


The Oneida Bicentennial Dedication Breakfast, held Tuesday, July 25, 2023 at the Radisson Hotel & Conference Center, was the kickoff event for Oneida's acknowledgment of 200 years of existence here in Wisconsin. As the audience and event team were preparing for the day's agenda, the Oneida Hymnal Singers took the stage to provide their gift of song for everyone.

After the Hymnal Singers, Bobbi Webster, Master of Ceremonies, greeted the crowd in her good way. While the event transpired, Webster flawlessly facilitated the events through unexpected twists and turns to make the event go as smoothly as possible.

Along with Webster's M.C. services, Michelle Danforth (wide brimmed hat), Big Bear Media Director, and Leah Stroobants (top hat), Tourism Coordinator, also provided welcome messages to the audience as they donned period clothing created by Yale Theatre major, Carter King (center). King's team, far left and right, are Mark Wozinski and Megan Kitzman, respectively. To the left and right of King are Sarah Madden and Julie McLester, who also showed off King's wardrobe creation, which was a continuation of the special clothing made for the September 2022 Treaty Anniversary event at Heritage Hill.





Leander Danforth, along with Chairman Tehassi Hill, provided an Oneida welcoming address and opening remarks, respectively.

Shortly after, the Oneida Color Guard presented the eagle staff, along with the rest of the colors. The Buffalo Creek Singers provided appropriate drumming and singing to open the event.







After the Color Guard, the crowd anxiously awaited the highly anticipated reveal of Dawn Dark Mountain's commissioned piece, Honoring our Past, Present, and our Future, the Journey Home.

Dark Mountain's commemorative tribute piece to the Oneida Bicentennial is the largest work she's ever created. The artwork alone, not including the frame, measures roughly 29" tall by 41" tall.

As a pleasant surprise, Governor Tony Evers made an appearance to enjoy the activities and inform Oneida about how the Wisconsin state budget is prioritizing Oneida initiatives.

As the morning progressed, Courtney Gerzetich, Brothertown Tribal Preservation Historic Office and Oneida Museum Registrar, along with Phyllis Tousey, Brothertown Chair, pictured here with Chairman Hill, delivered a presentation on Brothertown archives. The Brothertown are recognized by Oneida Nation for their contributions to our wellbeing. Tousey is seen here gifting Chairman Hill with a wooden feather adornment, tobacco, and some fabric.

The Bingo Queens, Alma Webster and Sandra Ninham, lower right, were recognized for beginning our gaming enterprises via Bingo.

Finally, Charlie Doxtator (green ribbon shirt, lower right) led a team of social dance singers just before the Oneida Smoke Dancers wowed the crowd with their fancy footwork.

While the history conferences were happening at the Radisson, the Amelia Cornelius Culture Park was heating up, literally and figuratively, to host to many cultural activities, including classes for painting, beadwork, silversmithing, sculpture, basket-making, and corn husk flower making.

The weather was a scorcher, so attendees kept cool by staying in the shade and taking advantage of the cooling towels, water, and fans given to them by the event staff.

Friday evening, July 28, 2023 was the Bicentennial Theater Night at the Radisson.

The Rosy Simas Danse Co. had the lights dimmed in dramatic fashion as dancers performed *She Who Lives on the Road to War.* The performance was symbolic of a Haudenosaunee historical figure, Jigonhsasee, whose wisdom and vision helped Hiawatha and the Peacemaker bring the Nations together.

Next up was Perry Ground, Turtle Clan of the Onandaga using his 30 years of experience to tell Haudenosaunnee stories to the audience in a most animated style.

It was late afternoon, Sunday, July 23, 2023 when the community got together in the Irene Moore Activity Center parking lot to provide a hero's welcome to the Oneida contingent of athletes returning home from competing in the North American Indigenous Games (NAIG) in Kjipuktuk (Halifax), Nova Scotia.

