Oneida Artists Collaborate on OSCAR DESIGN

Lily Gladstone continued to make history at the 96th Academy Awards (AA) by becoming the first Indigenous woman to receive a Best Actress nomination for her role as Mollie Burkhart in the Martin Scorsese film, *Killers of the Flower Moon*. At the AA festivities, Gladstone wore a stunning gown that will forever link this event to some talented Indigenous artists, including Joe Big Mountain, who was featured in the November 2023 edition.

Big Mountain's connection to Gladstone began when she wore his quillwork in a photo shoot for British Vogue Magazine. This connection continued recently when Gucci's Creative Director Sabato De Sarno formed a groundbreaking collaboration with Big Mountain, as well as other Indigenous artists, to design a custom midnight-blue velvet gown that paid homage to Gladstone's Blackfeet heritage. The gown featured a strapless silhouette and a matching cape adorned with floral quillwork petals, symbolizing the enduring beauty of Indigenous artistry passed down through generations. This remarkable moment marked the first time a high-fashion luxury label collaborated with an Indigenous artist on an Oscars design, celebrating both creativity and cultural heritage. "I can literally feel the love poured into each quill and

bead—the dress is alive with it," says Lily Gladstone.
Gladstone intentionally infused her Oscar look
with Indigenous motifs, as she believes this

historic moment should be shared by Natives everywhere. The choice of quillwork holds immense cultural significance across many Nations, including the Blackfeet. For her, it's a personal connection—she

Shekoli khale hoyan (Hello and happy new year)! I would like to send my well wishes to all our Oneida relatives near and far and hope that 2024 is a prosperous year for you and your family. In January, our community put through Tsha?tekohsélha? (saw-deh-go-sail-ha) our Midwinter ceremony where we were once again fortunate to renew our responsibilities as Ukwehuwe (the real/original people) for another cycle. Seeing this is my first Oneida Business Committee (OBC) forum in the Kalihwisaks, it's important that I extend my heartfelt gratitude and deep appreciation to the Oneida community for believing in my ability to serve as councilman and represent our Nation for the 2023-2026 term. Yaw^ko ki wah (thank you very much)!

During the campaign, I had two major strategies that I worked on that continue to guide me in my new role as a councilman. My vision for Oneida is: "Rebuilding our Nation together with compassion, kindness, empathy and optimism." The five (5) priorities that I will focus on during this term are:

- Mental Health & Wellbeing
- Technology
- Energy
- Community and Economic Development and Diversification
- Housing

The other strategy that guided my campaign was Native Nation Building. My goal was to gain a deeper

understanding of how this approach could positively transform the governing structure of our Nation to reflect our traditional Haudenosaunee governance system. Native Nation Building is an extensively detailed concept that can be explained as a process by which a Tribal Nation strengthens its own capacity for effective and culturally relevant self-government and sustainable community development. The OBC kicked-off the 2023-2026 term with a week's worth of Nation Building which provided an overarching theme for the development of the OBC's Strategic Plan.

As an OBC councilman, I serve as a member of the Legislative Operating Committee (LOC) and was elected by my fellow councilmembers to serve as chairman of the LOC, which is a responsibility that I hold in high regard. One of the LOC's goals is to enhance community engagement to spur more participation in the lawmaking process. Thus far, we have hosted two community meetings where we gathered feedback and suggested solutions that may help strengthen the Nation's laws, policies, codes and ordinances.

As I continue to serve the Nation, the priorities I campaigned with are well intact. I am committed to serving the Nation with compassion, kindness, empathy, and optimism.

I have held positions in payroll, purchasing, travel, budget, accounting, and most recently as the Nation's Assistant Chief Financial Officer for the past 13 years.

These are a few of my career accomplishments:

- · Implementing accounting and timekeeping systems
- Implementing an inventory system
- · Acquisition, re-negotiating, and compliance for both financial institution debt and bond debt
- · Drafting a General Welfare Assistance law that was used as the template for Oneida Nation
- · Providing guidance and the debt extinguishment plan for \$93.6 million of debt
- · Providing financial guidance to help build cash from \$60.3 million in 2008 to \$368.7 million in January 2024
- Building the equity (value) of the Nation from \$412 million in 2008 to \$1.296 billion in January 2024
- Helped guide the government through the Great Recession of 2008 and the COVID-19 Pandemic shutdown During my career I have been so lucky to have wonderful mentors in Diane Rusch, Tina Danforth, and Larry Barton.

