LYLE BURMEISTER-TREE PLANTER FOR LIFE, 2.4 MILLION STRONG AND STILL GOING

Have you ever driven passed Hidden Valley Driving Range on W Mason St, heading towards the Turtle Roundabout in Oneida, and marveled at the majestic trees that grace the right side of the valley? On October 3, 2023, I had the privilege of meeting the tree planter behind this captivating landscape, Lyle Burmeister.

Burmeister recounted his first tree planting job within Oneida during the late 80's. It was located just west of the Oneida Apple Orchard and Hidden Valley Driving Range. Initially, he started the job as his brother's helper, but his brother decided to pursue a different career, while Burmeister remained steadfast in his commitment to tree planting.

Over the years, he has further contributed to afforestation efforts in the Oneida area, as well as throughout Wisconsin. His most notable plantings are the Fish Creek Reforestation Area, Seminary Road, end of Mullein Road, and the corner of Reformatory and Olson Road. He has planted an array of species, including White and Red Pine, Spruce, Silver, Red Maple, White Birch, Red and White Oak, Bur, Swamp, River Birch, Yellow Birch, Cherry, and Basswood.

In an enthusiastic manner, Burmeister discussed a new tree he recently began planting in this area, the Sycamore. After researching this species, he discovered that the Sycamore has the capability to withstand Wisconsin winters, evidenced by the tree's natural habitat, extending from the eastern coast of the United States north to Quebec, Canada. He remarked, "They seem to be a really hardy tree that can withstand the cold."

The recently planted Sycamore and pine trees can be observed at the intersection of Reformatory and Olson Road. Burmeister explains the purpose of these trees will be for sequestering carbon dioxide from the atmosphere and storing carbon in the trees and into the soil, thereby contributing to enhanced air and groundwater quality within the community, stating, "This is one of the main reasons I plant trees."

In all, Burmeister has planted trees in 17 counties. He claims not to have a favorite place to plant, humbly explaining, "When I go for a Sunday drive with my Wife, I say, oh yeah, that one looks pretty nice now." He adds, "I've planted 2.4 million trees already. My legacy was to get to 2 million and I'm way over that, I'm going to keep planting for as long as I can."

SUPERINTENDENT VISITS ONEIDA COMMUNITY

Oneida welcomed Dr. Claude Tiller, Jr., who recently became the Green Bay Area Public School District Superintendent in July 2023, to tour the Oneida Nation and it's resources, including a community question & answer session at the Career Education Center on Thursday, September 21, 2023.

Tiller began the Q&A session by explaining his mindset as Superintendent, and proclaiming, "This is a people business. You have to honor the individual cultures and to understand them, you have to get out and meet people." Thus, this was the goal Tiller had in mind by meeting with the Oneida people. He continued further by saying, "You have to give honor to the people in front of you that you're teaching."

Tiller received a Bachelor's Degree from the Univ. of Michigan, a Master's of Education from Bowling Green State Univ. in Ohio, an Education Specialist Degree from Wayne State Univ. in Detroit and finally, a Doctorate of Education from American College of Education in Indiana. His academic achievements prepared him to become the Assistant Superintendent over high school transformation with the Detroit Public School Community District in Detroit, MI. Prior to this, he served as school improvement grant facilitator and monitor for the School Improvement Support Unit for the State of Michigan.

Tiller fielded an array of questions from Oneida Community members on an unusually warm September 2023 afternoon. Questions about how Oneida students are still being confronted with discrimination, Tiller responded, "You're talking to the first African American Superintendent." He continued by discussing about how he's striving for discrimination not to happen on his watch by putting his faculty through the appropriate training and taking the time to directly address this type of behavior in his school systems. Another key discussion topic was regarding the Oneida language being integrated into current curriculums. He was very open to this, stating, "Bring the curriculum and certified teachers to my office and we'll make it happen."

Other topics included Summer Slide, or in other words, the loss of academic momentum while students are on summer vacation. Part of Tillers's solution is to enhance and create more opportunity for students to attend summer school.



METOXEN, Oasis Senior Advisors, Connecting the Dots for Elderly

Matt Metoxen is the owner/operator and Certified Senior Advisor for Oasis Senior Advisors of Green Bay (OSAGB), which he's been running from his home in Ripon, WI since July 2023.