A Madison365.com article, *Team Wisconsin impresses at 2023 North American Indigenous Games* sites that Wisconsin's teams did exceptionally across all sports leading the state to place 7th in overall medal standings with 56 total of which 21 were gold. Wisconsin joined other states such as Minnesota, New Mexico, Michigan, and more along with plenty of teams from Canadian provinces and territories.

According to NAIG2023.com, the beginning of the (NAIG) started in the early 1970s and took until 1990 for the first event officially titled North American Indigenous Games to be held in Edmonton, Alberta, which now brings together 756 Indigenous Nations. NAIG takes place every four years showcasing the very best of North America's Indigenous athletes. Celebrating customs and traditions reconnecting through sport and culture.



THE NEXT SECQUOIA CORNELIUS 200 YEARS on a Path to Success

Congratulations to the Oneida people and the GTC for moving forward with the blood quantum discussions. It is a significant breakthrough and is especially meaningful in the footsteps of the 200year commemoration marking our time in Wisconsin, underscoring both our kinship and resilience.

While the proposed plan is less than perfect, it gives us the opportunity to bring clarity to the conversation and explore a path forward. Many ideas need to be investigated, both pragmatic and some not feasible. Issues such as benefits, local control, constitutional processes, future generations, Oneida civics, and timelines require serious discussion. Ideally, top-down, and bottom-up strategies should be explored simultaneously.

Secquoia Cornelius graduated with high honors in June 2022 from Green Bay Southwest (GBSW) by maintaining a 4.0 grade point average throughout her high school years. In fact, along with regular high school coursework, she also acquired college credits from the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay. Beyond the academic success, Cornelius was the American Red Cross Blood Drive Coordinator at GBSW, played lacrosse with Notre Dame Academy and competed for National American Miss Teen Wisconsin in August

2022, all while working as a Certified Nursing Assistant at Anna John Nursing Home since she was 16. Needless to say, Cornelius will be moving on to college this fall. Among her choices were Datrmouth, the University of Pennsylvania, Yale, Harvard, Syracuse, Vanderbilt and the University of Boston, Amherst. After much thought, she decided to attend Harvard where she wants to become a Doctor of Internal Medicine and Bio Chemistry.

When asked how she has achieved such great success, Cornelius offered words to inspire her peers, "Be determined and never give up. It can get really difficult, especially as an Indigenous youth, but push through and I promise it will be worth it in the end. The success I achieved involved a lot of work inside school, as well as in my



extracurriculars and in the community. It also involves a lot of sacrifice. I often said no to friends, stayed home from fun events, and spent quite a bit of time alone just studying and completing my work to the best of my ability to achieve my goals and success in and out of school. Another piece of advice I have is to use all of the resources available to you and take advantage of every single opportunity you have, these experiences and tools are things you will use a lot down the road and as Indigenous people we are often looked down upon and have to work ten times harder than those around us to prove ourselves so those opportunities and resources may be scarce. There may be some ups and downs but with perseverance, determination, and patience you can and will achieve success as I have, if not more!"

SELISSEN CONTINUES Learning as She Educates

Jessi Selissen, Oneida Member and professional educator, elevated her career by becoming the new Associate Principal in July 2023 at Two Rivers High School.

Selissen began her educational career by first progressing through her own education, starting with graduating from Green Bay Southwest High School. Soon after, she earned a Bachelor's Degree in Education from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. From there, she continued her educational journey by earning two master's degrees. The first was in Education from Concordia University and the second came in February 2023 in School Supervision from the University of Wisconsin-River Falls. Selissen also explained that she will be seeking a Doctorate degree in the near future but has not yet decided what

school she will be attending or what specific area of education she will focus on.

Flashing back to 2019, after her undergraduate work, she began teaching English in 2019 to K-12 students at White Lake School, She later moved on to once again teach English but this time, at Clintonville High School. Finally, in July 2023, she began her Associate Principal role. When asked if she'll miss teaching, she replied, "Yes. I will miss teaching. I love being in a classroom and getting students interested in literature in new and different ways." Although her teaching career is over for now, she explains that at some point,

she has aspirations to teach at the college level. For now, though, Selissen is excited about her new role and her future, including at some point becoming an author. She would like to write a book about being an educator, where she hopes to share all the nuances of being a teacher that most don't know about.