The activities began Friday, March 15 with a Social Dance in the NHC Cafeteria. Many community members, Oneida students, and some NAIAHF Inductees, came together to enjoy song and dance, as well as each other's company. Shortly after, the pace quickened with a Traditional Lacrosse game on the southwest lawn of NHC. Players delighted the crowd with great Lacrosse action while the players enjoyed a sunny 55 degree afternoon. This brought the days activities to a close until early Saturday morning.

Anthony Fleg, coming all the way from New Mexico via an invitation from Ninham, led a contingent of runners and walkers at 6:30am, heading east around the Oneida Hotel/Casino Complex to meet the sunrise to acknowledge the eldest brother, the Sun, and to give thanks for a new day. After, Artley Skenandore smudged everyone as he provided good words to participants to continue on with the day, encouraging each other to form good relationships.

The banquet doors opened at 9am where attendees greeted one another as they enjoyed beverages as Dan and Susan welcomed the Buffalo Creek Singers to provide an honor song to open the activities.

One after the other, the audience applauded each inductee, or inductee representative, as they were introduced, given a certificate and gift, and posed for a photograph. By this time, most had built up an appetite, especially those from the morning run/walk.

A delicious lunch was served from Noon-1pm by the Oneida Hotel as Menominee Nation member and musician, Wade Fernandez, entertained everyone with his pleasing music. On March 1, 2024, the Maple Sugar Camp at Oneida Nation Elementary School commenced with Wáhta Kayu kwa tho – Maple Tree Tobacco Burning led by Randy Cornelius. Afterward, students engaged in maple sugar tapping while learning proper techniques and savoring delicious samples.

This ceremony is held at the end of February or first part of March, after the first thunder which wakes up the trees. It all depends on the weather. When the warm winds once again begin to circulate, a day is set aside to give thanks. A tobacco burning is done to honor the maple tree. Each camp in the community will have their own tobacco burning. A small fire is built near a maple tree. The words in the tobacco burning ask all of creation for a safe time while the people are in the woods working, thus calling on the Creator to assure that no great harm comes to those harvesting the sap. All of creation is acknowledged. Then the people can go and set up their sugar camps. Otsyi khé. ta Twanehelatú (Maple Tree Thanksgiving -Closing) Once the camps are all done harvesting the sap, and everything is cleaned up, a day is picked by the faithkeepers to give thanks for what people have been able to harvest. At this time, the sap is used as medicine for everyone to drink and give thanks. Two Great Feather Dances are done to honor the maple tree and for Creation's cooperation during the harvesting of the sap.

Harlow Skenandore, the daughter of Clyde Skenandore and Alex Powless, is 1st Team All-Conference in the Fox River Classic Conference (FRCC). At 145 lbs, Skenandore is also the FRCC Wrestler of the Year.

Going into the state tournament, Skenandore was seeded #8 and was dealing with torn ligaments and muscles in her hands. The night before, she decided to give it a go, eventually beating Turner Junior Sydney Andrews 5-1, becoming the first athlete from Pulaski to win a girls state wrestling championship. "It was awesome. I don't know how to put into words yet. It's still kind of hitting me now."

Watch out world. Harlow is just a freshman.



NDNSports.com reported in February 2024 that Waukau was the 2024 Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Women's Basketball Newcomer of the Year. Waukau ranked third in the conference with a 0.366 three-point field goal percentage and 53 three-pointers made. She was fifth on the team with 7.5 points per game with a season high 15 points against UW-Stevens Point on February 3, 2024.

Margie Stevens, the daughter of Margaret and Mirac Ellis, graduated from Green Bay Southwest High School in 2023 before beginning her basketball career with the Wisconsin Lutheran College Warriors (WLC).

In her freshman campaign, the six-foot, one inch Stevens, from her forward position, racked up quite a list of accolades, including First Team All-Northern Athletics Collegiate Conference (NACC), NACC All-Tournament Team, and NACC Student-Athlete of the Week for January 15-21, 2024.

She helped lead the Warriors to an overall 23-5 season, including 66-42 victory over number 2 seed St. Norbert College capturing WLC's 12th NACC title before losing in a tight battle, 65-72 to the Wartburg Knights from Waverly, lowa in the NCAA Division III Championship Tournament.




KEEPERS OF THE EARTH-PART I Our Carbon Footprint

If you ask anyone living in the Northeast Wisconsin (NEW) area about this 2023-2024 Winter season, the common answer would be, "Warm." According to WeAreGreenBay.com, NEW has seen seven record-high temperatures set since December 24, 2023, including a 70-degree day as recently as February 27, 2024. To gain a better understanding of this, it's important to be aware of what most scientists believe is the primary driver of these record-high temperatures.