Before starting OSAGB, Metoxen double-majored at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, earning a Bachelor's Degree in Political Science and Public Administration in the year 2000. Later, he continued his education by acquiring a Master's Degree in Public Administration from the University of Oshkosh in 2005. His education propelled him into a US Department of Education position in Washington, DC and most recently ended a seven year stint as a Sales and Project Manager for a Wisconsin-based LED lighting company. Over time, however, Metoxen began to disagree with the direction of the company and thus, started looking for a new career. It was his experience during a family emergency where he would find inspiration for his next chapter.

During my interview with Metoxen, he shared with me with how difficult it was to go through a troubled time with his immediate family during the onset of the pandemic. Unfortunately, he quickly discovered there was no one there to help them navigate a maze of resources. On the other side, though, perhaps it was a blessing in disguise because during this experience, he learned how important it is for his fulfillment in life to help others, as he metaphorically explained, "Connect the dots." He went on to explain that, essentially, he acts as a conduit for elderly and their families in securing assisted living, financial resources, and legal services such as wills, etc. Coupled with his own family's lesson in resilience, he also finds inspiration from his grandfather, who rose above poverty to begin his own business that still thrives today. Metoxen explains how his grandpa loved to tell stories and in turn, how he (Matt) began to love hearing the stories of people's lives and discover how fascinating they are. It was the story of how his grandpa eventually had to move into assisted living in 2016 that further solidified his new career choice.

Metoxen's previous work and education honed his skills to help seniors and families during what can be challenging times. "I want them to know that they're not alone. When they have trying times, it's not uncommon, and there are resources for them. If we can make someone's transition period a little easier, that's what we'll do. Typically, no one comes to us when they're having a good day but hopefully, I can help make that day a little easier." 
Oneida Retail's category manager, Taylor Oudenhoven knew that the Oneida branded water is a big seller in Oneida One Stops and Smoke Shops, but he was also aware of the impact that water bottles have on the environment. Taylor took the initiative to come up with a plan to help offset that impact by donating a portion of the sales form each water bottle to a local water advocacy group. This past year, that group was the Fox Wolf Watershed Alliance (FWWA). Last month, Oneida Retail presented a check in the amount of \$4,557.17 to the alliance to help keep the waters in and around the Oneida Reservation clean. The check presentation occurred at the Oneida One Stop – Larsen and Jessica Schultz, Executive Director along with Katie Woodrow, Lower Fox River Program Director, were on hand to receive the donation.

FWWA is an independent nonprofit organization that identifies issues and advocates effective policies and actions that protect, restore, and sustain water resources in the Fox-Wolf River Basin.

River Ocker, Oneida Member, along with her co-worker Vicki Strzelecki, as well as many other faculty and students at Rock Ledge School in Seymour, WI, wore Orange Shirts stating "Every Child Matters" to acknowledge Orange Shirt Day on Friday, September 29, 2023.

Ocker commented that over her four years as a Youth Education Services Advocate, with this being her first year at Rock Ledge, how impressed she was with the show of solidarity at her school to recognize the historical trauma caused by the Residential Schools, "This was a huge success. This is my first year here, but our principal noted that this was the first year we have done something to this extent."

The school also builds awareness to Oneida culture as well with a variety of activities, such as making corn husk dolls during the school's family night, participating in Tsyunhehkwa's Harvest/Husking Bee each year, and field trips to Oneida Cultural Heritage.

Safe Shelter Continues its Mission

Safe Shelter has been in operation since November 2021 and was first introduced to the Kalihwisaks readership in the June 15, 2022 edition, which cited that inflation was at 8.3% and by the end of that month, it peeked at 9.1%. Currently, the inflation rate has decreased to 3.7%. Nevertheless, the aggregate effect the current and historical rates of inflation have had on the cost of living is continuing its detrimental effect on the ability of those less fortunate to secure housing. A two bedroom rental was around \$924 as of April 2022. Currently, according to Rent.com, a two bedroom rental in the Green Bay area averages \$1,167. US Census data from the Green Bay area reveals that the living wage for a family of four (two adults and two children) is \$36.68. For a family of four, this living salary, assuming a family has a wage earner capable to earn this amount, or both of them combining to make this, are using roughly 25% of their income just to pay for housing, pushing the boundaries of the 28% that most lenders recommend.

Pearl Webster, Safe Shelter (SS) Executive Director, points out that these data points reaffirm why SS prioritizes family more than individuals because the majority of the SS families have a single wage earner making between \$15 and \$17 per hour. Beyond the data, though, Webster says, "Taking one look into the eyes of the children in these circumstances is my daily motivation." Webster goes on by explaining that providing a roof over these children is a bandaid. The more sustainable solution is working with the adults to help them become the best versions of themselves.