Jessi is the daughter of Roxy and Keith Selissen, and the great grand daughter of Jonas and Cora House. When not teaching, Jessi loves to travel and be outdoors, especially on her kayak floating down a river enjoying a good book. Her advice to her students, and really anyone for that matter, is, "You can be who you want to be. You shouldn't be afraid to express who you are inside. That's very important."

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SHAWN'S PRO WASH-CLEANING WITH A NEW PURPOSE

In 2019, Shawn Skenandore embarked on an entrepreneurial venture by starting a small power washing business based on a unique ambition: acquiring new vehicles and power tools, which he affectionately refers to as his "Toys."

While amid founding Shawn's Pro Wash Solutions (SPWS), Skenandore also maintained a full-time position at a nearby paper mill. The following year, however, his journey took an unexpected turn as he faced lifethreatening health challenges that began with contracting Covid-19, which led to gallbladder and appendix failure. On top of this, he would eventually overcome two more setbacks to his health. First, his doctors found and removed a mass on his lungs and two, he suffered



a stroke in October 2022, forcing Skenandore to leave the paper mill.

While in recovery, Skenandore never gave up. He maintained his optimism and began to brainstorm how he could elevate SPWS. stating, "The creator blessed me with an opportunity." Shortly after, Skenandore received a call from a contractor he previously worked with. The contractor, based on how impressed he was with the quality and service Skenandore provided, asked Skenandore to do a job. Skenandore hesitantly agreed due to his medical issues, but nonetheless agreed on a trial basis. From this point, SPWS experienced significant growth.

Skenandore now has four full-time and three part-time staff. Skenandore says his role has transitioned from front-line operations to behind-thescenes booking jobs and strategizing on how to evolve the business, including maintaining how versatile SPWS is with the industry.

Skenandore explains that SPWS can clean many types of surfaces: residential or commercial carpet and tile floors, exterior cleaning; houses, roads, concrete and driveways, as well as environmental hazard clean-up for the Department of Transportation. In fact, over this past year, SPWS has washed 40-50 homes, 200 gas stations, and 30-40 commercial buildings.

Skenandore is very proud that his operation is an Indigenous, ecofriendly and family-owned business that he plans to grow by expanding services from seasonal to yearround services via two new divisions: automated semi-truck washing and floor cleaning. For more information





Q&A on GWA OLIPP


- Q: What is GWA OLIPP
- A: This stands for General Welfare Act Oneida Life Insurance Plan Plus.
- Q: How does GWA OLIPP work?
- A: In the event of a member's death, the OLIPP benefit pays up to \$15,0000 to their funeral home to cover final expenses. Then, if a beneficiary is on file, the remainder will be distributed to the your names beneficiary(ies). The intent of this benefit is to provide for the final expenses of a deceased member as part of their general welfare needs, so their family is not burdened.
- Q: How long is the process to receive payment?
- A: Once a certified death certificate is received along with all other forms, we can start the process, then takes 2-3 weeks for payment.
- Q: What is the total number of Beneficiary forms on file for o ur members?
- A: As of August 2, 2023, total forms turned in 9,851 (67%).
- Q: What if I don't have a beneficiary form on file?
- A: Currently, until September 29, if not beneficiary form is on file funeral cost will be paid and any remaining funds will be paid out under a naming sequence. However, after September 29, 2023, only funeral costs will be paid, any remaining funds will stay in the GWA fund.
- Q: Can I still turn in a form after September 29, 2023, if I don't have a form on file?
- A: Yes. Forms can be turned in anytime.
- Q: Who do I contact to find out if I have a form on file?
- A: You may call the office at 920.869.6200 or email: TrustEnrollments@OneidaNation.org.
- Q: Where can I get an Oneida Beneficiary Designation Form?
- A: This form is available in office or online: https://oneida.nsn.gov/resources/enrollments/forms/
- Q: How often can I make changes?
- A: You may make changes at any time. Reason to update your form should be remove/add beneficiary, beneficiary is deceased.
- Q: What if I list a minor as primary beneficiary?
- A: If I minor is listed, we than ask for proof of guardianship of the minor, then the funds would be distributed to the person in care of the minor.



