reality, "Delia is the type of leader who knows the way, goes the way, and shows the way."

Smith also mentioned that another strategic initiative to their efforts was prioritizing veterans and thus, a large contingency of Indigenous veterans were present, a population not often served by these types of initiatives. Furthermore, Smith wanted to commend Kerry Metoxen of Oneida Veteran Affairs for helping them market the event.

Smith describes the event as not just a job fair, but a way to help individuals better themselves with either newfound employment or connecting them with community resources. Both Smith and Powless are optimistic that this year's event will serve as foundation and model to hold a yearly event.

Shawn Skenandore organized a community-favorite sports event featuring Oneida Youth playing the slightly older Oneida athletes in a basketball showdown on Saturday, March 18 at the Oneida Nation Turtle School.

This year, the theme was Mature Super-Heros Vs. Oneida Youth. However, a legacy tradition of this game resulted in some of the Mature players wearing their best thrift shop attire. The pictures are worth a thousand words. The final score was Mature Super-Hero's 57, Oneida Youth 53. Although, the Oneida Youth were the true champions because we all knew the Mature Super-Hero's cheated. Athletic clothing and apparel giant, Nike, which employs about 75,000 people worldwide, is currently represented by just 180 Indigenous individuals. They collaborated with IAIA to improve this ratio by partnering with them to interview their students for internship opportunities at their Beaverton, OR headquarters. After two rounds of interviews, Benally, one of three students selected, will began working at Nike this June for ten weeks as a Color Design Intern in their Color Scene Department. Benally says Shinymoon Creations strives to fill the gap in keeping Native American culture alive by implementing cultural designs into contemporary fashion and traditional wear. Her award-winning clothing is a fusion of woodland Haudenosaunee and Southwest Indigenous designs. She also recently developed her Warrior Society line of men's clothing, paying homage and honoring the roles of Indigenous Men. 



If you were born between September 2, 2001 – September 1, 2005, there may be a Minor Trust Account (MTA) available for you to claim or defer.

MTA's have been established for enrolled tribal members 18 & under for those members eligible to receive their MTA or the members who previously deferred.

The Minor Trust Payment Deferral forms were mailed the first week in March 2023.

**Receipts:** A receipt will be mailed within 2 weeks of your submission whether you defer or claim all. If not received, contact the Oneida Trust Enrollment Department.

### **Options to Claim a** Minor Trust Account:

- Claim All You will receive 100% of your Account
- Deferral All or a portion of your account will remain invested if you elect any of the following options:
  - If you elect to defer 100%, all funds will stay in your account.
  - If you withdraw a portion, please indicate a whole number percent ie. 10%. The remaining funds will stay in your account.

If you choose to defer your funds you will not be able to request your trust funds for 1 full year.

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

### ONEIDA NATION PARDON AND FORGIVENESS HEARING NOTICE

Purpose: Pardon or Forgiveness – a Tribal member may receive a pardon for the conviction of a crime(s); or a Tribal member may receive forgiveness for acts that render him or her ineligible for housing with the Tribe or other Tribal benefits. A Tribal member or non-Tribal member may receive forgiveness for acts that render him or her ineligible for Tribal employment; an occupational license, certification or permit issued by the Tribe; housing through the Tribe; or other Tribal benefit.

  - c. Witnesses: Witnesses who wish to testify against the granting of a pardon or forgiveness must register twenty-four (24) hours prior to the pardon and forgiveness hearing date. There will be no exceptions.

Just as fast as the snow melts, and the grass is turning green, the grounds-keeping team prepares to oversee 138 properties covering 350 acres and over 15 miles of roadway. Suzanne Jordan, DPW Grounds-keeping Manager describes the versatility of her team, "The grounds-keeping crew covers street sweeping, ditch maintenance, and tribal properties. Our area is more than just cutting grass." The current team consists of four truckers, five heavy equipment operators and four groundskeepers staff with three open entry level positions. Susan comments on the difficulty of finding help, "The biggest challenge for our area is that we're only getting one to three applicants over a two to three month period." Since the entry level position requires one year of experience, she is looking at creating a trainee position to give applicants an opportunity to gain experience.