OurWorldData.org states CO2 and other greenhouse gases (GHG) like methane and nitrous oxide that are emitted when we burn fossil fuels to produce materials like steel, cement, and plastics have dramatically increased. The graph to the right illustrates the increase in GHG emitted around the world since the industrial era, showing 4 billion tonnes in 1850 to 54.5 billion tonnes in 2021. GHG's cause temperatures to warm by absorbing and emitting radiant energy. They absorb radiation coming from the Earth and prevent heat from escaping into space. With this comes the strongly correlated rise in average temperatures.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) calculated that in pre-industrial years, the Earth's average surface temperature was about 56.62 degrees Fahrenheit (F). Since then, Earth's temperatures have continued to rise 0.11° F since 1850. However, since 1982, this rate tripled to 0.36° F per decade, with 2023 being the warmest year since records began, averaging 58.74° F, This 2.12 increase may seem small, but because of the vast complexity of Earth's systems, the amount of energy to increase global temperatures by this much are



massive, leading to climate-related challenges the likes of which none of us, including us here in NEW, and Oneida, have ever seen before.

Some may argue, "We're in an El Nino weather pattern this year." This occurrence happens when the equatorial Pacific becomes warmer than average and easterly winds blow weaker than normal, pushing warmer weather patterns over the United States. However, even this weather phenomenon, which was once thought to be caused by natural cycles, is now linked to human activity. Although January 2024 brought some colder temperatures and two snowstorms, this was quickly offset by increased February 2024 temperatures. Winter activities in

Wisconsin were all but non-existent, such as snowmobiling, skiing (except for man-made-snow-making), ice fishing, etc. In fact, Governor Evers released grants to help economically struggling businesses that have suffered through the 2023-24 Winter season.

Councilman Jameson Wilson attended the 6th Annual Seminole Tribe of Florida Renewable Energy & Sustainability Conference and the Tribal Clean Energy Summit in Temecula, California, both of which occurred in February 2024. The Oneida Nation hosted and presented at the 29th Annual Wisconsin Wetlands Association (WWA) conference held on February 20-22, 2024 at the Oneida Hotel. More than 350 attendees gathered under the theme "Great Wetlands Make Great Waters" to engage and share valuable insights surrounding wetland research and restoration. The conference also offered a field trip opportunity that highlighted the many partnerships that help make the Oneida Nation's conservation efforts possible. At the 80-acre WisDOT wetland mitigation bank, participants learned about the regulatory requirements and management of the site that make it a very high-quality wetland as it serves to replace the wetland habitat that was lost with local DOT road projects. In 2025, ownership will transfer to the Oneida Nation who will oversee managing and maintaining the project. The second stop

was at the 420-acre prairie and wetland habitat project located at a headwater tributary of Trout Creek, land which was reacquired by the Oneida Nation from the State of Wisconsin. It serves as an important breeding ground for grassland and marsh bird species as it is the largest, high quality native prairie grassland in northeast Wisconsin.



in various forms, from headdresses to regalia and she reminisced on the very first pair of earrings she bought that were crafted by Bob Tailfeathers, an artist from her hometown.


Joe and Sunshine Big Mountain, in collaboration with a talented team of Indigenous artists from the Oneida reservation in Wisconsin,







BACK PAY LAW AMENDMENTS

The purpose of the Back Pay law is to set forth standards used in the reinstatement of an employee and the calculation of back pay for all employees of the Nation in accordance with the Nation's law.

The Back Pay law amendments will:

- Include a new section in the law which provides for the reinstatement of employee who had an involuntary separation overturned and addresses such issues as:
 - requirement to hold a position pending litigation;
 - · amending the position description or eliminating the position pending an employee appeal; and
 - reinstatement of an employee to the position the employee was involuntarily separated from;
- Clarify that back pay calculations shall be made using the employee's last wage in the position which they were involuntarily separated from.
- Clarify the circumstances in which an employee is not eligible to work, and therefore is not eligible for back pay.

HOBART LAWSUIT POSITION STATEMENT

Recently the Village of Hobart (Village) sued the Department of the Interior (DOI) and federal officials to stop them from taking land into trust for the Nation. The village claims the fee-to-trust process is unconstitutional, the Nation is not eligible to have land taken into trust, and the DOI is biased against it. The Nation believes these claims are without merit and that prior litigation has answered

some, if not all, of these claims. The Nation moved to intervene which, if allowed by the presiding judge, would allow the Nation to act as a party in this litigation. The federal government supports the Nation's involvement in this litigation, but Village's position is not currently known. This matter remains open, and the court will decide the matter in accordance with its process timelines.


The expansion of sports betting to the entire Oneida Nation reservation



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