We don't often talk about it until it's too late. Suicide doesn't only impact family and close friends, but everyone within that person's sphere of influence and those within their family's and friends' spheres of influence. Death by suicide has a ripple effect that can impact an entire community.

When you consider that in 2021, in the U.S. alone, nearly 3 million adults made suicide plans, that 1.7 million people attempted suicide and 48,183 people died by suicide, you begin to understand how pervasive its impact can be. It's likely that in your lifetime, you'll meet or know someone who is considering suicide, or you may have considered it yourself.

While September is National Suicide Prevention Month, it's important to be aware of suicide's realities every month of the year and know what you can do to help.

How Can I Help?

Because suicide can often be prevented, awareness is the first step. Warning signs can include depression, change in personality, instances of self-harm, long-term pain, substance use issues, withdrawing from others, recent life crisis and conversation about wanting to die.





Due to barrier and customer ease of access at Four Paths-Shell (corner of W. Mason and Packerland), Oneida Retail lowered the cost of fuel at this location and created Barrier Buster Deals. This change: attracts new customers, retains existing ones, brings back those who switched to another Shell.

Tribal members fueling at Four Paths-Shell pay less due to the lower cost of fuel (5¢ less), combined with their tribal member discount (30¢ off), for a total of 35¢ off per gallon!

Customers using their Fuel Rewards (FR) card receive 3¢, 5¢, or 10¢ off per gallon, plus an additional 10¢ off per gallon on Fridays. Tribal Members are unable to receive these additional discounts on fuel due to the inability to stack tribal and loyalty fuel discounts.

The good news is tribal members using their FR card for in-store purchases (tobacco excluded) may earn and accumulate cents off per gallon on the Barrier Buster deals:

- Spend \$25 in store (excludes fuel and tobacco), earn EXTRA 5¢ off per/gal.
- Buy 5 hot coffee (any size), earn EXTRA 5¢ off per/gal.
- Buy 2 Monster Energy® (16 oz) in single visit, earn EXTRA 5¢ off per/gal.
- Buy 2 Twisted Tea® in single visit, earn EXTRA 5¢ off per/gal.
- Buy a Luigi's pizza and 2-liter Pepsi® for \$10 in the same visit, earn EXTRA 10¢off per/gal.

There is no limit to earn cents off. When you accumulate more than 35¢ off per gallon, redeem your points for fuel, instead of using the tribal member discount.

GROUND TURKEY SWEET POTATO SKILLET

INGREDIENTS:

2 large sweet potatoes, peeled and diced (about 3 cups) 1 lb ground turkey 1 yellow bell pepper, chopped 1 Cup onion, diced

½ tsp salt ½ tsp pepper

14 Cup cilantro, chopped

1½ tbsp ground cumin

1 tbsp garlic, minced

1 tsp chili powder

2 tbsp olive oil

1/2 Cup shredded mozzarella

DIRECTIONS:

- 1 In a large pan, heat olive oil over medium high heat. Add garlic and cook for 1 minute and add ground turkey. Break apart meat and continue cooking until turkey is browned.
- 2 Add cumin, chili powder, salt and pepper and stir. Add onion, bell pepper and cook for 3-4 minutes.
- 3 Add sweet potato and stir. Cover with a lid and cook for 6-8 minutes or until sweet potatoes are soft. Add water if needed to avoid contents from drying out.
- 4 Remove lid and add additional salt and pepper if needed. Top with shredded mozzarella and allow to melt. Remove skillet from heat and garnish with fresh cilantro before serving.