SS provides the standard programs in partnerships with other shelters, AODA counseling, recovery coaching, employment assistance, housing referral and support, budgeting, daily living activities, parenting and other lifeskills training. Beyond the standards, Webster strives to offer as many cultural education and practices that are available from the community and that currently, an entire curriculum is being developed.

In addition to being the strategic leader, Webster is also the Operations Manager, Public Relations, Marketing, and Special Events Coordinator for SS. Wearing all these hats is incredibly difficult, as she says when asked if there are any upcoming special events, "Unfortunately, no. These 1.5 years has been exhausting just keeping our feet on the ground. Funding has been a struggle due to being an entity below the all-important two-years-in-operation threshold, which is the magic number to qualify for most grants. We're excited to turn two this November so I'm optimistic this will mean new funding sources." Aside from the daily operations, another recently important topic, as noted above, is public relations regarding the roles and responsibilities she upholds to her Oneida community.

Webster says, "Through no fault of their own, many, including the Oneida Community, have a lack of knowledge about SS and the circumstances we're under to serve Oneida's homeless." Webster has been tracking the ethnicity of SS residents. Currently, 50 of the residents are Indigenous. However, because it's prohibited to track, or even ask about specific tribal affiliation due to funding regulations, it's unknown how many are Oneida or Oneida descendants. Off the record, though, Webster knows that a large percentage of the Indigenous residents have some Oneida lineage.

As Webster continues SS' vision and mission from weekto-week and hopefully, year-to-year, to end homelessness, she wants to emphasize to everyone to keep in mind the lessons of the Great Law, or whatever way of life you follow, to exercise compassion and caring and to know that most residents are not lazy or don't work. It's also important,

CLEVELAND MAKES HER DEBUT ON SILVER SCREEN

Memphis Cleveland, Ho-Chunck/ Meskwaki/Oneida, the daughter of Michelle Greendeer and Stepfather, Lance Rave, was 20 years old and hard at work studying for a Bachelor's Degree in the Media field in 2021 when she suddenly lost her Grandfather, George Greendeer. It was a very difficult time for Memphis, but as she would soon discover, it was also a very exciting time.

In April 2021 Cleveland's friends recommended she respond to a casting call, which at that time, seemed to be a very-under-theradar movie. She wasn't sure what it was about, but she took her friends advice. The casting call requested Indigenous actors who were able to ride horses. Cleveland mentions, "It was perfect because I have been involved with horses my entire life." She went on to explain that even today, she lives with her mother in Black River Falls helping to run a hoarse-boarding facility called Sweetgrass Stables. Although she

was still in school, she realized what a great opportunity this was. With her mother's support, she packed up and went to Oklahoma to try out. After the auditions, she came back home and waited for a phone call.

A casting agent mentioned all the A-listers, Marten Scorsese, Leonardo

DiCaprio, and Robert Di Nero, as he gave her the bad news first, "We're not looking for horseback riders for this movie." Cleveland thought, "Well, I guess this isn't for me, then." Then, the casting agent delivered the good news, "We love your look so much that we still want you to try out for BG (Background) roles anyway." Long story short, Cleveland once again packed up for an acting adventure she'll remember for a lifetime.

Principal shooting for *Killers of The Flower Moon*© began in April 2021 and Cleveland was ready. She was so ready that, despite not being able to find living quarters near the Oklahoma set due to all the local hotels being booked, Cleveland, as resourceful as any, made one of her horse-trailers her home for the next six months.

Although none of her roles were spoken, Cleveland played in a multitude of roles ranging from a young wealthy Osage to a young



Traditional Osage woman. In total, it was 15 different roles she would play. As she did so, she recollects how the Creator put her on this path, "It was meant to be. During my time on set, I learned so much about the movie-making world and more importantly, how I can apply it to my future endeavors." Belle goes on to describe how she eventually wants to pursue a career in Journalism and Public Relations, which she previously studying, as well as be a leader in Tribal Advocacy.

When she lost her grandpa, despite temporarily foregoing her studies to take advantage of this acting opportunity, she channeled her energy in a good way with resounding success. After the filming was complete, she came back home to help her family once again at Sweetgrass Stables. Since being home, she has also been in other acting roles, including parts in season two and three of Reservation Dogs, and most recently, is playing a part in Meet Me By the Creek, a documentary being filmed in Oklahoma about protecting waterways, which will debut in 2024. She has also started school again at Western Tech studying for her Associate Degree in Liberal Arts with aspirations to continue her education in Diversity and Equity Inclusion.

During Killers of the Flower Moon[©], she took great satisfaction in how the entire cast and crew were so respectful of Indigenous culture. As someone who lives the traditional Ho-Chunk way, it reaffirmed and heightened her sense of community and the value of her culture. The sky is the limit for Memphis, who has good advice for anyone looking for their path in life, "Don't be afraid to be vulnerable. Don't be afraid to be wrong. If you don't know, ask questions." Killers of the Flower Moon[©] began showing October 19, 2023. Look for it, and watch for Memphis' appearances, in a theater near you.

first place in her sectional tournament with a score of 72.





Tsyunhehkwa (Joon-Hen-Kwa), commemorated its 30th Annual Harvest and Husking Bee (HHB) Saturday, October 7, 2023. Participants were invited to help pick, husk, and braid traditional white corn, all while learning about the significance of the Oneida Nation's sustenance to the community and culture. Eric McLester, Manager of Tsyunhehkwa, took a moment to enlighten participants how much they're appreciated during the event, "The white corn harvested during HHB directly benefits the Oneida community. Once the white corn is

dry, we will typically process 150 pounds of dried corn per week, which is eventually delivered to the Oneida Cannery, where it is transformed into an array of white corn products." Ultimately, these products are made available for purchase at the Oneida One Stops and provided to community groups. In addition to learning about Oneida's Nation's white corn, Tsyunhehkwa treated attendees to an assortment of enriching experiences, including apple cider, traditional corn soup, music, wagon rides and engaging activities such as corn husk doll crafting, watching corn mush demonstrations, while also enjoying the various food and craft items from local vendors...

Joe Big Mountain, Cree/Mohawk/ Comanche, the husband of Sunshine (Nunies) Big Mountain, is a internationally renowned porcupine quill work artist whose jewelry was recently featured as part of the wardrobe for *Killers of the Flower Moon*© leading actress Lily Gladstone's photo shoot for an article appearing in the October 2023 issue of British Vogue magazine.

When asked how he became interested in quillwork, Big Mountain explained that he was raised in a family of crafters who traveled the pow wow circuit. Thus, it was an inevitability that his family would encourage him to partake in some form of crafting. Needless to say, he chose quillwork. Even with 20+ years of experience, he says he still continues to master more quillwork methods, of which he mentions there are hundreds of.

Today, Big Mountain sells his work mostly online and thus, he and his family don't have to travel much anymore. Although recently, his wife attended New York Fashion Week, September 9 & 10, 2023, part of which featured Justin Jacob's (Plains Cree) Indigenous-themed clothing. Through the Global Fashion Collective out of Vancouver, Canada, Jacob discovered several jewelry designers, including Big Mountain, to provide jewelry for the event, another tribute to Big Mountain's talent.

Currently, Big Mountain continues to create new lines of jewelry, which sell out quickly and so, it's business as usual. On the horizon, though, Big Mountain is looking to expand his talent into making authentic Indigenous Dolls, adorned with Indigenous clothing, regalia and of course, his jewelry. He ended the interview with words of wisdom to anyone wanting to advance themselves with their craft, "If you want to do it, do it and don't give up. The improvements shown here for the Veterans Memorial are piggy-backing on the Amelia Cornelius Culture Park to take advantage of equipment and materials already on-site.

- A. Remove and replace parking lot.
- **B.** Address sinking memorial pavers and regrade surface to divert water away from the base of the wall.
- C. Encircle site and Purple Heart Monument with accessible asphalt walking paths.
- D. New base installation for second eagle statue.
- E. Remove and replace landscaping on the side of the wall closest to Hwy 54.

Prior to the developments listed above, the wall received a new ridge cap to divert water from the facade of the sign, the wampum painted design was refinished and cracks and erosion on the sides of the wall were sealed and repaired. Finally, the Oneida Veterans Memorial lettering and the Oneida Nation Seal were replaced.

HAZARD TREE EVALUATIONS Identifying the risks associated with a hazardous tree is a subjective process. Since the nature of many tree failures is unpredictable, determining which trees will fail and in which fashion the failure will occur, is extremely difficult. The Hazard Tree Evaluation can serve as a tool, which can determine when, how, and what actions will be conducted by Conservation Department Staff or if the situation requires an outside Contractor. To initiate the process, an intake form can be established for an evaluation. The evaluation MUST meet the following requirements: An Oneida Enrolled Member.

- Designated as an Elder or Disabled.
- Tree is a Hazard to person(s) and or property.
- Member is the primary homeowner.
- Is the Homeowner's primary residence.
- Hazard MUST Pertain to Dead, Dying, or Storm Damage Tree. *Healthy Trees Will Not Be Considered For An Evaluation.
- Home is located within the exterior boundaries of the **Oneida Nation Reservation.**



Q&A on GWA OLIPP

Submitted by Oneida Trust Enrollments

- Q: What is GWA OLIPP?
- A: This stands for General Welfare Act Oneida Life Insurance Plan Plus.
- Q: How does GWA OLIPP work?
- A: In the event of a member's death the OLIPP benefit pays up to \$15,000 to their funeral home to cover final expenses. Then, if a beneficiary form is on file, the remainder will be distributed to your named beneficiary(ies). The intent of this benefit is to provide for the final expenses of a deceased member as part of their general welfare needs, so their family is not burdened.
- Q: What if I don't have a beneficiary form on file?
- A: As of September 29th, 2023 if there is no form on file funeral expenses will be paid. If there is any remaining funds they will stay in the GWA OLIPP fund.
- Q: Is there a deadline to turn in my form?
- A: No, forms can be turned in anytime.
- Q: Who do I contact to find out if I have a form on file?
- A: You may call the office 920.869.6200 or email: TrustEnrollments@oneidanation.org
- Q: Where can I get an Oneida Beneficiary Designation Form?
- A: This form is available in office or online https://oneida-nsn.gov/resources/enrollments/forms/
- *Q: How often can I make changes:*
- A: You may make changes at any time. Reason to update your form should be remove/add beneficiary, beneficiary is deceased.
- Q: What if I list a minor as primary beneficiary?
- A: If a minor is listed, we than ask for proof of guardianship of the minor, then the funds would be distributed to the person in care of the minor.

KILLERS OF THE FLOWER MOON Movie Review

It's the early 1920's and the Osage People experience the luxuries from newfound riches along with criminal acts that follow the allure of money and power in an oil boom. Acclaimed director Martin Scorsese's film Killers of the Flower Moon©, based on David Grann's book of the same title, follows outsider Ernest Burkhart's (DiCaprio) relationship to the people of Osage County with guidance from his uncle William "King" Hale (De Niro), influential leader in the community. It also features breakout star Lily Gladstone, member of the Osage Tribe, portraying Mollie, who bares close witness to the deception, manipulation, and murder of so many in Osage County.

Leading up to the time of the film the Osage had been forced to cede ancestral land throughout the 1800's. Their eventual settlement would prove wealthy; The Osage had struck black gold by the end of the 18th century. In 1906 The Osage Allotment Act offered subsurface mineral rights to the tribe. Royalties would then be distributed among members. That head right would be passed to the allottee's legal heirs, and that's where some sought opportunity. The land held some of the richest oil fields in the U.S. bringing in tens of millions of dollars per year making The Osage the richest people per capita in the world. To go from working the fields to living the lavish lifestyle eventually attracted predators with criminal intent. The atrocities that followed were enough to trigger the first ever federal investigation under President J. Edgar Hoover.

Overall, Killers of the Flower *Moon*[©] feels authentic with great performances, writing, and set pieces of incredible detail. Numerous Native Americans were part of the cast and design throughout the film. Years of research and elder interviews from journalist/author Grann contributed as well. Aside from the criminal dealings and mysterious deaths the film regularly hits on pieces of the culture and language. The film also shows the struggle of many vices, colonization, and disease that so many Native Americans had gone through despite having great monetary wealth. The run time can be a little overwhelming at nearly 3.5 hours but is time well

spent. It's a great depiction of the horrific events in Osage history, one that should not be missed. My rating is 8.8 frybreads out of 10.

CANANDAIGUA TREATY DAY OF COMMEMORATION

November 11, 2023 commemorates the 229th year of The Canandaigua Treaty of 1794 forged between the United States of America and the Iroquois (Haudenosaunee) Confederacy: Seneca, Cayuga, Onondaga, Oneida, Mohawk and Tuscarora. The treaty signified peace between the two and recognized the sovereignty of the other as distinct nations to govern and set their own laws.
